Gold for Import

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, April 14 .- The stringency of the money market brought its own alleviation in Wall street this week by forcing engagements of gold for import, by moderate speculative liquidation of stocks and by a very extensive transfer of speculative holdings from New York to foring the ceremonies, but the construcon of the outer part of the rest of the edifice has progressed up to the second story. Previous to the ceremony a copper box two and one-half feet long and eighteen inches wide was placed in the stone in the presence of the grand treasurer of the grand lodge. The box contains many rare and unusual articles, together with coins of the United States and the series of postage stamps now in use Some idea of the size of the build ing is given by the following frontages: On B street, 476 feet; on New Jersey avenue, 470 feet; on First street, 452 feet, and on C. street 348 feet, making a total frontage of 1,740 feet, or approximately one-third of a mile. The building contains 410 rooms for mem-

bers, together with a multiplicity of caucus rooms, audience rooms, postoffice, restaurants and other features. It is a modern office building.

History Recalled

A century and thirteen years ago. George Washington, then President of the United States, assisting the acting grand master of the Masons of Virginia and Maryland, laid the corner stone of the national capital. Then the nation had but 4.000,000 population, and the city of Washington but 4,000 inhabitants.


Fifty-eight years later Millard Fillmore, President of the United States, laid the corner stone of the extension to the capitol with similar impressive ceremonies characterizing the laying of the first corner stone. The nation, when President Fillmore laid the cor-ner stone of the extension, had grows-from 4,000,000 souls in 1793 to 20,-000,000 in 1851.

Today, with a more impressive ceremony, the corner stone of the largest office building solely devoted to the primary purposes of legislation and the comfort of its legislators in the world, will be laid with Masonic fraternity as active participants, assisted by President Roosevelt, who, like Presidents Washington and Fillmore, is a Mason and who, following immemorial custom, delivered the principal address.







After calling of the roll and reading of the minutes of the last meeting, the High School Orchestra rendered two pleces of music, both of which were highly applauded. The first subject on the program was "What Effect Has the School Grounds and School Buildings Upon the Conduct of the Chil-The first paper upon this was dren?" by Miss Dawson, from school No. 1. She was followed by Miss McFadden and a general discussion in which President C. T. Work of the Girls' Industrial College at Denton took a

part. A song, "Sunbeams," by Miss Maud Sawyer of building No. 9, followed. Miss Sawyer, as usual, was encored, giving another selection as happily elected as the first. Then came a paper upon the relation of the library o the school, prepared by Mrs. House of Waco and read by Mrs. J. C. Terrell. The paper had been prepared for and read before the Teachers' Association at San Antonio. An address by Q. T. Moreland followed in which he made reference to what has been said regarding the necessity of sidewalks. Miss Warren having declared she preferred good sidewalks to ice water. Mr. Moreland, who furnished ice. water for the schools, replied in a humorous way. Mr. Moreland's subject was "Discipline in the Schools and Teachers' Responsibility." The thread of his remarks was a general complaint without remedy and the statement that after all he believed the teachers did the best they could. Objection was made by him to the 'keeping in" prm of punishment. Pierpont Morgan has rounded out 69 years, and he achieved his greatest financial victories after he had passed the half-hundred mark. John D. Rockefeller is 67 years old and his intellect is as keen after a dollar as it was in the long ago when he first conceived the idea of making Standard Oil the greatest money-getting agency in the world.

George F. Baer, the recognized head of the hard coal industry, is still alert at 64, while Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor is 56 and as young and active as he was 20 years ago. Mark Twain, our greatest humorist of the old and new school, is 71 vears old, and just a few days ago the New York police had to be called out to prevent people who turned out to hear him speak from being crushed to death, so great was the assemblage.

THE POWELL ADMINISTRATION

When Thomas Jefferson Powell turned over the city government of Fort Worth to his successor a few days ago this city lost he services of one of the ablest and best executives that has ever occupied the mayor's chair. That much can be truthfully said concerning the retiring mayor, for it is universally conceded by Fort Worth people.

When Mayor Powell was called to the position of mayor of this proud and progressive city there were many who did not envy him his heritage, and predictions of failure were rife on every side. Fort Worth had just passed through a period of great depression, her finances were at a very low ebb and her credit was about on a par with that of the individual who is informed that the price is so much, half cash, and the remainder within the very next minute.

