# **NEW BUILDINGS SHOW HOW FORT WORTH GROWS**

Another of Fort Worth's banks has started improvements in its banking rooms, which, when completed, will make them among the most convenient and elegantly finished in the city. This latest bank to take up the matter of better quarters is the American National and when the improvements are finished at the expiration of about ten weeks the building at the corner of Sixth and Main streets will have quite a different appearance. ### \_\_\_\_\_ THE SHAME OF SOUTH CAROLINA

When South Carolina undertook to solve the liquor question by adopting the dispensary system, which is in reality the monopoly of the traffic by the state, there was a great cry raised that the proper solution had been found and other states were urged to adopt the Palmetto state's method. In Texas today there are some advocates of the dispensary plan, and the developments just coming to light in connection with the way things are run in the state where the movement originated, must involve considerable of a disappointment. Almost a year ago the special committee appointed by the legislature of South Carolina to investigate the whisky traffic began work, and at first the inquiry was directed toward the local dispensers-men who retail the product in the various cities and towns under the monopoly afforded by the state. The evidence of graft uncovered by this investigation was so strong that a wave of genuine prohibition swept over a score of counties, but more than half the counties remain under the system, and the big state institution at Co lumbia still exists, although in a somewhat crippled condition.

During the past few weeks the investigators have been camping on the trail of bigger game in looking rounded the jail in which the execution took place. the state's liquor traffic, and have dug up wit nesses who have sworn that one of the directors has received thousands of dollars from whisky manufacturers in the way of rake offs and rebates, and one of the contractors, a prominent citizen of Newberry, says under oath that he once saw the former chairman of the purchasing committee appointed by the state, with a silk hat filled with bank notes, several of which were of \$1,000 denomination. This money, the contractor declares, had been given the purchasing agent by the whisky manufacturers. The system by which the manufacturers are alleged to have dealt with the board of purchasers was explained by the president of the chamber of commerce of the city of Greenville. He says that a Baltimore liquor dealer told him he was not able to obtain an order without giving a rebate, and on one shipment he had paid a dispensary magnate the sum of \$8,000. As he did not figure to lose on the transaction, it was necessary to adulterate the product, and he evidently prepared to protect himself on the first shipment, which he said was so vile and worthless that he feared it would not be accepted. The next cargo was even more worthless, but he says it was sold by the dispensary at standard rates and marked "chemically pure," when it should have been labeled "purely chemical." All along the investigators have charged that the case referred to was not unusual, but that it was the regular practice to rebate and then adulterate the liquor, and the evidence seems to bear them out on this point. Thre is also said to have been graft in the beer business, in the bottle and label business, and it is declared they are for Bell is what renders them so small in the many distillers received the rating on their goods they were clearly not entitled to, obtaining favor with the dispensary managers and getting them to push the sale of certain goods through the medium of large gifts. Summed up in a nut shell, the dispensary, after a trial extending over many years, is a failure as a temperate measure; it has failed to offer the most satger. isfactory solution of the problem; it has encouraged rather than discouraged crime; it has not been put into effect in other states, and has proven an ever fruitful source of graft, to say nothing of the demoralizing

It is true the Republican members of congress dared not pass a measure prohibiting campaign contributions during the last congress, doubtless for the reason that they foresaw the emergency that was even then confronting them, but the willingness of the party to accept does not insure the usual liberal free will offerings. The Telegram believes the outlook is very encouraging for Democratic success in the congressional elections this fall. It is believed the prospects are bright for the party to capture a majority in the next house, but as the News says, the Republican partisan is a pretty stubborn proposition. It may be that this natural born stubbornness will be sufficient to hold the majority of the party in line, but judging from the general state of unrest that is evident throughout the country, the masses are in open revolt and it bodes ill for the party now in power.

Democrats all over the country are greatly enthused over the outlook and Republicans are correspondingly alarmed. Speaker Cannon has said he was unable to figure out more than a Republican majority of fifteen in the next house, and when Uncle Joe reduces his estimate to such small proportions it is pretty good evidence that the situation is serious.



