Defendant Says He Was In Fulton's Office Next Morning, Instead of Night of Flogging, As Told Jury

A grilling cross examination of A. C. Golden, defendant in the perjury case, in the 58th district court was concluded at 1:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. The direct examination, including the cross-examination, lasted until the noon recess at 12:30 o'clock and continuing from 1:30 o'clock to 2:30 o'clock, when a 10-minute recess was announced. Immediately preceding the recess, attorneys for the defense rested their case and the state announced that rebuttal testimony would be heard following the re-opening of court.

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ber of the party. He said he appeared before the grand jury and testified just as the evidence of the grand jury showed. Found statement false. "I found that my statement to the grand jury was untrue, after the indictment was returned and Mr. Arnold reminded me of the photo call to Mr. Fulton on the night of the flogging," the defendant said. "I testified to what I believed was true. I believed that I was there until I was reminded by Mr. Arnold of the photo call the next morning and of the photo call the night before, the witness said. He testified emphatically Wednesday morning that he was not in Mr. Fulton's office on that night. On cross examination the defendant said that he had served on grand juries in Wichita county two or three times; that he was a member of the grand jury which met in December, 1922, after the flogging on Dan Smith in September. He testified that Arnold and Hines of Iowa Park were members of the same grand jury on what he stated was December, 1922. He admitted that he had been associated with the courts frequently and was familiar with proceedings. "Did you know at the time that you were on that grand jury that you were suspected of being a member of the party who flogged Dan Smith?" Attorney Martin asked. "Smith talked to me, but I did not know that he suspected me," the defendant replied. "When you were accepted on that grand jury in December, 1922, you were sworn to inquire into all violations of the law, didn't you?" the attorney asked. "Yes sir," was his answer. "Were there any witnesses called before that jury in the Daniel Smith case?" Attorney Martin inquired. "No, sir, there were no witnesses called in that case," he answered. "Why were you not called?" "I was sworn on that grand jury, knowing that you had been mentioned in the photo call flogging and you were not anxious to investigate that case and clear your name," Mr. Martin asked. "I stated there for five weeks and worked hard on all kinds of law violations and there were many that were investigated," the defendant said. "You were busy and worked hard on all kinds of law violations," was his answer. "I would tell you why we did not investigate that any more than I would tell you why we did not investigate a dozen other cases," he answered. "You give your honor, I appeal to you for protection," exclaimed Hines, one of a score of character witnesses who testified for the defendant in the trial of A. C. Golden, Iowa Park banker, on trial in the 58th district court on a charge of perjury, while under fire of cross-examination Wednesday morning. This appeal was made by Mr. Hines to Judge P. A. Martin when District Attorney Bernard Martin explained that he answered the question. "When you testified that you did not recall the trial of A. C. Golden and Roy Arnold to the office of E. L. THREE PARTIES IN SOUTH DAKOTA NAME 1924 CANDIDATES

COOLIDGE CHOICE OF REPUBLICANS
LIGAN ADOPTED BY DEMOCRATS

LA FOLLETTE ENDORSED BY FARMER LABORITES

Governor McMaster Defeats Senator Sterling For Seat in U. S. Senate.

PIERRE, S. D., Dec. 2.—President Coolidge, William Gibbs McAdoo and Robert M. La Follette, United States senator for Wisconsin, were endorsed as presidential standard-bearers for the Republican, Democratic and Farmer-Labor parties, respectively, at state proposal meetings here last night, the selections in each being made over 11,000 ballots. United States senator Hiram Johnson and Henry Ford, who was named by both Democrats and Farmer-Laborites.

Senator Sheppard, United States senator for Kansas, was chosen for second place on the Republican ticket and the Democrats chose James W. Cramer of New York. Late in the night a group of approximately 50 men broke away from the Farmer-Labor meeting, announced the national platform and began negotiating with the Democrats for joint selection of a ticket from United States senator Lewis.

The conference was continuing early today. For the Republican endorsement a bitter fight was waged between adherents of Thomas Sterling, incumbent, and William H. McMaster, governor, with the latter winning 46,507 to 37,886, and thereby creating a surprise. Governor McMaster had previously endorsed the candidacy of Senator Johnson and while he had not announced his stand, Senator Sterling was regarded as a Coolidge supporter.

Regardless of the majority repudiation given to Governor McMaster, Sterling will file either as an independent or minority Republican presidential candidate, according to W. C. Clark, his campaign manager. Tom Ayres, chairman of the state central committee, won the endorsement of the national platform and labor convention by a large majority over Mark Baker, former leader in the Nonpartisan League.

