**MURDER CHARGED**  
Accused of Killing Condit Family at  
Edna Year Ago

HOUSTON, Texas, June 23.—Upon receipt of Captain McDonald of the morning arrested and jailed on the state ranger, Felix Powell was this morning arrested and jailed on the charge of murder of Mrs. Condit and four children at Edna a year ago. August Diggs was also arrested, charged with murder. Monk Gibson, a negro boy originally charged with the crime, is now in jail at San Antonio awaiting a second trial, the first having resulted in a hung jury. The murder was one of the most atrocious in the annals of the state.

**ANARCHISTS SEEK  
LIFE OF ALPHONSO**

**King and Queen Intercepted  
While Taking Trip**

MADRID, June 23.—In La Granja, forty miles northeast of here, today a man was arrested for attempting to intercept the royal automobile in which King Alfonso and Queen Victoria were traveling. When the man was arrested and jailed, his name was Jose Maria, saying that he was from Madrid. On his person was found a bundle of suspicious documents and a considerable sum of money.

**All Strangers Watched**

As the royal couple are spending their honeymoon in La Granja, or St. Ildelonso, as it is known officially, the authorities have adopted extreme vigilance to protect that a number of dangerous anarchists are on their way to Spain, including a rigid inspection established on the frontier. Nevertheless, the king and queen are frequently seen leaving the palace to take walks in the park. In spite of their seeming unconcern, however, the government has instituted a close watch for all strangers and every visitor to the neighborhood is subjected to the most severe scrutiny.

**BAIL FORBIDDEN  
ABNER AND SMITH**

**Alleged Murderer of Dr. Cox  
Awaits Trial in Jail**

JACKSON, Ky., June 23.—The case of John Abner and John Smith, charged with the murder of Dr. B. D. Cox, was called in the county court this afternoon. By agreement of all parties, the testimony introduced in the trial of James Hargis, charged with the same offense, was used as the sole evidence in this trial. The commonwealth practically rested its case on the testimony of Asbury Spicer, an alleged accomplice. The defendants declined to testify. They seemed to rely for bonds on the fact that bond had been granted by a circuit judge to an alleged accomplice, but as Judge Taubee seemed to have a different view of this case, he announced that he believed the defendants were guilty and that they were not entitled to bail.

**CHINESE TO MAKE  
BOYS DIPLOMATS**

**Celestials Start Reform to Re-  
move Pigtails**

SHANGHAI, June 23.—China is to open a school of diplomacy. This is a move far ahead of western ideas and must be ascribed to Japan initiative. The Chinese, however, are already the most skillful diplomats in the world, as the powers know to their cost. The school is to be inaugurated in connection with the Berlin foreign office, which will supply professors.  
**Students Trained Three Years.**  
The students to be selected from among the most promising scholars of the high schools, who on graduation will be paid a salary and given appointments in the diplomatic service. The course of training will be three years. As the reorganization of the Chinese army involved abolition of six robes and pig tails, it is likely that the new departure in Chinese diplomacy will remove the picturesquely robed Chinese delegate from foreign capitals, replacing him by a silk hatted and frock coated celestial.

**PROBE LYNCHING AFFAIR**

**Government Agents Seek Light on

**SHARP WORDS PASS  
IN COUNCIL DEBATE**

**Controversy Over Street Sprinkling Results in Defeat of Mayor's  
Suggestion to Advertise Bids After Acrimonious  
Debate at Special Session—Market House  
Project Completely Knocked Out**

One of the sessions of the Fort Worth city council that have lately become characteristic, was held Saturday night and again the street sprinkling question was the excuse for an extended and, at times, acrimonious debate, or, as one of the aldermen termed it, a wrangle.

The mayor was accused of a lack of consistency in a manner that he so resented that he called the offending aldermen to order and told him, Wagonman of the Second ward, that he could only proceed in order and that he must not abuse a question of personal privilege by using insulting terms to the mayor or other aldermen.

There was a display of feeling between Aldermen Lehane and Maddox that led to a demonstration, so threatening that City Marshal Maddox intervened when the alderman from the Sixth ward moved from his desk toward the Fourth ward alderman who advanced to meet him.

**Sprinkling Debate**

The question: Shall the city advertise for bids for the sale of the sprinkling wagons and advertise for bids for the street sprinkling? was the excuse for the debate, which was latiduous.

Mayor Harris tried several times to stop the discussion, but the feeling was too deep and the overflowing utterances would not until, at last, the mayor himself was so put on the defensive that he made an explanation of a statement which was attributed to him but which he said was garbled.

Alderman Zurn was bitterly sarcastic at the expense of the aldermen from the Third, Fifth, Sixth and Ninth wards for their "courtesy to him," reciprocal of an act of kindly courtesy by him to Alderman Maddox and was not at all tender of the mayor's feelings either.

