SAN FRANCISCO STILL STRUGGLING TO RELIEVE DISTRESS AND FAMINE

SAN FRANCISCO IN DARKNESS

Hospitals Only Buildings Permitted to Use Lights

NONE GO HUNGRY

Relief Committee Taking Heroic Measures to Feed People—Mayor Asks Aid

By Associated Press. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 21.—For the first time in its history San Francisco has had its taste of martial law. When darkness fell upon the desolated city last night every one of the inhabitants of the houses that are left standing groped about their homes in the darkness early in the evening, the survivors of the terrible calamity cooking their suppers on fires built in front of their houses, while the wind fanned many fires into nasty blazes, and for a time it looked as if many new fires would be started; but police orders were issued that all fires must be put out, and with the assistance of the soldiers, the building of fires in front of the houses was summarily suppressed.

City in Absolute Darkness In all homes left standing no lights were allowed to be burned. In places where persons lit their lights contrary to the orders of the police and militia, citizens formed and forced the occupants to extinguish them. There was only one exception, and

and the chief of the army medical staff will be in charge of it. Conditions among the homeless in the park, it is reported by Chairman Cerf, are excellent, but it is feared there will be considerable suffering in the mission district, where the committee has not been able to reach all the people.

Alameda has room for 3,000 and Fresno telegraphed that it wished to provide for 3,000 and asked that this number be sent, for which the Southern Pacific railroad promised to furnish transportation.

R. E. Breder, manager of the Standard Oil Company, says the city of Richmond could take care of 500 and he would transport them today at 10 and 12 o'clock, leaving from the Fulton iron works. It is stated upon authority last night that the Merchants Exchange, the Fairmont Hotel and the Monadnock building will be open for public offices. All these buildings have been carefully examined by expert architects, who pronounced their frame and foundations to be absolutely safe. THE WORK OF VANDALS WORSE THAN MURDERERS

Charge is Made That Intoxicated Soldiers Shot Innocent People Suspected of Robbing the Dead or Wounded

By Associated Press. SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 21.—A. J. Neve, who at the time of the earthquake was manager of a drug store at San Francisco, is in Sacramento. Mr. Neve said: "The work of those vandals, the ghouls—those than murderers—was the thing that added rage to the discouragement and despair. Hundreds of women crowded in to the San Francisco hotel, it being believed that it could withstand the flames. The buildings were burned on all sides of it and then it caught. The women were carried out and the vandals cut off their fingers and put them in their pockets to secure diamond rings. "There was only one consolation, the men caught at this work were shot without question. Many of them were killed. Wherever men were found robbing the dead, they were shot down. In the pocket of one who paid the penalty with his life there were five diamond rings that had been stripped from the fingers of the dead. "The soldiers, worn down and thirsty, broke into the saloons to get water or liquor to brace them up. Many of them got drunk and the result was that they shot many innocent people. That is the simple truth."

LEAVING BAGGAGE

NEW YORK, April 21.—The Western Union Telegraph Company received the following from its office in the Ferry building, San Francisco, early today: "It is still difficult to estimate the dead, as the bodies are scattered all over the city. They are burying them in trenches unidentified and putting fifteen bodies in each ditch. A later dispatch read: "The ferry boats are running on schedule time. There is an immense crowd around the depot here and committees from all towns across the bay are urging the people to leave Frisco and go with them to their homes, but the authorities won't let them take any baggage with them. It looks like an immense second hand store here. People have dragged everything down here, from pianos to bird cages and their goods are all piled up around the depot for a long