## THE IOWA IDEA

The Iowa idea is attracting much attention throughout the country in the matter of tariff reform, but the Hawkeye state has some other ideas that will attract general attention when made public. The matter of matrimony is one on which there is a well defined Iowa idea, and a matrimonial contract just entered into by Iowa parties is one of the most remarkable on record. Isalah F. Harding and Mrs. Isabella Engelbrecht of Dallas county, Iowa, had each been married twice and divorced when they looked upon each other with fond longings. When the prospective bridegroom had confessed the longing that filled his soul his fair inamorata showed her native caution by proposing that they lay down some rules for their future guidance, and as Harding assented the result was perhaps the most unique marriage agreement that was ever entered into.

This marriage contract arranges for almost every possible contingency that may arise in the life of the two people. It sets forth who shall build the fires, when the husband may bring guests home to meals, when the relatives of each shall visit them, how the money is to be divided, how often the wife may attend social functions without being scowled at-and even fixes a limit to the possible future Hardings. The cou-Die were united in marriage two months ago, and so far each has observed the marriage contract without deviation and no cloud has arisen to mar the serenity of their bliss. The contract is as follows:

Know all men by these presents:

That we, by the terms of this agreement, made this 3d day of May, A. D. 1906, between Isaian F. Harding of the county of Dallas and state of Iowa, party of the first part, and Isabella Engelbrecht of the county of Polk and state of Iowa, of the second part, do hereby bind ourselves by this covenant to carry out entire and in detail the terms of this solemn obligation, so that we, as man and wife, may dwell together in peace and harmony so long as this said covenant shall be in force. to wit: From the said 3d day of May, A. D. 1906, until the 3d day of May, A. D. 1921, a period of fifteen years.

It is hereby agreed and stipulated between said Isaiah F. Harding, party of the first part, and Isabella Engelbrecht, party of the second part, that if, at the end of the fifteen years aforesaid described, we, or either of us, shall have cause to believe that such union is not for the best interests of either of us the said same union shall be terminated by either party without further formality; providing that, if at any time during this period above set forth, either should wish to relinquish the bonds of matrimony, such action shall not be taken except with due process of law.

We hereby agree that we shall jointly and severally settle upon the children of each by former marriage one-half of the estate of each, the said one-half of the estate of the party of the first part to be settled upon his children and the said one-half of the estate of the party of the second part upon her children. Deeds and papers to this effect shall be duly signed, transferred and recorded upon the completion of this covenant. And this shall be regarded as applying to personal property as well as real.

And we hereby bind ourselves to the faithful performance of the following stipulations, so far as within us lies:

Isaiah F. Harding, party of the first part, agrees that Isabella Engelbrecht, party of the second part, shall, upon her wedding to him, the party of the first part, receive each week the sum of \$15 with which to defray the household expenses; but it is understood that he, the party of the first part, shall furnish fuel and water.

CORBETT'S GOSSIP

One of the most interesting incidents in the career of Jack McAuliffe, the world's greatest lightweight, occurred when Jem Carney came over from the British isle touted as the superior of McAuliffe. And it came very near proving the case. He gave McAuliffe one of the hardest battles of his life.

McAuliffe was a sick man before the battle commenced, and offered Carney \$1,500 to postpone the battle for a week, but Patsy Shepherd, who was looking after the Englishman's affairs, would not listen to the proposition, and the battle went on. Jack Dempsy was behind McAuliffe, and during the fight McAuliffe's legs began to swell. Dempsy saw what horrible condition McAuliffe was in and begged him to stop, but the fight continued. Jack said that he would at least give his backers a run for their money, and he surely did. Finally, McAuliffe's legs had swollen so

that the blood refused to circulate, and Dempsy cut his tights. Never after that battle was Mc-Auliffe's wonderful ability questioned, and I do not believe that any fighter from across the Atlantic ever stirred up as much respect for his native land as that same Carney.

The blow known as the plvot was first introduced in the ring by George La Blanche

La Blanche was engaged in his famous battle with Jack Dempsy before the California Athletic Club, in August, 1888. The fight had gone 31 rounds and Dempsy, who had defeated La Blanche before in 13 rounds seemed to be more than holding his

When the 23d round was started there was still Dempsy money to be had. Like a flash La Blanche wheeled around and caught poor old Jack a terrific wallop on the side of the jaw that knocked him into dreamland for several minutes.

From that day on until it was barred the pivot blow was made much use of by the leading pugs.




