## GOVERNOR TRAPP TO ASK LEGISLATURE TO RECESS TO JANUARY

### BRIEF SESSION OF SENATE IS HELD TUESDAY MORNING

### COMMISSIONER SUPREME COURT FACES CHARGES

Articles of impeachment being prepared and may be filed Tuesday.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Nov. 20. (AP)—Announcement was made at the office of Governor M. E. Trapp today that the state legislature would be asked to recess until the second week in January.

The senate met briefly this morning and adjourned until afternoon. The senate only a few formalities were exchanged, including expressions of appreciation of press representatives for courtesies extended them during the impeachment trial of J. C. Walton.

W. E. Disney, chairman of the house board of managers, announced today that articles of impeachment against Charles H. Ruth, supreme court commissioner, were being prepared and may be submitted to the house this afternoon. Ruth, who has long been a political associate of Walton, was appointed to his present position by the deceased governor.

Disney indicated that most of the evidence on which the Ruth impeachment charges are based had been given to the committee by Mrs. Patrick A. Nagle, member of the state board of affairs, of which Ruth was chairman prior to the appointment as a supreme court commissioner.

A resolution to expel Murray Gibbons of Tulsa, speaker of the house in the 9th regular session of the legislature, on grounds that he commercialized his influence as speaker, was introduced today. Gibbons had interfered with the special election October 8, was introduced in the house and the committee investigating house members.

The house voted to hear discussion on the resolution at 9 p. m. Friday. ## FINES INCREASING AND WILL EVEN BE LARGER NEXT TIME

JUDGE ATWELL STATES THAT VIOLATION MUST STOP IN DISTRICT.

MANY PLEAS OF GUILTY ENTERED BY DEFENDANTS

Statements of Men Lead Judge to Say That Much Whiskey Lost in Wichita Falls.

Fines in the United States district court are on the increase. Judge Wm. H. Atwell, presiding at the fall term of court of the Wichita Falls division of the federal district court is raising the fines for violations of the national prohibition laws between \$100 and \$150.

Tuesday morning he stated that at the next term of court in all probability his range would be between \$200 and \$400.

"This practice must stop in my district. The people must quit, because it is the law of their government. They have no right to say that the law is not good, because it is as much their law as it is mine or anyone else's."

The expressions from the defendants led the court to remark, "It certainly seems as though there is a lot of whiskey lost in Wichita Falls."

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## WIFE OF WITNESS WANTS TO TESTIFY AT FORBES INQUIRY

MRS. MORTIMER REQUESTS AN OPPORTUNITY TO DEFEND HER CHARACTER.

CHARGES INSINUATIONS MADE BY WITNESSES

Requests That Testimony Given in Secret Session Be Made Public.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20. (AP)—Mrs. Katherine Mortimer of Philadelphia, wife of Elias H. Mortimer, state witness against former Director Charles R. Forbes, tried unsuccessfully to testify today before the senate veterans committee in an effort, she said, to vindicate publicly her "character and good name."

Responding to the formal request of her counsel, Daniel T. Wright, Chairman Reed said Mrs. Mortimer had been heard at her own request in private and that if she desired the committee would release her testimony publicly. He added that the committee also would propound to Mrs. Mortimer a number of questions as her counsel might prepare and as the committee might regard as relevant and necessary.

"We do not recall anything in the matter already," Chairman Reed said. "The principal offender in this respect was Mrs. Mortimer's own attorney in her divorce proceedings (S. D. Timberlake of Washington, Va.). He dragged into the record matter which he, as an attorney, must have known were irrelevant."

Mr. Wright said the committee would be glad to submit questions to the committee and that Mrs. Mortimer had been heard in secret sessions before the committee.

Presenting the plan of his client Mr. Wright said Mrs. Mortimer had come asking for an opportunity to refute the insinuations which had been made and declared that a spirit of fair play "would demand that she be heard."

**NEAR END OF HEARING WAR VETERANS BUREAU**  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 20. (AP)—The senate committee investigating the veterans bureau is determined to complete its report to congress next month.

While much of the public investigation has been devoted to charges of debauchery and corruption and testimony relating to the construction of the veterans bureau, the principal charges, Elias H. Mortimer, members of the committee say, has been done at their business sessions which have extended over many weeks.

Additional corrective measures remain to be put into force, said the committee, any some of these must await action by congress on recommendations before the senate which will accompany the committee's report. Chairman Reed and his colleagues desire to get these recommendations before the senate at the earliest time possible and this has been a controlling factor in cutting short the public inquiry.

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## HITLER CRITICALLY ILL

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## Council of Ambassadors After Further Meetings Have Outlined Compromise Formula for Germany

PARIS, Nov. 20. (AP)—After six days of negotiations four meetings and five adjournments the ambassadors' council met on a "compromise" formula for dealing with Germany which even if it only postpones the evil of decision as many maintain, at least, it postpones a break in the allied front.

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### Open Outer Wooden Gates of the Tomb of "King Tut" In Preparation For Exploration of the Interior

By Universal Service.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—With the opening of the outer wooden gates to the tomb of King Tutankhamon Monday by Howard Carter, American Egyptologist, in charge of the expedition which has again entered the valley of kings to complete the work of discovery begun under direction of Lord Carnarvon, the work of entering the inner tomb is close at hand.

Carter has just returned from Cairo where he completed an agreement with the Egyptian government concerning the excavation now in progress, and work is expected to go ahead rapidly without further interruption.

