

### CASTRO RESIGNS; **EL MOCHO SMILES**

Fernandez Says Venezuela Is Acting Probable Tragedy

New York Agents of South American State Think Probably Castro Has Simply Taken Extended Trip

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, April 12 .- The Herald

General Jose Manuel Fernandez (El Mocho), who led the revolution against President Castro of Venezuela several years ago and who was imprisoned for three years following his capture, said in his apartments last night that he heard of Castro's resignation of the presidency, and that it caused him to

"Yes, indeed, it is news," he said, stroking his grizzled beard. "When I humor here, a comedy, that at the change of a few lines may be transformed into a tragedy. Who knows what is back of this latest move of the president of Venezuela. I can observe by mental telepathy the delicate hands that moved the pawns on the chess board of my country, and must not allow myself to lose repose when picturing Gomez in the chair.

"Gomez is not brilliant. For years the tool of Castro, he will not better be able to do the bidding of the late president now that he is seated in the president's chair. Castro will now be better be able to gather the fruits of his office without assuming any of the responsibilities of his office, or any of them which have rebounded to his dis-

"This comedy may last a week or a trifle longer. Then we will receive another cablegram that Castro has resumed his seat or that the comedy has been directed into another and more dangerous channel. The machinations of the 'gang' will not be blocked now. that Castro has stepped from the throne. They even may be accentuated.

There can never be a prosperous country until the period has arrived when the gang is driven from the country and that country put on a footing where it may thrive and go without the iron hand of oppression upon the throats of the people. Perhaps a week this will last; perhaps until a moment comes when succor will come to the sore and tried, but beautiful land."

### Castro Tenacious By Associated Press.

NEW YORK, April 12.-Concerning the announcement made last night by Carlos B. Figuerdo, consul general of Venezuela in New York, that General Cypriano Castro on April 1 retired temporaritly from the presidency of Venezuela, being succeeded by General Juan Vicente Gomez, first vice president of the republic, the Times today

"Norbert B. Kates of the firm of Kates & Bola, the commercial representatives of the government of Venezuela in this country does not believe that President Castro resigned as the result of the strained relations with France following the recall of M.

"I cannot conceive of it," he said last "Castro is a strong man. He is firm in everything, and when he believes he is right he will stick in his position and show his teeth against opposition. This is the most surprising news and I can only believe that he has resigned because I know that at one time he was anxious to leave his office, but was compelled by public

sentiment to remain. Mr. Kates expressed the opinion that Castro would not resign permanently. He thought that even in the event of President Roosevelt taking a hand in Roosevelt to interfere.

### MINISTER FOUND **DEAD IN CELL**

Preacher Hung by Blanket in Jail at Hillsboro

WAS VIOLENTLY INSANE

Hill County Sheriff Goes to Call Man to Meal and Finds Him Dead in Cell He Occupied

HILLSBORO, Texas, April 12.-Becoming violently insane, Rev. B. F. Badgett, a Methodist preacher of near Covington, was placed in the county jail here, but when the officer went to call him to breakfast this morning he was found hanging by a blanket,

Sheriff Satterfield returned from Covington last night, bringing Rev. Badgett, who had become insane at his home on a farm near there. Satterfield had little difficulty in

he unfortunate man under straint and bringing him to town. He was placed in jail and, when the jailor went to put him to bed in the insane cell, he again became violent and with great difficulty was finally induced to retire. This morning, when the jailor went to call him for breakwestern Telephone company, and was a fast, he found him hanging by a blanket to one of the bars of his cell. He had evidently been dead for several hours. The body was prepared for removal to his home.

Rev. Badgett had been an active preacher for more than twenty years in this section, having resided at Whitney, Cleburne and Itasca. Private trouble was blamed for his insanity.