Alderman Lehane insisted that the mayor was not perfectly candid in some of his statements about the proceedings leading up to the "bolt" of the four aldermen last Monday evening, and the mayor said that the alderman did not see the impropriety of one, having the casting vote, prejudging a question that his vote might decide, in advance of the argument and the presentation of the question for action.

Alderman Cook thought all of the "recalcitrants" should be subjected to the discipline of the city league and that the people of the city were getting tired of certain aldermen coming to the council and opposing everything that the mayor advocated.

Alderman Wagonman insisted that the mayor was inconsistent and, so it would not, until everyone had his say, and several of them several says, that a vote was taken on the question and five of the aldermen voted against involving bids for the sale of the sprinkling wagons and that incident was closed.

**Market House Killed.**

There was another ripple when the veto of the market house ordinance was called up and the proposition killed. Alderman Wagonman served notice on the aldermen from the wards who had opposed the proposition that there would be a time when they would come before the council asking for something for their wards. He wished to understand that when they did they would find the Second ward squarely opposed to all they wanted unless it was for the general welfare of all of the wards.

**Denver Request Granted.**

The petition of the Fort Worth & Denver Terminal Company was granted as far as the school board recommendation of the city engineer, city closing of streets, etc., was referred to two committees and several of the city officials with power to act. There will be no question that that the matter will go through as the petition asks, modified as it was by the school trustees.

Another question that threatened a wrangle was the matter of filing the opinion of the city attorney that the minority of the city council had no authority to pass a resolution ordering the payment of the award of the jury of condemnation in the William Langer matter of \$500. As the first judgment was for \$5,000, the city was congratulated on the victory, substantially gained by the later award.

**Park Offer Withdrawn.**

The offer for the vacant part of Hyde park, \$20,000, was withdrawn, it being stated that after careful examination by two eminent attorneys the conclusion was reached that the city could not give a merchantable title.

The city attorney was ordered to draw up the proper deeds to effect the Langer transfer.

"What because of the check for \$500" asked Attorney Orrick. "It is still attached to the report," with decided sharpness, City Secretary

