# COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER ALLEGED POLICE VIOLENCE

### Meeting With Mayor at 4 p. m. Saturday

## FATHER COMPLAINS

### Young Man Shot While Prisoner of City on Charge of a Misdemeanor

Following the circulation of a report that a police officer of Fort Worth had shot a prisoner in the city's custody, charged with a misdemeanor, while that prisoner was alleged to have been endeavoring to aid and abet a jail delivery, Mayor Harris called a meeting of the police committee of Fort Worth city council to meet in the city hall at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock, at which time the committee is expected to decide just what steps will be taken in the matter.

### Mayor Harris' Call

The call was made by a communication to Alderman Jake Zurn of the police committee Saturday morning, as follows:

Fort Worth, Texas, July 7, 1906.—Mr. Jake Zurn, chairman police committee. Dear Sir: I wish to see you and the other members of your committee at 4 p. m. today, to consult with me with reference to some complaints you with reference to police officers' violence used by police officers toward prisoners in their custody. Let me know at once what time you will be in the city hall at 4 o'clock at the mayor's office at hour name. Respectfully, W. D. HARRIS, Mayor.

### Alderman Cook's Statement

Regarding the call for the meeting of the police committee, R. P. Cook, alderman from the Third ward, said to a reporter for The Telegram Saturday morning:

"In last Monday's issue of The Telegram there was a statement to the effect that a prisoner in the city jail, incarcerated for a misdemeanor, while attempting to escape through an opening in the floor above, had been shot by a police officer, a member of our police force, and, in this morning's issue of the Record, I note that Mr. Waggoner proposes to bring the case before the police committee, of which he is a member. I heartily endorse the proposed investigation of this matter, and believe that it is the imperative duty of every good citizen of our city and much more so officials who are charged with this duty, to lend their aid toward locating the officer who shot the prisoner, if you can meet me at the mayor's office at four o'clock, Saturday morning. I have believed for some time that there were some members of our police department who were inclined to serve in that capacity and I have been quietly gathering some facts that I shall gladly submit to the committee when they meet, if you will, which will be an 'eye opener' to them. 'Some time ago I saw a certain officer high in authority, who was usually benevolent in his treatment of prisoners, who was so much intoxicated that he could stand up without assistance. He gave me names of them to the police committee when they meet. As Mr. Maddox is not ordinarily at the police committee, I will give you his name for not knowing of the disrespectful and brutal conduct mentioned above."

**ABILENE WANTS COMMON RATE**  
Proposed Change in the Tariff Causes Much Protest  
**TOWN AROUSED**  
Plans for Fight, Considered by Wholesale and Retail Business Interests

**Special to The Telegram.**  
ABILENE, Texas, July 7.—Roused by what they term an unjust and uncalled for change in the boundaries of Texas common point rate territory, the wholesale and retail merchants of Abilene are preparing to resist in unison the new schedule, which they declare seriously jeopardizes their interests.  
These interests represent several million dollars in capital, and several millions more in annual trade, trade which has been built upon the basis of the fact that Abilene jobbers have been getting the same rate on freight shipments from out of the state as have jobbers at Fort Worth or other Texas cities in the common point territory.  
By an arbitrary ruling railroads affiliated in the south traffic have moved the boundary of this common point territory on several lines in Texas. Probably the most important change has been the movement of the line east to Santo on the Texas and Pacific. This move hits Abilene harder than any other West Texas town because Abilene has more wholesale houses and does a larger wholesale business, with a correspondingly larger number of freight shipments, than any other West Texas town until El Paso is reached.  
Fifteen to Forty Dollars a Car  
The J. M. Radford Grocery Company, the H. O. Wooten Grocery Company, the Ed S. Hughes Hardware Company, the Morgan Weaver Company, the Western Drug Company and the Abilene Cold Storage Company are some of the firms most largely interested in this change in common point territory, which means to them an increase in freight charges of from \$15 to \$40 on every car of goods they receive from outside the state.  
When it is estimated that the merchants of Abilene pay an average of \$2,000 a day to the railroads for freight transportation some idea of the importance in the new freight ruling to the city is obtained.  
But important as this proposed increased charge is, it is not so important in the actual dollars and cents involved as the jeopardy in which it places the wholesale trade by menacing competition.  
If Fort Worth and Dallas jobbers can get a lower freight than those of Abilene, say the West Texas men, where is the competition going to? The new ruling is good enough for Fort Worth and Dallas, which it does not affect, but how about Abilene and the big business interests represented there?  
Some of the firms mentioned in the list of wholesale houses have branches all over West Texas. The Radford and Hughes Companies are two of the largest concerns of their kind in the state.  
Clustering about the wholesale houses are the many prosperous retail establishments deriving their support from the surrounding trade territory.  
An important feature of this common point rate territory is that it represents an area equal to any of the South Atlantic states. In the Abilene county, Taylor county and the seven counties surrounding it, 120,000 bales of cotton were raised last year. This is as much as was raised in all of the thirteen counties surrounding these seven, an indication of how West Texas development has centered around Abilene.

