





Her beauty was wan and spiritual. The matron of the shelter told me the child was getting special treatment for tuberclosis. Do you know what this consisted of? A spoonful of cod-liver oil a day! They cannot even dream of milk

'The Greeks must be extolled for their charity in their own lands, however. Although they were overridden with want and suffering they did not turn away the Armenian refugees when they knocked, homeless, at their gates. Their own were starving but they took their fellow sufferers in and the little they had they were willing to divide.

"One of the most sublime things about a work that has its hard, discouraging aspects is the wonderful charity that is found in the hearts of the poor. That is one of the things I have marveled about in your America-the willingness of the poor to give. American charity is the most consoling charity I have witnessed. It doesn't even stop to consider or argue. It gives at once. Once you have touched the heart you have touched the pocketbook at the same time. The sacrifices the poor people make are boundless and

The creeks and smaller streams of the area overflow occasionally, as does the lowland along the Wichita rivso frequent or so damaging as to interfere with the utilisation of the

Three Type Phases Empsed.

Vien soil series were found in the area which were of sufficient importance to map and of these, thirty-three soil types and three type phases were mapped. Of the thirty-six soils mapped, only ten are important in areal extent and range in origin from material sediments to residual soils derived from the weathering of Red Beds material. Several of the soil series found in this area have been encountered in other mapped areas and they, therefore, hear the name of the area where they were first encountered where they were lirst encountered by the suggestors. The series map-ped in this area are: Vernon, Kirk-land, Allendale, Calumet, Buffalo, Wichita, Bastrop, Millers Tahola, and Midway. This is the first area mapped in Texas in which the Cal-umet series has been found and the Wichita, Alloudale, Buffale and

Midway soils, when eccur in con-siderable bodies in this area, have never been mapped before. These names are from local sources. The Vernon soils are the typical chocolate-red soils with chocolate-red subsoils, and are representative red subsoils, and are representative of very large areas of the rolling red prairie lands of the Red Beds region of Northwest Texas. The Allendase soils are very similar to the Vernon soils in color and are datived/also from the Red Beds but differ in that the subsoils are more tough and savy than those of the Vernon. The difference, therefore, between the types is mainly in the structure of the subsoil material. The Kirkland soils occur in close association with the Vernon soils and are derived from some formations of the Red Beds but they are brown surface soils having dark brown surface solls having dark brown to chocolate-brown tough, heavy, subsolls. The Kirkland solls while the Vernon soils are more rolling. The main areas of the Kirkland soils are nearly flat with surfaces which incline enough to allow ready irrigation. The Wichita soils represent very old waterfald sediments probably washed from the Permian Red Beds and associated formations and are chocolated to chocolate red rather friable subsoils. The surface soils and upper subsoils of the Wichita series are not as a rule calcareous, but the lower subsoils are calcareous, though in places the old terraces have been eroded into a rolling top ographic form. Calvin Coolidge Talks. Strong, Slunt, Message, He Knowe What He Wants. And He Tella You.

A presidential message, telling congress what the president thinks it should do, and over the head of congress telling the people why the president thinks he ought to be re-cleated, must cover many points.

Fresident Coolidge's message deals with foreign affairs, money, prohibition, education, our islands, army and navy, coal, Muscle Shoals, farmars, the bonus, immigration taxes, railroads, merchant marine, budget, foreign debts, world court, negroes, Russia, highways, forests, etc.

At this ground President Coolidge covers in a message that has the merit of being free from high flying oratory, and the greater merit of being perfectly blunt, outspoken, unmistaltable in its meaning.

You observe first of all that there is not a word that could offend any rich man. The most important work of all is to cut down texation, says the greatent. That will please the men with big incomes. For while they have not actually been paying the heavy taxes, it appoys them even to think about them.

The president flatly rejects the bonus for soldiers. That at least shows political courage, and will cast many a vote. Perhaps these that would have been taxed to pay the bonus will make up for the lost soldier votes, but that's doubtful.

The farmer is told that he la doing pretty well on the whole, sleven of his staple products having increased in value from five billions three hundred millions to seven billions. As one farmer talking to another, Mr. Coolidge tells the farmer he must vary his crops. The man in North Dakota would say, "Come out here and do it."

The president thinks farmers will profit "indirectly" by reduction of taxation. He won't, when he hasn't one income to tax.

On the whole, the farmer must look out for himself. The president says "no complicated scheme of relief, no plau for government fixing of prices, no resort to the public treasury will be of any permanent value in establishing agriculture." value in establishing agriculture,"

The farmer will recall drastle government fixing of grices, freight fates and passenger rates did a great deal to reestablish railroads. But apparently there is one political economy for railroads, another for farmers.