ROBBERS SHOT DOWN

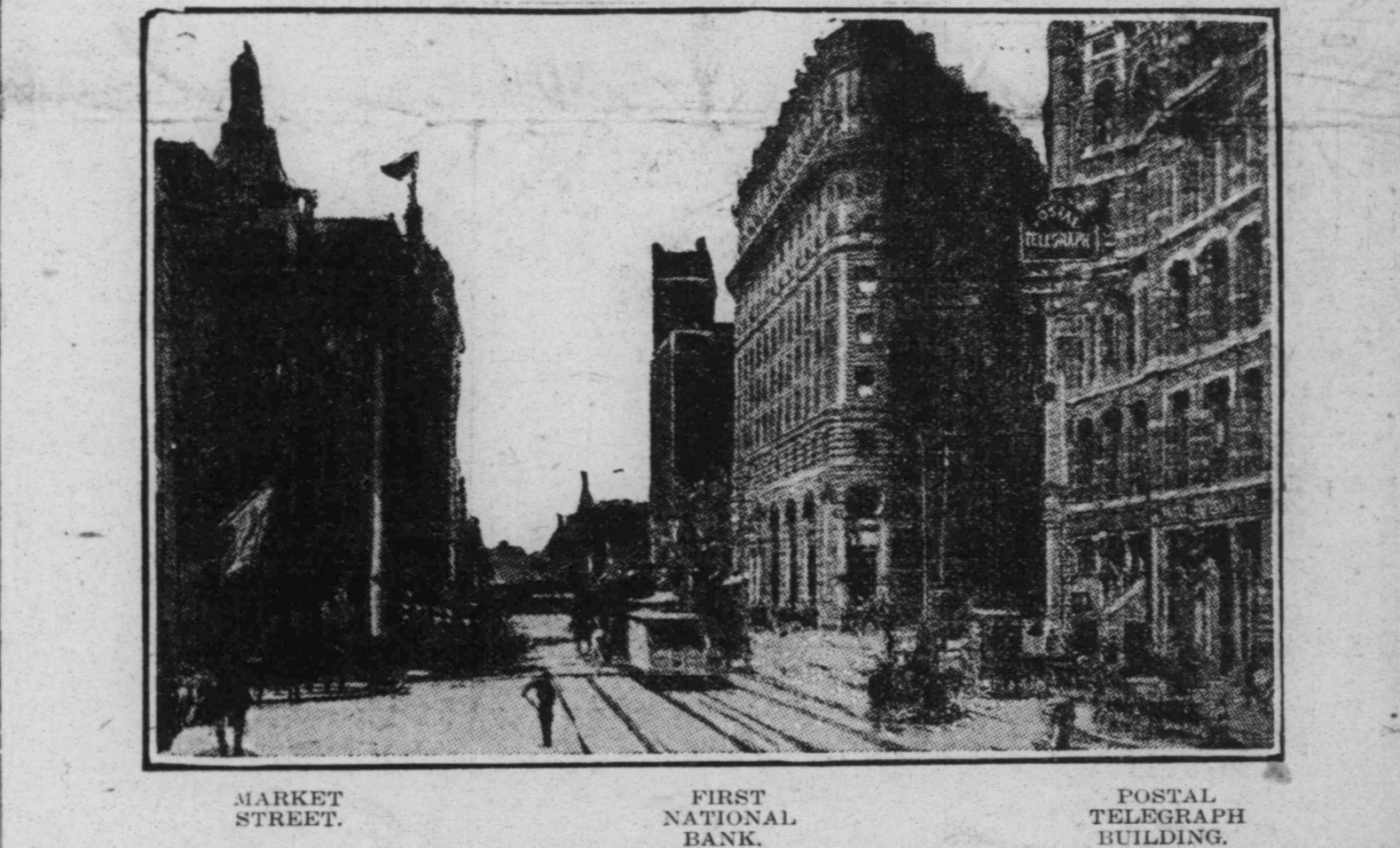
All Messages Delayed

By Associated Press. CLEVELAND, Ohio, April 21.—A shock felt in many parts of the city at noon yesterday and supposed to have been an explosion was a slight earthquake shock, according to the micro seismograph register at St. Ignace College.

Expressions of Sympathy

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, April 20.—Further expressions of condolence and sympathy on account of the great disaster at San Francisco are coming to the President from all parts of the world. Overnight messages were received as follows: The president of Guatemala; the president of Belgium; the president of Cuba; Premier Kirkpatrick of New Zealand; the viceroy of India; the governor of Victoria; president of Switzerland; Emperor Franz Josef; Prince Henry of Prussia; the premier of New South Wales, and Count Witte.

Relief from Denver

By Associated Press. DENVER, April 21.—A relief train of seven cars, loaded with provisions, clothing, etc., was dispatched last night via the Union Pacific. The train will be given the right of way and should arrive in Oakland on Monday. Another relief train will leave tonight. Contributions are being collected in all the towns of Colorado and forwarded direct.

