“LONG LIVE THE KING” CRY FROM NEAPOLITANS

Presence of Victor Emanuel Restores Confidence... ASHES ARE FALLING... Auto Coats, Caps and Goggles Used to Protect People From Gender-Laden Air

NAPLES, April 12, 10 a. m.—From all quarters come reports that the situation is ameliorated, but ashes from Mount Vesuvius are falling everywhere, houses are collapsing and burying their occupants and the roads near the volcano are no sooner opened than they are closed again by the falling ash.

More shops opened today and the city is slowly resuming its normal life. The people, having recovered from the shock of yesterday, are less sullen and dejected. The presence of King Victor Emanuel in Naples, which always produces a good effect, acted as a tonic on the Neapolitans, who have a superstitious veneration for the king.

The king left Naples early this morning for San Giuseppe, Ottajano and Tergoleto, in order to ascertain personally the actual situation at these towns. He hopes to be able to continue his journey by Ermo and Castellana. The king has inspected all the camp hospitals in which troops are being suffering refugees, speaking to the injured, comforting them in their misfortunes and asking them what he could do to relieve their distress.

CASTRO RESIGNS; EL MOCHO SMILES

Fernandez Says Venezuela Is Acting Probable Tragedy... SOME EXPRESS DOUBT... New York Agents of South American State Think Probably Castro Has Simply Taken Extended Trip

NEW YORK, April 12.—The Herald today says: General Jose Manuel Fernandez (El Mocho), who led the revolution against President Castro of Venezuela several years ago and who was imprisoned for three years following his capture, said in his apartments last night that he heard of Castro’s resignation of the presidency, and that it caused him to smile.

“Yes, indeed, it is news,” he said, stroking his grizzled beard. “When I come to think of it, there is grim humor here, a comedy, that at the change of a few lines may be transformed into a tragedy. Who knows what is back of this latest move of the president of Venezuela. I can observe by mental telepathy the delicate hands that moved the pawns on the chess board of my country, and must not allow myself to lose repose when picturing Gomez in the chair.”

“Gomez is not brilliant. For years the tool of Castro, he will get better able to do the bidding of the late president now that he is seated in the president’s chair. Castro will now be better able to gather the fruits of his office without assuming any of the responsibilities of his office, or any of them which have rebounded to his discredit.”

“This comedy may last a week or a trifle longer. Then we will receive another cablegram that Castro has resumed his seat or that the comedy has been directed into another and more dangerous channel. The machinations of the ‘game’ will not be blocked now, that Castro has stepped from the throne. They even may be accentuated.”

“There can never be a prosperous country until the period has arrived when the gang is driven from the country and that country put on a footing where it may thrive and go without the iron hand of oppression upon the throats of the people. Perhaps a week this will last; perhaps until a moment comes when success will come to the sore and tried, but beautiful land.”

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, April 12.—Concerning the announcement made last night by Carlos B. Figueredo, consul general of Venezuela in New York, that General Cipriano Castro on April 11 retired temporarily from the presidency of Venezuela, being succeeded by General Juan Vicente Gomez, first vice president of the republic, the Times today says:

“Norbert B. Kates of the firm of Kates & Bole, the commercial representatives of the government of Venezuela in this country does not believe that President Castro resigned as a result of the strained relations with France following the recall of M. Talmy.”

“I cannot conceive of it,” he said last night. “Castro is a strong man. He is firm in everything, and when he believes he is right he will stick to his position and show his teeth against opposition. This is the most surprising news and I can only believe that at has resigned because he was anxious to leave his office, but was compelled by public sentiment to remain.”

Mr. Kates expressed the opinion that Castro would not resign permanently. He thought that even in the event of President Roosevelt taking a hand in the matter, it would be a temporary measure.

MINISTER FOUND DEAD IN CELL

Preacher Hung by Blanket in Jail at Hillsboro... WAS VIOLENTLY INSANE... Hill County Sheriff Goes to Call Man to Meal and Finds Him Dead in Cell He Occupied

Special to The Telegram. HILLSBORO, Texas, April 12.—Becoming violently insane, Rev. E. F. Badgett, a Methodist preacher of near Covington, was placed in the county jail here, but when the officer went to call him to breakfast this morning he was found hanging by a blanket.