Apostle Seized With Fainting Spell in Chicago

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, April 12.-The Record-Herald today says:

John Alexander Dowle's controversy with Voliva and the other revolutionists at Zion City, shrank into insignificance just before midnight last night, at which hour the self-styled apostle faced the great maker of all. On his knees in the center of his chamber in the Auditorium Annex, whence he had stumbled from his bed in the midst of racking illness, Dr. Dowie invoked heavealy aid in what may be his final struggle with disease. It was at the close of a strenuous day that the Zionist was attacked. His collapse seemed so extreme that his personal attendants, all of whom have been taught to shun medicine, urged that they be allowed to send for a physician.

"I want no doctor," said Dowle feebly. "I will have no physician. I shall ask divine assistance—that is the only real help.'

Then, with a convulsive movement Dowie struggled from his bed and stumbled to the center of the room. He had gone but a few feet when he sank to his knees and muttered a prayer. His attendants carried him back to bed again, and at 3 o'clock this morning he was said to be sleep-



### NEW TRIAL FOR RICE

Criminal Appeals Court Reverses and Remands Johnson County Case

AUSTIN, Texas, April 12.-The case of D. R. Rice, appeal from Johnson county, was reversed and remanded vesterday in the court of criminal appeals. The appellant was convicted of murder in the first degree and his punishment assessed at confinement in the penitentiary for life. The indictment charged the appellant with the murder of his wife on Dec. 6, 1904, the allegation as to the cause of death being the administration of strychnine m a fountain syringe. The stat testimony showed that appellant neglected his wife for another woman who lived at Fort Worth. An error in the charge of the trial court was the cause for the court reversing and remanding the case. The court held that the trial court erred in limiting the testimony or the woman in question to the motive of appellant, being a charge on the weight of evidence.

NEW YORK, April 12 .- Another effort is to be made today by the subcommittees representing the anthracite coal operators and mine workers to reach an agreement and send the men back to work. The miners, who have had under consideration since Tuesday the counter arbitration plan of the operators, which provides that the strike committee of 1902-03 shall take up the dispute so far as it relates to up the dispute so far as it relates to wages and method for adjustment of complaints, are ready to submit their

The miners will insist that the eighthour demand, along with the re-adjustment of wages and reconstruction of the conciliation board, be taken up by the arbitrators. If the operators should refuse to entertain the miners' amendment to the employers' plan and insist that their latest proposition be accepted, as submitted, the miners may stop negotiations, call a convention and declare that a strike exists.

President Mitchell and other members of the general scale committee, however, believe the dispute will not go so far. As both sides have repeatedly expressed themselves against a strike, it is felt that each side will go a long way before taking the responsibility of a long suspension of mining. ### KANSANS ASKING prunkards **Cured Secretly** OF TEXAS COTTON

Jayhawkers Plan Colony to Raise Southern Staple

INFORMATION IS SOUGHT

J. A. Stephenson Holds Opinion That Plant Will Thrive in Soil Adjacent to Indian Territory

"Three or four weeks ago," said J. A. Stephenson, secretary of the M. Sansom Co., "I received an inquiry from parties in Kansas, asking for information relative to cotton seed for planting. These parties had determined to form a colony and go into the raising of cotton. They think that, as the, place they have selected for the purpose is not so very far north of the territory line, cotton ought to do well, While it is true that no cotton has ever been planted that high up and none in the territory near the line, still there is no good geason why the plant should not do well there, provided it escapes the frosts. I gave them all the information they needed about the methods of planting and cultivating cotton in the south and relative to the ginstands, and concided with their view that the plant ought to do well provided it was planted in May so as to enable it to get its growth and fruitage before cold

"One thing is certain, that the place is far above the boll weevil's habitat and there is not much doubt but that cotton will grow. Upon my reply the parties ordered seed from me and also a ginstand, or rather outfit. Their intention is to make a fair trial this year and plant enough land so as to make the experiment something worth while, and they propose to have the gin ready to do the work if the plant turns out all right. In case it does then they will go into the planting of cotton on a great scale and give their entire at-

tention to it. "While on this subject I will say that I have filled an order for a car of cotton seed for planting purposes from Del Rio, Texas, which was filled from the Panhandle. This is undeveloped cotton territory, and, no doubt, will prove to be as good as every other part of Texas has."