Town of Tomales Ruined

By Associated Press. OAKLAND, Cal., April 21.—A dispatch from San Rafael says the town of Tomales is a pile of ruins. All the large stores are fine. The Catholic church, a new structure of stone, is also ruined. Many ranch houses and barns are down. Two children, Anita and Peter Couzza, were killed in a falling house.

Thousands Leaving Frisco

By Associated Press. SAN FRANCISCO, April 21.—Twenty-five thousand persons left devastated San Francisco today and as many as could be carried by the ferries, and probably twice as many more are tonight seeking to depart.

Daughters Vote \$1,000

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, April 21.—At today's session of the congress of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Mrs. I. H. Evans of Texas was elected vice president general. The congress voted \$1,000 for the relief of San Francisco.

Dispatch from Funston

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, D. C., April 21.—The following dispatch from General Funston regarding conditions at San Francisco came to the war department at 5:40 o'clock this morning, having been sent from the naval training station: "The fire is making no progress to the west from Van Ness avenue. A west wind of considerable force is now blowing. Indications now are that all of the city south of Van Ness avenue and north of the bay will be destroyed. "Some considerable apprehension is felt as to the post at Fort Mason, but it is believed we can save it. Weather continues fine and warm. There is practically no suffering from the cold. It will be impossible to at once establish the proper sanitary conditions. Much sickness must necessarily be expected. "Of the city to the west that now remains standing intact, there are many good buildings that can be used as hospitals. The water supply is encouraging. The Spring Valley water people believe they can deliver from 10,000,000 to 12,000,000 gallons daily. This, with the other sources not mentioned, will prevent a water famine. "General Bell, chief of staff of the army, to whom the dispatch was addressed, said he thought the words of General Funston, "South of Van Ness avenue," should read, "East of Van Ness avenue," as the thoroughfare runs north and south.

Frisco Will Rise Again

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, April 21.—In spite of the staggering property losses involved in the destruction of San Francisco by the earthquake, New Yorkers who have large interests at stake in that city and Californians living here say without hesitation: "San Francisco will be rebuilt as shortly as may be possible; that city will rise from its ashes on grander lines than those of its past; that it will be a safer and a healthier city."

TO OUST THOSE MIS-MANAGING

British Policy Holders of Mutual Pass Resolutions

By Associated Press. LONDON, April 21.—A meeting of the British policyholders of the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York yesterday adopted the following resolutions: First—To use all means to procure the elimination from the board of trustees of all those who are responsible either by participation or neglect of duty in the irregularities and extravagances, and also of any of those representing or influenced by outside financial interests. Second—To see that the control of the surplus funds and assets be genuinely in the hands of the policy holders. Third—To safeguard the interests of the British policy holders and then, if these efforts are unsuccessful to further the formation in the United Kingdom of a separate company of policy holders, and that a committee be appointed to secure the united support of the policy holders throughout the kingdom. A resolution of confidence in D. C. Halderman, the former manager of the Mutual Life Insurance Company here, was also passed.

