Professionals Even Up and Prices for List Take Turn—Close Heavy

Special to the Telegram. NEW YORK, June 9.—Professional dealings, which have been the stock market's principal asset during the last week, culminated today in a general greening up of accounts over the holiday. Most of the liquidation was from longs and prices dropped as a consequence. The day's news was indifferent and the market opened quiet with prices generally below parity. Liquidation started immediately after the call and fluctuations trended gradually downward during the first hour, the decline being accelerated in the final dealings by an unfavorable bank statement. Reading, Anaconda, Colorado Fuel and Iron and Union Pacific sustained the greatest loss, dropping 2 1/2, 2 1/4, 1 1/2 and 1 point respectively. Others showed fractional losses of various proportions. The close was heavy. Total sales, 306,200 shares.

CHICAGO GRAIN

Kansas Wheat Crop Deteriorates 19 Per Cent Since April—Market Booms on News

Special to the Telegram. CHICAGO, June 9.—Wheat prices rose 1/2 during the final hour of trading today, the advance being occasioned by King's report of Kansas crop conditions, which was very bullish, showing a deterioration of 19 per cent since last April, and 7 per cent as compared with one year ago, the condition being 70 per cent against 89 in April and 77 last June. The market opened easy with prices 1/4 below yesterday's final. Trading during the first hour was principally covering-up of long contracts, which caused a slump of 1/4 from the opening figures. Prices were around this level when the Kansas report was received and July in the next few minutes sold at \$2, while September touched 84 1/2. The sharp advance caused a renewal of liquidation and a recession occurred, the market ending steady with prices at a net gain of 1/4 3/4.

NINTH STREET TO BE PAVED

Completion of Work Soon Appears Assured

WORK ALREADY BEGUN

Proposed Improvement Will Extend From Rusk Street to the City Hall

There is a strong probability now that the paving of Ninth street, from Rusk to the city hall, will be one of the next paving jobs undertaken. This morning George Stillman of the Metropolitan hotel announced a willingness to pave in front of the Stillman property, the Owl saloon, 100 feet on the south side of the street, beginning at Main street and running back towards Rusk. L. H. Halstead of California, who owns the other 100 feet of frontage on that street, has said that he would not stand in the way of any improvement of that kind, which may be inferred as a willingness to pave his part of the street if the others do. Ninth is one of the narrow streets, forty feet, from curb to curb, and as the street car company paves between its rails and for two feet on each side of the rails, it takes off a pretty good slice from the total width to be paved.

Other Owners Willing
It is the general understanding that all of the other street owners have expressed the intention of paving when the street car company laid its tracks, and that the city will lay a good brick pavement from Rusk street to the city hall.

As told exclusively in Thursday's Telegram, the city is already having pavement laid on the north side of Ninth street, between Main and Rusk. It is understood that the city will arrange for the pavement of the short stretch of street between Ninth and Houston, and the pavement fronting the Carnegie library and Hyde Park, and is one of the most used thoroughfares in the downtown district, being the center of the city, being a short cut from Main and Houston streets to the postoffice and the Jennings avenue viaduct, but also being the largest number of persons who drive over it to the Carnegie library.

HOME FROM MANILA

U. S. Vincent Visiting His Parents Here

U. S. Vincent has just returned to this city from the Philippines, where he has been employed in Manila in the government service as clerk in the office of the governor general. Speaking of the growth of Manila within the last few years, Mr. Vincent says: "There is a great future in store for the city of Manila. Today Manila is the central shipping point for all of the Philippine islands, the principal exports being hemp, sugar, coffee and tobacco."

Mr. Vincent stated that an invention by an American has largely revolutionized the hemp industry in the Philippines. Up to recent years the stripping of hemp was done entirely by hand, which made a slow process, but this American, Lindsey, replaced the old way by the new machine, which strips the hemp and has done much toward increasing the volume of this commodity for export markets. Manila hemp is divided into two grades. The first is used for sail cloths and cordage and the second made up into fabrics, which are still finer and softer than those made from the best Russian hemp.

Another important crop is coconuts, one of the chief products of the coconuts, and a considerable quantity is exported annually, principally to the countries of France and Germany, where fine soaps and a few other toilet articles are made from it.

Many Americans are found in the Philippines today and the number of Americans in business is growing annually.

Mr. Vincent states that he will leave later in the summer for Washington, D. C., where he will continue in the government service. William Vincent, Mr. Vincent's father, lives at Station 6 on the interurban.

HOT NIGHT ADDS TO DISCOMFORT

Minimum Temperature Does Not Fall Below 74

Although the maximum temperature in Fort Worth Friday was but 91, the minimum for the night was 74, so that but little respite was had from the heat. The wind registered ten miles in the morning, but reached fifteen in the afternoon. Phoenix maintained its reputation as a hot place with a temperature of 102.

The low barometer area over the upper valleys the past two days is now over the Great Lakes, much spent in energy get causing rain in Minnesota and high winds, Buffalo reporting fifty-two miles. Thunderstorms have occurred during the past twenty-four hours in the Ohio valley, New York state, District of Columbia, Arkansas and Georgia. Rain fell this morning at Fort Smith, Texas is generally clear without precipitation.

Weather Along Denver
