BAILEY IS DEFIANT AT ACCUSATIONS OF GRAFT

Senator Prepares to Meet the Charges in Enemies Camp

COLQUITT BLAMED

Effort Made to Lay Entire Affair to Both Commissioner's and Hearst's Ambition

ALLAS, Texas, Sept. 25.—United States Senator Bailey arrived in Dallas this morning from Fort Worth, where he had spent the night. He arrived in the city shortly before 10 o'clock and registered at the Oriental hotel.

The junior senator was assigned to rooms on the parlor floor, the suite occupied by Railroad Commissioner O. R. Colquitt during the democratic campaign. One of the first to greet Senator Bailey on his arrival here was Jot Gunter of San Antonio, one of his oldest political and personal friends.

Gunter Meets Bailey

Mr. Bailey and Mr. Gunter were together when a reporter was ushered into the room. Early during the morning Senator Bailey could not say when his statement would be ready, but stated that it might be ready for the press noon.

Revises Statement

A stenographer was busy in an adjoining room, typewriting the senator's statement which was being revised. Politicians, both amateurs and professionals, were much interested in Senator Bailey's statement this morning. It was the most talked of matter on the streets, and everywhere the question was asked:

"Has Bailey given out his statement?"

Friends or admirers began to gather in the lobby of the Oriental as soon as it was generally learned on the streets that the junior senator had arrived in Dallas.

GAINESVILLE, Texas, Sept. 25.—After receiving information from all over the state that his connection with the Standard and Waters-Pierce Oil companies, some of his personal friends called a meeting last night to endorse Senator Bailey's position. It is said here he made his campaign for governor against corruption in office, and that is the reason why he opposed Bailey.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—Ola Benga, the African pygmy, who has been exhibited at the New York zoological gardens for some time past, tried to kill a keeper yesterday with a knife. He fought furiously before he was disarmed. Benga's anger was excited by the keeper, in a spirit of fun, turning the hose on him.

Benga has been exhibited in the monkey cage. He has attracted wide attention because of the protests of several negro societies against the exhibition.

Hill Street Barn Burns

DEAD IN RUINS

Fifty persons were in the place at the time of the shake, only seven of whom have been accounted for. Mrs. Murray, the landlady, has never been seen nor heard from and it is thought that her body is among those found.

JEROME AND HEARST CLASH

New York Democracy Undecided on Man For Governor

FIVE CANDIDATES

Frank S. Black Seeks the Republican Nomination for Executive By Convention

By Associated Press.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 25.—The action of the Democratic committee in referring all contests to the convention meets with general approval and will facilitate the work before the state Democratic convention, which will begin at noon in what was formerly the armory and which has a seating capacity of about 4,000.

At noon State Chairman Cord Meyer will introduce Temporary Chairman Lewis Nixon of New York, former leader of Tammany Hall. Mr. Nixon is expected to speak briefly and then the convention will take up the work of naming the different committees.

May Delay Nomination

Permanent organization of the committee will be reached until Wednesday. There is apparently a disposition to put over the serious work of the convention until tomorrow, when it is planned to adopt the platform and name the candidates for governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state comptroller, attorney general, state treasurer and state engineer and surveyor. Three of the leading candidates for governor, W. R. Hearst, W. T. Jerome and William Sulzer, are from New York county, a fourth, Justice W. J. Gaynor, is from King's county, and a fifth, J. H. Adam, is mayor of this city. Others are talked of in various counties, which is regarded not improbable.

Republicans in Same Boat

SARATOGA, N. Y., Sept. 25.—There has been no crystallization of sentiment in favor of any one candidate for the Republican nomination for governor of New York as to make it possible to predict with accuracy the choice that will be made by the Republican state convention, which will be called to order at noon today.

Ex-Governor Frank S. Black has developed some strength but he is quoted as saying he will be a candidate only on unannounced demand of the delegates from New York county, with 159 votes, is alleged to be opposed to him and for Charles E. Hughes, the insurance investigator.

