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RURAL LETTER CARRIER
JOB MORE HAZARDOUS
DEPARTMENT REPORTS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—The job of rural letter carrier has become a hazardous one, the casualty list for the last two and a half years, made public by the postoffice department, showing 55 lives to have been lost in the performance of duty.

A plan to patrol of rural routes was issued urging that boxes be placed on the right hand side of the road in the direction of the carrier's travel. This it was said would remove one of the greatest dangers of traffic perils.

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REPORT CONDITION OF AGRICULTURE IN SOUTHERN STATES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27. (AP)—Agricultural conditions in the south during the past week were summarized in part today by the department of agriculture as follows: The weather during the week ending November 27 was mostly from abrupt changes in temperature and was mild for the season in virtually all sections of the country, although a moderate cool wave had overspread the interior valleys and the south at the week's close. The temperature, which was above normal in all sections except in parts of Florida. Precipitation occurred in the south-east locally as far south as central Georgia, but in the Mississippi valley and trans-Mississippi states temperatures as low as 32 degrees were not reported south of St. Louis, Mo. Extreme northern Arkansas and south Kansas were mostly less rainfall and mild temperatures in the northwestern portion of the cotton belt were favorable for field work and very good progress was made in picking. Harvest was about completed in Texas except in the northwestern portion, where the last of the cotton crop was being gathered in Arkansas earlier than usual.

CONFERENCE CONSIDERS SMUGGLING OF LIQUOR AT CANADIAN BORDER

OTTAWA, Nov. 28. (AP)—Canadian and United States officials attending the international conference on liquor smuggling expected today to get down to hard facts in their discussion of methods proposed by the American government to end exportation of rum across the border. Although strict secrecy was maintained, it was believed little was done at the opening of the conference yesterday other than for the Canadians to receive the United States proposals which, in effect, were thought to be the same as those outlined in Washington before the conference opened. These proposals, it has been indicated, will find little favor in the eyes of Dominion officials.

Jacques Bureau, minister of customs and excise, whose department is interested primarily in the proposals, will make his first appearance at the conference today. He is expected to set forth the reasons why acceptance of the American plan in its entirety would be difficult because it would necessitate action by the Dominion parliament whereas the liquor question in Canada is left entirely to the provinces.

SOUTHAMPTON, Nov. 28. (AP)—Forty girls who sailed today for New Zealand made a promise, solemn and laughing, according to temperament, that they would not become brides for at least 12 months. They are going out in charge of a mission under the "domestic help scheme," and the wedding clause in their contract was necessary because of the rush of suitors these girls from the mother country are attracting.

LARGE SUM REALIZED FROM SALE OF GOODS BY WAR DEPARTMENT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. (AP)—Sale of war department properties acquired during the war and declared to possess no military value for the government in peace time had returned \$944,573,329 to the treasury on June 30, 1923, according to the annual report of Assistant Secretary Owen Davis. The returns made in the 1923 fiscal year totaled \$70,447,742, the remainder having been made in the northwestern portion, where the last of the cotton crop was being gathered in Arkansas earlier than usual.

An analysis of the returns and costs of the properties disposed of shows that the average percentage of recovery to June 30, last, was 28 per cent. The cost value of property still on hand for disposition at the same time was \$117,528,248, of which \$12,562,416 represented the cost of lands and buildings.

UNDISTURBED TOMB OF TIME OF CHRIST HAS BEEN DISCOVERED

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 28. (AP)—An undisturbed tomb dating from the time of Christ has been discovered in the Valley of Kedron near Jerusalem, according to word received here from Dr. W. F. Albright, director of the American school of oriental research in Jerusalem. Dr. James Montgomery, president of the school, announced today.

SHORTAGE OF HOGS IN SOUTH AND SOUTHEAST SAYS CHICAGO EXCHANGE

CHICAGO, Nov. 28. (AP)—A shortage of hogs in the south and southeast is seen by the National Live Stock Exchange, according to its president, Everett C. Brown, who predicts a rise in prices paid to farmers early next year.

"Commission men all over the United States regret that the farmers are sacrificing their hogs at prevailing ruinous prices when there is such a bright prospect for 1924," Mr. Brown said in a statement.

"The farmers themselves are the only ones who can correct this," he strongly urged them to hold one-third of the hogs that they would have shipped. If they do this, I will guarantee that hogs have struck bottom for this winter and that there will be an advance in the next sixty to ninety days that will give at least a \$2 advance in prices."

