

General Ayala Throws His Support to Gomez

NEW YORK, July 7 .- The transient colony of prominent Venezuelans in this city, whose members are men not friendly with President Castro, has been increased by the arrival here of General Ramon Ayala, former vice president and ex-minister of war of Venezuela. He arrived unexpectedly

and unannounced a few days ago from Fort de France, Hayti, accompanied by his wife and two sons. General Ayala and his family are staying at a local hotel. General Ayala is another of the politically powerful men in the Castro government who have either deserted him or have been repudiated by the president. Ayala Turns to Gomez

General Ayala and Castro became estranged over personal matters and General Ayala became a strong supporter of General Vincente Gomez, vice president of the republic, who in Castro's absence from Caracas has been president ad interim. He left Venezuela shortly before the time announced for Castro's return to power, following the example of many other comez followers not in accord with Castro. General Ayala declares that his visit north is a mere jaunt for recreation. The general has a reputation in Venezuela as a fighter. During the Matos rebellion Castro sent General Ayala into the field against the army of General Segundo Riera. His campaign resulted disastrously. Taft to Denounce Republicans of the South

Special to The Telegram. WASHINGTON, D. C., July 7.—Secretary Taft has left for Oyster Bay. He had in his pocket a draft of the speech which he will deliver to the republicans of North Carolina in state convention at Greensboro next Monday. The secretary of war and the President will go over the speech together and when it is delivered it should be received as expressing the views of the President himself.

# HARMLESS PAINTER

Man Alleged to Seek Kaiser's Life Not Dangerous

SEATTLE, Wash., July 7 .- The central committee of the United German societies of Seattle at its regular meeting last night declared that August Rosenberg, arrested in Germany upon suspicion of being an anarchist with designs against the life of Emperor William, was nothing but a harmless mixer of paints.

The letter which caused the arrest of Rosenberg, the members of the society claim, was written by a secret enemy of Rosenberg's to the authorities in the Fatherland. A prominent member of the committee, having known Rosenberg for several years, states that Rosenberg was an investigator of paint compounds and that the chemicals and apparatus found in Rosenberg's old shop were all for the purpose of experimentation in this line.

Returned to Live in Germany Most of his supplies in his researches were purchased from a local firm, and Dr. Warmburg, a chemist, was often called into consultation by Rosenberg touching his experiments. According to this committeeman, Rosenberg was 72 years of age, had amassed about \$6,000, a competency for himself and wife, and his return to Germany was to spend the rest of his days in ease.

New Orleans Prepares to Keep Dread Disease Out

HOUSEBOAT BUILT

Vessel Will Aid Fruit Ships to Pass Quarantine and Crews Forbidden Ashore

NEW ORLEANS, La., July 7 .-Workmen today are preparing the first bernatorial candidates have neglected in the town. ably strict quarantine system. The house boat is for use of both isolating crews and enabling a second crew to bring fruit steamers from quarantine to New Orleans without danger of infecting the city. The regulations governing the house boat are combined from the orders of Surgeon General Walter Wyman of the Marine hospital and the public health service at Washington, plus the extra regulations promulgated by the Louisiana state board of health. These precautions were made necessary by the reports received by the state board of health which up to date indicate all except two tropical fruit ports from which these steamers come are now

infected with yellow fever.

The fruit snips having provileges of he house boat proceed to sea under the following regulations: No members of the crew can came ashore at New Orleans except the captain to clear the ship and it must be done during daylight. The unloading crew is taken off at the quarantine and placed aboard the house boat while the seagoing crew, which has been isolated on the house boat is placed aboard a steamer from the time of leaving New Orleans until completing the round trip to the fruit port and on the return the steamer will be fumigated four times with sulphur and pyrethrum.

Guard Unloading Crew

At the fruit port the seagoing crew s not allowed on shore, the captain again being the only man to go ashore. Returned to quarantine, this crew is again isolated on the house boat and supplanted by the unloading crew. The unloading crew is kept continually under guard by the state board of health to see that no member gets ashore by stealth. Besides the captain the engineer in charge is allowed to pass quarantine with the steamer. The first house boat is being equipped by the Planters Steamship company, no other companies yet having applied for permission to nurry steamers to port here under

The second message reported that the Supply was unable to pull the Thomas off and tugs were needed, and that none was to be had



# **FULL CONFESSION** BY RUFUS MARTIN

Condemned Negro Writes Letter to His Mother

In a letter addressed to his mother, who lives at Ratoon, N. M., and written in a figure cipher, Rufus Martin, condemned to die Thursday, July 12, for the murder of Charles Scwackhammer Oct. 29, 1903, has made a full

The letter was given to Deputy Sheriff Ollie H. Buck Friday by a negro named George who is here from Ratoon, N. M., to arrange for the disposition of Martin's body after the execution next Thursday. This letter was delivered to Deputy Sheriff Buck under a rule that no letters are permitted to be sent out by prisoners without first being inspected by the

In writing this letter Martin used four pages of letter paper to convey in figures of a code which it is presumed his mother had the key to. As soon as Deputy Buck opened the letter he and Jail Deputy W. D. Louthian went to work to decipher it, and were engaged on it until 5 p. m. Friday. The result of their combined work was the following letter to Martin's mother:

"Say, mama, I killed the man, but God did forgive me for it and -----helped do it to. He was just as big in it as me and the pepel knoed he was in it but did not know how. At first they let him tell his part of the teal and would not let me tell anything at all. They did not have hem in the same place they did me and they helped him to fix up his lie Theys peple had nuthing to shw that I was the wone and to this day they · · · He would tell all for it would hurt hem. He seen that I not the shw he had and \* \* \* he fix up his lie good. You see, it was a made up thing. They knoed nuthing agance and no nuthing untill now, only that I was in the wagon. They loed me no shw to tell it at first and don't you think I will tell it at the last, for I won't. I tell you for I knoed that you would wont to know the truth. They are bagging me to tell what I know but I only say me and God for it. May God bless you, mama. You can tell buddie the rest if you want to. I know they will wont to know it." After deciphering the letter Buck

had occasion to pass Martin's cell, when Martin asked him what he thought of the letter, and if it did not but him (Buck) to guessing. When informed by Buck that the figures in the letter had been copied Martin did not seem to worry, thinking that they could not be read, but later when a copy of the translation shown him he was thunderstruck and destroyed the copy which had been shown him. A second copy was in possession of

translation of his letter was correct laiming that the deputies being at what he had written to his mother Martin's excitement on reading the translation convinced Buck and Louthian that the letter had been correctly deciphered.





# ABILENE WANTS **COMMON RATE** SECURITY.

Proposed Change in the Tariff Genuine Causes Much Protest

# Carter's TOWN AROUSED

Little Liver Pills. Plans for Fight, Considered by Must Bear Signature of

Wholesale and Retail Business Interests Special to The Telegram.

ABILENE, Texas, July 7 .- Roused by what they term an unjust and uncalled for change in the boundaries of Texas common point rate territory, the wholesale and retail merchants of Abilene are preparing to resist in unison the new schedule, which they declare seriously jeopardizes their interests.

These interests represent several million dollars in capital and several millions more in annual trade, trade which has been built upon the basis of the fact that Abilene jobbers have been getting the same rate on freight shipments from out of the state as have jobbers at Fort Worth or other Texas cities in the common point ter-By an arbitrary ruling railroads

affiliated in southern traffic have moved the boundary of this common point territory on several lines in Texas. Probably the most important change has been the movement of the line east to Santo on the Texas and Pacific. This move hits Abilene harder than any other West Texas town because Abilene has more wholesale houses and does a larger wholesale business, with a correspondingly larger number of freight shipments, than any other West Texas town until El Paso is reached.

Fifteen to Forty Dollars a Car

The J. M. Radford Grocery Company, the H. O. Wooten Grocery Company, the Ed S. Hughes Hardware Company, the Morgan Weaver Company, the Western Drug Company and the Abilene Cold Storage Company are some of the firms most largely interested in this change in common point territory, which means to them an increase in freight charges of from \$15 to \$40 on every car of goods they receive from outside the state. 



#### Bad Bank Statement Interrupts Upward Movement-Early Gains Are Wiped Out

Special to The Telegram. NEW YORK, July 7 .- The upward movement of prices on the Stock Exchange was interrupted today by a wave of profittaking, affecting the entire list to a certain extent. This did not appear, however, until yesterday's gains had been substantially increased.

An accumulation of overnight covering orders and higher prices for American stocks in London caused a firm opening here, prices generally being fractionally higher, while St. Paul and Reading showed gains of more than a point. Owing to the good demand for stocks and the paucity of offerings, the upward movement extended into the second hour, initial gains being increased 1/2 to more than 1 point for the more prominent issues. The advance, coupled with the appearance of a very unfavorable bank statement, started traders to taking profits and a sharp slump ensued. The leading issues were well supported at the decline and a fair recovery was effected, but the close was somewhat irregular, although in most instances prices were above yesterday's finals. 

For some time past it has been the

desire of Messrs. Andrews, Mathews and others of those living in the westesrn and southwestern parts of the city that the corporation limits be so extended as to include their property. Want to Come In

A petition, so numerously signed that the statement that it is practically unanimous is warrantable, has been

circulated by those living south of the city, asking that the corporation limits be stretched out so as to embrace them and their belongings. If these extensions are made, and there are assurances that many of the legislators will favorably consider the application when made, then the limits should be extended on the east so as to include Glenwood and, if that is done the intermediate Texas and Pacific addition would naturally and by force of circumstances be embraced in the fold of the Greater Fort Worth.

Power of Extension It is a fact that the favorable action of the people of the district proposed to be annexed, or included, is now unnecessary, and with the consent of the legislature upon the petition of the city the limits can be extended, even if there is objection on the part of those sought to be included.

As stated above in some instances. the people of the affected districts, if the Fort Worth charter is so amended as to extend beyond the present limits, favor instead of object to the extension. It is not known that there is any objection to any of the suggested extensions. It is the hope of those concerned actively in this matter that there will be no objection for the prospects now are that the request for the enlargement of the corporation boundaries by charter amendment will be made to the legislature at the next session, January, 1907.
