CROSS PLAINS — Freddy Greenway, of Baird FFA, exhibited a 1,270 pound heavyweight Charolais steer, which the judge described as "being as big as a mountain," as Grand Champion of the annual Callahan County Junior Livestock Show held Saturday. Judge Peyton Scott of Rising Star told the large crowd he had chosen the big Charolais because he felt it would yield more beef. The steer had earlier been named best heavyweight Charolais and

Champion of that division. This was Freddy's second year to feed steers, he fed two last year and has two steers this year. His calf was bred by V&J Ranch of Abilene City. This is the 4th year that calves have been bought and fed from this ranch. It is also the first time a Charolais-cross has won the Callahan County Show.

Jim Hatchett showed a Reserve Champion Charolais-cross at the show. It was his second year to feed steers, and his calf was purchased from Walsh Ranch at Fort Worth.

Greenway is showing his steer at the Abilene Show this week, and both boys will take their calves to Ft. Worth, Jan. 31 and will possibly show them in Houston.

Andy Vestal, Baird FFA, exhibited the Champion Brahma. This is his 4th year to have the Champion Brahma at the County Show. His calf was bred by Heep Ranch at Buda, and he plans to show in Fort Worth

and Houston. Tom Windham of Baird had the Reserve Champion Brahma, his first year to show Brahmas. Burleson Announces For Re-Election

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Congressman Omar Burleson, who represents the 17th District of Texas in the U. S. House of Representatives, has announced for re-election.

He has filed for a place on the ballot in the Democratic Primary Election on May 2, 1970.

Burleson was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House.

MEASLE IMMUNIZATION CLINICS COMPLETE FOR CO. SCHOOLS

BAIRD — The five schools of Callahan County have completed schedules for immunization clinics to "rub out" Rubella or German measles.

County Health authorities and the officials of each school are urging parents to have their children, ages 1 through 10 immunized against this disease. German measles is usually a very mild disease, but the danger is when an expectant mother contracts the disease during the early months of pregnancy, and the child could be born with a birth defect, such as a severe loss of hearing or vision, heart abnormalities, or mental retardation. Children are the most common source of the virus infection in the community and the pregnant mother is exposed to the disease.

Rubella measles vaccine has only been available to the public since last June, and the vaccine should not be confused with the vaccine that is given for the Red or seven-day measles, which has been given for several years.

A history of German measles is usually not reliable enough to exclude children from immunization. There is no reac-

tion to the vaccine and is probably effective for life.

The vaccine will be given free of charge to all children, ages 5 through 10. There will be a charge of approximately \$2.25 for ages 1 through 4, but parents of this age group are urged to bring this age to be immunized regardless of their ability to pay. Organizations in each community will help with the expense.

Eula Youth Named Outstanding Farmer By Abilene Jaycees

ABILENE — A Callahan County Young Farmer who believes in the farming industry was named Outstanding Young Farmer by Abilene Jaycees during their noon luncheon Monday.

Winford Gardner, 32, of Eula, expressed his belief that anyone who really wants to farm, can do it. He graduated from Eula High School in 1956; he quit a job that was paying \$800 a month with a furnished house and other benefits to put his beliefs to work.

Today, he leases land, and owns some land of his own, runs cattle, raises turkeys, and also has a hog production unit. The selection was made on

YEARS REPORT OF VETERANS ADMINISTRATION OPERATIONS

Administrator of Veteran Affairs Donald E. Johnson said today that a year-round report of the Veterans Administration operations for 1969 reflects growth and increased activities in a majority of its programs.

These trends were particularly evident in the agency's educational program, and that a record number of 783,000 veterans, servicemen's sons, daughters, wives and widows are in training programs of all types. This is an increase of 35 per cent over last year.

Most of these trainees, 736,000 are veterans and servicemen training under the current GI Bill.

A total of 1,650,000 persons have trained under this third generation of GI Bills since it went into effect June 1, 1966. Direct effect in VA education allowances amounted to \$720 million in 1969.

Mr. Johnson said the report also reflects VA's intensified orientation and counseling efforts to encourage more veterans and servicemen to apply for government benefits.

VA's insurance service did enough business in 1969 to maintain its position as the 3rd largest organization of its type in the United States. It administered government insurance programs totaling more than 5.6 million policies, with coverage valued at more than \$38 billion.

In addition, VA supervised the government - industry Servicemen's Group Life Insurance program with 3.78 million members under the group policy with a total face value of \$37.7 billion.

Beneficiaries in all of these programs received about \$980 million during 1969.

Mr. Johnson said another highlight of the VA's year-end was the nearly one-quarter million home loans the agency guaranteed for veterans in 1969. He explained that 80 per cent of these loans went to veterans who served after Jan. 31, 1955, and that the loans were provided despite a general shortage of mortgage funds in many areas of the country.

The VA's construction obligations during the year amounted to about \$100 million. This includes a contract awarded for the modernization of the VA Hospital in Dallas.

Treatment in VA Hospitals rose 18,000, to 776,000 veterans during 1969. The increase was partly the result of the improved techniques and facilities which made shorter hospital stays possible, permitting a larger number of veterans to be treated.

The population of America's living veterans rose during the year from 26,700,000 to estimated 27,300,000 as of December 31, 1969.

The projected population of Vietnam Era veterans as of December 31, 1969 is approximately 3,700,000, compared to about 2,800,000 a year ago.

Veterans and servicemen with GI life insurance policies issued during World War I and World War II periods will receive some \$264 million in dividends in 1970.

Administrator Johnson is approving the dividends, and said 1970 payments will be \$28 million more than last year. The payment will go to holders of Government Life Insurance and National Service Life Insurance. The VA chief said the increase in dividends was made possible because of larger interest earnings in the two funds, and the payments will be made through 1970 on the anniversary dates of the policies.

Mr. Johnson explained that since the dividends on each policy depends of the plan of insurance, age of the insured, age of the policy, and its face value, individual payments will range from a few dollars to hundreds of dollars.

He stresses that since the cash payments will be automatic, there is no need to write to the VA to receive them. The only exception is where the serviceman or veteran has indicated to the VA another disposition of his dividends.

It was also pointed out that dividends will not be paid on policies terminated by death, or surrendered, since these dividends are ordinarily paid at the time.

Veterans, together with their dependents or survivors, make up almost half of your country's population. This is a sizeable group of citizens who at one time or another require the services of a competent counselor of veteran's affairs to assist them in filing a claim, or advise them on a particular phase of the veterans benefit program.

In a communication to Mr. C. O. Fleming, County Service Officer, Mr. Johnson said:

"Your counseling efforts were responsible for bringing approximately \$355,017.00 into your county during the past year. This financial return would certainly be an indication that the assistance you provide our veterans is worthwhile and commendable.

"The service rendered by your office is appreciated, and we are indebted to you for your sincere cooperation and assistance."

Public Notice

An Ordinance Fixing And Determining The General Service Rate To Be Charged For Sales Of Natural Gas To Residential And Commercial Consumers Within The City Limits Of Baird, Callahan County, Texas, And Providing For The Manner In Which Such Rate May Be Changed, Adjusted And Amended and Declaring An Emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAIRD:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered after the final approval of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Baird by Lofie Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.867 Gross; \$1.68 Net.
 All Over 1,000 cu. ft. @ \$1.0433 per Mcf Gross; \$.939 per Mcf Net.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential or commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, the Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. The fact that there is an imperative public need for an ordinance fixing and determining the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency, and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the Mayor.