Sheriff Satterfield returned from Covington last night, bringing Rev. Badgett, who had become insane at his home on a farm near there. Satterfield had little difficulty in placing the unfortunate man under restraint and bringing him to town. He was placed in jail and, when the jailer went to put him to bed in the insane cell, he again became violent and with great difficulty was finally induced to retire. This morning, when the jailer went to call him for breakfast, he found him hanging by a blanket to one of the bars of his cell. He had evidently been dead for several hours. The body was prepared for removal to his home.

Rev. Badgett had been an active preacher for more than twenty years in this section, having resided at Whitney, Cleburne and Itasca. Private trouble was blamed for his insanity.

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, April 12.—A resolution providing for the election of senators by a direct vote of the people has been favorably acted on by the house committee on election of president, vice president and representatives in congress.

The resolution, which was introduced by Mr. Mowbray of Nebraska, makes the term of members of the house four years, instead of two. Both propositions are to be accomplished by amendments to the constitution.

Reasons why the term of members should be four years are stated to be because no party can inaugurate its policy in two years.

By Associated Press. LAWTON, Okla., April 12.—By order of an attachment suit for \$10,000, filed in the district court by J. F. Fitzwater, Sheriff Hammonds attached seventy-five lamps and other property belonging to the Hydro-Carbon Light Company of Wichita, Kan. It is expected that officers of the company will arrive here tomorrow to make some sort of a settlement. The company’s business here has netted them several hundred dollars per month during the last four years. Fitzwater is father of the 16-year-old boy who was fatally burned in the county jail as a result of an explosion of one of the lamps operated by the Hydro-Carbon Company.

MAN ATTACKS THREE WOMEN

Girl Stands Ground and Is Injured... One of the boldest attacks ever made by a highwayman in Fort Worth occurred Wednesday night shortly after 9 o’clock when three women were assailed at Jennings avenue and Jarvis street, and one severely injured in an effort to save her pocketbook, which was pulled from her grasp.

The robber escaped and there is no clue left which the police can follow. Miss Minnie Carey, who was injured, is a telephone operator for the Southwestern Telephone company, and was on her way home at the time accompanied by her two sisters, Mrs. Triller and Miss H. Carey. Upon reaching the corner of Jennings avenue and Jarvis street, a heavyset man suddenly made a dash at the women from the shadow of a nearby tree, made a grab at the purse which Miss Carey held. Miss Carey bravely stood her ground, but the purse string broke and she was thrown heavily to the curb, sustaining painful injury about the head.

The Purse Contained no Money... The attack was made with such suddenness and so desperate the few moments it lasted that none of the three women could do more than attempt to give the police any description except that he was a man weighing about 185 pounds. Whether he was a white man or negro they are unable to say.

At the offices of the Southwestern Telephone company it was stated Thursday that Miss Carey was unable to go on duty for the day, but would be at her post in a day or two.

GARFIELD REPORT WILL ARRAIGN STANDARD OIL

President Intends to Submit It to Congress... PRICES ARE VARIED... Statement Will Show Methods of Company in Dealing With Competition

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, April 12.—The Garfield investigation of the Standard Oil Company will be completed in a few weeks. The President intends to submit it to congress before adjournment, excepting the portions concealed in public interest.

Statistics of profits will be given, showing the same price not charged for the same grade of refined oil in different sections allowing for cost of transportation, and that the same price was not paid for crude oil of an equal grade in different fields. The deduction will be that the company crushes competition by slashing prices in one section, while recouping itself elsewhere.

Facts and figures will be presented to show that no matter what conditions are now, the time was when the company had advantages over other shippers in its relations with the railways.