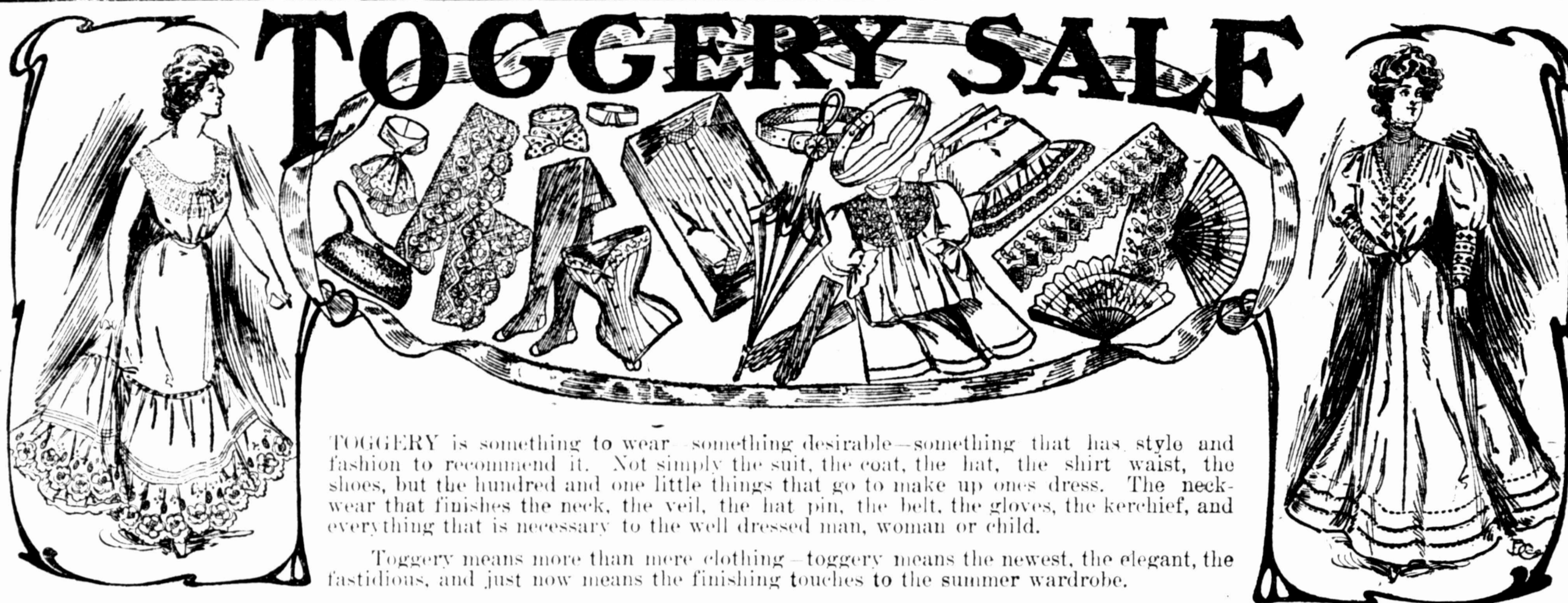

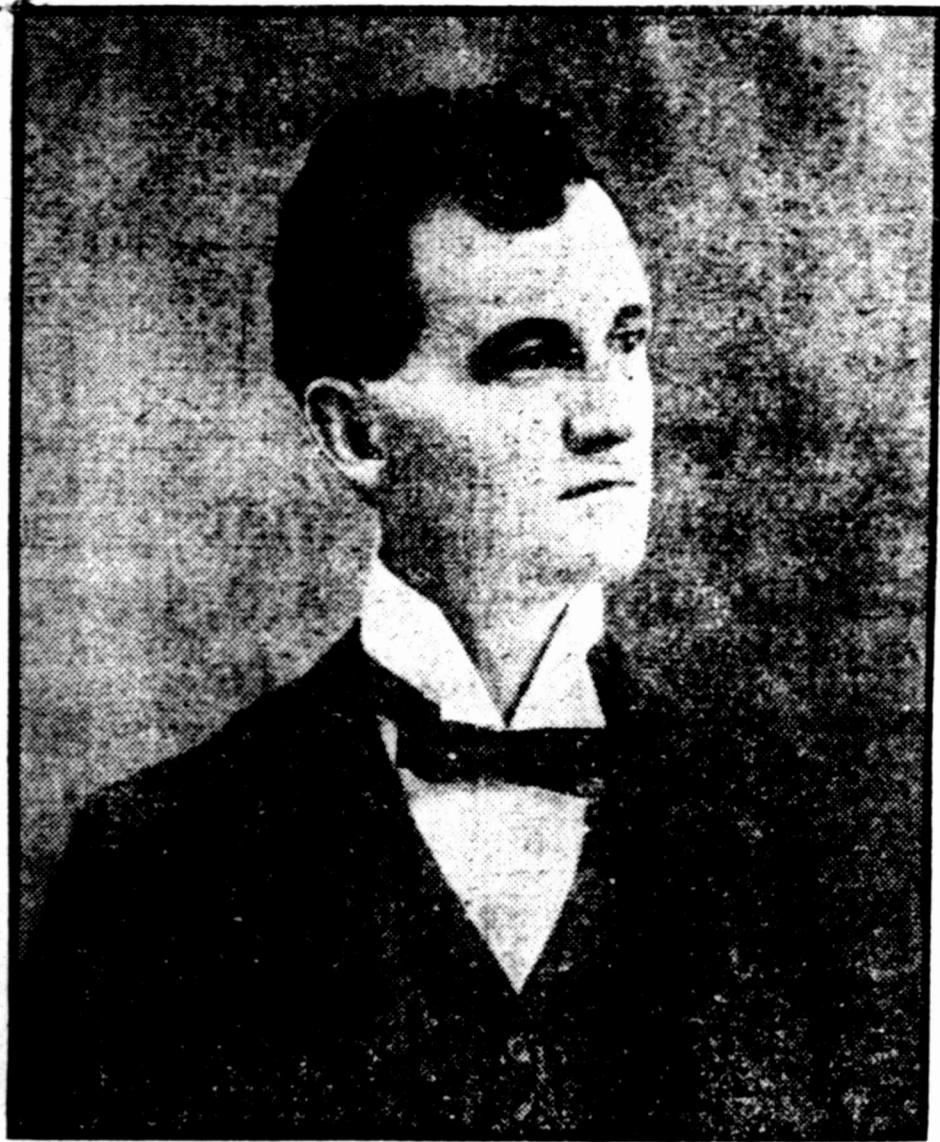

BRIDGE BUILDING PROVES DIFFICULT

To Span Marine Creek Is No Small Undertaking

Work is steadily progressing on the new bridge across Marine Creek in North Fort Worth, just north of Twenty-fifth street.

Much has been contended with in the way of shutting out the water in order that the stone work might be started on dry ground. The first step in preparation for the new steel span is to build the abutments or piers on each side of the stream on which will rest the bridge. On the south side the pier would have to be extended out into the water and made square so the two side beams of the span will rest on the stone work at the same distance from the center of the stream.

The concrete pier or wall must be built four feet below the water level in order to get a solid foundation. The form was made by driving a pile of steel pipe into the ground and then the water must be pumped out. It was impossible to shut off all seeping and although a concrete and steel work with a capacity of 1,000 gallons a minute was used, the ground could not be dried. City Engineer Hill then tried a new plan, which was successful. He filled in the space with bricks of concrete, beginning at the two ends, thus crowding the water to the center, and the water was then pumped out, except in the center. It was then possible to empty the small space by the pump.

Saturday this wall or pier was nearly half finished and the close of next week will see the work on the south side well on toward completion. The old abutment on the north side of the stream had been slightly damaged by the recent washout. It has been repaired and greatly strengthened. Concrete has been filled in behind the outer wall, which makes about two feet thick and well fitted to hold the span.