One Man Shot

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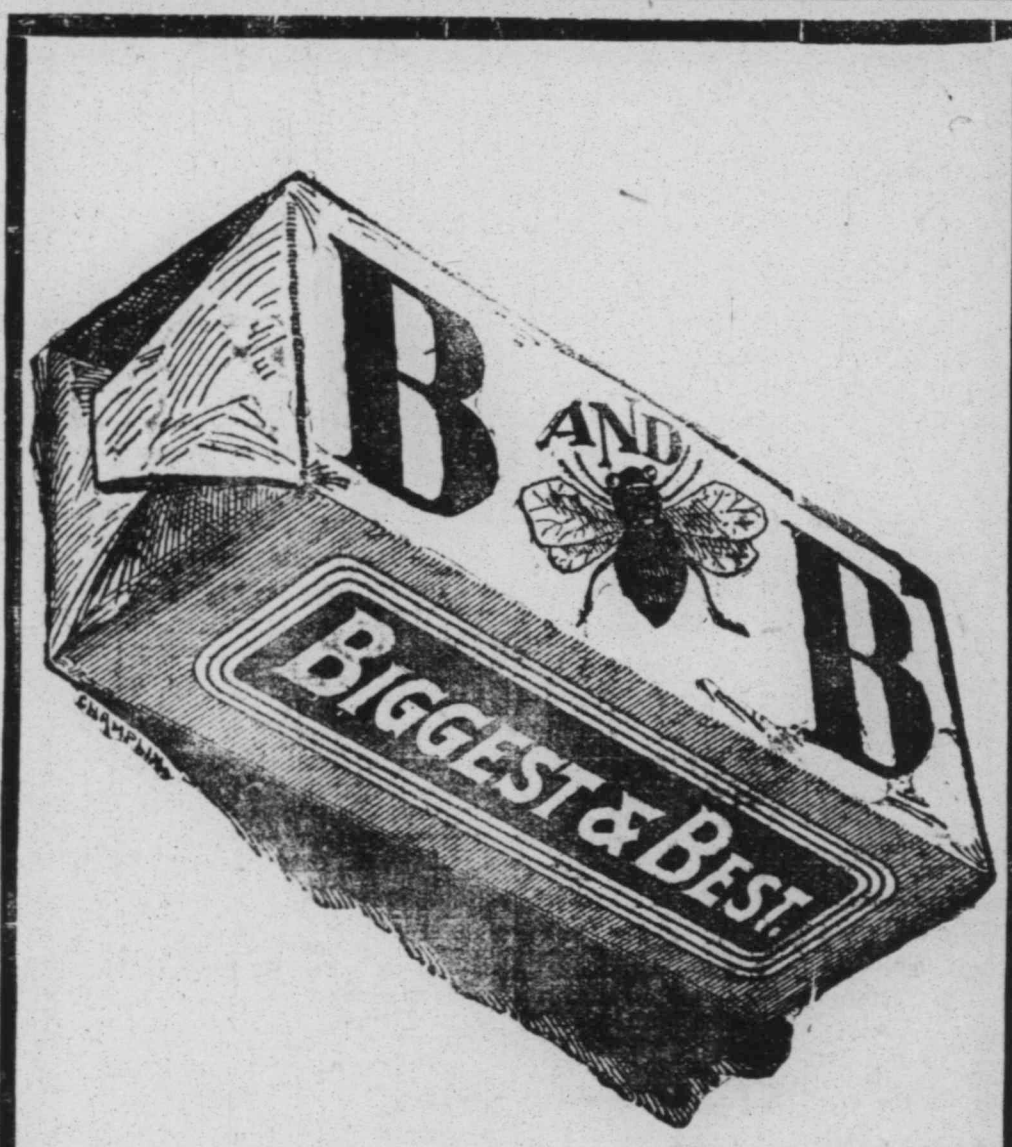

It's true that law as it now appears on the statute books has, perhaps, a few objectionable features, chief among them being that it is so cumbersome, but we do not agree with The Telegram when it says that the major portion of the law should be repealed or amended, nor do we believe with our contemporary that the people—a large majority of them—are getting sick and tired of that law, as framed by the venerable statesman at Austin, and passed by the Texas legislature. To the contrary, we believe that in the main the law is exactly what Texas needs just at this particular time, and furthermore we believe that during the short time in which the aforesaid law has been in operation, it has done more to purify the ballot than has ever been done in this or any other state by any law ever passed by any legislature. The foregoing being true, as we see it, we do not believe, as The Telegram predicts, that the next legislature will virtually repeal the law in operation, but on the other hand, we both believe and trust that the law will continue on the statute books, being amended and strengthened from time to time. And if such proves to be true, the Terrell election law will, as the years come and go, uplift and purify the body politic, and become an enduring monument to the memory of him whose wisdom and patriotism made it possible for Texas to have such a wise and far reaching law upon her statute books.—Bonham News.

There are many salient and valuable features about the Terrell election law, as well as others that are not so commendable. The Telegram has consistently opposed features of this law since it was first proposed by its venerable and respected author, and The Telegram is not yet prepared to concede that the fact Judge Terrell is its author is sufficient to remove or obliterate the many serious objections that have been raised against it.