Falls in Love With Texas

"I came to this state only a few months ago, three in fact-from Missouri, and have been shown so effectually the great possibilities of Texas that I get more and more in love with her every day, 'said J. A. Haw-kins, of Ringgold, Montague county. "I buy feed and sell cattle and am perfeetly satisfied with the outlook for the future. Grass is coming fast and cattle are in fair shape. We have had a fine rain and the season in the ground is good. Stock farming is taking the fancy of the people and they are buying up the lands around Ringgold as fast as they can be cut up Silverstein has already cut up his ranch and it sold for good prices. Rawls has also cut up and sold his 3,000 acres and 'Uncle Joe' Harris has sold his 7,000 acres to a Dallas man, who is having it divided now into smaller tracts. I do not know what price was paid, but the average price paid for similar lands is \$20 an acre. "This is my first shipment to this

NAPLES, April 12.-Viewed as a whole, the conditions throughout the district affected by the eruptions of Mount Vesuvius, are better this morning, as compared with those of the early hours of yesterday. Frequent detonations are still heard, but faintly. The main crater is gradually enlarging. The rain of ashes over the Mediterranean side of the volcano has diminished. The heaviest fall is now over Somma, Santa Anasiasia, Pondelli and the other villages in the section opposite and some distance from this city. Large contingents of troops have arrived, affording a military force sufficient to successfully meet all eventualities. Garrisons have been doubled and sailors ordered ashore from the squadron in the bay to help restore and maintain public order. For a time after midnight eruptions were somewhat more acute.

### **HOME FINDERS** IN SESSION HERE

Work of Caring for Children Is Discussed

Plans for providing an endowment fund for homeless children were scheduled to be discussed at a meeting of the Children's Home Society board in the Worth hotel Wednesday afternoon. Committees are to be appointed to provide for such a fund, to raise money for the erection of a detention home in Fort Worth, and to draft a petition requesting the legislature to enact a law making it an offense for a mother or father to abandon a child. The board, which met Tuesday afternoon, is composed of representatives

from Austin, Houston, Paris, San Antonio, Dallas, Decatur, Greenville and Fort Worth. Rev. I. Z. T. Morris of Fort Worth, who is in active charge of the work, made his annual report. It showed that during the past year homes were found for sixty children and thirtyfive women. Forty children have been aided in getting back to their parents.

Steps toward the establishment of a detention home were urged by Rev. Mr. Morris, who has heretofore cared for all persons under the society's charge, at his own home. The efforts to establish an endowment home was also urged. At present the money used in caring for unfortunate children is raised by popular subscription.

"Of General Gomez," saidl Mr. Kates, "I know only that he is of the same school of Castro and presume the government would be run on about the same lines as under Castro, save perhaps, that there would be no such incident as that concerning M. Taigny.' General Castro has been in the habit of making trips into the interior of Venezuela, on which occasions the vice president, General Gomez, has managed the affairs of state, but without being empowered to act fully in Castro's place. These interior trips have been on business affairs, it is said, and coupled with a statement from Mr. Kates that Castro and Gamez were in business together in the interior, some of those interested in Venezuelan passing history were inclined last night to believe that perhaps Castro had only withdrawn long enough to cover a necessary absence from the capital.

as having handed in his resignation to the president of the Venezuelan congress. Prior to his moves in that direction have been ruses only, to obtain certain ends which he invariably got. Cypriano Castro sprang into prominence in 1899 when, with a handful of soldiers, himself a tattered cowherd, he engaged and defeated the soldiers supporting the government of his native province. ### APATHY IN MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

The newspapers of the state have devoted much space to the fact that something like half a million voters in the state have voluntarily disfranchised themselves through failure to pay their poll tax. Another phase of this same question is brought forcibly to light in the woefully small percentage of the legal vote that is cast. Take the recent municipal elections for instance and compare the number of votes cast with the total voting strength. In Fort Worth only a little more than 1,200 votes were cast in a mayoralty election. The surprising lack of interest in public matters is decidedly bad in its tendency. A government of the people where the people do not take sufficient interest to even express themselves is bound to become a govtrament by few. This has the certain tendency of creating bosses and insures their maintaining their power. How to arouse interest among the voters in matters that should be of interest to them is one of the problems of the present time.-Denison Herald.

