to find an apprentice in the plumbing trade or in the printing trade or in carpentry or in many other lines

Sometimes we wonder whether our compulsory educational laws have not had something to do with the breakdown of the apprentice system. They compel school attendance at an age when apprentices formerly were starting to learn their trades; they put the youth into an educational system that leads them into the "white collar" ranks instead of overalls. And we sometimes wonder whether the modern way is much of an improvement over the old which. at least equipped the youth for constructive service in which he could find ready employment.

To provide workers, who have not been provided through the apprentice system, which seems to be dying out in this country, training schools subsidized by employers have been opened for the training of artisans in many lines. These schools are getting a large number of students, who, having received an education that influenced and fitted them for "white coller" workers, have failed to find employment in such occupations and have turned to the trades. This system of subsidized schools is hardly what it ought to be, for the student has already lost valuable years and can hardly develop in a few mouths of intensive training that skill and proficiency that is developed through the apprentice system.

We, of course, would not advocate the abandonment of compulsory school attendance. Berhaps the apprentice system does not fit into the scheme of modern production. With these premises, it would seem the duty of our educational system to make some provision for the training of the youth in some is a growing necessity. It will add burdens and complexities to our educational system, already a big problem, but it is coming and the time is not too early to begin thinking about it.