Lieutenant Governor M. Linn Bruce's friends are hopeful that he will be chosen, particularly as he has some friends in the New York county delegation and as Mr. Hughes' up-state strength is said to be not great. There is some talk of Secretary of State Elihu Root and Judge Hitchcock, but it cannot be said to have taken a definite form in favor of either of the men named.

TRAFFIC TIED UP

Chinese Passenger Boats Refuse to Pay Fee

HONG KONG, Sept. 25.—Advices from Canton report that owing to the customs service imposing a fee on native passenger boats which the latter refuse to pay, in consequence of which the clearance papers are being refused them, traffic is seriously disorganized.

The boat owners have circulated circulars among the floating fraternity, threatening to strike unless it is rescinded. All boats arriving yesterday and today are laying up and some of them are putting back. The outlook is very disquieting.

Indorse Bryan

HONOLULU, Sept. 25.—The democratic territorial convention in its platform declares William J. Bryan the acknowledged leader of the party. After expressing approval of the Roosevelt administration the home rulers indorsed George R. Carter, the present incumbent, for governor.

MADE WILL AT 102

Aged Woman After Frugal Life Leaves \$100,000

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—In the surrogate's court at White Plains yesterday the will of Mrs. Levina Lovett, drawn after she had passed the age of 102, was offered for probate. Mrs. Lovett, who led a life of great frugality, left an estate valued at \$100,000, consisting of mortgages and ten bank accounts. Her husband was the village blacksmith of Tarrytown.

BIG OCTOPUS KILLED


Monster Sea Animal Fought Eight Hours for Life

THE BOMB AT STOLYPIN'S VILLA

For daring recklessness the attempt on the life of the Russian premier, M. Stolypin, has few parallels, even in Russia. M. Stolypin was holding a reception in his summer residence in Apothecary Island, a wooden building. The guests had assembled, when there arrived four men, to all appearances ordinary visitors. But as the list of intending visitors had been closed, the servants would not allow them to enter. They thereupon attempted to force an entry into a room adjoining that in which the guests were assembled. In the struggle one of the men let fall a bomb, which exploded with terrible force. Thirty people were killed and about thirty injured. M. Stolypin escaped unhurt, but his daughter and little son were both badly injured. Among the killed were a prince, a general, a colonel, a captain and two court officials. Of the four terrorists three were killed and the fourth was arrested.

FIGHT NEW RUSS. TERROR

Fear of Violent Death Fatal to Russian Leaders

BOMB NOT NEEDED

Many Are Dying Thru Dread While Others Flee the Land of Horrors

By Associated Press.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—A dispatch to the Times from Paris states in a letter from St. Petersburg, that Professor Alexandre Ular, who is regarded in Paris as the mouthpiece of Count Witte, says that many of the highest Russian functionaries are dying from fright or are on the point of escaping from the country. In their case bombs and knives are no longer necessary.

Professor Ular says that General Skalon, governor general of Poland, with the drums of both his ears destroyed by the explosion of a bomb, is in a state of imbecile collapse and probably will be succeeded by General Renkmpf.

Admiral Dubassoff, author of the Horrors at Moscow, whose leg was blown off, is in receipt of a present of 1,000,000 roubles (\$50,000) from the czar in compensation, but his depressive zeal is at an end, and he has decided to spend the rest of his life in foreign waters.

Ex-Minister of the Interior Durnovo took refuge in Paris, but was practically expelled by M. Clemenceau, for trying to organize a Russian police system here.

His whereabouts are absolutely unknown.

RETURNS TO FACE CHARGE

Stensland Breaks Down on Meeting Son

SAYS HE'S SORRY

Admits Thefts, But Blames the Cashier for Forgeries. Will Plead Guilty

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—Paul O. Stensland of Chicago, bank embezzler, who arrived from Tangier today on the steamer Prinz Adalbert, was brought to this city at 6 o'clock last night from quarantine and locked up at police headquarters. He will be taken to Chicago today.

Harry Olsen, assistant state attorney of Illinois, who accompanied Stensland, stated that the prisoner had made a confession to him while en route from Tangier.

