



MEETEETSE, Wyo., April 17 .-Partially intoxicated in the effort to drown their sorrow at not having been able to secure the requisite number of girls of Denver, Col., to emigrate for the purposes of weddings, announcement of which desire has been published in the daily press dispatches, a party of young men here, bent on driving dull care to the forewinds of the earth, caught a man completely under the influence and, pouring alcohol in persuasive profusion about his garments, struck a match and yelled

"fire. The announcement of "fire" was immediately followed by the breaking out of flames in the places that had been soaked with the combustible composition about the clothing of the victim and, before the blaze could be extinguished, his head and face were seriously burned. It is said that he will be marked for the remainder of his natural life from the effects of the drunken jokers' work, and that a damage suit will be brought against the perpetrators of the fun.

#### Gov. Davis (Ark.) Silent Special to The Telegram.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 17 .- Governor Hoch of Kansas, Governor Hagerman of New Mexico and Governor Davis of Arkansas, who are here as guests of the convention of the Southwestern Commercial Clubs, were asked today for expressions concerning the Springfield, Mo., lynching. Governor Hagerman said:

"Such a lynching as took place in Springfield under the Statue of Liberty with the police helpless could not have occurred in New Mexico. Our mounted police are men who would take no account of the odds against them in enforcing the law. It would be a lasting disgrace to a sheriff in the territory to have a prisoner taken from him by a mob, as it is to have a prisoner es-

cape.' "Race prejudice is not bounded by geographical lines. This outbreak in which the mob did not wait to learn whether the prisoners were guilty is an instance of this hyenalike spirit."

Governor Davis of Arkansas said: "I have nothing to say on any subject to a newspaper reporter; I don't want to see one. I have no opinion on the lynching at Springfield or any other subject for publication."

Reed Smoot Case to Go to Senate This Week Special to The Telegram WASHINGTON, April 17. - The Smoot case is to be made the basis of a grand senatorial filibuster against the rate bill, according to a stor; afloat in senatorial circles. 
CURIOUS ART DISCOVERY



Colonel Bryan is preparing to return home soon, and he will come back a much bigger and broader man than when he went abroad. There is today no greater or purer statesman on the American continent than William J. Bryan, and the indications are that all the American people are finding



#### COTTON IN WEST TEXAS

West Texas is developing into a wonderful cottonproducing country, and that the acreage in that section will be largely increased is due to the fact that so many people are being attracted to that section by its producing ability. It is no rare thing for cotton planters to make a half bale of cotton to the acre on raw sod land, and there are many instances on record where the cotton produced on the land one year has been sufficient to pay the purchase price.

But such yields of cotton cannot be expected every year in west Texas for there are years when it will require many acres to make a bale. If it were not so, every foot of tillable land in the west would be under the plow in less than five years. There are many beautiful prospects for a big cotton crop in west Texas that melt away like a gentle dew before the genial warmth of the summer sun. There are boll weevils and army worms down in the old agricultural belt that render cotton production just about as uncertain as it is out in the arid west, and the people are taking cognizance of that fact. This within itself accounts largely for the influx of new population and the planting of increased acreage. There will be a big cotton crop planted west of the Brazos river this year, even if the farmers out in that section are still busy picking last season's production .- Fort Worth Telegram.

