LIGHTFOOT STILL ON INVESTIGATION
Assistant Att'y General Returns to Capital City

AUSTIN, Texas, April 17.—Judge J. P. Lightfoot, office assistant attorney general, returned this morning from Fort Worth, where he admits that he has been prosecuted further investigations of the Fort Worth Live Stock Exchange.
Judge Lightfoot declined to discuss what progress he has made, before Judge C. T. Prewitt. For the second time since the case has been before the court a hung jury resulted. The jury was out about fifteen minutes. The penalty upon conviction is from \$20 to \$200. It is the first case in which the new ordinance is concerned and will be in the nature of a test case. Another jury will be selected Wednesday and the case retried.

Of the last railway accident on the Rio Grande railroad, where the telegraph operator on duty so long that he went to sleep at his post, Chicago News says:

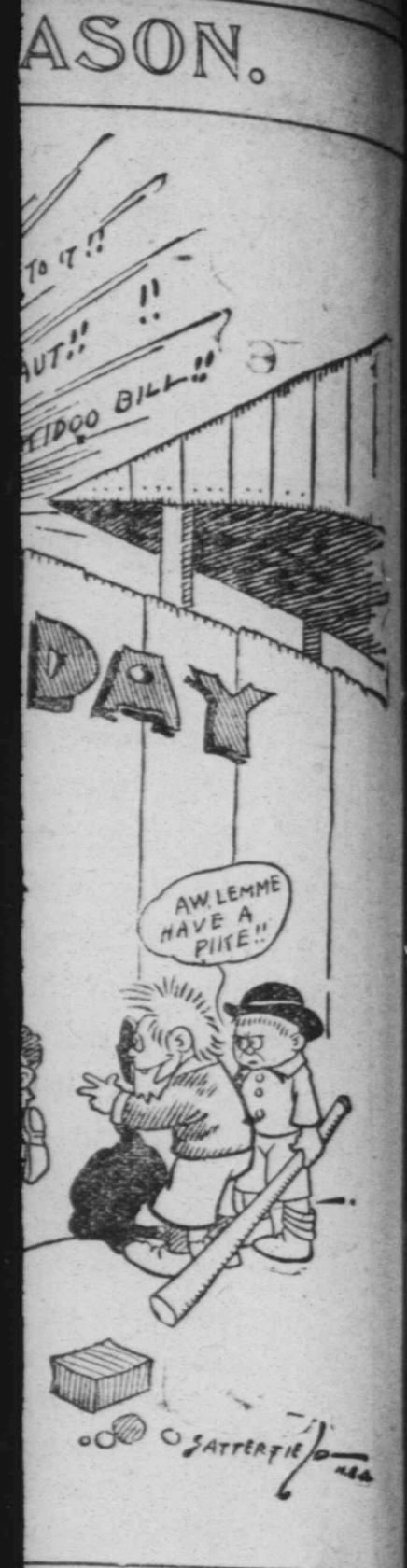