Republ... LIQUOR SMUGGLING GIGANTIC CRIMINAL PROBLEM FOR U. S.

By Universal Service. WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—The liquor smuggling business is the most gigantic criminal problem the United States has ever faced on the high seas, according to Attorney General Daugherty in his annual report submitted in congress.

Approximately 1,500,000 gallons of liquor valued at more than \$7,000,000 were shipped from Glasgow, Bahamas, alone for the United States during 1922 and the fore part of 1923, Mr. Daugherty asserts. As evidence of the flow from European ports, Mr. Daugherty points out that during one period of seven weeks in the spring of 1922 nearly 150,000 gallons of liquor were shipped from Glasgow, Scotland, for American consumption. Eighteen vessels of foreign registry were seized on charges of liquor smuggling during the year ended June 30 last, according to Mr. Daugherty's report. Profits from foreign governments, he explains, made necessary the release of these vessels unless it could be established that they were in actual contact with the shore.

SENATOR SHEPPARD GIVEN IMPORTANT COMMITTEE PLACE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Senator Merrie Sheppard has been named a member of the Democratic steering committee in the senate. This is a position highly prized by all Democratic senators as the committee constitutes the supreme authority in all party matters affecting the senate. It makes the Democratic committee assignments and decides upon the party platform to be presented to the voters. Appointments to this committee are almost invariably made as a result of party action.

PROPOSED AUTO MERGER HAS BEEN ANNOUNCED... NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Confirmation of reports that the proposed merger of the Studebaker and Maxwell Motor Company had been abandoned was furnished today by James C. Hurst, a director of the Maxwell company, who declares that the overture for such a union came from the Studebaker corporation.

LADY ASTOR PUTS HECKLERS TO ROUT WITH READY WIT

Ugly Minority Waved Red Flags During P. V. Mouth Speech.

ELECTION IS CONCEDED BY OVERWHELMING MAJORITY

Has Whole of Plymouth Community Under Spell of Her Personality.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—Another candidate for a seat in the house of commons has been obliged to abandon his campaign meetings as a result of rowdiness which took a violent form in numerous places last evening. His is Major Sir William Prescott, conservative candidate for Tottenham North.

Lady Bystance Perry, wife of the conservative candidate for Hastings, was badly injured last evening by rowdies who broke up the meeting held in support of Lord Rokeby. One of the disturbers threw a broken cup toward the platform, barely missing the chairman's face and hitting Lady Bystance in the side. As the lord and lady were leaving the meeting a dense crowd surrounded their motor and in the confusion Lady Bystance's arm was jammed in the door of the machine and badly injured.

This is the last day of speech making and canvassing preparatory to the casting of ballots in the most important general election of recent years. The speaker shows into the campaign by all parties in the last few days becomes more intense as the drive for votes reaches its close, and from this morning until midnight the output of words on platforms and the house-to-house solicitations will reach the maximum.

CAMPAIGN PLAN AWAITS DELIVERY COOLIDGE SPEECH

LEADERS ARE EXPECTED TO
BEGIN ACTIVE WORK
DURING WEEK.

WILL NOT WAIT FOR
OFFICE TO SEEK MAN

Friends of President Coolidge
They Must Fight to Defeat
Johnson.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 5.—
The president will see two steps
taken toward the selection of the
next Republican nominee for the
presidency. The public's view of
President Coolidge's speech will be
followed immediately by the
active work done by a group of
Coolidge's friends.

Their theory, as
expressed to the
present writer, is
that the complete
picture of Coolidge's
personality and
principles will be
before the people
the day the
president's speech is
published. Their
belief is that the
people will approve
and will desire to be
confronted in the
white house. But
their theory is that
with the influence
of the direct primary
as the method of
selecting about one-
half of the delegates,
it is no longer
possible for any man,
no matter how highly
approved by the
public, to wait for
the office to come
to him. They claim
there must be
work and organization
to effect the
extremely energetic
organization already
under way in behalf
of Hiram Johnson.

These Coolidge
leaders who argue
this way, and who
propose to begin
active work on
Thursday, include
the ones who
apparently are
closest to him and
also those who
have been identified
with his political
fortunes in the past.
Nevertheless, they
do not pretend to
have the authority
of the president
act. It is evident
that the president
has made no
decision on this
point himself. Also,
it is a fact that
since the president
was being
pushed forward for
the presidency in
1923, Coolidge
publicly called off
the activity of some
of these same
friends after they
had been active
for several weeks.
This incident is
not cited as having
any necessary
reference to the
present situation.