BUTS \$3000 OF ALLEGED MYTHICAL PLACER CLAY DEPOSITS IN ARIZONA

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 28. (AP)—Major George W. Clark, of Fort Worth, Texas, told a federal court jury yesterday that he lost \$3,000 invested for development of alleged mythical placer clay deposits in Arizona and California, which he said were represented to him a few months ago by Joseph W. Boyd, on trial here on a charge of misuse of the mails in the furtherance of a scheme to defraud Major Clark, who was stationed at Camp Bowie, testified he was so confident that the clay deposits would be developed for the manufacture of soap that he induced two other army officers to invest \$100 each in the enterprise and urged other friends to buy stock in Boyd's project.

DETROIT HAS MILLION AND HALF DOLLAR FIRE

DETROIT, Nov. 28. (AP)—Starting from an overheated stove in a watchman's shanty today, fire destroyed the Detroit and Windsor Ferry Company dock housing United States immigration and customs offices, spread to the six-story Munger building, which was burned to the ground, and then destroyed a four-story warehouse and several small buildings on Woodward avenue and Bates street. When the fire was brought under control a few minutes after 5 o'clock this morning the total loss was estimated at \$1,500,000.

Frank Kelly, a fireman, was knocked from a ladder when a hose slipped from the hands of hosemen. He fell 24 feet to the ground. Robert Yates, the watchman, was burned about the face and hands when he attempted to check the fire. Carl Kraslin, another watchman, was overcome by smoke.

CHICAGO, Nov. 28. (AP)—Automobile production continues to increase both for passenger cars and trucks, the federal reserve bank for the seventh district set out today in its November business condition report. The output rose 1.5 per cent during October over that of September, according to the report.

H. F. HOUSTON DIES AT HOME IN SEYMOUR

SEYMOUR, Texas, Nov. 28. (AP)—H. F. Houston, aged 71, died at his home here Monday afternoon. Although deceased had been in ill health for several months, the paralysis was the immediate cause of death. The remains were buried in the local cemetery Tuesday afternoon. Rev. J. R. Balch, pastor of the First Baptist Church, conducted the funeral ceremonies.

YOUNG BROKER CONVICTED OF EMBEZZLEMENT CHARGE

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 28. (AP)—Maurice Mandell, 26-year-old broker, stands convicted today of embezzlement and conspiracy to defraud in connection with the failure of the Hibernia Bank & Trust Company which closed here last July with a shortage of \$464,000. A district court jury last night found Mandell guilty of all of the seven counts brought against him. Judge Johnston granted a stay of execution 10 days pending appeal for a new trial.

FOUR MOROS KILLED IN CLASH IN PHILIPPINES

MANILA, Nov. 28. (AP)—Four Moros were killed in a clash with a constabulary detachment near Bayan, in the province of Lanao, on the island of Mindanao, according to a dispatch received here from the governor of the province. There were no casualties among the constabulary forces. The red flag, Moro symbol of unrest, has been raised in several sections of the province of Lanao. 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Senator Hiram Johnson Scores Administrations Foreign Policy In Opening Campaign In Chicago

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—A two-fisted denunciation of the administration's foreign policy, with a mercileless flaying of Secretary of State Hughes' reparations proposal were outstanding features of an address by Senator Hiram Johnson here tonight.

The California senator who had only a few days ago announced his candidacy for the presidency spoke at a banquet of the Cook County Real Estate Board.

Senator Johnson gave approval of the soldier's bonus, demanded an immediate tax reduction, aid for the farmers through cooperative marketing and demand for re-enactment of the child labor law and minimum wage law which had been held invalid by the United States supreme court.

The senator tore into Secretary Hughes' latest effort to get the United States, as he charged, into the cockpit in Europe. He specifically termed the reparations policy of official Washington "a transparent subterfuge."

He deplored the lack of genuine American policy at Washington.

The whole foreign policy of Washington today, the senator said, was in "deplorable harmony" with the foreign policy that has prevailed in the seat of government ever since the armistice.

He asserted, in a commitment to this country to "undisclosed European adventures."

"I have American viewpoint," Senator Johnson maintained. It was high time that the American people insisted on an American viewpoint at Washington.

The assault on Secretary Hughes' reparations proposals, particularly when he termed them a "pretense" to cover up the real purpose behind them, marked the most stirring episode of the evening.

It is the first time that a statesman of presidential size has employed the scalpel unparagoned in warning the American people against the "maneuvers of the internationalists" with respect to reparations.

