#### THE TERRELL ELECTION LAW

The Fort Worth Telegram surprised us by declaring In favor of repealing about four-fifths of the Terrell election law, or as it pleases to term it, the "Turkish" Terrell election law. It's true that law as it now appears on the statute books has, perhaps, a few objectionable features, chief among them being that it is so cumbersome, but we do not agree with The Telegram when it says that the major portion of the law should be repealed or amended, nor do we believe with our contemporary that the people-a large majority of them-are getting sick and tired of that law, as framed by the venerable statesman at Austin, and passed by the Texas legislature. To the contrary, we believe that in the main the law is exactly what Texas needs just at this particular time, and furthermore we believe that during the short time in which the aforesaid law has been in operation, it has done more to purify the ballot than has ever been done in this or any other state by any law ever passed by any legislature. The foregoing being true, as we see it, we do not believe, as The Telegram predicts, that the next legislature will virtually repeal the law in operation, but on the other hand, we both believe and trust that the law will continue on the statute books, being amended and strengthened from time to time. And if such proves to be true, the Terrell election law will, as the years come and go, uplift and purify the body politic, and become an enduring monument to the memory of him whose wisdom and patriotism made it possible for Texas to have such a wise and far reaching law upon her statute books.-Bonham News.

There are many salient and valuable features about the Terrell election law, as well as others that are not so commendable. The Telegram has consistently opposed features of this law since it was first proposed by its venerable and respected author, and The Telegram is not yet prepared to concede that the fact Judge Terrell is its author is sufficient to remove or obliterate the many serious objections that have been

One of the greatest objections to the Terrell election law is the control it has taken of the democratic party and the individuals who compose the democratic party. One of the fundamental principles of democracy is that law is the best law which governs least, and when democracy is simmered down to a fine point it is found that it simply means the right of the people to rule. Here we have a measure passed by the representatives of the people which arrogates to itself the right to rule in the most harsh and tyrannical manner. It destroys the rights of the people it was intended it should serve, and as the Waco Times-Herald so aptly expresses it "pokes its nose" into affairs it should let severely alone.

Another great objection to the Terrell election law is the rigid censorship that it establishes and maintains over the state press. A free and unfettered press is the greatest bulwark of the people, and every law that is passed fettering the press is but binding additional shackles upon the people. The Texas press has heretofore had just about all the burden it could carry in the existing unfair and unjust libel laws, but the distinguished author of the Terrell law has exceeded the libel law by about 1,000 per cent. He has had the state of Texas say what the editor of a newspaper shall put in his columns and what the shall not put in his columns. He has gone further than that by having the state of Texas regulate and control the price that shall be charged for certain kind of matter that the editor is permitted to put in his columns. The Telegram has contended against this outrage upon a free press and a free people since it was first suggested, and it expects to continue offering its protest until this great

wrong is righted. Another paramount objection to the Terrell election

law is its great ponderosity and extreme verbosity. There is not one average voter out of ten in all Texas that can and does understand its provisions. And while The Telegram believes it is the duty of the lawmakers of this state to place all proper and necessary restrictions and safeguards about the exercise of suffrage, it does not believe it is proper to cumber the statute books of this state with a superfluity of verbiage that can be remedied by the proper simplification. And if the Terrell Turkish election law was pruned of its unnecessary ponderosity and brain-fagging verbosity, at least four-fifths of that measure would be

The Terrell law is far reaching in its effects. Stretched from end to end it would reach from El Paso to Texarkana. There is no necessity for amending the law, for it now covers all Texas like the dew and any additions would necessarily be an intrusion upon

#### A LARGE SIZED CONTRACT

Colquitt may be the "friend of Houston," as is claimed by the campaign clubs being organized in the Bayou City, but, according to advices from Kauman county, he is not regarded as a very warm friend of local eption.-Fort Worth Telegram.

Advices from Nueces county say that Senator Willacy, champion of the brewery idea, finds General Bell "sound to the core." Here at home J. B. Cranfill, leader of the state prohibitionists, insists that General Bell is as loyal as he was in the warm days of 1887. Gum shoe! Well, don't mention gum in the hearing of Editor Robinson of the Times-Herald .- Dallas Times-

Editor Robinson is endeavoring, to small purpose, he fears, to get Editor Fitzgerald to "tote fair." Defined, the "gum shoe" man is one who adjusts himself to the prevailing views of each locality he visits. Senator Stone of Missouri is a past master in

"gum shoe" methods; of him it has been said that he not only sucks the eggs but hides the shells. On the prohibition question, if we understand aright, Judge Brooks, General Bell and Colonel Campbell occupy identical ground. Each votes "dry" every chance he gets, but neither favors submitting the question of constitutional prohibition. It is quite probable that

each has "anti" supporters as well as "pro" supporters. The other two candidates for governor, Messrs, Colquitt and Moore, vote "wet" every time. But more than likely each has "anti" supporters and "pro" supporters, for the reason that prohibition is not the paramount issue in this campaign.