The Telegram has heretofore referred to the apathy existing in this city in regard to municipal elections, and in addition to the exhibit made in that direction in connection with the recent election of a mayor, there is yet another illustration of far more striking character. Last Tuesday there was a general city election held here under the referendum plan, involving the question of whether or not the Northern Texas Traction company should be permitted to extend its tracks in the Third ward. All the people of Fort Worth were entitled to express themselves in this matter, and the intention of the referendum procedure is that they shall do so. But note the result:

First Ward-27 for and none against. Second Ward-19 for and 1 against. Third Ward-132 for and 3 against. Fourth Ward-20 for and none against. Fifth Ward-22 for and 4 against. Sixth Ward-5 for and 3 against. Seventh Ward-15 for and 6 against Eighth Ward-24 for and 3 against. Ninth Ward-14 for and none against.

It will be noticed that the total number of votes cast In this election amounted to the stupendous total of 298. And this is a fine showing to be made by a city that has about 5,000 qualified voters. The per cent of qualified voters who expressed themselves in this matter is so ridiculously small that the election referred to can but be regarded in the light of a screaming farce. If the referendum plan is to result in such a small proportion of Fort Worth's citizenship expressing itself, then we must turn in some other direction in order to get a real expression from the people.

This comment is not indulged in for the reason that The Telegram was opposed to granting the Traction company the franchise desired, for it seems to have been a proposition with merit behind it. But it is desired to admonish the people of the city against the evil results that are sure to inure from this policy of neglecting to express themselves upon matters of vital moment to themselves. If the measure sought to be granted had been an iniquitous one there is no certainty the result would not have been the same. And with an established reputation in this respect, how long will it be until Fort Worth will be literally flooded with applications for franchises under the referendum plan, that will be so chock full of dynamite that lasting damage will ensue?

Patriceism and a desire for public protection should inspire every public spirited citizen to register his sentiments in these matters as opportunity is extended. The policy of neglect and general apathy now being manifested in the matter is sure to bring trouble in the future. Fort Worth voters must awaken and make up their minds that they will do their plain duty in the premises. There is too much danger in the course that is now being generally pursued.

### PANHANDLE CATTLEMEN

The seventh annual meeting of the Panhandle Stockmen's association convenes in the thriving little city of Amarillo Tuesday, April 17, and as is usual upon such occasions, the stockmen are expecting to have a royal good time. Amarillo has made extensive and suitable arrangements for the entertainment of the visitors, and the indications are that there will be no disappointment over the result.

The Panhandle association is second only to the great Texas Cattle Growers' association in point of membership and influence. While essentially a local or district organization, it finds plenty of work to do without coming in conflict with any other organization, and it is constantly growing both in size and influence. The membership is now in excess of 500, and the affairs of the organization are in a remarkably healthy condition.

This Amarillo meeting is expected to be productive of very decided results in the matter of finding a market for the steers located above the line that are for sale, and the annual meetings of this association have for two reasons played havoc with the old custom of setting the spring ball to rolling at the annual meetings of the association of Texas cattlemen. In the first place, the Panhandle association is composed of men whose holdings are exclusively located above the state and federal quarantine line, and this is the character of stuff that annually finds its way to the northwest and into Kansas. Cattle from below the line cannot go into those sections, on account of the quarantine regulations, and it is but natural the buyers in search of that class of stuff should attend the meetings where they will be brought directly in contact with the very people with whom they desire to do business. The other reason referred to is the fact that the Panhandle meeting is held a month later than the state meeting, when all danger of bad weather is over, when cattle are in better conditions and buyers in better shape to determine just exactly their own needs and require-

The generally bullish tendency of the Texas cattle market is well reflected and sustained by the existing temper of the Panhandle producers. These gentlemen realize that there is already more than enough inquiry in sight to take the last hoof that will be offered for sale, and the new markets that have been opened up through the development of the corn belt feeder trade but serve to inject additional stiffening into the situation. The Panhandle cattlemen are in position to lose no sleep over the absence of buyers from the Amatillo meeting, if for any reason they should decide not to attend. They can still find markets for their steers and at prices that will be highly satisfactory.