One of the greatest objections to the Terrell election law is the control it has taken of the democratic party and the individuals who compose the democratic party. One of the fundamental principles of democracy is that law is the best law which governs least, and when democracy is smothered down to a fine point it is found that it simply means the right of the people to rule. Here we have a measure passed by the representatives of the people which arrogates to itself the right to rule in the most harsh and tyrannical manner. It destroys the rights of the people it was intended it should serve, and as the Waco Times-Herald so aptly expresses it "pokes its nose" into affairs it should let severely alone.

Another great objection to the Terrell election law is the rigid censorship that it establishes and maintains over the state press. A free and unfettered press is the greatest bulwark of the people, and every law that is passed fettering the press is but binding additional shackles upon the people. The Texas press has heretofore had just about all the burden it could carry in the existing unfair and unjust laws, but the distinguished author of the Terrell law has exceeded the liberal law by about 1,000 per cent. He has had the state of Texas say what the editor of a newspaper shall put in his columns and what he shall not put in his columns. He has gone further than that by having the state of Texas regulate and control the price that shall be charged for certain kind of matter that the editor is permitted to put in his columns. The Telegram has contended against this outrage upon a free press and a free people since it was first suggested, and it expects to continue offering its protest until this great wrong is righted.

Another paramount objection to the Terrell election law is its great ponderosity and extreme verbosity. There is not one average voter out of ten in all Texas that can and does understand its provisions. And while The Telegram believes it is the duty of the lawmakers of this state to place all proper and necessary restrictions and safeguards about the exercise of suffrage, it does not believe it is proper to clutter the statute books of this state with a superfluity of verbiage that can be remedied by the proper simplification. And if the Terrell Turkish election law was pruned of its unnecessary ponderosity and brain-fagging verbosity, at least four-fifths of that measure would be repealed.

The Terrell law is far reaching in its effects. Stretched from end to end it would reach from El Paso to Texarkana. There is no necessity for amending the law, for it now covers all Texas like the dew and any additions would necessarily be an intrusion upon Mexico.

A LARGE SIZED CONTRACT Colquitt may be the "friend of Houston," as is claimed by the campaign clubs being organized in the Bayou City, but, according to advices from Kansas county, he is not regarded as a very warm friend of local option.—Fort Worth Telegram.

Advices from Nueces county say that Senator Wilkey, champion of the brewery idea, finds General Bell "sound to the core." Here at home J. B. Cranfill, leader of the state prohibitionists, insists that General Bell is as loyal as he was in the warm days of 1887. Gun shoe! Well, don't mention gun in the hearing of Editor Robinson of the Times-Herald.—Dallas Times-Herald.

Editor Robinson is endeavoring, to small purpose, he fears, to get Editor Fitzgerald to "tote fair." Defined, the "gun shoe" man is one who adjusts himself to the prevailing views of each locality he visits. Senator Stone of Missouri is a past master in "gun shoe" methods; of him it has been said that he not only sucks the eggs but hides 'em shells.

On the prohibition question, if we understand aright, Judge Brooks, General Bell and Colonel Campbell occupy identical ground. Each votes "dry" every chance he gets, but neither favors submitting the question of constitutional prohibition. It is quite probable that each has "anti" supporters as well as "pro" supporters. The other two candidates for governor, Messrs. Colquitt and Moore, vote "wet" every time. But more than likely each has "anti" supporters and "pro" supporters, for the reason that prohibition is not the paramount issue in this campaign.

Now the "tote fair" doctrine will not permit us to single out one of these men as a horrible example of "gun shoe" methods, letting the other four go free. But Editor Fitzgerald has set himself the task of defeating the Fort Worth man, and he is giving his imagination full play. Where General Bell is under consideration, "Fitz" just won't, "tote fair."—Waco Times-Herald.

The Telegram seems to have innocently been the cause of dispute between the Dallas and Waco newspapers, and it hastens to the front with a small vial of oil to pour upon the troubled waters. With the Trinity and Brazos both bank full the prospects are good for an inundation.