"This," he declared emphatically, "is transparent subterfuge by gentlemen who, having tried and failed to put us in European politics directly through the League of Nations, now wish to get us into the League through the back door."

"I deny that this is our duty, and I decline to do it."

Senator Johnson denied with great emphasis that this nation was cold blooded and heartless. He said that the League of Nations had recorded when the United States had failed to go to the relief of suffering human beings in Europe.

Have Been Generous. He insisted, the American people ever have been generous and unselfish, and always will be wherever Europe's need for human aid is apparent.

He was for maintaining friendly relations with all nations and for bringing the nations closer together in harmony and human happiness.

But under present conditions in Europe, when millions are rampant and when the people are burdened to the breaking point for the maintenance of standing armies and fresh wars, paid for in part by money that is owed this country, he insisted that whether it be called League of Nations world court or German reparations commission, it all was of the same piece of pretense and subterfuge.

By this subterfuge, he said, American statesmen sought to fashion an American policy dictated in Europe and for Europe at the grievous expense of the well being of the good people of the United States.

"Our policy in Washington today," he added, "is in deplorable harmony with our policy ever since the armistice, to commit to undisclosed European adventures."

"To resist that policy and to prevent it from coming to fruition is the first duty of the citizen who, in order to preserve his own prosperity and security, must preserve the security of the independent experiment in government and in human happiness which we call the United States."

Supreme Political Question. While not under estimating the grievous concern of all the people over domestic problems, Senator Johnson said he had no hesitations in declaring our foreign policy to be the supreme political question of the hour.

Domestic problems are capable of proper solution in time, he said, whereas once embarked on a stupid and spineless foreign entanglement policy the nation might be destroyed.

The future of American independence, he went on, overshadows every other consideration—just at this time.

Pointed out that there are now in this country 12,600,000 people paying income taxes on incomes under \$10,000 and he contended that with the \$200,000,000 of surplus now in the treasury it would be possible not only to decrease the income tax rate to three and one-half percent million citizens but also to start on the bonus.

"We stand," he said, "for tax reduction that is just, and we stand for the good faith of the American people."

Taking up the agricultural problem, the senator said that the farmers "are often befuddled by politicians and officials."

He opposed the proposed price fixing of farm products by the government as well as the government going into the wheat business.

For Lower Freight Rates. "This first remedy," he said, was a lowering of freight rates and a cutting down of the middleman's profit by the cooperative marketing plan.

Railroad rates, he insisted, must come down, not in an attempt to hurt the carriers but in order that justice may be done.

He would oppose, he added, employing the government to turn back the excess taxes to the farmers, but would aid in seeing to it that the excess charge was not collected from the farmers in the first place.

He stressed the California cooperative marketing plans, which were solidly based when he was governor of that state, and held out that system as the first great stride on the part of the farmers of the northwest.

Speedy development of the proposed Lake to the Gulf waterway and other water shipping facilities, he suggested, would aid greatly in eliminating some of the high cost of transportation which now comes out of the farmers' meager income.

Touching the supreme court's decisions in the child labor and minimum wage for women cases, Senator Johnson said they were a "reproach."

"If the constitution prohibits such laws," he declared, "then the constitution must be amended."

He said he yielded to no man in his reverence for the constitution, but it must stand as a charter for all the people, forever for free speech and free assembly, and not responsive to those cardinal principles must be made so.

Finally, the senator said he was an optimist and had an abiding confidence in the nation and its future.

He, however, thought it imperative that a note of warning be sounded against the era of peripatetic foreign statesmen who, at intervals, are instructing us in our duty.

"We must be always alert against those from within who, with the best of intentions, would carry us into ruinous enterprises."

"We also must be vigilant against those from without who, with no intention for our welfare, would take us into foreign adventures for their."

Sense of Smell Is Sufficient to Justify Search

CHAMBERBURG, Pa., Nov. 28. (AP)—The sense of smell was held by Judge W. Rush Gilliam to be sufficient justification for searching motor trucks for liquor without a warrant in a decision yesterday.

The decision was in the case of three men arrested April 25 while enroute from New York to Cleveland in two motor trucks alleged to have contained 1,100 quarts of whiskey. They were found guilty of transporting liquor illegally and motions had been filed staying judgment.

"The officers relying on their own sense of smell," said Judge Gilliam, "knew that whiskey was concealed within the trucks. This knowledge gave them the right to search without a search warrant."

"No constitutional rights of these defendants have been violated."