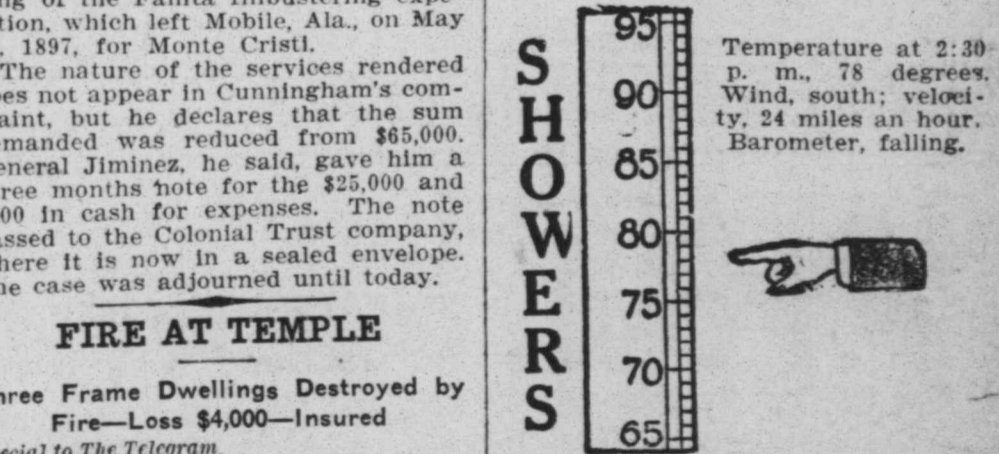
Tables showing that the railways paid more for oil than the general customer will be given, the difference being equal to a rebate.

PANHANDLE CATTLEMEN

The seventh annual meeting of the Panhandle Stockmen's association convenes in the thriving little city of Amarillo Tuesday, April 17, and as is usual upon such occasions, the stockmen are expecting to have a royal good time.

The Panhandle association is second only to the great Texas Cattle Growers' association in point of membership and influence. While essentially a local or district organization, it finds plenty of work to do without coming in conflict with any other organization, and it is constantly growing both in size and influence.

This Amarillo meeting is expected to be productive of very decided results in the matter of finding a market for the steers located above the line that are for sale, and the annual meetings of this association have for two reasons played havoc with the old custom of setting the spring ball to rolling at the annual meetings of the association of Texas cattlemen.

The generally bullish tendency of the Texas cattle market is well reflected and sustained by the existing temper of the Panhandle producers. These gentlemen realize that there is already more than enough inquiry in sight to take the last hoof that will be offered for sale, and the new markets that have been opened up through the development of the corn belt feeder trade but serve to inject additional stiffening into the situation.

Last year the buyers were in Amarillo in considerable numbers, and those from the northwest will long have occasion to remember that particular meeting. While they were engaged in an effort to obtain low prices the Kansas buyers sprang into the ring and virtually cleaned up the entire offering.

The indications are that much business will be done at Amarillo, but it all depends on the buyers. They are going to pay more than they are expecting to pay if they contract many Panhandle cattle.

BLACK ART NOW WAY OUT OF DATE

Sam Du Vries Says Public Is Wise to Old Tricks

"Black art that went with the public six years ago is now out of date. The old-time tricks have been exposed so often that the people are familiar with their operation. To fool the people, you must give them something new and keep ahead of the times."

So says Sam DuVries, master electrician, carpenter, mechanic, wizard, illusionist and magician, who is on this week's bill at the subject.

And then to prove the paradox of his argument DuVries puts on the "trunk trick" one of the oldest illusions on the stage and fools people with it every night. But while it is an old trick, DuVries does it as it never was done before, does it so that it fools the only people in the audience but those who are on the stage with him at the time, does it so that neither he nor the audience know it is accomplished and if either or both were to tell all they know to some rival stage magician, the latter could not profit.

DuVries also does the trick with a homemade box with the lid nailed on instead of being hinged as is a trunk and allows the audience to see the knot in the box before he uses it on the stage, but he allows the carpenter who built the box to tear it apart after the entertainment is over to satisfy himself that the box has not been tampered with.

DuVries uses the trunk trick, Aka, or the floating spirit and the disappearing chair on his present tour. He works on a full lighted stage with the addition of the spot light calcium on his apparatus, and uses an ordinary stage setting instead of the customary black draperies.

The so-called black art with its half lights and dusky drapery he discards as being out of date, although he built and devised many of such stage tricks under the late Herman the Great and under, and in fact all of the magicians now on the stage.