Now the "tote fair" doctrine will not permit us to single out one of these men as a horrible example of 'gum shoe' methods, letting the other four go free. But Editor Fitzgerald has set himself the task of defeating the Fort Worth man, and he is giving his

imagination full play. Where General Bell is under consideration, "Fitz" just won't, "tote fair."-Waco Times-Herald. The Telegram seems to have innocently been the

cause of dispute between the Dallas and Waco namesakes, and it hastens to the front with a small vial of oil to pour upon the troubled waters. With the Trinity and Brazos both bank full the prospects are good for It is a well known fact that friends of Judge Brooks,

who is wearing the belt of the prohibition candidate for governor of Texas, are making a determined effort to relieve Candidate Colquitt of the responsibility of carrying his home county for governor. It is a well known fact that Candidate Colquitt is not in line with the local option sentiment existing in Kaufman county, and that ct was sufficient to prevent him from carrying the county both as a candidate for the state senate and for railroad commissioner. If he has failed to carry his home county twice already on this account, it looks reasonable to suppose he is going to have some trouble in his present aspirations, especially when the local option fires are burning so brightly in Kaufman county, and the enemy has already organized to encompass his defeat.

Judge Bell is taking no stock in these side issues and will not be drawn into something that is foreign to the campaign. While friends of Brooks and Colquitt may rake the prohibition coals until they fairly glow, the next governor of Texas is making a dignified and convincing campaign that is bringing to his support loyal and conservative democrats from one end of the state to the other. And parenthetically it may be remarked if the distinguished Celt presiding at the helm of the Dallas Times-Herald has undertaken to encompass his defeat he has the biggest contract of his life on hand, and will realize in the end that he has been up against something that was loaded.

But Editor Fitzgerald will "tote fair." He is only sparring for time in which to get his second wind.

Congress has appropriated one million dollars for the relief of the people of California, and all over the United States the people are coming to the front with large donations. Truly, there is not so great a people anywhere else on earth as those we have in these United States, and great public calamities always bring the greatness of Americans conspicuously to the front.

The people of Texas should not forget a state legislature is to be elected this year. And the experience of the past has been sufficient to demonstrate the necessity for choosing men who are able to measure fully up to the requirements of the occasion.

The insurance companies taking advantage of the "act of God" clause in their policies and refusing to pay for California homes destroyed in the recent terrible catastrophe should be suitably remembered in the future by people who want fire insurance.

Judge Charles K. Bell told the cattlemen at Amarillo the other day how he rode the trail behind the festive Texas steer back in his boyhood and young manhood days, and they saw and understood. They knew at once why they were all Bell people.

While other cities are wondering how it is done, Fort Worth is going steadily ahead in the matter of building more sidewalks. That is a way Fort Worth always had, and it largely accounts for the fact that we lead all other Texas cities.

Fort Worth will respond to the appeal for the stricken district of California in the proper manner. The great heart of Fort Worth has never yet failed to go out in a proper and substantial manner to the suffering and distressed.

At the first public meeting held to aid stricken California nearly \$1,000 was raised in a few minutes. But that is only a starter. Out of her kindness and abundance Fort Worth will give liberally.

It is not generally believed that many Standard prayers are being offered for the recovery of the attorney general of Missouri.

Now that excitement is dying down with regard to the great California catastrophe, we will probably begin to get a few of the real facts.

#### PEOPLE FOUND SAFE

Messages Received by Relatives from California Friends

A telegram was received by L. P. Robinson Friday afternoon from Bart Caufman, formerly of this city, dated Sacramento, Cal., stating that he was in San Francisco when the earthquake occurred, but escaped unharmed. The relatives of Caufman in Fort Worth knew that he was in the stricken city and had tried to reach him by wire. but failed. It seems that Caufman left San Francisco at the earliest opportunity and went to Sacramento, where he could send the telegram.

A message has also been received announcing that W. R. Scott and family and Charles Coppage and family, who were in California during the earthquake, are safe. Mr. Scott was formerly general superintendent of the Fort Worth and Denver City railroad, with headquarters in this city. Mr. Coppage was also an employe of that line. Mr. Scott is now superintendent of the Southern Pacific pier at Oakland, Cal., and his family reside at Berkeley. The message came over the railroad wires from Oakland.