It is a well known fact that friends of Judge Brooks, who is wearing the belt of the prohibition candidate for governor of Texas, are making a determined effort to relieve Candidate Colquitt of the responsibility of carrying his home county for governor. It is a well known fact that Candidate Colquitt is not in line with the local option sentiment existing in Kaufman county, and that fact was sufficient to prevent him from carrying the county both as a candidate for the state senate and for railroad commissioner. If he has failed to carry his home county twice already on this account, it looks reasonable to suppose he is going to have some trouble in his present aspirations, especially when the local option fires are burning so brightly in Kaufman county, and the enemy has already organized to encompass his defeat.

Judge Bell is taking no stock in these side issues and will not be drawn into something that is foreign to the campaign. While friends of Brooks and Colquitt may rake the prohibition coals until they fairly glow, the next governor of Texas is making a dignified and convincing campaign that is bringing to his support loyal and conservative democrats from one end of the state to the other. And parenthetically it may be remarked if the distinguished Colt presiding at the helm of the Dallas Times-Herald has undertaken to encompass his defeat he has the biggest contract of his life on hand, and will realize in the end that he has been up against something that was loaded.

But Editor Fitzgerald will "tote fair." He is only sparring for time in which to get his second wind.

Congress has appropriated one million dollars for the relief of the people of California, and all over the United States the people are coming to the front with large donations. Truly, there is not so great a people anywhere else on earth as those we have in these United States, and great public calamities always bring the greatness of Americans conspicuously to the front.

The people of Texas should not forget a state legislature is to be elected this year. And the experience of the past has been sufficient to demonstrate the necessity for choosing men who are able to measure fully up to the requirements of the occasion.

The insurance companies taking advantage of the "act of God" clause in their policies and refusing to pay for California homes destroyed in the recent terrible catastrophe should be suitably remembered in the future by people who want fire insurance.

Judge Charles K. Bell told the cattlemen at Amarillo the other day how he rode the trail behind the festive Texas steer back in his boyhood and young manhood days, and they saw and understood. They knew at once why they were all Bell people.

While other cities are wondering how it is done, Fort Worth is going steadily ahead in the matter of building more sidewalks. That is a way Fort Worth always had, and it largely accounts for the fact that we had all other Texas cities.

Fort Worth will respond to the appeal for the stricken district of California in the proper manner. The great heart of Fort Worth has never yet failed to go out in a proper and substantial manner to the suffering and distressed.

At the first public meeting held to aid stricken California nearly \$1,000 was raised in a few minutes. But that is only a starter. Out of her kindness and abundance Fort Worth will give liberally.

Now that excitement is dying down with regard to the great California catastrophe, we will probably begin to get a few of the real facts.

Mr. Scott is now superintendent of the Southern Pacific pier at Oakland, Cal., and his family reside at Berkeley. The message came over the railroad wires from Oakland.

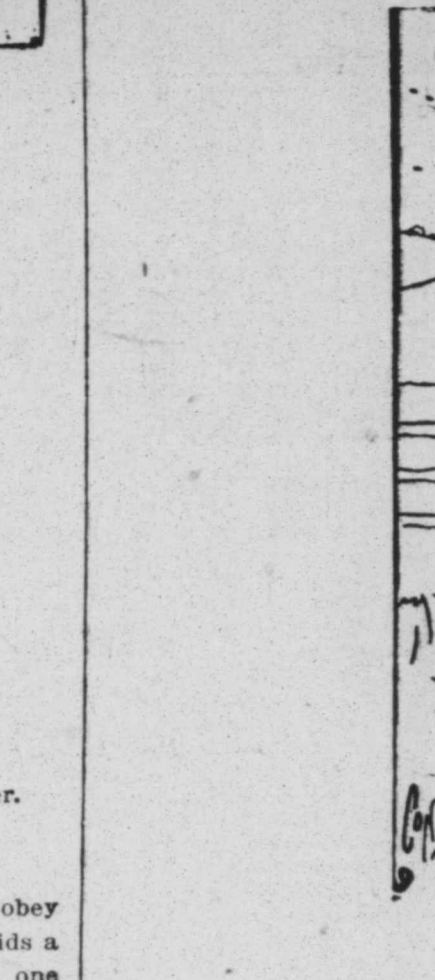