DuVries devised the wonderful Mermald illusion which was shown here earlier in the season. He has been making stage illusions for fifteen years, but has only recently taken to doing work on the stage with his own apparatus.

### ENLARGED SCOPE FOR STOCK SHOW

All Classes of Exhibits Are to Be Added

### PLANS FOR BUILDINGS

Separate Places for Cattle, Horses, Pig Stock, Hogs, Sheep and Poultry Urged by Committee

A meeting of the committee appointed by the Board of Trade at its meeting on Tuesday met in the exchange room of the Live Stock Exchange, in North Fort Worth Wednesday afternoon and discussed plans for the erection of a permanent home for the show.  
Members of the committee who were present at the meeting were Sam Davidson, chairman; Sterling P. Clark, Stuart Harrison and R. H. McNatt.  
In discussing the matter it was agreed by the committee that the Live Stock Show should have exhibits of all kinds of stock, including cattle, sheep, horses, pig stock, poultry and hogs, and that these should be shown under separate sheds. Besides this a big auditorium will have to be built in order to accommodate a ring and seats for 6,000 to 10,000 people.

Need of Sheds  
In speaking of the matter Sterling P. Clark stated that he had attended the meeting of the Texas Swine Association at Waxahatchie and had endeavored to bring exhibitors here and that they had refused to do so on account of the danger of hog cholera, and that consequently in order to get registered swine here it would be necessary to build a place whereby swine could be housed without any danger and arrangements made for shipping them out again. As it is now, no hogs can be shipped again after going into the hog pens. The same applies to sheep which might be exposed to scab.

All members of the committee agreed that it would be to the interest of the city to establish stock farms about this vicinity rather than agricultural farms and that a fat stock show taking in all classes of stock would create an interest in this that nothing else would. It was declared that the show must become as soon as possible not only a cattle show, but a general stock show. Stuart Harrison stated that he had kept count of the figures that had come to him during the three days of the show regarding registered swine and that there were no less than thirty-seven questions asked as to whether entries could be made or where registered swine could be purchased here.

The interests of the packing houses and Fort Worth are both in the raising of more hogs. It was declared. The raising of sufficient hogs is all that prevents the coming of more packing houses here, according to the members of the committee. It was agreed that place must be made for hog exhibits and sales.  
Cost \$100,000 to \$200,000

In estimating the cost of a permanent fat stock show here with pavilion and sheds, cost was placed by various members of the committee between \$100,000 and \$200,000.  
Marion Sanson was authorized by the committee to send letters to the Swine Raisers' Association in Chicago asking for information and suggestions regarding the building of a permanent home; and also to Colonel Skinner, manager of the Chicago stock yards, and to Eugene Rusk, manager of the Kansas City stock yards.

### R. E. MADDOX DIES

Brought First Shorthorns to Tarrant County  
Colonel R. E. Maddox, for many years one of the prominent citizens of Fort Worth, died at St. Joseph's Infirmary Wednesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, after an illness of about two weeks from rheumatism and stomach trouble. He was 57 years of age at the time of his death, and leaves a wife and daughter and six brothers, Walter T. Maddox, S. P. Maddox, James H. Maddox, Edward Maddox, all of this city, J. E. Maddox of Phoenix, La., and Pike Maddox of Pensacola, Fla.  
Several days ago it was announced by relatives of Mr. Maddox that his condition was serious and they were

prepared in a measure for the news of his death, the immediate cause of which was rheumatism of the heart.  
Colonel R. E. Maddox came to Fort Worth with his father's family in 1873, and soon took a position among the prominent men of the city. He always had strong faith in the future of Fort Worth and worked for and contributed to its upbuilding whenever called upon to do so. No subscription list for funds to secure some enterprise that would benefit the city was ever passed by him. He was not only a good worker for Fort Worth, but gave liberally.  
At one time Colonel Maddox was one of the largest real estate owners in Fort Worth. He had faith in Fort Worth real estate, and besides he acquired large holdings outside the city that afterwards passed out of his hands as a result of the collapse of the real estate boom in 1890. He established Maddoxia, at that time the finest stock farm in Texas, on which a number of notable favorites of the track were bred. He was not only a breeder, but an importer of fine stock and is credited with having brought to Tarrant county the first car load shipment of shorthorn cattle.  
Colonel Maddox started the building boom on lower Main street in the latter eighties, by erecting the structure now occupied by Fakes & Co. The Richardson hotel building, and a triangular building on Front street just across the street from the Texas and Pacific passenger station. Personally he was a man who made friends of all who knew him.  
Colonel Maddox held two offices during his life, and only two. He was a colonel in the state militia and for