There is another
group of Republican
leaders, not so
close to Coolidge
personally, but
equally strong
in their conviction
that it is the
best policy for the
party to nominate
him, who think
the best way to
bring about the
nomination is
for Coolidge and
Coolidge's friends
to refrain from
trying to compete
with what they
designate as the
"combination of
ballyhoo and gum
shoe tactics" of
Johnson and
Johnson's friends.
Their argument
is that the best
way to make
Coolidge's
nomination
inevitable
is for Coolidge
to go right on
making as good
a president as
they feel he now
is, and making
speeches as good
as they expect
one this week
is going to be.

The South Dakota
preference
convention, which
will occur the
same day as
Coolidge's
speech, is
generally
expected to
name Hiram
Johnson as the
preferred
candidate
and Coolidge
as the second
preference.
Readers should
not confuse
this preliminary
convention,
whose function
is merely to
propose two
tickets, with
the actual
South Dakota
direct primary
in which all

the people vote directly on their
presidential preference. This
event does not come until March
15.

It is generally conceded, however,
that if the South Dakota primary
were held now, Johnson would
probably win. Johnson campaigned in
the state personally in 1922, and
made such a showing as to give
grounds for the belief that he could
carry the state as against Coolidge,
who up to date is under the hand-
icap of being practically unknown
to the state except for his record as
president. By March 15 the greater
knowledge of Coolidge as a president
may or may not be such as to en-
able his friends to carry the state
against Johnson. Incidentally, it is
not South Dakota on March 15, but
New Hampshire on March 11, that
will be the first state to choose its
delegates to national convention.
Inasmuch as New Hampshire will
certainly be for Coolidge, such
prestige as attaches to winning the
first found will go not to Johnson but
to Coolidge.

Johnson's appointment of Frank
Hitchcock as his campaign manager
has engaged the serious attention
of the other Republican leaders. It
was universally taken as meaning
that Johnson's campaign is going
to be a thoroughly professional
battle in the political sense and
adequately backed with resources
sufficient for militia, country-wide
organization. The bulk of the Re-
publican leaders, both national and
local, are not friendly to Hitchcock.
Their instant comment was that
the appointment of Hitchcock means
among other things, a thorough
effort to capture the delegates
from the southern states. They an-
ticipate that Hitchcock will do
everything possible to get the al-
legiance of the local southern
leaders. What they anticipate with
even more concern is that wherever
Hitchcock cannot get the allegiance
of the southern state leaders who
are in power, he will follow the
policy of dealing with the local
"outs" and will set up contesting
delegations. The other national
party leaders say this will cause a
world of trouble; but they take a

blunt and generous appraisal of
the southern delegations have been
reduced in size since 1922 and that
therefore "the cotton crop is not
going to be very large next year."

Very much of Hiram Johnson's
fortunes depend on whether two
other men, Governor Pinchot and
Senator LaFollette, also enter the
race. If both these men should
remain out, it would make a differ-
ence of a hundred delegates
to Johnson. There are at
least five states which Johnson can-
not possibly carry if Pinchot and
LaFollette are running, but which
Johnson has a chance to carry if

certainty. Pinchot's candidacy can-
not yet be predicted with equal
confidence.

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Revision of House Rules Will Make Possible Needed Legislation Contentions of Insurgent Leaders

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Revision of the house rules which now seems to be assured as a result of the revolt of the little band of Republican insurgents, means that constructive and progressive legislation is certain of consideration and action in this and future congresses. This has been the ultimate object of the insurgent group from the beginning of their fight to force liberalization of the rules. Blocking organization was only a means to an end—a lever to focus attention on the situation and compel the old guard to permit adoption of the necessary changes.

The insurgents assert that the benefits gained in the memorable overthrow of "Cannonism" have been lost in their entirety. Since that time, they say, there has been gradually built up a system, wherein, instead of speaker being the czar as in "Uncle Joe" Cannon's reign, a handful of leaders on the majority side operating in secret through the steering committee, has been able to absolutely control the fate of all legislation.

Small East Session.
The spectacle at the end of the last session is still fresh in the minds of those who witnessed it. It proved the straw that broke the camel's back. Representative Campbell, of Kansas, chairman of the rules committee and acting speaker in the absence of Gillett, who was ill, was able alone to prevent consideration of a dozen measures, notwithstanding the fact that special rules giving their right of way had been granted. Campbell's action, dictated by the steering committee, it was charged, was never the less resented all the more because he was a "lame duck," having been defeated in the Republican primary.