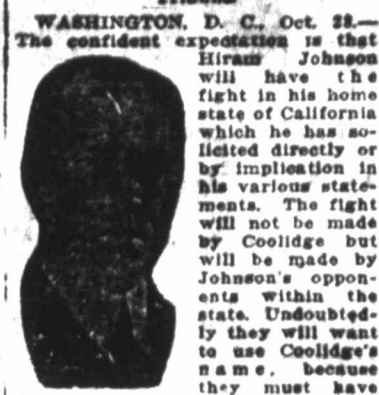

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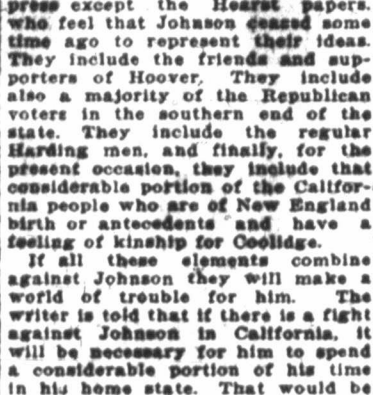

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New Principle of Law for Divorce Trials In Texas

AUSTIN, Nov. 28. (AP)—The divorce of Robert E. Biddy of Martin county by one woman and his marriage to two other women all in the same month presented a novel situation to the court of criminal appeals and elicited a new principle of divorce law from the court in an opinion today holding Biddy guilty of bigamy. A five-year sentence given in Martin county was sustained by the court.

According to the testimony, Biddy was divorced from Dema Biddy January 6, 1922. On January 20, fourteen days later, he married Grace Ann Pettit. On January 29 of the same month he married Alice Haley in Midland county.

This was not the end of his marital experiences, for on the day after the third marriage he was arrested for bigamy and at the same time his second wife secured a decree of annulment.

The unique plea Biddy presented at his trial was that his second marriage was no marriage at all because it violated the divorce decree dissolving the first marriage which prohibited the parties from remarrying within a year and that if the second marriage was void his third marriage was legal.

The court of criminal appeals stated this was the first time the question had been raised in Texas, but it promptly held against Biddy.

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 28. (AP)—Geraldine Farrar, grand opera star, will not be allowed to appear in concert at the Wesley Memorial church here on Friday night as advertised. It was announced today. Rev. In confirming this announcement Dr. Laprade declined to give his reason.

IRRIGATION BONDS DISTRICT NO. 2 TO BE PASSED ON AT AUSTIN

J. W. Chatham, Jr., auditor of the Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 2, left Tuesday for Austin, accompanied by Judge J. E. Starley, of Dallas, attorney for the irrigation district, to be present at the inspection of the bonds of the Wichita County Water Improvement District No. 2.

C. F. Gibson, assistant attorney general of the state of Texas, Tuesday began the task of examining the record in the suit brought by the Wichita Water Improvement District No. 2 for the approval of the bonds aggregating \$1,750,000, according to information received at the office of the irrigation district here Wednesday morning. The suit was filed at Wichita Falls and is due to be called on December 2.

After examining the records, the attorney general will note his objections, if any, after which the court will declare the bonds valid or invalid as the case may be. Great care has been taken by officials of the irrigation district in preparing the bonds according to laws of Texas and it is believed that any corrections on technicalities will be noted by the attorney general's department.

District No. 2 is a part of the great water improvement undertaking near Wichita Falls, and consists of most of the territory in the irrigation project outside of the city of Wichita Falls. District No. 1, including the city of Wichita Falls, issued the bonds that were sold for funds to construct the dam and started the irrigation system. District No. 2 will add \$5,000 acres for irrigation, and the bonds will provide for extensions of canals and laterals to supply water to this large area.

Three Residences And Warehouse Damaged By Fire

Fire which broke out in the residence owned by A. W. Bell at 1208 North Ninth, Tuesday afternoon at 8:40 o'clock, completely destroyed that home and caused some damage to an adjoining residence, occupied by Stanley Weidman. They were advised to notify the officers in Durant and the local officers agreed to watch this end of the case for them.

WICHITA COUNTY SOIL SURVEY DATA PREPARED AND SENT TO WASHINGTON

The soil survey and maps of the Wichita county irrigation system and lands which will be irrigated have been completed by W. T. Carter, Jr., soil survey scientist of the United States Bureau of Soil Surveys, in charge of the work in Texas, and E. T. Templin, soil scientist of the state of Texas, and the maps have been forwarded to Washington.

The scientists are now at work on a soil survey of Wichita county and the work will probably take several months' time. As soon as the work is completed maps of the soil in the county will be forwarded to Washington and soil survey bulletins on Wichita county will be issued by the government as soon as possible.

