Dec 5.49—Manufacture of intoxicating liquor by an individual for private medicinal purposes without a permit from the state comptroller is a legal defense in Texas to a charge of violating the liquor laws—the court of criminal appeals intimated in an opinion in the case of Roland Treglude of Wichita county.

Treglude was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary for manufacturing liquor. He testified that it was for medicinal purposes on the recommendation of his physician. # PROBLEM FOR U. S

By Universal Service.

WASHINGTON. Dec. 5.—The liquor amuggling business is the most signatic criminal problem the United thates has ever faced on the

United thates has ever faced on the high seas, according to Atterney General Daugherty in his annual report submitted to congress.

Approximately 1.500,000 gallons of liquer valued at more than \$7,000,000 were shipped from Nassau, Bahamas, alone for the United States during 1922 and the fore part of 1923, Mr. Daugherty asserts.

As evidence of the flow from European parts, Mr. Daugherty points out that during one period of seven weeks in the sprin of 1923 nearly 150,000 gallons of liquer were shipped from Glasgow, cotaland, for American consumption.



"Times were when towns were built on streams to furnish easy communication," observes the Denton Record-Chronicle. "Then as railroads came and shoved even navigable streams into a sort of innocous despetude, towns sought railroad lines and, out them, usually perished.

"Another stage in transportation development may be indicated in the fact that a Lamar county town built originally on the railroad, has moved itself bodily to a concrete highway, choosing that in preference to the rail line, according to the Honey Grove Signal.

"Of course even today sizable cities cannot thrive without railroads-the hauls are too long for truck and litney limes to make. But in some of the states new there are regularly established truck lines over as much as 200 miles and as good roads increase and bile making improves, there is certainly a possibility that the radius of economical operation of motor trucks will be extended.

The number of books distributed during November, 1922, was 5881, The total for November, 1922, was 4862.

The greater portion of this increase was in the juvenile department, according to the report, approximately 800 of the 1299 gain having been made in the circulation

baving been made in the circulation of children's books.

The principal reason for the greater demand for juvenile books is thought to have been the observation of National Childrens' Book Week during November. week during Rovember.
Special programs were arranged for children daily throughout the week and several hundreds boys and girls visited the library each day.
Another beneficial effect of Children's Book Week was the bringing of an increased number of parents and teachers to the library, because of their interest in the encouragement of children's reading, the monthly report stated.