Theodore Stensland, the banker's son, immediately afterward issued a statement, in which he said that his father would plead guilty to certain of the indictments charging violation of the Illinois state banking laws after he had examined the indictments. He would not plead guilty to forgery, but would reveal everything leading up to the wrecking of the Milwaukee Avenue State bank and in so doing would implicate his father.

WOULD KILL JACOB SCHIFF

Infernal Machine Intercepted in Mails

SECOND ATTEMPT

Financier Has No Knowledge of Anarchists Reason For Seeking His Life

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—Jacob Schiff, of the firm of Kuhn, Loeb & Co., was informed last night at his country home that secret service men in Philadelphia had seized in that city, wrapped in paper and addressed to him in New York, an infernal machine. Mr. Schiff said that he suspected no one and could not think for what reason any person would wish to take his life.

"This is the second infernal machine that has been addressed to me," he said. "I cannot understand it at all. What possible reason could anyone wish to assassinate me have? I have done no harm to anyone that I know of."

Second Attempt

A previous attempt upon Mr. Schiff's life was made on Aug. 13, of last year, when a combustible packed in inflammable cotton and filled with gunpowder was sent to his New York office. A clerk who regarded the package as suspicious, soaked it in water before opening it. No clue to the send of the bomb was ever discovered.

GUARD THEATER LOSS

Insurance Company to Protect Actors and Public When Play Postponed

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—Plans were discussed yesterday for the formation of an insurance company to protect against loss when postponements are made in big theatrical productions. It will be the object of the Actors' Liability Company, as the concern will be called, to protect actors, managers and the public, and eventually to insure managers, actors and authors against the failure of plays. The company will insure the public in such a way that they can be absolutely assured when they buy a theater ticket that they will either see the performance on the night for which the ticket is purchased or receive twice the amount of the purchase.

MANY STEAMERS ARRIVE

Customs Inspectors Kept Busy at Port of New York

250 NEGROES ARRESTED TROOPS HEM IN BLACKS

PLAY FORBIDDEN

Two Killed in Desperate Battle With Police

BLACKS ARMING

Any Attempting to Break Thru Lines Are Promptly Shot and Killed

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 25.—In a desperate battle at close range between Bicycle Officers T. C. Smith, G. A. Moxley and a Policeman Cason and two dangerous negroes, barricaded in a house near the corner of McGruder and Randolph streets at 6 o'clock this morning, the two dangerous negroes were killed and the police officers had narrow escapes from death. During the fight the officers were exposed to open view of their assailants and bullets rained over the heads of the policemen who were unable to find shelter on account of being in the thickest part of the negro settlement.

Trap Laid to Murder

Officers Maddox and Smith had been notified that negroes were shooting in the vicinity of Houston and Randolph streets early Tuesday morning. When they reached the scene there was no shooting, but they were told that the difficulty was in the vicinity of Randolph and McGruder streets. Whether this was a trap laid to kill the officers is not known, but negroes who were where the house was in which the negro who had done the shooting had taken refuge. The officers went to the house, Officer Moxley and Officer Cason reached the rear door of the house but attempted to enter and the negro began shooting at him.

Fire on Officers

Officer Smith immediately cried for Policeman Maddox, who ran around the house to his partner's assistance. As he did so he saw two negroes leaning out of a window firing at the officers ten feet away. The officers returned the fire and the negroes dropped below the window. Officer Cason had come up in the meantime and had discharged the house. Officer Maddox ran to the window and pulled himself up, gun in hand. A pistol blazed to the left of his head. The first bullet dropped to the ground, pulling the window down with him.

Both Negroes Killed

He then ran to the door and broke it open, his brother officers running with him. As he opened the door a gun was thrust into his face, and the bullet passed over his head. He and the other officers then fired, killing the two negroes who had done the shooting. This was reported quiet in this section Monday.

250 Negroes Arrested

By Associated Press. ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 25.—The Constitution in an extra edition this morning says:

"One negro was killed in Brownville by the militia this morning while trying to break through the lines. Two hundred and fifty-seven negroes have already been placed under arrest in Brownville. The negroes were heavily armed. One other negro tried to get away and was shot. The raid started shortly after 5 o'clock. The negroes were taken to the barracks and every one found armed was placed in cars to be sent to police barracks."