ten years, when Fort Worth was a small place, was assessor and collector of taxes.  
Funeral was announced for 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon, from the residence of W. T. Maddox, 918 Lamar street. The pall bearers are all selected from the most intimate friends of Colonel Maddox, as follows: R. N. Graham, Stuart Harrison, John F. Swayne, S. T. Bibb, Jud Boyd and John T. Montgomery.

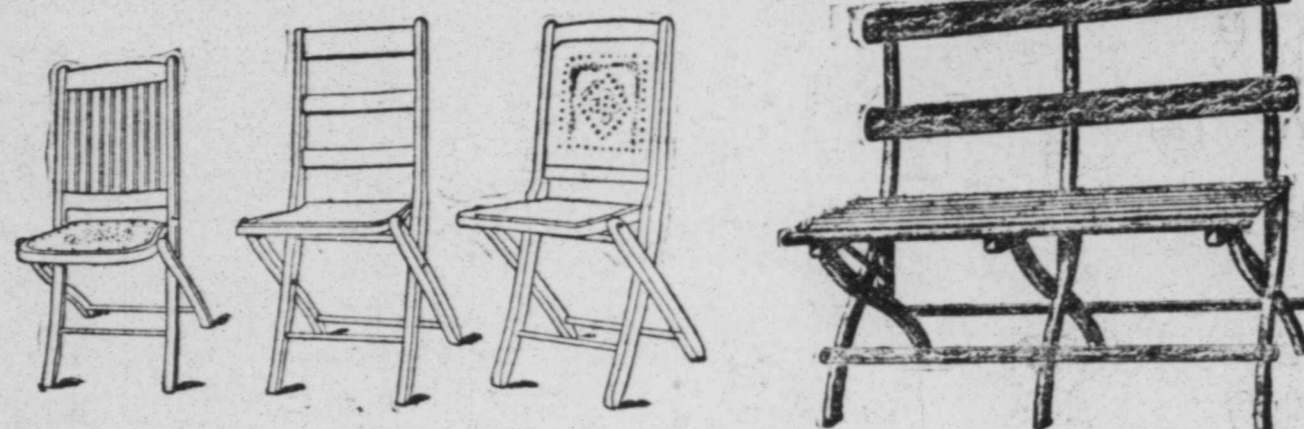

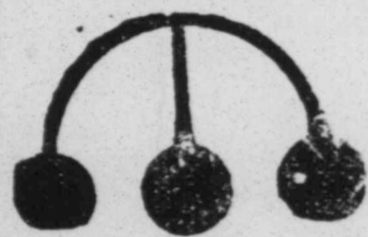

TEXAS FORECAST COOLER WEATHER

Showers Reported in the Panhandle Country

Kansas is now the center of the low area, according to information received at the local weather bureau. Showers reported in Montana, Wyoming and New Mexico and rain in Colorado. While New Mexico has snow, it is interesting to note that in Texas a warm condition prevails over the state, although cooler weather is promised. Rain has also visited the Dakotas and Minnesota. Thunderstorms continue in Kansas and Nebraska. Clear and cool weather in the northwest is caused by a high barometer area.

For northeast Texas showers and cooler weather is predicted. Wednesday night there was a shower at Amarillo. The highest temperature recorded in the state was at El Paso, where 46 degrees was registered. At Montgomery, Ala., the thermometer stood at 88, the highest temperature observed throughout the United States.

Reports to train dispatchers of railroads entering Fort Worth gave the following summary of weather conditions Wednesday morning: East to Marshall, cloudy with indications of rain; north to Whitesboro, cloudy and warm; west to Big Springs, fair and warm.