**Ready to Fight**  
From interviews a Telegram correspondent obtained from leading business men of the town, the stand Abilene has taken on the rate territory change may be summarized as follows: "We believe the railroads have made a mistake by this sudden and unexpected change. We think they are open to reason and arbitration and we can show them that it will hurt their own interests to jeopardize ours. If they won't accept reason and arbitration we're ready to fight and we can beat them."  
One merchant who is interested in the fight seemed to have the impression the Texas and Pacific railroad is responsible for the change, inasmuch as it is the only railroad now entering Abilene. He declared that if the change were enforced merchants would route their goods by way of the Texas Central and Cleon and use the Texas and Pacific only from that point to Abilene in order to give the Texas and Pacific the least possible business. But this view is not that of the majority.  
Another method suggested for the fight is the employment of attorneys and resort to litigation methods. Still another is the employment of a joint traffic agent for the merchants of Abilene and other West Texas towns to represent their interests in securing equitable rates.  
San Angelo, Brownwood and Stamford are all interested with Abilene in keeping the rate boundary at its former limits, as they are also affected by the proposed change. Representatives of business interests in these cities have met with the merchants of Abilene and it is believed if the issue resolves into a fight they will unite with Abilene.

TWO NEW ENGINES ARE BIG FELLOWS Texas and Pacific Turns Out Own Locomotives

The two big passenger engines with seven-foot driving wheels that have just been completed by the Texas and Pacific at the Marshall shops are now temporarily in commission on the Texas and Pacific line between Texas, Kansas and Marshall. They will remain on the line between Fort Worth and Dallas until such time as they will be put to work pulling the Cannon Hill train. These two engines which are of the Atlantic type are the largest passenger engines in Texas, and are said by railroad men to be equal if not exceeding in construction to the best passenger engines in use on any road. The improvements to be made on the main line between Fort Worth and Dallas referred to above are these two monster passenger engines are to work on this end of the road to complete a new bridge over the Trinity river at Dallas. The tonnage of the two big engines is so great that, to be on the safe side, they will be used in pairs. The new bridge, until the new bridge is in or the present bridge strengthened.

Officials of the Kansas City Southern admit they are in the fight for a New Orleans outlet for ocean business. To aid in the accomplishment of this they are now building a line, 110 miles long, from Lewisville, south of Shreveport, to Crowley, whence the line of the Southern Pacific is parallel to New Orleans, where terminal arrangements have been made with the Illinois Central. About forty miles of the line of the Gould and Frisco, now building through Louisiana to New Orleans. For a long distance the three new roads will almost parallel each other, and the Kansas City Southern line, which for a half century has been the only south Texas road into New Orleans.

All the railroads entering Fort Worth are already preparing for the fall and winter traffic which is expected to be heavier than ever before, and which will demand increased yard facilities at this point. The Fort Worth and Denver, the Rock Island, Texas and Pacific, and the Frisco particularly will add materially to their yard facilities. Frisco General Manager L. S. Theby, Assistant General Manager J. W. Eversman and Superintendent Page Harris of the western division of the Texas and Pacific, are in the city here with a view of extensive improvements and extensions that are to be made work to begin in the early fall. The Central connects with the Katy, the Cotton Belt and the Houston and Texas, and the Frisco at Dallas. The Santa Fe at Morgan, the Frisco at Dallas and the Texas and Pacific at Dallas, thus connecting with the chief lines of the Gould and Frisco. It has become a disturbing factor of the rate situation of great importance.

A Katy circuit calls attention to the fact that the law enacted during the recess of congress, permitting captured cattle to be kept in pens for ten days without branding, which became effective July 1, requires the written application of the shipper before the provisions of the law apply. In a default of such application the old law fixing the maximum of twenty-eight hours, is operative.

It is settled that W. C. Nixon, late of the Santa Fe in Texas, will have his headquarters in St. Louis and his office will be in the city of Dallas. He is the general manager of the Frisco, ranking next to Vice President Gray.

Fort was broken for the office building and passenger depot of the Brazos Valley at Teague City Friday.

The grade of the Abilene and Northern is finished to Anson and the grade work toward Stamford is progressing rapidly.
