

Friona State Bank is one of only four known banks in the United States which will use "sit down" tellers. Both the tellers and the customers are seated for bank transactions. Interior' of the bank building

is carpeted throughout. Each officer has a spacious private office, giving customers theultimate in privacy for their transactions.

The bank has almost tripled the number of safety deposit boxes, now having 1400 boxes, and is more than able to take care of customers for this special service.

The bank's drive-infacilities features a relatively new concept, in that the second drivein window will be operated by means of a "pneumatic tube," One teller can operate two lanes under this set-up.

The bank will operate two lanes at first, but two additional lanes have been constructed in case they are needed in the fu-

#### Pause and Reflect

The following letter is being mailed to twenty-two people who, in one capacity or another, represent influential organizations.

Politicians, newspaper editors, museum directors, librarians, all have been invited to share the Prairie Prowler's

Here is the letter ---

The construction of dams along Running Water Draw is of prime importance to industrialists, agriculturists and con-

I am in complete agreement with plans as outlined in recent news releases.

Running Water Draw is one of the few remaining "drainage ditches" of the last Ice Age and must be considered a treasure

house of archaeological wealth. Since time immemorial animals and early man traversed its length. In recent ages Indians used it as a highway to New Mexico: Coronado, the Texas-Santa Fe expedition, and modern pioneers and cattlemen found it to be a source of

grass and water. This letter is an earnest plea to you to use your influence in the preservation of the fossils and artifacts that will be exposed during the construction of the dams,

I have absolute proof that much important material has been excavated in this general area but never brought to the attention of those who would have delayed construction in the cause of science.

Please confirm the receipt of this letter and indicate your willingness to impose the necessary restrictions upon the contractors chosen to perform this work,

Not everyone will recognize the reasoning behind the broadcasting of such an epistle and for that reason let me refresh

the memory of the casual reader. To add the weight of authority, I will quote from the 1940 edition of the Panhandle Plains Historical Review; specifically mentioning an article by Mr. Frank Bryan of Dallas,

Mr. Bryan, a graduate of the university of Arkansas, chief geologist for Gulf Oil Company in Mexico, Captain in the A.E.F. in France and a founder of the Central Texas

Archaeological Society. As a writer he contributed to "American Antiquities" and "Texas Folklore Publications." Our old friend J. Frank Dobie calls him "one of the best story tellers in Texas."

Refering to our part of Texas Mr. Bryan states-"We learn many things from the Llano because it is a fixed land, an eternal land, a page from the past, a record reaching back into remote antiquity it reckoned from the time since our continent took on its present shape.

It is a library in which is recorded all that has happened since the beginning of the Ice Age, which came and went in a cloud of dust -- and possibly eras before.

It is a book not yet read."

Those of us who have taken the time to prowl the prairie know that our country is not flat; the western edge of our plain is about two thousand feet higher than the eastern edge, a slope of about 10 feet per mile.



Stated very simply the torrents generated by the melting of the last Ice Age coursed down hill scouring out deep canyons

toward the Gulf of Mexico. The Canadian River basin is one, the Pecos River in New Mexico is another, and in between Running Water Draw is the silted in remains of yet another.

A rushing stream picks up and carries along its course, rocks, trees, bones and other loose articles.

This rushing stream reaches flatter country and the debris sinks and remains in a more or less stable location, to be covered with dirt by the gentler rains to follow.

Probably most of us made it through Thanksgiving without too many extra pounds (7) and now we need to start thinking about the next great "day" in our lives.

Some of you may have some special "days" between now and then, via births, weddings, days of new realizations -- etc., but many others are thinking about Christmas already . . ,and well they might since this past Sunday was the first Sunday in Advent, But don't let us forget Thanksgiving too quickly -- nor forget it at all.

I was a part of a community worship service the night before Thanksgiving, right here in Frions, that thrilled me to the heights. (Now for a preacher to say that when he didn't do the preaching is really something!) But if you were there, you know what I mean. 



The man running the stable, and leather goods store, upon finding out Gonser was from Friona, is said to have told him "I robbed the bank in Friona once." He said he learned leather work while in prison, and had gone into business in Santa Fe.

Friona State Bank was robbed the third time on Monday, June 29, 1936, at about 3:30 in the afternoon. Two armed menentered the bank. Those present were Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Mc-Lean, Orma White (Flippin) bookkeeper, and Hugh P. Lee, a customer.

Orma was in the back, doing her posting work, and did not know what was going on at first.

Mr. and Mrs. McLean, Lee and Orma were forced to the back and asked to lie down, Having corralled the employees into the back, the intruder announced, "This is a hold-up." He then proceded to rifle the

The bank president recalls the working conditions in those early days with the bank, at the old red brick building at Fifth and Main. "When we'd have one of those bad sand storms, the dust would sift in the doors and windows and it would be so dusty in the back where I worked that you could hardly see," he states.

It also was recalled that there was only one electrical outlet in the back part of the building. An extension line laid on the floor, and as expected, often was kicked or stepped on. One day it wore through, and the sparks fairly flew, but damage to the building was minor.

After working five years at the bank and advancing to assistant cashier and number two man in the organization, Spring resigned in 1936 to accept a position with International-Harvester Company as a col-