The steel span, which is eighty feet long and sixteen feet wide, is being made by the Leverage Construction Company of Fort Worth, which will probably deliver same about July 15.

CITY BUYS PLANT

City Will Purchase Waterworks at Price of \$907,000

HOUSTON, Texas, June 23.—Within the next two weeks Houston will take over the plant of the Houston Water Company, paying for it \$907,000, and she will then make her debut in a new roll of municipal ownership. The commission promises much from the management of this utility. It assures the people that they shall have pure water always, an abundance of it, that mains shall be extended over the entire city, and that a meter system shall be installed which will reduce the present water charges with economical use of the fluid.

The deal for the water plant was clinched at the special election held last Thursday, which gave the commission the right to issue \$435,700 as a part payment on the purchase of the plant. The bond issue to be floated at the city's leisure, as it is believed they should command a top price. They are to be of the forty-year 5 per cent specified, and the city wants at least 10 per cent premium for them.

TO BUILD NEW RINK White City to Have Another Skating Pavilion. Plans are being made for a new roller skating rink in White City. It was announced Saturday that within the next few days arrangements will have been completed for a new rink large enough to supply the demands of patrons of White City. The new rink will be in dimensions 75x100 feet and will be located south of the old rink near the edge of Lake Togo. It will be covered and built from the latest type. The aerial swing is now on the grounds and work on this new attraction will not be delayed. The swing tower has been completed for some time past, and final work has only been delayed pending the arrival of the rotary swing.

PLACED UNDER BOND. Man Says He Sold No Lottery Tickets, Nor Is He One Wanted. W. R. Alexander, heretofore reported in The Telegram as under indictment in the federal court at New Orleans on a charge of conspiracy to violate the federal anti-lottery laws, waived examination before United States Commissioner Dodge and was placed under a \$500 bond to appear at the next term of the federal court at New Orleans. He says the case is one of mistaken identity.

These creatures turn bearish if Standard Oil sneezes and if a smile appears on the face of Henry H. Rogers, stocks immediately become buoyant. ... Just now a large majority of the able gentlemen in No. 26 Broadway seem to be in danger of being put on trial for their lives. If they are guilty and the trial stops the work of relating the result cannot help but be beneficial to the railroad companies that have been forced to give rebates. If the thing is a stock market argument at all, it argues for higher rebates.

Standard Oil Offended. ... But as he has never yet showed possible symptoms of insanity, it is possible that traders may have been misinformed as to his present intentions. ... The time is ripe for some heroic spirit to lead the bears into a massacre. Sentiment is all bearish, but the facts all point in the other direction. ... In the Street. ... The total number of shares of stocks traded in today was 34,100, against 28,241 the same day last year. The total par value of bonds sold today was \$44,000 against \$1,467,000 the same day a year ago. ... Heavy profit taking appeared in the stock market today, after a steady opening. The bank statement with its surprise in the cash account inspired further sales. Prices declined an average of about 2 points in the active issues. TWELVE SAILORS PERISH IN STORM

Typhoon Turns Boats Upside Down as if Toys ... Special to The Telegram. ... NEW YORK, June 23.—Twelve sailors are believed to have perished in four vessels overturned by a terrific northeast gale and hail storm which swept New York bay and the New Jersey coast Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The gale rushed upon a two-masted schooner from Red Bank, N. J., the three fishing sloops of the New York & New Jersey Oil Company and a large mail sloop, all anchored in the channel. The helpless men aboard the vessels were unable to make a move for their escape. ... Boats Overturned. ... A waterspout spinning like some huge top swallowed one sloop after another, seized upon the schooner and the sloop and after tossing them about turned them turtle. The storm had already worked terrible havoc at Coney Island, where the hall storm had driven tons of boats and holiday vehicles screaming to shelter. ... The typhoon appeared to form just off Sandy Hook point. On Sandy Hook point hundreds of people were torn out of the ground by the roots and a number of buildings belonging to the government at Fort Hancock were unroofed. Several frame structures were set on fire by the lightning.

LIGHTNING HITS CAR

Passengers Panic Stricken and Trample Over Each Other. ... Special to The Telegram. ... PRINCETON, Ind., June 23.—While a heavy electrical storm was raging a traction car on the Evansville and Princeton line was struck by lightning and completely disabled. Twenty passengers on the car were badly shocked. Immediately a panic followed among the passengers and several women made a rush for the door, falling over those who had been knocked down and were just getting to their feet. The conductor played himself in the doorway and held the excited passengers till order was restored.