Last year the buyers were in Amarillo in considerable numbers, and those from the northwest will long have occasion to remember that particular meeting. While they were engaged in an effort to obtain low prices the Kansas buyers sprang into the ring and virtually cleaned up the entire offering. History has a method of repeating itself, and unless the men from the northwest proceed to get busy early in the game they are again going home from Amarillo without making many purchases.

The indications are that much business will be done at Amarillo, but it all depends on the buyers. They are going to pay more than they are expecting to pay if they contract many Panhandle cattle.

### **BLACK ART NOW** WAY OUT OF DATE

Sam Du Vries Says Public Is Wise to Old Tricks

"Black art that went with the public six years ago is now out of date. The old-time tricks have been exposed so often that most people are familiar with their operation. To fool the people, you must give them something new and keep ahead of the times." So says Sam DuVries, master electrician, carpenter, mechanic, wizard,

t and magician, who is on this week's bill at the Majestic. And then to prove the paradox of his argument DuVries puts on the "trunk trick" one of the oldest illusions on the stage and fools people with it every night. But while it is an old trick, DuVries does it as it never was done before, does it so that it fools not only people in the audience, but those who are on the stage with him at the time, does it so that neither his two assistants know how it is accomplished and if either or both were to tell all they know to some rival stage magician, the latter could not

DuVries got the "trunk trick" idea in in India. He has improved and has changed it so that the fakir who gave him the original suggestion would be utterly bewildered in trying to solve the trick in its present form

Briefly the "trunk trick" is this. An ordinary trunk is brought on the stage; a man put inside, the trunk locked, and a tarpaulin placed over outside. The trunk is placed behind the curtain for probably a minute and a half. At the end of that time the curtain is pushed aside, the trunk rolled out toward the front of the stage; the knot in the tarpaulin lace untied, the trunk unlocked, the lid opened and-presto, a young lady is found crouched inside, while the young man whom the spectators saw locked inside a couple of minutes before, walks down the aisle of the theater.

DuVries also does the trick with a homemade box with the lid nailed on instead of being hinged as is a trunk lid. He is trying to find someone who will make a box for him to use sometime this week. His only requirement is that he be allowed to spend an hour with the box before he uses it on the stage, but he allows the carpenter who built the box to tear it apart after the entertainment is over to satisfy himself that the box has not been tampered with.

DuVries uses the trunk trick, Aga, or the floating girl, and the disappearing chair on his present tour. He works on a full lighted stage with the addition of the spot light calcium on his apparatus, and uses an ordinary stage setting instead of the customary black

The so-called black art with its half lights and dusky drapery he discards as being out of date, although he built and devised many of such stage tricks ised by the late Herman the Great. Keller, and in fact all of the magicians now on the stage.

DuVries devised the wonderful Mermaid illusion which was shown here earlier in the season. He has been making stage illusions for fifteen years, but has only recently taken to doing work on the stage with his own

"The fact that this dollar completely misled the government expert and also the secret service agent into believing that the coin was a counterfeit, also goes to hurt one's confidence in government work, for after discovering the difference in the coin from the genuine and standard silver dollar, which difference was subscribed to by the agents of the government, the position taken by the bankers here was strengthened in being assured that there was something wrong with the 1890 dollars that were circulating about this vicinity.'