Among the measures he held up was one dealing with Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals, which a majority of the house undoubtedly desired to act on.

Mercurial Barometer Added to Equipment of Observation Station Operated By the Electric Company

A mercurial type of barometer has been constructed and assembled at the home of the Wichita Falls Electric Company as an addition to the weather indicating instruments which form the local observation station for governmental weather reports. The barometer is not a necessity to the observation station but is welcomed to the government and by the interested observers in the community as a help in forecasting coming changes in the atmosphere which forewarn all changes in the weather conditions. P. A. Rogers, manager of the electric company, states that it is his desire to fully equip the local observation station with all necessary instruments which go to make up a complete government reporting station in order that the residents of the community have the most accurate information regarding the weather conditions about them and their local interests. Mr. Ralph Parker of the transmission and distribution department of the electric company ingeniously constructed and assembled the mercurial barometer. Barometers are instruments used to determine air pressure. It is through changes in air pressure that the weather changes in weather conditions are made known and from which weather forecasts are compiled.

Types of Barometers.
Barometers are divided into two principal types, the mercurial and the aneroid. The mercurial barometer, such as has been installed at the office of the Wichita Falls Electric Company, consists of a glass tube containing a quantity of mercury which extends a glass tube sealed at the top and open at the bottom. To construct this barometer it is necessary to completely drive the air from the glass tube and completely fill it with mercury, after which it is inverted and inserted into a mercury basin or receptacle mounted at the bottom. The only thing that keeps the mercury from dropping in the tube and running over the edge of the basin is the counter air pressure which forces or holds the mercury at a certain level in the tube. By putting a graduated scale along the glass tube with graduations showing the tens and hundreds of an inch variation or less, it is possible to record accurately the exact barometric pressure in inches of mercury which is looked upon as the standard.

The aneroid barometer is constructed on a portable idea and resembles a clock of general construction and mechanism. No mercury or liquid is employed in this device. There is a metal box with a corrugated cover used instead of a glass tube which all air has been extracted. Changes in air pressure play upon the cover of the aneroid, making it slightly, which vibrations are indicated on a magnified scale through recording mechanism. This form of barometer is portable and is of great service in other types but is of great service in the observation work where it is necessary to carry the instrument to a high altitude.

Theory and Facts.
The normal atmospheric pressure taken as the sea level government standard is 30.12 inches of mercury. This corresponds to an atmospheric pressure of 14.7 lbs. per square inch. The pressure of the air varies considerably owing to changes in altitude and atmospheric variations in producing squalls and winds. Wichita Falls, which has an elevation above sea level of 251 feet, has a normal atmospheric pressure of 29.76 inches mercury. The barometer usually shows the approach of storm weather. Very large reductions are indicative of bad storms, hurricanes and tornadoes. Rising pressures indicate in general the approach of fairer weather, but in many cases are indicative of cold waves, depending on the total amount of the pressure rise.

It is a simple thing for one to understand the effects of winds when one stops to analyze the reasons for them. When the pressure at a certain point is higher than at a point understood that the pressure from a surrounding or adjoining section of territory presses to equalize the atmospheric condition at the first named point. When one's hat blows off owing to a gust of wind, it does not ordinarily take time to stop and analyze the cause or reason for his misfortune, but should be that he or his hat points in the wind, he would then realize he was at a point of lower atmospheric pressure than his surroundings.