Banquet Tendered Supreme Chancellor Shiveley

### **MUCH ENTHUSIASM**

Joint Reception by Lodges to Terminate Features of the Reception

In honor of the visiting supreme chancellor of the Knights of Pythias, Charles E. Shively of Richmond, Ind., and Major General Arthur E. Stobbart of St. Paul, Minn., commanding the Uniform Rank of the same order, about forty local members of the Fort Worth lodges and a few members of outside lodges had a banquet at the Metropolitan Friday night, and the following menu was enjoyed:

Wine and Cigars John M. Adams, supreme representative, acted as the toastmaster and, after the keen edge of the hunger of the guests was dulled, called on Dr. J. L. Cooper for the address of welcome. Dr. Cooper was so hoarse that he could scarcely speak, but did manage to say a few words of cordial wel-

come which gave the keynote to all of the subsequent talks. R. H. Buck was called to fill the breach, and this he did acceptably, welcoming the supreme chancellor and the major general in fitting terms of cordial Pythian friendship in behalf of the lodges of Fort Worth and North Fort Worth, merely a forerunner, he said, of the welcome they would get on the way to and at Galveston.

#### Address by Supreme Chancellor

The address of the evening was that of the supreme chacellor. When C. E. Shiveley arose he was warmly greeted and for several minutes could not proceed. This has been so implanted in the minds of this generation, at least, that the flag is as safe here as it is in any state north of the Mason and Dixou's line, and then when the effete rule of decrepit Spain was ended in Cuba none of the states contributed more through the heroic acts of their citizens to that end than did Texas. The fraternal organizations have done more to bridge the chasm of the civil war than all other agencies, and not

From its inception, he urged, Pythlanism has stood, and still stands, for cleanness in governmental affairs. Damon's troubles in Syracuse were due te his insistance on right doing in the affairs of the government. 

### **ELLERY'S PLAYERS GREAT MUSICIANS**

Audience Divided in Praise for Artists and Director.

Channing Ellery, whose name to the religious suggests Unitarianism and to the musical the essence of artistic merit in band management, has brought a great organization to Fort Worth. Probably never such a group of artists in their diferent lines was ever brought to Texas. It is even doubtful if the Thomas and Damrosch orchestras, undoubtedly the greatest orchestras ever in the southwest, produced such satisfying results to their hearers as does Francesco Ferullo, a slim little Italian, only 26 years old and but a couple of years from the ranks, bring from the three-score magnificent musicians whom Mr. Ellery has given him to direct.

The story of Ferullo tells a little of what the Ellery band is. Italian bands are comparatively new in America and Channing Ellery is the pioneer. It is not so long ago since Creatore startled America with what might be termed electrical effects in tone. Under the Ellery management Ceratore and his band, considerably smaller than the present organization, toured the country and created furores in every city of prominence.

Creatore took his Italian artists to Milwaukee and played Schumann's Traumerel, dear to the heart of every German music lover, as not even the greatest Teutonic artists who had visited that city by the lake had ever played it before. German Milwaukee went into ecstacles over an Italian band, and that was only one of the many triumphs which the pioneer El-

lery organization won. Ferullo, the present leader, was taken from the ranks of the band-he was an oboe player-by Mr. Ellery and placed at the head. He has been a phenomenal success. It would be hard to convince some of the Creatore enthusiasts that Ellery has found in Ferullo a successor even greater than the original, but to the unprejudiced audience the suggestion leaves no room for doubt. And yet Ferullo was only one from the ranks. What Ellery has in the other musicians who compose his band can be left to the imagination.

First Audience Small The first audience which heard the

Ellery band at Greenwall's Friday night was small, inexplicably so. "Doesn't Fort Worth have a reputation for musical culture, more than Dallas?" asked Mr. Ellery in bewilderment, as he gazed at the rows of empty seats. There was no answer to make. The few people present were musiclovers, but the majority of Fort Worth people who have reputations as leaders in musical matters were painfully lacking. The bulk of the audience sat up-

brought to Texas then. First Night's Program

The Friday night program of the Ellery band was admirably arranged. The band is strong in wood-winds. brasses, trumpets and horns and this varied strength was beatifully dis-

Orlando's "Symphonie" march sharpened the appetite of the audience, but the enthusiasm of the hearers did not reach full measure until the second number, the familiar "Maritana" overture. Volume and delicacy, richness and tonal attenuation followed each other in succeeding waves until at the close the audience enthusiastically demanded an encore. It came in Paderewski's "Minuet,"

The first part of the concert closed with the first presentation in Texas of Massent's "Manon," Fantasie. Especially beautiful in this number were the tenor and soprano "Love Duet," the organ fugue and the minuet.

The second part of the program opened with Chopin's funeral march. No number of the program displayed better the massive richness which Ferullo can bring from his heavy basses and baritones. There was not even the suggestion of the harshness that ordinarily is expected with a great volume of brass, but the same purity of tone that characterized even the trumpet solos ruled the deepest

The seventh number of the program selections from the "Prince of Pilsen," pleased the lovers of lighter music and Ferullo was forced to respond with a popular encore.

Ferullo a Composer

If Mr. Ellery were not so insistent that the band stand wholly on its merits as a classical organization, he could readily swing Ferullo into a popular glamor of the sort that surrounds the Sousa organization by calling his leader a "waltz king" and letting his reputation start with the "Queen of the West" waltz, which Ferullo composed and which was the eighth number of the Friday evening Johann Strauss never did more with

strings than Ferullo has accomplished with his inconceivably beautiful instrumental combinations in this number. Friday night's audience demanded a repetition but Ferullo gave instead a charming intermezzo of which he is also the author. The program closed with the fa-

mura, Di Natale, Riso, Forte and Donizetti's music has been played scores of times in Fort Worth, but never was it given with the warmth, the volume or the purity which marked its rendition by the Ellery band.

Extremely Bullish Statistics Send Liverpool Prices Up-Early Response on Local Market

Special to The Telegram. NEW YORK, April 21.-Extremely bullish week-end statistics showing heavy spinners' takings and a large decrease in the American visible, imbued that part of the foreign talent which has all along been disposed to favor the long side of the market, with the aggressive spirit and confidence in the ultimate outcome, which heretofore this week has been lacking, to a considerable extent, and coupled with some good buying for American account, resulted in a fairly active and generous Saturday market in Liverpool, with prices advancing some 3 to 4 points more than had

been anticipated. With the English setting the pace and bullish confidence somewhat rejuvenated on Wall street, the essential qualifications for a healthy market were on hand and the opening was firm with prices showing the full response to the foreign strength, being points higher for the old crop months. In the first few minutes following the call the gain was increased o a matter of 1 to 2 points, after which time the session was a typical week-end affair. Weather conditions were rather fa-

vorable for planting but did not extend much influence, while the surplus energy of the bulls seemed to have been spent in the initial trading, and although there was no short selling of consequence, the usual volume of week-end liquidation was forthcoming, while the bull leader confined his energies to enthusing over the situation in a document which he cabled to Liverpool and sent out to the American trade, with no appreciable effect, however, for although the market was narrow and at all times steady, prices eased off gradually, losing the greater portion of the gain on May and all on July, while new crop months sustained a net loss of 1 to 3 points. The closing tone was steady. Spots were quiet with prices 5 points higher at 11.80c for middling. The May situation is of paramount importance just now, as the bull campaign hinges to a considerable extent on the outcome of that option in the final settlement, the date of which is rapidly approaching. Authentic information, which is not generally known, has been obtained from a reliable source to the effect that the local bull clique have been negotiating for some time and have now completed banking arrangements whereby they will be enabled to accept all cotton which may be tendered on May contracts, thus preventing any serious disturbance in the market.

# EYE WITNESSES TELL OF FRISCO HORRORS

Terrence Owens of Denver, in Frank L. Ames in Front of Grand Hotel

### FIRE DEP'T CHIEF NEWSPAPER MAN

Two Shocks Felt Distinctly. Air Turns Bluish Yellow. People Panic-stricken

By Associated Press. SALT LAKE CITY, April 21 .- Terrence Owens, chief of the Denver fire department, was an eye witness to the San Francisco earthquake. The chief, with his wife and young son, arrived here yesterday. They were guests at the Grand hotel in San Francisco on the morning of the earthquake and, after the first shocks, escaped to Oak-

"I happened to be awake when the first shock came," said Chief Owens. "The plaster began to come down around us and the furniture of the room was thrown about,

#### Rescues His Family

"My wife sprang up from the bed and a moment after she had quit it, a heavy dresser was thrown violently upon it. It would probably have killed her had she remained there. I quickly got my wife and child to the street. Going back I got our things together and took them down where my wife was. I saw fire burst out a few blocks away. An engine came down and hitched to a hydrant, but seemed to be doing nothing. I asked the engineer what was the matter and he said there was no water. I saw enough in those minutes to convince me the city was doomed.