Irrigation officials point out the fact that the maps are valuable and a great asset to the county, because if the maps, guides, and suggestions of the scientists are carried out by the farmers of the county, the success of the irrigation system is assured.

A map of the county is prepared and the different soils are marked on the map at their several locations. The maps tell the best kind of crops to plant in the various localities. The bulletin issued by the United States bureau of soil surveys will be distributed in the county as soon as they are published.

Due to Improved Economic Condition Of Farmers, Immediate Business Outlook Promising—Guaranty Survey

While conditions in industry and trade in the United States generally are not so favorable as they were a few months ago, there is little change in the volume of industrial employment or in wage scales, nor is the average of wholesale prices much altered by the individual fluctuations from week to week, states the current issue of the "Guaranty Survey," which has just been issued by the Guaranty Trust Company of New York.

"The substantial improvement in the economic position of the farmer as a whole, compared with the early this year or last fall, is making itself felt in various directions," the "Survey" states.

"The business outlook is generally more promising, except to those who can't recognize prosperity in rampant inflation."

"The favorable features of the situation have been strengthened by the responsiveness of production to the continuing requirements of trade. With the passing of the special features of demand which last spring evoked the extraordinary but of the usual activity, curtailment of production in many instances was the only alternative to the accumulation of excessive inventories."

"Here and there, commodity markets and wage scales remain conspicuously out of adjustment when measured by the usual standards applicable to these relationships. And in some branches of industry there is capacity for production considerably in excess of present or immediately prospective requirements. Neither condition, however, represents a serious danger to the business community, and, except through misdirected efforts to apply corrective, such conditions need not induce a general business depression. The underlying conditions are in the main sound, and we may preserve a fair measure of prosperity if government policy does not add additional handicaps upon business initiative."

Retail Trade.

"The volume of retail sales which has been consistently recorded in all reporting lines during recent months is a significant indication of the strength of the current demand for consumer goods. The fact that this high level of consumption has been maintained, despite the industrial recession of the summer and fall, is to be taken into account in considering the probable future course of the trade."

"In 1932, the only period in which sales have approached the level recorded this year, prices were much higher than during the first forty-four weeks of this year. Now that it was then."

"This conclusion is substantiated by the record of railroad freight car loadings. In the first forty-four weeks of this year, a total of 18 per cent higher than that of the same period last year, and in per cent above the high record established in 1930. In the twenty-four weeks beginning with May 25, the weekly average exceeded 102,000—only four times during this period did the weekly total fall short of a million loadings. In certain of these cases the decline was recorded in a week containing a holiday. Prior to this year, the million car mark was reached only a few times during the fall crop movement."

"Car loadings are particularly valuable as a supplement to the physical volume of distribution. But they include, of course, the movement of both producers' and consumers' goods. However, they give an indication of the activity of retail distribution, particularly the loadings of merchandise in tax and bonded cars, and of miscellaneous freight. During the first nine months of 1932, loadings of these classes of freight exceeded the 10 per cent increase of the corresponding months last year, and by 13 per cent the loadings for the corresponding period in 1930."

"The element of year to year growth, apart from critical variations, must also be considered in interpreting the sales data. The chain stores, for example, have grown steadily and rapidly over a period of years. Therefore, the large increase in the sales of these stores should not be taken to indicate that retail sales in general have increased by an equal ratio, since it appears that these stores represent an ever-increasing proportion of retail business as a whole."

"With allowance for secular trend on the one hand, and for differences in price levels on the other, it seems pretty clear that the volume of business done this year by department and chain stores, and probably by all retail stores, compares favorably with that of any period in the past, and indicates a highly favorable situation with respect to the final distribution of consumers' goods. Mail order sales are usually regarded as a barometer of purchases by farmers, and how accurately they reflect total farmer buying has not been determined."

"High Level of Purchasing Power"—Factors for the favorable record of retail trade are apparent. Employment has been at a high level for many months, and although the fear of labor shortage which was noted in the spring is no longer present, the pronounced recession in certain branches of manufacturing activity during the last few months have brought about a surprisingly small decline in the number of workers employed."

"The situation with regard to wages has been similar. The price declines and reductions in manufacturing output which began last spring, and the inevitable result of curtailment of profits, might have been expected to produce a much greater drop in wage levels than has actually taken place. It has been a notable fact in recent years that downward wage readjustment has been considerably retarded, while upward movements have not shown the lag behind wholesale price increases which was formerly regarded as one of the most characteristic features of the upward swing of the business cycle."