The Denver Road has reports of light rains along the line of the road from Wichita Falls to Childress and heavy showers from Childress to Texline. The temperatures reported are Texline, 50; Amarillo, 64; Childress, 62; Wichita Falls, 65.

Official statement is: "The barometric depression centered over Utah yesterday morning is now centered over western Kansas, causing snow in Montana, Wyoming and New Mexico; rain in Colorado, the Dakotas and Minnesota and storms in Kansas and Nebraska, and high winds generally throughout the 'low' area. El Paso reporting a maximum of 40 miles per hour. "A high barometer area is pushing in from the northwest, causing clear, cool weather in the northwest, Nevada reporting a current temperature of 26 degrees.

"Texas is generally clear, except in the east half. Amarillo reports a shower for last night."

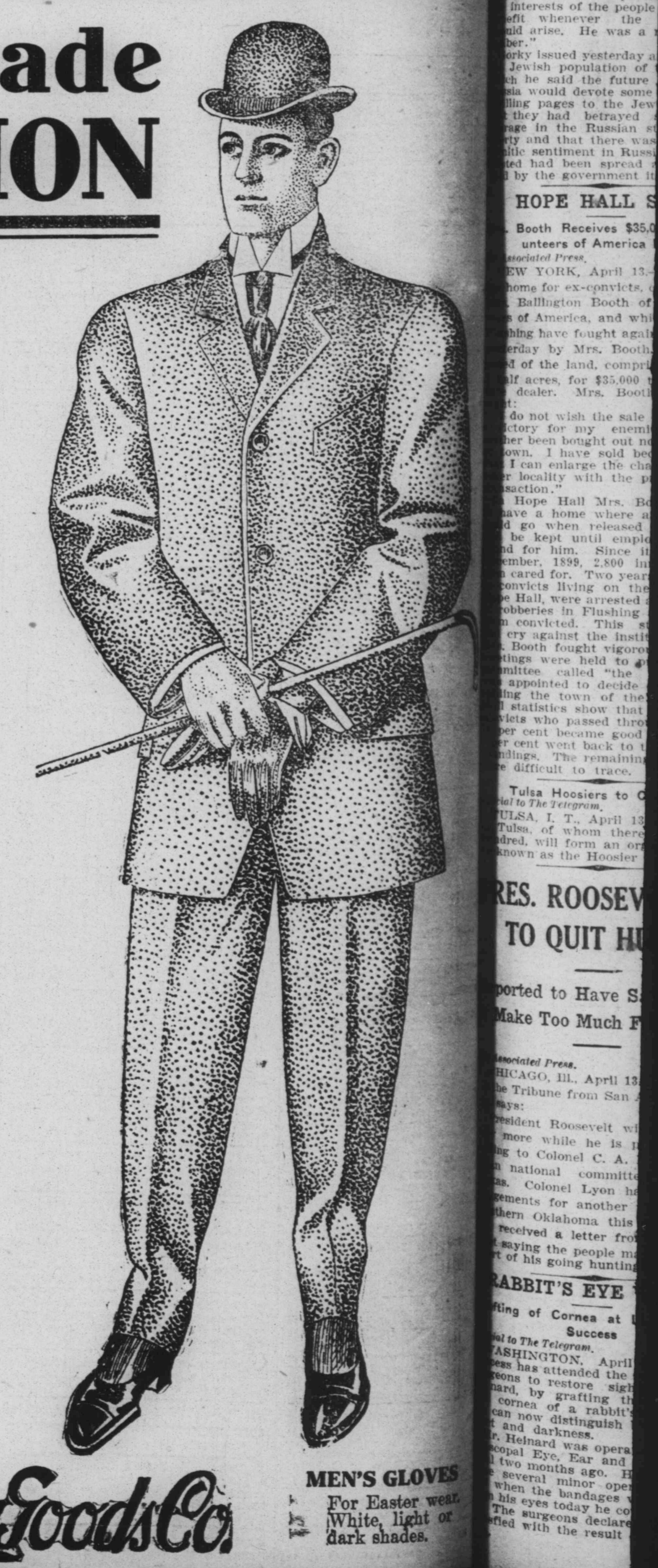