Blacks Hemmed In

One of the first arrests was L. J. Price, a negro postmaster, charged with supplying ammunition to the blacks. The negroes who tried to break through the lines were fired upon halting promptly. Captain Wilson held a conference with President Gammon of the seminary on the situation. The negroes are hemmed in by the militia members of the Governor's Guard and mounted county police anxious to avenge the massacre of Officer Wood and the wounding of other police, which occurred last night when the negroes fired from ambush on the officers. The negroes are badly frightened.

Condemn Mob Violence

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 25.—At a meeting of the National Negro Baptist Preachers' Union from Washington and vicinity, resolutions were adopted condemning mob violence by the whites against negroes and assaults of white women by negroes. The "dual crimes in Atlanta, which are a disgrace to our Christian nation," and calling on all negroes in this vicinity to assemble in their church Sunday, Oct. 7, and offer prayer for a peaceful solution of the race problem.

Another Negro Outrage

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 25.—A special to the News from Mobile says excitement runs high at Okladale, a suburb of Mobile, as a result of a desperate attempt at criminal assault by a negro upon Mrs. J. Touchton, a well known resident of that place. For two hours the woman fought desperately with the negro brute, preventing his evil designs after fighting him all over the room and even after he almost throttled her. If the negro is

GOULD RAILROAD SCHEME GIGANTIC Includes Plan For Line From Pacific Coast to Gulf

A report from Mineral Wells is to the effect that the survey work on the Weatherford, Mineral Wells and Northwestern extension is done and that a party is now cross-sectioning the proposed line with the view of beginning construction at an early date.

The great work the Gould lines have under way, which gives a trans-continental line under direct Gould control from Baltimore to the Pacific at San Francisco, has been reported and the progress being made in the difficult Rocky mountain construction is remarkable.

By some shrewd management the Goulds acquired a line from Salt Lake, Utah, westward to San Francisco, and also the right of way with all or the greater part easier grades a more direct line and one less subject to snow blockades in the winter as some of the other trans-continental lines.

**CUMMINS OPENS IOWA CAMPAIGN**  
Republican Gubernatorial Candidate Fires First Gun

Special to The Telegram.  
CHURDAN, Iowa, Sept. 25.—Governor Cummins last night opened the republican state campaign here, speaking to a large audience of 1,500 business men and farmers. His address was devoted largely to setting right his attitude toward tariff.  
The governor said in part:  
"The individuals who compose corporations have precisely the same rights that all citizens have in public affairs and they ought to exercise them with the same freedom and independence that characterizes the unincorporated part of the community. But, as such, should be rigorously excluded from politics; that such associated influence is so harmful an influence as I could have my way, not one dollar from the treasury of a corporation would ever be contributed to the treasury of a political committee."  
"The principle that the government of the United States and that the government of Iowa should be conducted by its men, and not by its corporations, is dearer to the hearts of the people than any article of partisan faith."  
"I retract nothing that I have said with regard to the tariff. My views are unchanging. I have never favored, and for reducing certain duties as experienced during the last nine years and shown to be excessive."  
"My contention has always been that the revision of the schedules must be harmonious with the public interest, protective policy; that our duties that are too high should be lowered, but not so as to impair the efficiency as protective duties. Duties should always be high enough to give the home producer his home market with a reasonable profit, but they should never be high enough to enable the domestic producer to exact an unfair profit from the domestic consumer. The protection I have worked for and shall continue to work is therefore a republican modification."

**NEGR0 MUST DIE**  
Jess Jones Found Guilty of Killing Waco Citizen

WACO, Texas, Sept. 25.—In the case of the negro, Jesse Jones, alias Jesse Washington, the jury last night returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree and assessed the penalty at death.

The weather bureau announced that the tropical disturbance has passed the Gulf of Mexico from the Yucatan channel. Its appearance in the Gulf coast waters has not been felt at yet, except on the South Florida coast, where high southerly winds are blowing.  
Storm warnings are displayed on the South-Florida peninsula, and messages have been sent by the weather bureau to all Gulf ports.

### SKATING RINK'S ROOF FALLS IN

**\$1,500 Damage to Amusement Resort at Third and Rusk**

**NEIGHBORHOOD AROUSED**

**9,000 Square Feet Cave in With Terrific Crash—Two Boys Have Narrow Escape from Injury**

The roof of the Fort Worth skating rink, situated at the corner of Rusk and Third streets, came down with a terrific crash loud enough to awaken the soundest sleepers from their early morning dreams at 5 o'clock Tuesday morning. The section of roofing that so suddenly fell to the floor measured about 90x100 feet, representing the old dimensions of the rink prior to the recent improvements.

The damage to the rink is estimated by R. C. Armstrong, president of the Fort Worth Rink company, at \$1,400 to \$1,500.

The cause of the wreckage is attributed to the falling of one of the main trusses, which, it seems, were not supported by the roof, by these rods, according to statement of Mr. Armstrong this morning, had not been erected by the contractor, and despite the fact that the architects had not accepted the job, the contractors pronounced their work completed, and the rink had been in service, morning, afternoon and night, since Sept. 1.

A few days ago a slight sinking of the roof was noticed and the repairs were made immediately. Again last night when the rain began to gather upon the roof over the west half of the rink, a slight caving was observed by one of the employees. However, the exceedingly large number of patrons continued to skate until about midnight and when all had left the pleasure resort, except two employees, the building seemed in good, sound condition.

**Boys' Narrow Escape**

Two boys, Jimmie Spears and Turner Burnett, happened to be working at the rink through the night, going over the floor, preparing it for the morning. At an early hour in the morning the two boys "bunked" for a sleep squarely in the middle of the old section of the rink.

Jimmie Spears, a lad of about 16 years, said to a Telegram reporter this morning: "I had just finished going over the floor and had gone to sleep in the middle of the rink with my companion, Turner Burnett. About 4:30 o'clock I was wakened—I don't know why, because I always sleep soundly, and noticed that one of the main posts of the rink had been weakened. Burnett, called his attention to the condition of the post and floor, whereupon we heard the roof slipping, and, except for the noise, we thought the falling of the roof. The roof slipped for about fifteen minutes before it fell, so that we had ample time to save ourselves."

The fact that the roof began sinking last night, thus holding the rain that is in the air, is probably the best explanation of the wreckage, which would not have happened, experts say, had the truss rods been put in place.

**Noise Was Unearthly**

At an early hour this morning and continuing until noon large crowds gathered to view the wreckage. The west section of the building presents the most interesting feature, in that the floor is not damaged. The whole of the new section and the rest of the rink remains solidly intact, and it is believed that the noise that immediately raised and all necessary repairs completed within a very few days.

People living in the neighborhood in which the rink is located, state that the noise of the falling roof was a most unearthly one and that they could not see the falling of the roof, but had thought the building in which he was sleeping was falling and for a few minutes was in a frightful quandary.

**A \$15,000 Rink**

Just recently a new section, measuring about 90x60 feet, had been added to the rink, and the floor, being connected and raised, so that the actual skating surface had been increased to 13,775 square feet. All of the piers, which had been removed and the trusses put in their stead, but the rods had not been placed. The recent improvements made the investment in the rink aggregate \$15,000, and it was one of the finest and largest in the whole southwest. The seating capacity of the rink is two thousand and one thousand skaters can find ample room on the floor at a time.

**Will Repair Immediately**

R. C. Armstrong, head of the skating company, said: "We shall begin repairs immediately, and in a few days will have everything in readiness, determined to give the public the best rink money can buy. It is our earnest purpose to have the rink ready for our patrons by Saturday night. I don't think the floor is one whit damaged, but if it is, we shall immediately put down a new one. The time now money shall be spared in thoroughly equipping the hall. The building will be thoroughly overhauled and examined, and work will be begun at once."

The principal owners of the Fort Worth rink are R. C. Armstrong, president; Will Edrington, vice president; John Bondurant, manager; R. Tascor Camp.