Under the new impetus it is expected that in a few days men will look into the face of a pharaoh who lived in Egypt 3,300 years ago, thus the mystery of King Tutankhamon's life will probably be solved.

"There is little doubt in my mind that the tomb is a mystery," the whole tomb proclaims it. The royal mummy with which he was buried with his palace furniture suggests some ancient drama. The tomb was not even finished," says Mr. Carter.

Compared with any other royal tomb in the valley of kings, Tutankhamon's tomb is modest and humble—an unworthy place for a king of Egypt. The royal mummy was King Tut an old man? Was he worn out with trying to revive the ancient splendor of his country after the extravagance of his brother-in-law's expensive hobby?

Will there be found on his body the mark of an ailing man? Or was he a boy king who died of disease? Mr. Carter is more or less inclined to the latter belief.

"With very few exceptions," says Carter, "the garments found in the tomb are those of a child. Our first idea was that the king might have kept stored away the clothes he wore as a boy. But later on one of the belts and the squares of one of the robes we found the royal cartouches. He must then have become king, from which it would seem to follow that he was quite a young boy when he ascended the throne."

"The questions raise an interesting historical point and we shall be eager to see the evidence of the age the mummy will supply. Certain whenever the king appears on tomb furniture he is represented as little more than a youth."

Carter says that the most difficult task of the excavators will be the dismantling of the shrines in the sepulchral chamber.

"It is probable," he says, "from evidence supplied by the Ramesses IV Papyrus, that there will be a succession of no fewer than five of these shrines, built within one another, before we come to the stone sarcophagus in which the king lies, and in the spaces between these shrines we expect to find a number of beautiful objects."

"With the mummy—if as we hope and believe, it remains untouched by plunderers, there should certainly be the crown jewels and other regalia of a king of Egypt. Imagination falters at what the tomb may yet disclose."

Football Facts

QUESTION: What are the rights of the captain in regard to using any of the five middle players of the line back of the line of scrimmage on the offense? Can the captain shift a player from any of the five middle positions of the line and again return him to his position in the line? ANSWER: No player of the five middle positions on the line, center, guard or tackle, has the right to drop back of the line of scrimmage on offense before the ball is put into play, unless he is at least five yards back of the line when the ball is put into play, and the player who ordinarily plays behind the line takes his place in the line of scrimmage. The captain can make such a shift, as the taking of a line man to a position in the backfield if he so desires, but must notify the referee, and the player so shifted cannot again return to one of the middle positions. However, any of these middle linemen can be merely taken back five yards without consulting the referee, and may later return to his original position in the line. It is only when with a player is shifted to the backfield that he cannot again return to the line.

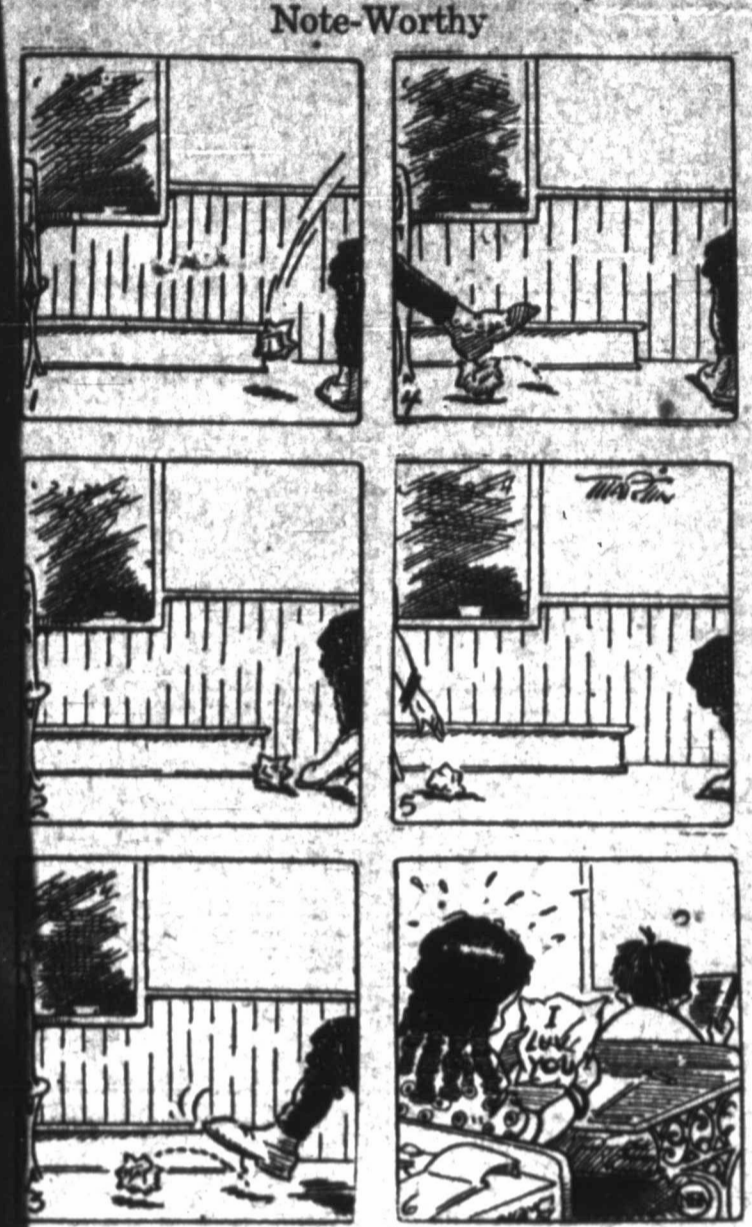
