Davy Crockett's Nephew To The Telegram.

To answer the questions of many who are asking who Texas Josh is, I will say that I am C. I. C. Crockett, nephew of the famous David Crockett. My father, Jacob Ira Crockett, was one of the soldiers who helped make the United States government trail across the territories. He served in the Mexican war and also carried the mail between Fort Leavenworth, Kan., and Fort Carney, 300 miles.

Five weeks ago I was robbed and left for dead by four men at Ross Crossing, fifteen miles from Bowie, Texas, and am just recovering from the effects of my injuries. The newspapers reported the robbery at the C. I. C. CROCKETT. Hastings, Okla.

Cost of Water To The Telegram.

I notice an article in a recent number of your paper relative to a cheap water rate, so-called, that prevails in the city of North Fort Worth. 80c per month, or \$2.40 per quarter is cheap, provided the city can afford it. But can it? If the plant was paid for and nothing save operating expenses were to be considered the reasoning would be plausible and possibly practicable.

The plant is in its infancy-in its experimental stage. There has not been a single monthly or quarterly report rendered since it started giving a detailed statement of operating expenses or revenue derived, and hence I claim the article in question is misleading, in that it leaves the erroneous impression upon the tax payer and the public at large that the plant is out of debt and that enough revenue is derived from the low charges, not only to pay

expenses, but to leave a snug sum to the city's credit also. To correct this impression and to lo

It before the people become educated to believe that the city can afford it 's the sole reason that prompts me to write this article. It is much easler and far more satisfactory to lower a rate than it is to raise it.

Should the rate be raised? Later on something will have to be done, or else the water works will more than likely become a burden to the proud, energetic, struggling city. Why do I say so? I am going to give a few figures carefully compiled from the data at hand, and then the public can draw

ardized; for it would be to the last degree foolish to secure here and there a small benefit at the cost of general business depression. But whenever a given rate of schedule becomes evidently disadvantageous to the nation, because of the changes which go on from year to year in our conditions, and where it is feasible to change this rate or schedule without too much dislocation of the system, it will be done; while a general revision of the rates and schedules will be undertaken whenever it shall appear to the sober business sense of our people that on the whole the benefits to be derived from making such changes will outweigh the disadvantages; that is, when the revision will do more good than harm.

"Let me add one word of caution, however. The question of revising the tariff stands wholly apart from the question of dealing with the so-called trusts-that is, with the control of monopolies and with the supervision of great wealth in business, especially in corporate form. The only way in which it is possible to deal with those trusts and monopolies and this great corporate wealth is by action along the lines of the laws enacted by the present congress and its immediate predecessors. The cry that the problem can be met by any changes in the tariff represents, whether consciously or unconsciously, an effort to divert public at-





FALL OUTLOOK FOR CATTLE

The cattlemen of Texas and the southwest are taking a very optimistic view of the fall and winter outlook. Several of the leading ranchmen of the state have been in Fort Worth during the past few days, and they all have the same cheering report of fat cattle and excellent range conditions. They say there is but one thing that spoils the generally roseate view end that is the low prices at all the leading markets. These low prices are having a tendency to prevent marketing the stuff that is now in fine shape to go out, there being such an abundance of grass that the owners feel it is better to hold them back and let them acquire more tallow. The stuff that is now being marketed in considerable quantities is in many instances pushed out by maturing obligations which the ranchmen are compelled to meet. Otherwise, there would be but little stuff going to market now when prices are generally so unsatisfactory.

A leading ranchman of the west Texas country spent several days here this week, and in discussing the general situation remarked that in all the long years of his experience in the cattle business he had never seen the range better or cattle in finer condition. He says the cattle are so fat that they are starving all the ticks in the country. His theory is that the ticks are compelled to have so much blood on which to exist, and the cattle now have so much tallow immediately under their hides that the ticks are unable to reach the blood supply and are slowly but surely starving to death. He says his section, which has heretofore been regarded as something of a tick center, is now shorter in its supply of that article than ever before within his recollection, and he believes another year like the present would virtually put the ticks out of business.

The outlook for the feeder trade is considered very good. It will be several weeks yet before this branch of the business will open up in good and proper shape, but the men who usually feed heavily in the state are already beginning to stir around and make some very cautious investigations. Texas has made a big feed crop this year and there is a world of roughness in the state that will have to be fed to be properly handled. The indications are that a great many cattle will be fed in the state this fall and winter. Last year the

is a pretty bold declaration to be made in the face of rending dissatisfaction with the tariff measure, and while it may have the effect of holding the big manufacturing interests in line, it will certainly have the opposite effect on the consumer. There are millions of people in the United States who believe in the principles of free trade, and there are millions more who stand for reciprocity and liberal tariff revision. The great trouble with the republican party is that it is so thoroughly committed to the principle of protection that its campaign promises of tariff revision are not received with much credence by the masses. RAILWAYS AGAINST NEPOTISM

Gradually it is dawning upon the heads of all the great business institutions of the country that the practice of nepotism is responsible for the filling of many responsible positions by incompetents, and there is a general disposition to call a halt in the procedure. The railways of the country are taking an interest in the matter, and are giving orders that nepotism must stop. Vice President and General Manager Leroy Trice of the International and Great Northern is the latest railway manager to put his foot down officially on nepotism.

A general order has been promulgated by Manager Trice, which is now in effect, prohibiting the employment of any relative by blood or marriage by the head of any department of the system. The order, however, will not prevent the relatives of the head of one department from being employed by heads of other departments where no relationship exists. It has the effect of placing each applicant for position in a situation where merit counts.

The new order has already resulted in a number of transfers. The clause allowing the retention of the relatives of heads of one department in some other department was adopted in order that some of the more efficient of the employes hampered by the relationship might continue in the service.