There will soon have to be a rewriting of the productive possibilities of west Texas. The cotton and the corn of this section of the state is yet to be, but an earnest of that coming production is reaped with greater certainty each year. Cotton acreage has increased in the country tributary to this city more than ten fold in ten years, and the sections covered with mesquite and cactus years ago are now rejoicing in the presence of the plow and smiling in the face of the man with a hoe. There is a virgin cotton acreage in this west that the state must reckon with in the future, and with the ever increasing cultivation of this hitherto supposed to be barren region a greater rainfall will come, insuring larger and more certain returns from year to year. Only this week some autolsts from the east and southeast of the state, who have been touring within a radius of fifty miles from this city expressed their astonishment at the extent and richness of the lands under cultivation, having been taught that there was no available agricultural land within a long distance of San Antonio. The turn in the tide has come. and there is going to be cotton and corn in abundance in this southwest, despite the evil prognostications of The Telegram. Its prophecies are in the line of its desires, but north Texas has seen the day pass in which it was able to belittle and distrust the possibilities of southwest Texas. The proofs of our soil and its wonderful fertility are in our hands, and the extent of our rich productive acreage is beginning to be understoood. President Roosevelt has shown himself to be in accord with the masses of the American people. But he is handicapped by the open hostility of his party leaders. The result is that Roosevelt has promised more and done less than any President we have had in a long time. Justice for his repeated failures can be found in the attitude of the republican party. He himself is not to blame, for Theodore Roosevelt is a genuine reformer and desires to do the proper thing. But the republican party is opposed to, practically all the reforms demanded by the President and the people, and in the end will defeat them so far as this administration is concerned. The republican party is daily digging the graves politically of republican members of congress, and the work being done in that direction is going to have a far-reaching effect in the congressional elections this fall and the national election two years later.

If the democrats place themselves in position to profit by the blunders now being made by their political antagonists, name candidates that are known to be true to the people and declare for the measures the people are demanding, there will be a great tidal wave sweep over the country from one end to the other and the republican party will be entirely swept from power. But it cannot be done with peanut politicians. There has to be a broader statesmanship brought into evidence than is evinced by David B. Hill, August Belmont and others of that class who have heretofore brought the party so completely into disrepute.

Some of the state papers are never at a loss for a hard word to say concerning the Lanham administration. And Lanham is not responsible for the general cussedness of the last legislature. Neither is he responsible for the shortness that has prevailed in the state treasury. He has done the best he could under adverse circumstances, and while his administration may not be as brilliant as that of some of his predecessors, the fact must be conceded that the affairs of state have been administered in a wise and economical manner, and the people have enjoyed the blessings of good government.

WAREHOUSE PLANS

THE FORT WORTH TELEGRAM

Steps for a warehouse so that the farmers of Tarrant county and surrounding country can store their cotton in Fort Worth are taking more definite shape every day. A letter was received by W. C. Stripling Tuesday morning from C. A, McMeans, chairman of the committee appointed by the Farmers' Union a week ago to confer with the merchants of this city, stating that he had notified the other members of the committee to meet with him at the Labor Temple on April 21 at 1 o'clock, and asking that someone be present to show them the intended warehouse in this city.

At the meeting which was held last week the committee from the Farmers' Union reported that they had been told to state that the union would give the merchants of Fort Worth two weeks in which to take action upon a ware-house. At this meeting there were present from the city several of the merchants of the city, and they immediately secured an option upon the lease of what were considered suitable warehouses for cotton. The meeting of the farmers' committee here Saturday is for the purpose of looking into the matter further.

The farmers in their request ask for a warehouse that will be able to hold 5,000 bales of cotton, which is two and a half times the total amount of cotton received in this city last season. Besides this it is probable that a large amount of cotton will be sold immediately upon delivery, so that the estimate of 5,000 bales seems to indicate that the amount of cotton brought in here will be the largest for years, if a warehouse is provided. The members of the Farmers' Union have promised to take charge of the warehouse and give it their support.



Johnson County Man Charged With Murder Freed at Hillsboro Special to The Telegran

HILLSBORO, Texas, April 17 .- The John Bateson case, brought here on change of venue from Johnson county, where defendant was indicted for murder, in connection with the death of W. S. Pate at Cleburne, Jan. 19, 1904, was concluded here Saturday night and Judge McCoy submitted his charge to the jury at 11:30 yesterday morning. The jury reached a unanimous conclusion, and following the reconvening of court for the afternoon session, a verdict of acquittal was returned.

Defendant was convicted of murder the second degree at Cleburne in February, 1904, and his punishment fixed at thirty-five years in the penitentiary. A reversal was obtained, and a change of venue to this county was secured.

At the February term, 1905, of the district court here, Bateson was convicted of manslaughter and a penalty of two years confinement in the penitentiary was assessed. This judgment

was also reversed and remanded.
