Frederick Cromwell, who was then treasurer of the company, said that a number of books were missing. When the Truesdale committee made its investigation it was announced that the commission could not get at the bottom of the workings of the purchase and supply department because of these missing books. The committee in its report said that many important books, papers and accounts covering transactions prior to September, 1905, were missing and although every possible effort had been made, no trace could be obtained of what disposition had been made of them.







#### Turkish Minister Informed That Great Britain Means Business

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 11.-Tewfik Pasha, foreign minister, called at the British embassy yesterday and made proposals with regard to the Tabah question that Ambassador O'Connor unhesitatingly rejected. Pasha was informed that any form of compromise suggested was quite inadmissible and nothing less than absolute compliance with the British demands would prevent drastic action. The anibassador also warned the min ster that the time is running short and counseled him to be under no misapprehension regard to the determination of Great Britain to enforce Turkish evacuation of Egyptian territory on the Sinai peninsular and joint delimitation of the frontier.

Expires-No Free Meals

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, Ill., May 11 .- The railroads ceased granting free transportation to San Francisco refugees yesterday, the privilege expiring by limiation last night. All refugees hereafter will be dealt with individually by the Chicago Relief and Aid Society. Since the earthquake the refugee mmittee of the Chicago Commercial Association has cared for 2,151 persons from San Francisco. A majority of these have been provided with lothing, meals and transportation to other points.

The giving of free meals at the railvay stations also ended last night. Hereafter each individual case will be investigated.







#### Grand Jury Summons Whole Massachusetts Assembly

BOSTON, May 11 .-- The determination of District Attorney John B. Meran to have all of the 280 members of the Massachusetts legislature appear before the Suffolk county grand jury in connection with an investigation of alleged bribery at the state house resulted in the examination of seven members of the house of representatives yesterday. Earlier in the day, several of the seventy-five members of the house upon whom summons have been served reported at the state house. A delay in the grand jury proceedings and the interruption of executive sessions at one time threatened to cause a serious clash of jurisdiction between the house of representatives and the grand jury. The difficulty was disposed of by an agreement between Speaker Cele and Mr. Moran to have the members go to the court house ten at a time.



#### CHARACTERIZED AS OUTRAGE

The state of Texas has brought suit against the Fort Worth Live Stock exchange and all its members, the Fort Worth Stock Yards company, Armour & Co., and Swift & Co. It is sought by the state to forfeit their charters and permits to do business in Texas and the penalties sued for aggregate to \$160,000 in each case. The plaintiff's petition alleges that the above named companies fix and maintain the price and charge of selling and buying live stock so as to prevent free competition. The way that it has been carried on is an cutrage and should have been stopped some time ago. We as a nation claim to be free when we are as far from it almost as the east is from the west. When a r an ships a car of live stock to market he first has to pay an enormous price for standing room for his stock in the stock yards. He next is compelled to pay somebody to sell them for him when he could if it were not for trusts and combines sell them and get just as much as any commission company. In other words, if we understand it rightly, he pays the commission company \$12 a car to receive a check from the buyer and write him another less all expenses. Now if the stockmen of Texas have not enough sense to receive a check direct from the buyer instead of paying some one else to write them another check, they had better quit raising only enough stock to supply the demand of their immediate neighborhood.

The corporations sued say it was begun by Attorney General Davidson for political effect, but we don't know about that. But we do know that if these suits are won and this robbery ended that it will have a great political effect. We only hope they will succeed in winning the rights sued for .- Brady Enterprise.

The remarks of the Brady paper represent both an extreme view and an ignorance of actual conditions. Experience extending over a period of many years has amply demonstrated that stock yards companies and live stock exchanges are necessary adjuncts of every live stock market, and they are maintained at every market. Without these institutions here shippers to the Fort Worth market would enjoy a chaotic condition that would elicit many more expressions of disapproval from even the Brady Enterprise than the situation that is now complained of. The Brady paper has fallen into the too common error of condemning without understanding both sides of the controversy, and its utterances are both unjust and untimely.

THURSDAY IN CONGRESS

The senate completed the consideration of the second section of the railroad rate bill and just before adjournment listened to the reading of sections 3 and 4 without considering any amendments offered to them.

A number of very important changes were made in the second section, including a provision restoring the imprisonment penalty of the act of 1887 and an amendment suggested by Senator McCumber imposing a penalty of fine and imprisonment against shippers who secure rebates from transportation companies. The latter amendment was incorporated for the avowed purpose of hitting the trusts.

Another amendment adopted was offered by Senator Warren. It gives the government business a preference over all other traffic in time of war. A long series of changes were also made at the instance of the interstate commerce commission. Many of these were verbal and all were intended to improve the administrative features of the law.

House-Consideration of naval bill was continued through the day.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 11 .- The statehood conferees met yesterday and adjourned, in accordance with the agreement that no effort will be made to dispose of that measure until after the rate bill shall be out of the way. The likelihood is that the rate bill will be voted on in the senate Saturday.



After a little pleasant talk the attorney general remarked that he apposed we came to discuss the suits hat had been filed, and called in two of his assistants, Mr. Lightfoot and Mr. Botts. Ike Pryor, one of our party, stated to the attorney general hat I was the representative of all the sarties sued and would do the talking. "In my talk to the attorney general said that under the conditions surounding the suits against the Exshange, packers and commission firms considered that an appeal for clemency would be within the bounds of propriety: that the defendants in the suits did not realize that they were riolating the law, but were endeavoring o promote the integrity of the Fort Worth Live Stock market.

The witness then started into the compromise propositions, but was inerrupted by the court, who said that hat matter was irrelevant and would not be admitted. Witness continued und said:

"A statement in the Record this norning makes it doubtful what my purpose was in endeavoring to recover he papers of the Live Stock Exchange, the inference from it being that I was acting in the interest of Swift and Armour, the packers. I want to say ight here that neither Swift nor Armour are members of the Live Stock Exchange and never were. I can furnish affidavits and men in proof of that statement. My efforts to get the books was in the interest of my people and in order that great industries might be kept in Texas.

"Returning to the conference: The attorney general left the room, taking with him from the room all of my party, leaving Mr. Lightfoot, Mr. Ball and myself to discuss the suits.


"I told the two gentlemen that I was not authorized to propose any compromise for Swift or Armour for one cent; that I felt I was acting for my people. Then Mr. Lightfoot said, Eliminate Swift and Armour from the proposition.' I importuned Mr. Light foot to make further investigation. had been informed that hte Live Stock Exchange had offered Swift and Armour a number of memberships, and suggested to Mr. Lightfoot that he seeing that in the minutes of the exchange might assume that they had been accepted, but it can be shown they were never accepted.