# FOR STOCK SHOW

**ENLARGED SCOPE** 

All Classes of Exhibits Are to Be Added

PLANS FOR BUILDINGS

Separate Places for Cattle, Horses, Pet Stock, Hogs, Sheep and Poultry

Urged by Committee

A meeting of the committee appointed by the Board of Trade at its meeting on Tuesday met in the exchange room of the Live Stock Exchange, in North Fort Worth Wednesday afternoon and discussed plans for

Members of the committee who were present at the meeting were Sam Davidson, chairman; Sterling P. Clark Stuart Harrison and R. H. McNatt. In discussing the matter it wa agreed by all present that the Fat Stock Show should have exhibits of all kinds of stock, including cattle, sheep horses, pet stock, poultry and hogs, and that all these should be shown under separate sheds. Besides this a big auditorium will have to be built in order to accommodate a ring and seats for 6,000 to 10,000 people.

Need of Sheds In speaking of the matter Sterling P. Clark stated that he had attended the meeting of the Texas Swine Asdeavored to bring exhibitors here and that they had refused to a man on account of the danger of hog cholera, get registered swine here it would be ecessary to build a place whereby swine could be brought here without any danger and arrangements made for shipping them out again. As it is now, no hogs can be shipped again after going into the hog pens. The same applies to sheep which might

be exposed to seale. All members of the committee agreed that it would be to the interest of Fort Worth to establish stock farms about this vicinity rather than agricultural farms and that a fat stock show taking in all classes of stock would create an interest in this that nothing else would, and that the show must become as soon as possible not only a cattle show, but a general stock show. Stuart Harrison stated that he had kept count of the inquiries that had come to him during the three days of the show regarding registered swine and that there were no less than thirty-seven questions asked as to whether such entries could be made or where registered swine could be purchased here.

The interests of the packing houses and Fort Worth are both in the raising of more hogs, it was declared. The raising of sufficient hogs is all that prevents the coming of more packing houses here, according to the members of the committee, so that it was agreed that place must be made for hog exhibits and sales.

Cost \$100,000 to \$200,000

In estimating the cost of a permanent fat stock show here with pavilion and sheds, cost was placed by various members of the committee between \$100,000 and \$200,000.

Marion Sansom was authorized by the committee to send letters to the Swift and Armour interests in Chicago asking for information and suggestions regarding the building of a permanent home; and also to Colonel Skinner, manager of the Chicago stock yards, and to Eugene Rusk, manager of the Kansas City stock yards.





Wheat Prices Rise Phenomenally-Advance Almost 2c-Bulls Flood the Market with Buying Orders

Special to The Telegram CHICAGO, Ill., April 12.-Wheat was preeminently a bulls' market today and the gentlemen with goring proclivities ruled the pit from start to finish, salving the sting of many a past defeat by the balm of an advance of almost 2c

Evidently plans had been well formulated for the extinction of unwelcome shorts and with Liverpool prices fully meeting our advance of yesterday there was nothing to deter the volume of buying orders which the market received.

Opening prices were practically unchanged and with very little hesitation prices started upward, trading from the start being more active than at any time recently.

There was little or no opposition and although there was a fair sprinkling of bears in the pit, these were soon run to cover and joined the throng of eager buyers.

A multitude of stop loss orders were distodged between 1/2c and 1c above the opening figures, but the talent was not satisfied with this trophy and prices continued to soar until May was selling 1%c above yesterday's closing level, while July and September sold at a net gain of 1%c, these being the highest prices for quite a length of time. At this level bullish greed was satiated to some extent, and profittaking caused a slight recession, but the market closed firm with prices 11/2c net higher for May and 11/3c higher for July and September. Local receipts 1 car vs. 47 cars this day last

Corn prices were helped along by the strength of wheat as well as a good volume of independent buying. In the early session the May option sold 1/20 net higher while distant options were up %c. A reaction in the last hour carried prices back to within 1/3c of yesterday's closing level, these being the closing figures. Local receipts 110 cars vs. 92 cars this day last year.

Oats Oats were in line with the other cereals and ruled urm throughout the session, final prices showing net gains of 1/2c to 1/8c. Local receipts 99 cars vs. 22 cars this day last year.