BATTLESHIPS WASTE OF MONEY; BRITISH NAVAL HERO SPEAKS
By MILTON BROWNER
SEA Service Staff Correspondent
LONDON, Dec. 4.—The money spent by the British navy in building battleships is being spent for the completion of superdreadnaughts allowed under the Washington Conference is a "waste of money," says a distinguished British naval officer.
The day of the battleship is definitely over.
This is the opinion of Admiral Sir Percy Scott with whom I had a long talk.
Sir Percy is one of the most distinguished of British naval men. When the great war broke out, he was commanding the battleship, and made a member of the board of inventions, became adviser to the admiralty on gunnery matters, was made commander-in-chief of the fleet department, and, just by way of a little extra work, took charge of the defense of London from air attacks.
"The future," said Sir Percy to me, "is with aircraft and the submarines. The day of the swanking battleship is done. In your country, in Japan, and in mine there are two classes of people who are especially fighting for battleships. First—those who make big money out of building them for the government, or from supplying the materials.
"Second—The senior officers in the navy. They know that if battleships were definitely discarded and if navies simply consisted of fast destroyers, submarines and airplane carriers, there would be no room for a lot of senior officers. They would be jobless.
"There was a time when battleships could cruise all over the sea destroying everything they met smaller than themselves. They could blockade an enemy's coast, could bombard harbors, could bombard enemy docks, towns and fortifications.
"But the last war showed the development of the submarine. And since the war ceased there has been a tremendous development of aircraft.
"The result of these new developments is that a battleship today is a liability rather than an asset.
"If you have a submarine, you can't go to sea by day unless surrounded by destroyers. If you have an enemy aircraft, you can't go to sea at night unless accompanied by an airplane ship to guard her from air attacks. At night she runs the double risk of being sunk by submarines or torpedo boats.
"I can't understand the American secretary of the navy saying battleships are still the main reliance of the navy. Theodore Roosevelt saying they are the backbone of the fighting forces afloat. And our own First Lord of the Admiralty saying they are the spearhead of our fleet. Under the new conditions of naval warfare, this is sheer stupidity. The airplanes have given nations such both being swallowed by our congress and our parliament.
"You couldn't send your battleship fleet across the ocean against either us or Japan in case of war and vice versa. The submarine and the airplane have given nations even on the small ones, effective methods of defense against aggression. So in a war, the new engines of war are instruments of peace because they make it harder for nations to use the sea as a highway for the making of war."

general livelihood when we pass through many changes when the clouds have been hanging low or the sun was obscured other than our general thoughts of such weather getting "our goals," and putting the community in general on edge. It has been said that the Englishman refers to a long period of dull weather as making him feel "sloopy" while the American easily confesses that he feels "mean." Both of these adjectives refer to a state of mental and bodily condition brought on by the weather. The situation is ordinarily attributed as resulting from a lack of sunshine which occurring over a certain length of time takes the so-called "pop" out of all of us. If this were true, the man who sleeps days and works nights as a watchman or the night worker on the morning press, or the mine laborer would always feel down in the dumps and would never have any sunshine in life. Contrary, therefore, as to whether the sun is shining or not, the mental and bodily condition of feeling mean is brought about by the changes in atmospheric conditions through changes in air pressure. As the pressure reduces, one's bodily balance or equilibrium is affected, although no appreciable change might be accompanied by the effects of intoxicating liquors. This is the common result brought about when one goes to the higher altitudes and climate mountain peaks which might be thousands of feet above sea level. Many people feel a marked physical distress with accompanying difficulty in breathing, owing to the extremely low atmospheric pressure which they meet under such circumstances. Extreme cases of this result in bleeding at the nose, sometimes minor hemorrhages which is due to lessened atmospheric pressure. Do you know that you, as an average adult man, are sustaining an average pleasant day an atmospheric pressure of approximately 14 tons at sea level the barometer records close to the normal 30.12 inches. When the barometer drops an inch or more, there has been a change in air pressure, which means that the pressure you are sustaining has been lessened by about a half a ton. Strange as it may seem, instead of feeling lighter and much more freely, your feelings are disturbed, and you are depressed on account of this unbalanced condition and extreme effect on your being. It is necessary to readjust yourself to this new condition before you are able to assume a relaxed feeling and right yourself once again.

"That this conference go on record as being clearly and unequivocally against the following evils so far as they exist in our respective communities, and to take steps to correct them as far as possible: A—Dirty athletics; B—All forms of unclean speech, obscene and suggestive printed matter; C—All forms of gambling; all forms of destructive games; and especially the use of drugs by athletes in games; D—Liquor and tobacco; E—Dishonesty, such as lying, stealing, and cheating; F—Dancing.

"That the reports of this committee be given to the newspapers of the entire section for publication.

"That we emphatically recommend that each delegate will stand out actively against rowdiness, joy riding, and suggestive conversation, and suggestive dancing.

GREAT INCREASE IN BOOK CIRCULATION BY PUBLIC LIBRARY

Circulation of books by the Kemp Public Library during November increased 1399 volumes over the total for the month of November, 1922, according to the monthly report made to the library board Tuesday evening by Miss Leola E. Powell, librarian.

The number of books distributed during November, 1923, was 2881. The total for November, 1922, was 1482.

The greater portion of this increase was in the juvenile department, according to the report, approximately 800 of the 1399 gain having been made in the circulation of children's books.

The principal reason for the greater demand for juvenile books is thought to have been the observation of National Children's Book Week during November.

Special programs were arranged for children, daily throughout the week and several hundreds boys and girls visited the library each day.

Another beneficial effect of Children's Book Week was the bringing of an increased number of parents and teachers to the library, because of their interest in the encouragement of children's reading. The monthly report stated:
