BOATS ARRIVE FOR LAKE COMO

Work Begun on Car Bars at Arlington Heights

Twenty row boats and two naphtha launches have been received for Lake Como and will be placed in service Sunday afternoon.

POLICE TO SHOOT

Second Pistol Contest to Be Held by Fort Worth Officers

Second pistol shoot to be held by members of the city police department will take place Saturday near Arlington Heights. Targets will be placed at distances of forty to sixty feet. The shoot will commence at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and it is expected that ten members will attend.
It is stated at the police headquarters that a number of shoots will be held during the summer. There are several expert shots among the force and good records are looked for.

DALLAS, TEXAS, MAY 11—The contest between Fort Worth and Houston for the next annual convention of the grand council of Texas, United Commercial Travelers of America, is the principal topic of interest in connection with the annual meeting of that body, in attendance at which there were upward of 100 delegates and a large number of visitors when the session was called to order today.

Addresses of welcome were made by Mayor Curtis P. Smith for the city of Dallas and by J. T. Trezevant for the Commercial Club of the city to which responses were made by A. H. Andrews of Dallas and Grand Counselor J. M. Alardyce of San Antonio. The annual reports of the officers are now in consideration by the session in executive meeting.
The contest between Fort Worth and Houston is a warm one, as both cities are supported by ardent advocates, about evenly divided.

BLOODY CHARGE MAY 12, 1863

Major Van Zandt Led Desperate Attack

Saturday, May 12, is the forty-third anniversary of the battle at Raymond, Miss., in which Major K. M. Van Zandt of this city, now commander of Texas division, U. C. V., led a desperate charge with 306 men, in which but 158 remained uninjured.
This terrible charge is still fresh in the mind of Major Van Zandt's soldiers and is recalled each year by the survivors still living. The attack resulted in the capture of the captain of company G, Indiana infantry, by Major Van Zandt and his command.
Following the capture an attack was made on Major Van Zandt, who, however, was warned in time and his assailant caught and placed under guard.
About five or six years ago Major Van Zandt noticed in reading proceedings of the Missouri legislature, the same name as that of the Federal captain at Raymond, Miss. Major Van Zandt at once wrote to the Missouri legislator, asking him if he had been captured on May 12, '63. Sooner than expected the reply came:
"Yes, I was captured at Raymond, Miss., on May 12, 1863. I was captain of company G, Indiana infantry. I am glad to hear from you and hope you are prospering and that before this you have been reconciled to the old flag."
Last year Major Van Zandt was presented an unique Inland writing stand by General J. T. Jarrard of Huntsville, Texas, composed of over 2,000 pieces of wood picked up from the Raymond battle ground.
The writing stand is inlaid with three silver plates, which bear the following inscriptions:
"Major K. M. Van Zandt, Seventh Texas infantry, C. S. A., from the battlefield of Raymond, Miss."
"1863, May 12, 306—158—148—Remained."
"1905, July 20, 42 years. A few remain."

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KEEPS PROMISE TO MURDER WIFE

Austrian Fulfills Pledge When Wife Is Insane

PREPARED FOR BURIAL

Husband Then Walks Into Newport News Police Station and Calmly Tells Story of Killing

Special to The Telegram.
NEWPORT NEWS, Va., May 11—Julian Pavline, who lived with his wife just outside the city limits, strolled into the police station here and calmly informed the sergeant that he had killed his wife early this morning. The man, who is a native of Austria, then told a remarkable story. He said:

"About two years ago my wife began to show signs of insanity. She became so violent that finally she was tried and sent to the Williamsburg asylum. She stayed there about a year and was discharged. When my wife came out of the asylum, she made me promise her that if she ever got so that she would have to be sent back that I would kill her. I promised her I would do so, and several times since then she has reminded me of that promise, and I always told her she need not fear.

Tried to Choke Him
"Some time ago she began to get violent and attacked me, and during the night she again tried to choke me. After a while she got calm, and then again she reminded me of my promise. I told her all right, and finally she went to sleep.
"About 4 o'clock this morning I found she was asleep, and I got out of bed. Going to the bureau, I took out the pistol. I cannot recall the bed where she was sleeping and fired.
"I think I shot her first in the head. Then I shot her six times more, but I don't know where the bullets struck. Then I sat down in a chair and waited for her to die. It was about ten minutes before I thought she was dead. When I thought she was dead I took her and washed away all the blood and gave her a bath. Then I got out fresh linens and put a fresh dress on her for her to be buried in."

Wanted to Shoot Himself
Pavline says he would have shot himself, as he now has nothing to live for, but wanted to be sure that his wife was dead and that he had carried out his part of the grim compact with her.
He was turned over to the Elizabeth City county authorities.

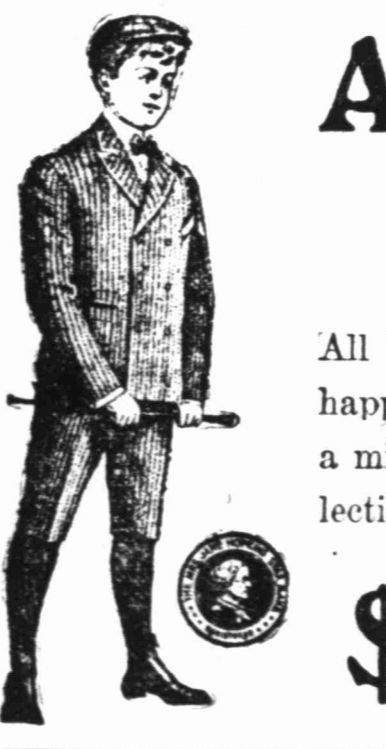

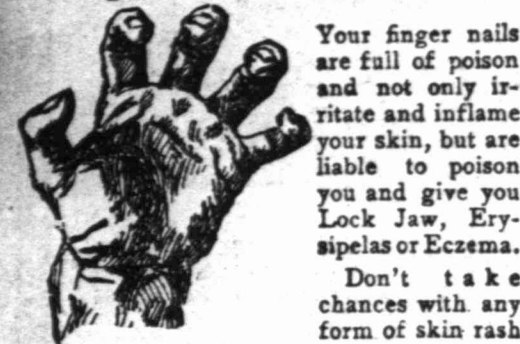