Market Dull and Narrow-Bulls Confident-Shorts Cover Some-Price Change Slight

Special to The Telegram, NEW YORK, April 12 .- A dull and comparatively featureless market was the best offered the talent today, but throughout the session bulls exhibited placid countenances and it was very evident that the vein of self-content was strongly developed among their ranks, and although for a time it looked as though Liverpool's course would break prices on this side, their serenity was not ruffled in the least and they looked on without uneasiness offering support when needed and preventing any serious decline. No so, however, with the shorts many of whom were plainly averse to carrying committments over the long holiday owing to the rather improving weather outlook, and as a consequence covered, but it may be stated not extensively, as there was never enough business to cause more than slight fluctuation in

The market opened easy with prices showing only a partial response to the foreign weakness, being 1 point lower. Following the call the loss was increased a point on July but the good news sent over from Liverpool regarding the spot business offset their decline in futures and prices soon reacted on short covering, working up 7 to 11 points from the lowest. This happened during the first hour and after that time the ring was almost deserted and no important transactions were made. Prices eased off a little and the market closed quiet and steady with old crop months selling 1 to 4 points higher. Spots were quiet at unchanged prices on a basis of 11.80c for middling.

Liverpool increasing spot sales after hours yesterday to 16,000 bales and disposing of 10,000 today, the spot situation here was also encouraging. Prices sold off shortly after the call to a level with yesterday's finals, but soon started upward again and advanced steadily throughout the balance of the session, the close being firm and at the day's best level, with May and July selling at a net gain of 8 points.

### SPEECH OF BDEE **PROVOKES LAUGH**

Possible Division of Texas Is Basis of Argument

Special to The Telegram. WASHINGTON, April 12.-While Senator J. W. Bailey of Texas was handling the Spooner-Knox combination without gloves Tuesday, in a master oration on the rate bill, Representative J. Adam Bede of Minnesota discussed in the lighter vein in the house. beginning with the postoffice appropriation bill, bringing in the statehood bill as the main point of argument and made the suggestion that the greatness of the state of Texas and the diversity of interests of her people was such that it would probably be possible to convert the Lone Star state into an independent republic, or cut it up into six thriving states of the American

Mr. Bede admitted at the outset that it might seem to some superficial thinkers a novel proposition, but Texas itself, he explained, was a novel proposition. "Texas stands alone among the states," he added. "She holds a unique place in history. Within a single century she has paid, allegiance to five flags." Continuing, he said in

"They never have been admitted on an equality in the history of the union. he exclaimed. "You cannot make Texas and Rhode Island equal. You cannot make New York and Delaware equal, and if that be true, why not Texas subdivide herself into four states, have a central government, a governor over all and lieutenant governors in the four several states, and elect senators to the United States senate. There is nothing, in my judgment, unconstitutional, but there are a great many things that are constitutional that this congress isn't going to do. I understand that perfectly well. It would be entirely constitutional for us to come in here tomorrow morning and admit Oklahoma to the union, but we are not going to do it, because it would be constitutional. It would be constitutional for us to cease to compel Arizona and New Mexico to come in together, but we are not going to do that right away, it seems to me from the history of affairs in this house. (Laughter.) I have been pleased to find this allegiance of the delegation from Texas to her own Lone Star state holding itself even when the other brethren of the south had come over and voted for the quarantine bill. They stood up in solid phalanx of sixteen and stood for Texas rather for Uncle Sam. I rather like that description, for their great state is big enough for an empire or republic of its own. "Oh, I hear it said that the senators

are bad folks. I do not know whether it is against the rules of this house to speak well of the senate or not (laughter and applause), but I am going to make that attempt. I began to speak well of the senate once before, walle I was upon my feet, but either my time expired or I was called to order. There are, I say, some who complain that the senators of the west do not represent enough people, but I say to you that I would rather leave my political rights in the keeping of a member of either house of congress hailing from the Rocky mountains and representing nothing but the sunset than to one standing in the shadow of the trust companies and representing the unearned increment. (Applause.) Why, some people upon this floor would have us believe that the people of Arizona do not know the initiative from the referendum (applause), and all that the friends of that territory ask is that they may have the right to vote upon the propositions which are submitted to them."