#### Reach Oakland Safely

"I made my way back to my wife and got away. She wanted to go to Golden Gate park but I told her that I believed the city was going and that we must get to Oakland. We managed to catch the first boat and got over and saw the rest of the fire from

"Market street when we got out of the hotel, was in a frightful state. Wires were down, naked and half naked men and women were running along the streets, cattle and horses were mixed up with the crowd and the scene was one of indescribable

#### Air Color Peculiar

The air seemed to be a sort of yellow. To make matters smell in the air. The buildings were leaning together in a crazy fashion and debris was falling everywhere. "I distinctly felt two heavy shocks before we left for Oakland and after we got over to the Oakland side there were two more.

#### Fire Spreads Quickly

"As we left the Frisco side I could see fire in all directions. People whom we met had come for many blocks running to the water front half naked and with bare feet. At that time it was no easy matter to get through the streets for the stuff thrown about by the shock. The sight was the most horrible I ever witnessed and I have seen many fires. Some persons we met were cut about the face and hands by falling glass and others had been hit by stones. None of them seemed to know where they were going, but ran about in every direction."

Palace at First Shock

Guests Stream From Hotel in Night Clothes and Scenes Following Are Fearful

Perhaps the most realistic story that has come from the scenes of death and desolation at San Francisco is told by Frank L. Ames, a newspaper man who was standing directly in front of the Palace hotel when the first shock of the earthquake came. He describes his experiences in the following statement:

"I had finished a night's work on my

newspaper and had been down to Zinkand's for luncheon, and was strolling by the Palace hotel. Under the port cochere of the Palace was a private carriage, and I vaguely wondered what should be keeping a man rich enough to own a private carriage up at that time of night. Inside the Palace office the lights were bright and inviting. Even as I looked the tall palms in the corner of the hotel lobby began to sway.

"An optical delusion, thought I, until the ground began sinking under my fect. Have you ever been in a swiftly decending elevator? That is the sensation. The ground does not sink so far as the elevator goes, but the earthquake sensation is the elevator sensation. I turned instinctively to the tall

buildings of the Chronicle and Call. "The clock in the Chronicle tower seemed to waver, and the Call's skyscraper, anchored as it was, hundreds of feet in the ground, simply

'Cornices and brick came tumbling around me. The team in the port cochere of the Palace ran, and as the horses passed me I could not help noticing the beasts' eyes were big with terror, and foam was coming from their nostrils. I stepped into an alcove for safety. It seemed as if the very earth was reeling. We have had earthquake shocks before, but not like From every entrance of the Palace guests poured out in their night clothes, but when they saw the devastation before them they returned

#### Safer Inside Buildings

"In this they were wise because most of the people inside saved their lives. ere was the most peculiar It was the people that ran outside that got killed and injured. This was true with few exceptions.

"As I stepped from the alcove the payement simply went in waves under my feet. I ran for the Chronicle building, for the way the bricks were coming from the Palace indicated it was about to fall. The quake ran from east to west and the cobble stones of Market street seemed alive. Everyone of them was moving and the street car rails were twisted from their

#### Pandemonium on Increase "The shocks died away gradually.

There was a low grumbling like the roar of 10,000 lions and then the ground would heave. It was terrifying to look at the ground, but when I looked up I was even worse scared. The tops of the buildings seemed to be nodding good morning to each other.

"Now a pandemonium began. Shrieks of women mingled with the hoarser cries of men. On the various streets hack teams were running away. I do not believe there were more than two or three hack drivers whose teams did not get away from them. "Women stuck their heads from

buildings and screamed that every. body else was killed. The tugs on the bay set up a shrill clamor. I thought the climax had been reached, but within ten minutes the cry of 'Fire, fire' smote my ears.


"Down on the 'Barbary Coast,' as cheap lodging house district is called, lamps were upset by the quake. A strong wind was blowing from the bay. Fire wagons were dashing through the streets, the drivers pulling up every now and then to dodge some debris. Although the shocks were over bricks were tumbling from the roofs at random and it was dangerous to go out on the streets.

### Policeman Crazed

"I met a policeman running for dear life. I stopped him. 'Let me loose,' he cried. 'The end of the world has come and I must report for duty.' He went on incoherently in this manner, and I soon saw he was crazy.

"Electric wires were on the pavements, spitting blue flame and writhing like snakes. I saw a fire team run into one, which tangled about one of the horses' legs. The horse fell and