But Powell is a man of untiring energy and possessed of much self-reliance. While wiseacres were predicting failure for his administration he was hard at work in an effort to bring order out of confusion and get the city again well on the road to progress. He met with many difficulties and was hampered by many disadvantages, but the dogged determination of the man never wavered for an instant. He took hold of the situation with characteristic vim and determination, and Fort Worth began at once to respond to the magic of the Powell touch. In his retiring message to the city council former Mayor Powell gives an array of facts and figures that fairly bristle with credit for his administration, and from that message we quote the following extract:

During the six years that I have been mayor the following permanent improvements have been made without the assistance of a single bond:

To which can be added the \$225,000 permanent improvements, as shown in this report for last year, makes approximately \$700,000 expended in permanent improvement during the six years I have been mayor, not counting the amount expended year before last, of which I haven't the figures at hand at this time.

It is reasonable to say that three-quarters of a million dollars have been spent in permanent improvements in the last six years in the city of Fort Worth, without the issuance of bonds. I do not believe that there is another city in America that can make a better showing in the handling of its finances than it told by the figures above quoted.

Truly, that is an exhibit to be proud of, and the retiring mayor is excusable for the pride manifested in that report. The Telegram doubts if there is another city in the country that can make such a showing, and that is but a part of the benefits that have accrued from the Powell administration, and which have been enjoyed by the citizens of this city. The Telegram will not undertake to say the Powell administration has ter advantages to men who can do things and do them well than the golden present. The price demanded of each man is that he excels in his particular line. That, in other words, he makes good today, tomorrow and every day as he goes along.

Joseph W. Bailey is said to have made a great speech on the railway rate regulation bill, and the occasion has again been seized upon by some of the small fry Washington correspondents to nominate him as the Democratic candidate for the Presidency. Bailey is a very able man-as able, perhaps, as there is in the United States senate. One of these days there will be a measure submitted to the people of this city under the referendum that deserves to be slaughtered. But the matter of remaining away from the polls will have grown into such a fixed habit that the franchise will be granted by a satisfactory majority.

The democrats have made large gains in Russia, and if David B. Hill, Perry Belmont, Alton B. Parker, Cousin Rienzi Johnston and other members of the party can be persuaded to stand with hands off, there may be hope for the Russian masses yet.

Those Texas murderers who were recently compelled to explate their crimes upon the gallows may have gone straight home to glory as they claimed in their farewell addresses, but there are a whole lot of people who aver they are from Missouri.

The activity that is being manifested over mere rumors of yellow fever in Louisiana is pretty good indication that the next time Yellow Jack really appears. in that vicinity the fact will not be suppressed so long as the consequences can be hidden.

Dowie has finally decided to wage a war-in the courts for possession of Zion City, and when he gets through with the undertaking the lawyers will have the city and John Alexander will have the vindication of a principle.

Advices from Austin indicate that the prospects for C. E. Gilbert's nomination for land commissioner are growing very bright, and his friends are already predicting success. Section 1. Hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to construct any curb on any street in the city of Fort Worth without having first obtained a permit therefor from the city en-

Sec. 2. Application for such permit shall be made in writing at office of the city engineer (on forms provided by said office), at least three days prior to issuance of permit, and on permit shall be issued until the city engineer or his duly authorized assistant shall have demarkated by proper stakes the alignment and grade of such curb, which alignment and grade shall be conformed to by the person construct-Sec. 3. On all streets not now occu-

pied by street car tracks, or over which street car privileges have not been granted, or applied for as required by law, the following widths of roadway shall be given and staked out

On streets of 80-foot width, 30 feet. On streets of 60-foot width, 30 feet. On streets of 50-foot width, 26 feet. On streets of 40-foot width, 26 feet. The middle of the roadway space to be at the middle line of each street. according to and corresponding with

Sec. 4. On all streets over 80 feet, or under 40 feet, in width, curb lines and grades shall not be staked out by the city engineer, nor permit issued, until the city council shall have determined upon a proper roadway width for such street, and shall have directed the city engineer what width to demarkate. Sec. 5. No charge shall be made by the city engineer for the work of giv-

ing lines and grades for curbs. Sec. 6. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof in the corporation court, be fined in any sum