HOOD COUNTY DIVERSIFYING

Frank Gastan Talks of Change During Recent Years

Frank Gastan, for twenty years the editor of the Granbury News, was in Fort Worth Friday accompanied by his daughter, Miss Mabel Gastan. Mr. Gastan thinks he holds the palm for longest continued service with any paper west of Dallas and, maybe also, to the eastward of that city. The News under his editorship has entered on its twentieth year. His report of the Hood county crop conditions are of the most gratifying character for the farmer of Hood county. He has, in the last day or two by phone and personally, talked to over thirty of the more prominent about wheat, and they are all of the opinion that the crop is one of the best. It is an unusual thing for the farmers of Hood county to have from ten to twelve thousand steers in the feed lots and the loss, because of the alleged bad conditions at the feed lots, averaged from \$3 to \$5 per head. One of the Hood county feeders recently topped the Fort Worth market with some animals, many of them being exceptionally well and the corn crop is most promising.

Cotton Secondary Crop

Plenty of cotton is still raised but it is becoming a secondary crop with the Hood county farmer. The forage crop with great success, alfalfa is successfully grown. Sorghum is becoming one of the leading forage crops and these and the various Johnson grass hay, are being raised for stock feeding. The hay is sold and everybody, down to the hogs and cattle, eat the nuts or the hay as the case may be. The yield is large and the Electric Lighted Dining Cars are plowed up and then raked and one of the farmers who experimented, as it were, got three big wagon loads of hay from a half acre. It is estimated that there must be a yield of fully a ton and a half to the acre and, as stated above, the old man down to the pigs. Dairying Favored

Lately attention has been given to the dairy business and with gratifying results to the dairymen. About 150 cows are milked at or near Granbury daily and the milk or the cream, for much of it is skimmied before shipment, is sent to our Fort Worth consumers. LAST ROUND-UP OF WILD HORSES

WILSON CREEK, Wash., June 23.—Eight hundred horses, comprising the first trailload from the last big round-up of Eastern Washington, have just gone East to range on Dakota wheat grass for a few months, when they will be broken and taken to points in Minnesota, Wisconsin and Canada for sale.

Round-Up on a Grand Scale During the last winter the demand for horses, hauled and packed by the owners, realizing that only one or two years more would find them without pasture for their hands, decided to make a clean sweep as early as possible in the Eastern Washington range.

The handling of this large body of buckaroos was a task that had never been undertaken in Washington before. The buckaroo is used to a wild, free life, and to handle so many of them would require generalship that could only be found in men who were acquainted with the country, the nature of the horses and the easiest way to accomplish the results aimed at.

At a convention of the horsemen, Thomas Barker, an old rider, and one of the principal owners, was selected as foreman and given entire charge over men and the work. In order to start the buckaroos off for the big ride in good spirits it was decided to give a few days of sport and pasture before beginning work. A buckaroo dance was given in the open house at Wilson Creek, which was attended by riders from all parts of the West.

The Roar of the Hoofs The main body of the expedition, augmented here by the addition of another big camp outfit drawn by six horses, and several white men and Indians, pushed leisurely down the canyon for the most part the trail was a good one, but several times the camp wagons were stalled when fording the stream, and saddle horses were pressed into the mire.

More Merciful to Shoot Them. Some two or three had gone to the "Figure 2" ranch on the south side of the mountains, when their horses came out and came in in the morning. About 400 horses had been driven in and fully 1,000 had been started, but in the afternoon, when the riders and horses were tired, it was difficult to hold them once they got under way in their efforts to escape.

Several orphans were brought into camp, and nearby settlers came and took them to their ranches to feed them.

OUR LAY SERMON

"Honesty is the best policy." There was never a greater truism perpetrated than this sentence so commonly set as copy in the copy-books of the young men of twenty-five years ago...

