the Texas and Pacific, W. C. Barnes, general immigration agent of the Gould lines, and J. G. Branch, a banker of Gladsbrook, Iowa, have returned and were in Fort Worth Friday evening. From the time we left the train at Loraine until the return today our course lay through all of the counties in the group named, and