Business Future Trend.

"The significance of the current record of retail trade as an indication of the future trend of general business is not entirely clear. There is no clearly defined normal for either production or distribution of commodities. Nor do we know precisely how close is the correspondence between present rates of production and of distribution. It appears that stocks of finished goods held either by producers or distributors are generally not excessive. Accordingly, continued retail distribution at the present rate would seem to call for producing and distributing in accordance with demand. In so far, however, as higher costs of production may in one line or another result in curtailment of operation, with consequent unemployment and loss of buying power, retail trade will be affected. And, if such curtailment in retail buying could not fall to react in turn upon production schedules, but unemployment were given, there is nothing in the present domestic business situation which is likely to induce any marked curtailment of production in general."

"In the last weeks of the year retail trade is normally most active. Producers and business men in general will look especially to the level of retail sales after the turn of the year as an indication of the trend of business as a whole."

Red River Receivership Property Has Earned Over \$12,000,000 In Past Three and One-Half Years

Business Survey Resulting From Welfare Drive

Prof of the substantial and normal citizenship of Wichita Falls is being brought to the attention of civic leaders and business and professional men by the reports from workers in the annual united municipal welfare drive. A valuable and unexpected result from the campaign is being obtained by the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce in the form of a business and professional survey of the city. Although the survey is only a by-product of the welfare campaign, officials of the chamber of commerce are taking the changes of addresses and placing corrections on the last census of the business district. According to expectations of officials, the reports of the workers will make the business district survey and census complete and up to the minute. Workers in the campaign, when they find out that a business or professional man, firm or company has moved, they note the change on their cards and the reports are turned in at campaign headquarters. The changes of address, names of new firms and names of people who have left the city are noted on the census of the business district and at the end of the drive the census of the chamber of commerce will be complete in every detail.

The income for the past three and one-half years from the receivership property along Red river has amounted to \$11,496,822.97, according to the eleventh report made by Receiver Frederic A. Delano, which not only includes the report of the past six months, ending September 30, 1923, but also a statement of the finances of the receivership since its beginning, April 1, 1920. The report in pamphlet form, which is filed with the supreme court of the United States as a part of the suit in which the state of Oklahoma is complainant, the state of Texas defendant and the United States of America, Intervenor, is a lengthy one and sets out in detail the value of the property, the net earnings of the past three and one-half years, the total expenditures, the amount of money paid out on claims and the amount increased in government bonds. The production of the river bed wells brought in an income of \$5,700,466, while the flood plain wells made an income for \$5,665,551, or a total of a little more than \$11 per cent of the total earnings of the receivership during its existence. Disbursements of the receivership during this period were: Administrative, \$373,482; operation, \$1,452,552; development, \$739,618, and paid to operators directly or indirectly under orders of the court \$5,088,540, leaving a balance of \$4,222,027.40 or 34.11 per cent of the total earnings. A comparison of the amount of monthly production when the receivership first came into existence with the production of September, 1923, is very interesting and shows conclusively the falling off in the amount of oil produced, as has been experienced by all operators and owners in the Northwest, Burk Burnett and Red River valley fields. The average monthly production from April, 1920, to March, 1921, was 145,498 barrels, while the total production for the month of September, 1923, was 43,105 barrels, or nearly a 75 per cent decrease. In addition to the decrease in production, the price of oil has much to do with the progress of oil companies. On April 1, 1920, oil was selling for \$1.50 per barrel. In the month of September, 1923, the average price received by the receiver for oil produced from the receivership area was \$1.49. The eleventh report of the receiver sets out in detail how the proceeds of the receivership have been invested. On September 30, 1923, Mr. Delano held \$2,300,000 in 4 1/2 per cent treasury certificates, falling due

BOLSHEVİK OPINION ON REVOLUTIONARY CHANCES

MOSCOW, Nov. 28 (AP)—An official bolshevik opinion on the impossibility of immediate revolutionary changes in the United States was expressed yesterday before the congress of scientists by Nicolai Bucharin, head of the left wing of the central soviet committee. He said it was evident that American capital was consolidated and was growing stronger and that no changes could possibly threaten it for a long time to come. Germany, he said, was going to deny. He could see the possibility of a workers' victory, but there was no certainty of it. Only a big loan could save Germany. All the present difficulties of central Europe, the speaker asserted, did not change the view that there would be an ultimate socialist success in the United States of Europe with Russia playing the leading role. This day might be seven decades removed, but its dawn was sure he said.