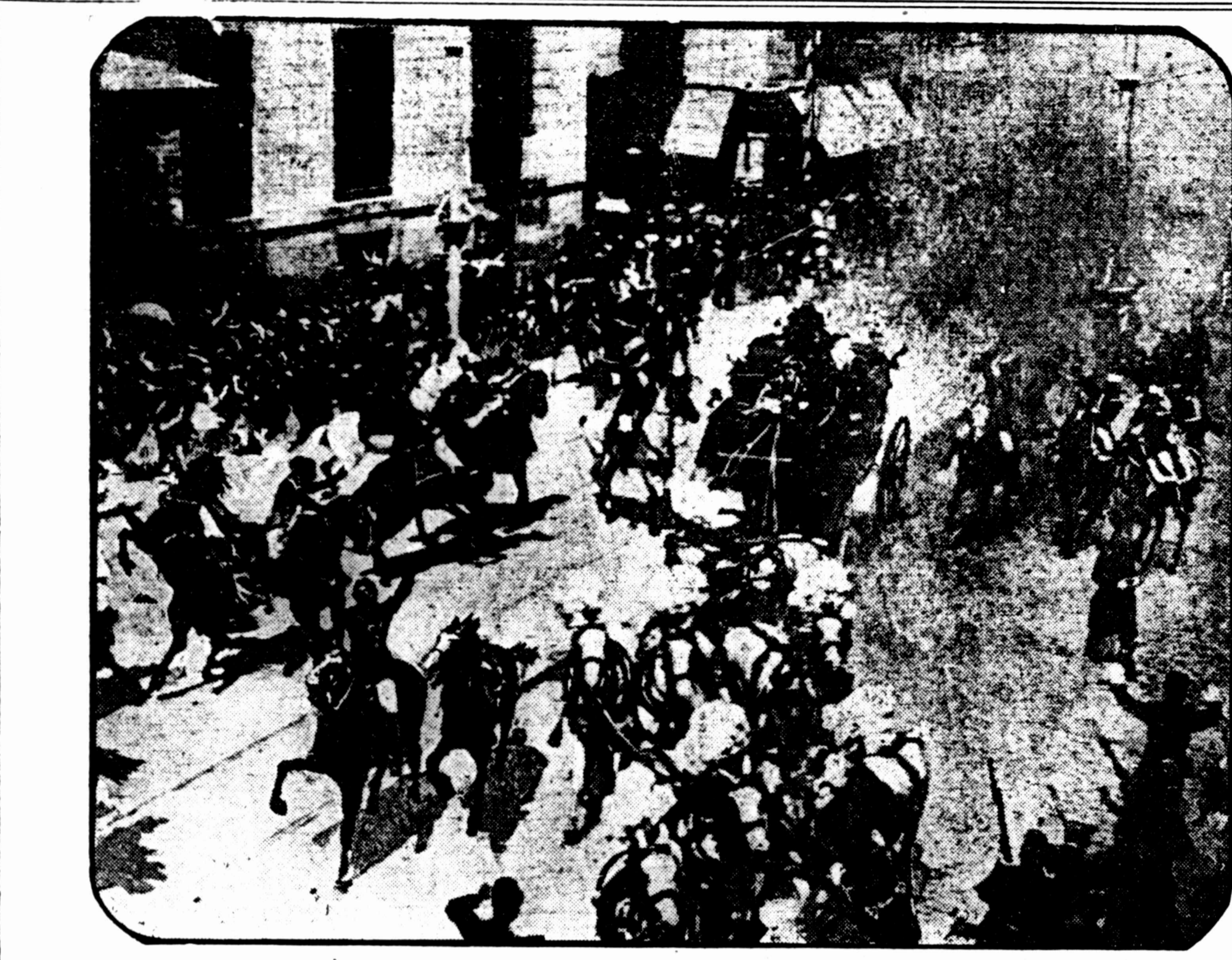

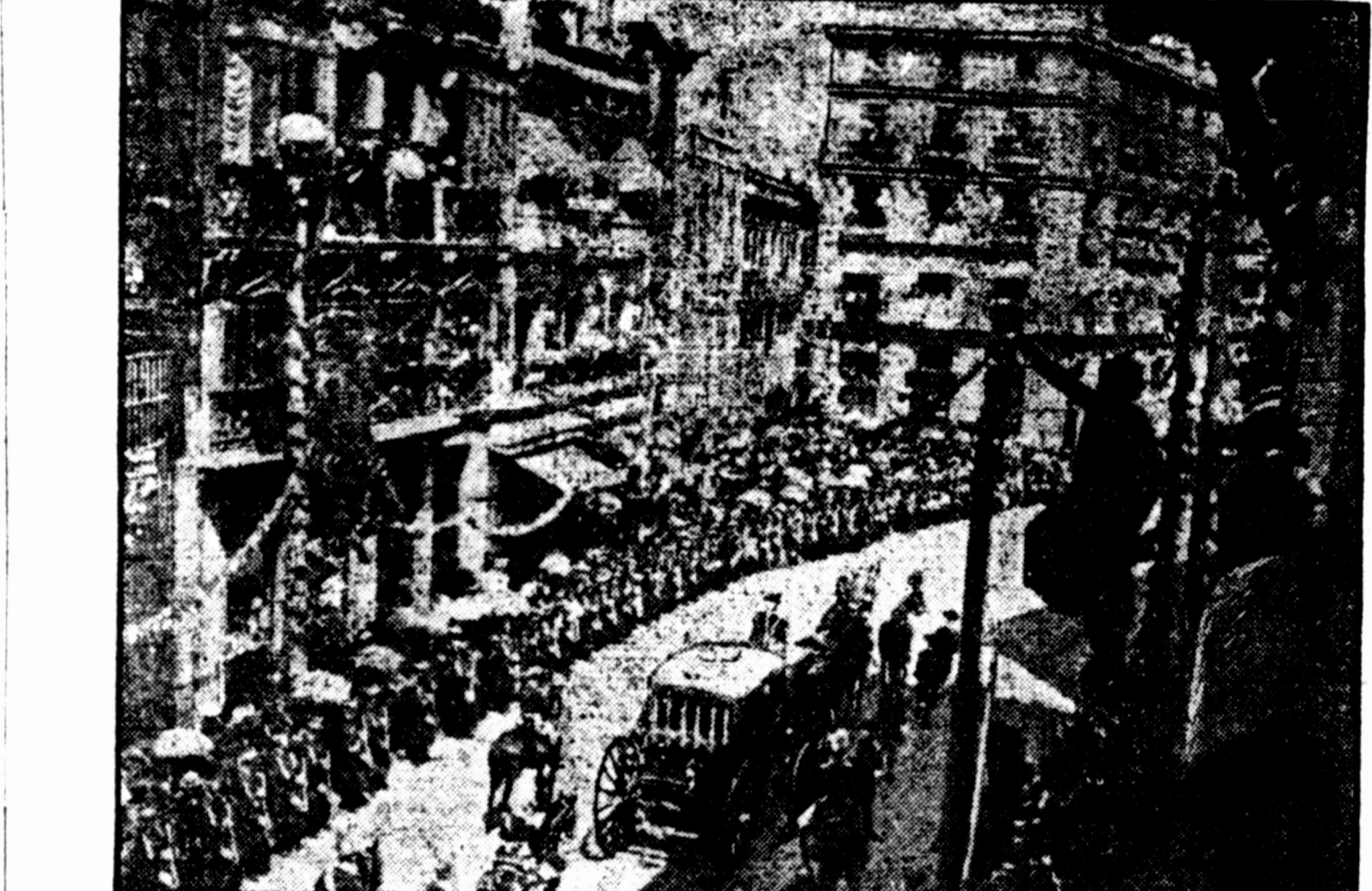

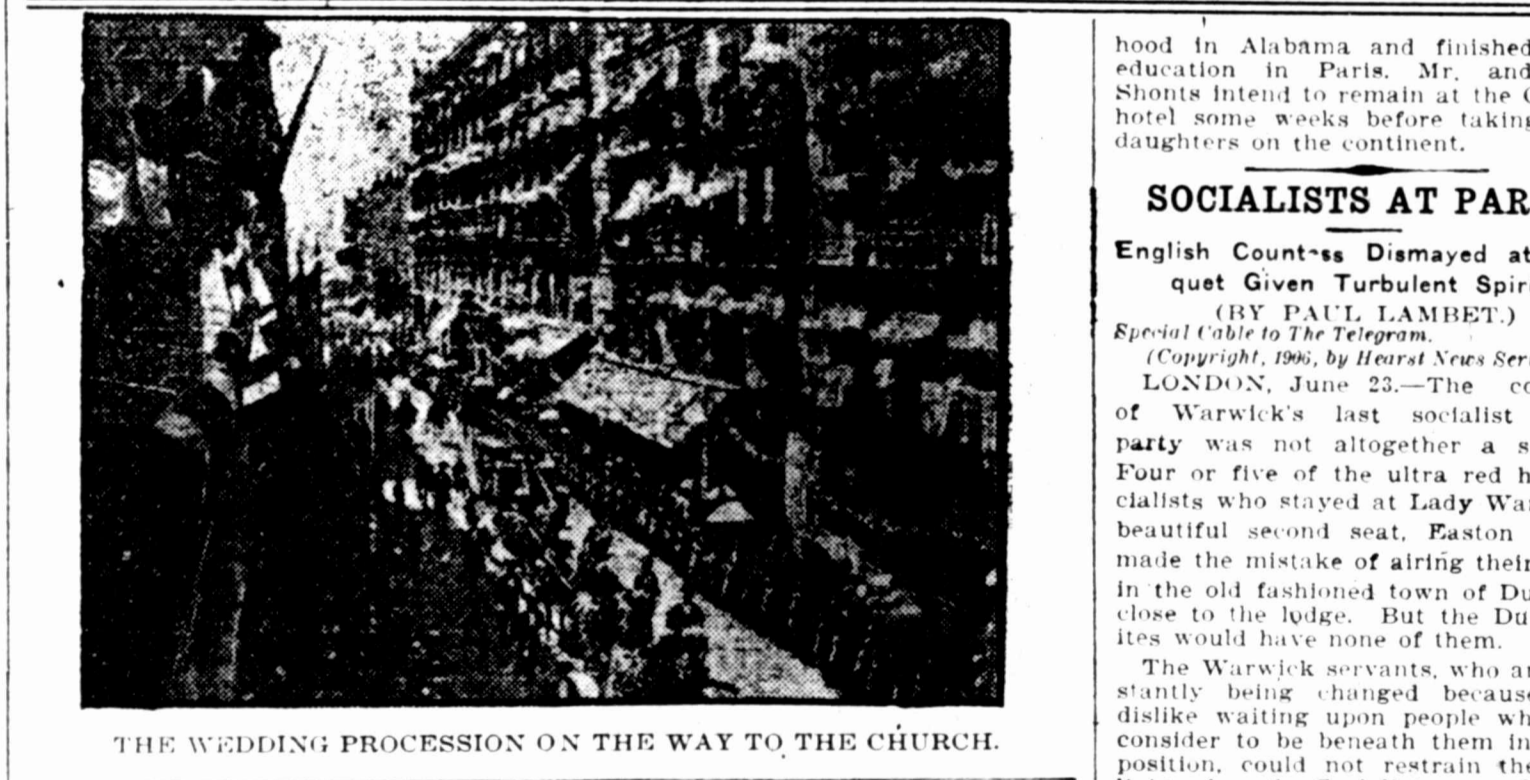

# LAND OF HIGHWAYMEN NOW WEALTHY EMPIRE

## James and Dalton Boys Once Ruled Oklahoma

## OPEN 17 YEARS

### New State Has Population of 1,350,000 and Is Larger Than Missouri

Special to The Telegram. WASHINGTON, June 23.—With the admission of Oklahoma into the union as a state, a new star will be added to the field of blue in the flag that will represent an empire endowed with all the rights and privileges guaranteed by the constitution. Since the days when the government at Washington first conceived the idea of aggregating the Indians in that portion of the Louisiana purchase until recent years, the popular conception of the Indian Territory and Oklahoma has been an indefinite place in the west where train robbers and desperadoes congregated. The wild exploits of the James, the Daltons and other bands of cutthroats were more intimately associated with Indian Territory than was the agricultural and mineral development of an exceedingly rich country. Territory Opened Seventeen Years

The vast strides in material progress made by the territory in the last 17 years are remembered when it is remembered that but seventeen years have elapsed since that territory was opened for settlement and that today its population numbers over 700,000. The combined population of Indian Territory and Oklahoma is today estimated at 1,350,000, closely approximating the following states in numbers of inhabitants: Arkansas .....1,311,554 California .....1,485,053 Kansas .....1,470,435 Minnesota .....1,731,294 Nebraska .....1,066,309 Louisiana .....1,381,625 South Carolina .....1,340,316 Maryland .....1,188,044

### White Man Predominates

Although the white man has practically expatriated himself by residing in Indian Territory, statistics show that he has been a powerful factor in the development of that territory. The census of 1900 described the total population of 392,000 as composed of 302,680 whites, 52,500 Indians, and 36,853 negroes. The advanced state of development of the territory is indicated by the fact that of the 2,260,881 acres of agricultural land, 8,062,193 acres are improved.

An originally intended by the government, Indian Territory was to be only a home for the Indians. The decimation of the Indian tribes, rendering the population abnormally low for the great territory, was recognized by congress, which in 1889 divided Indian Territory, by designating the eastern portion as Oklahoma Territory, which was opened up for settlement by the whites. But even though the white men were permitted in Indian Territory upon sufferance, and although they had no contractual rights, a flood of immigration continued pouring into that country, and land contracts were entered into with the Indians, whereby immense virgin fields were converted into farms, where corn, wheat, oats, corn, alfalfa, fruits, tobacco and vegetables were raised in abundance. It is also a noteworthy fact that although the contract entered into by the Indians and whites had no legal standing, that the Indians never broke faith with the spirit of such contracts.

The citizens of the new state of Oklahoma is typically American. Its population has been drawn largely from old settled states. In Indian Territory the American population comprises 98.35 per cent of the total, white in Oklahoma, it is about 2 per cent less. Area 70,030 Square Miles

The new state has an area of 70,030 square miles. It is slightly smaller than Kansas, and larger than Missouri, Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania or Ohio.

Besides its agricultural products, Oklahoma is rich in mineral deposits. From the coal beds of Indian Territory more than 2,000,000 tons of bituminous coal were mined last year. The natural gas and oil deposits represent wealth impossible of computation until complete development shall have revealed their extent. Besides that, the state is rich in salt, granite, asphalt, gypsum, lead and zinc deposits.

### Railroads Cover State

Covering the state is a network of railroads, consisting of more than 5,000 miles of main track, connecting its every part with the markets of the north, east, south and west. The available wealth of the state is indicated by the statement of bank deposits, which exceed \$28,000,000. The taxable property of the state is \$500,000,000, while many thousands of acres of land owned by the Indians are at present exempt from taxation.

The political complexion of the new state is generally conceded to be democratic. Notwithstanding that fact, it is anticipated because of the formation of the congressional districts three of the five representatives to be elected will be republicans. It is even considered possible that legislative districts may be so formed that two United States senators will be chosen by the republicans.

### The Constitutional Convention

The constitution of the state will be formed by 112 delegates, fifty-five from Oklahoma, fifty from Indian Territory, and two from the Osage Indian reservation. The enabling act provides that the state and judicial officers shall be elected within four months of the approval of such act. Ample provision has also been made in the enabling act for public schools, over 140,000 acres of land, worth \$5,000,000, having been set aside for that purpose. In addition to that the government will contribute \$5,000,000 for schools in Indian Territory.

### The Indian Problem

The early history of Indian Territory is inseparably entwined with the Indian problem, which continually demanded of the government a solution during the first century of the existence of the republic. The plan of establishing a separate territory for the Indians was first formulated in the beginning of the nineteenth century. The first Indians to take up their permanent abode in Indian Territory were the Old Settler Cherokees, who established homes in that territory in 1810. But it was not until about 1829 that the
