### STATE NORMAL PRESIDENT DEAD

#### J. S. Kendall Dies Suddenly at Denton

DENTON, Texas, Oct. 2.—President J. S. Kendall of the North Texas State Normal died yesterday morning from a hemorrhage, having been taken ill about 2:30. While Mr. Kendall had been in bad health for some time, his death came altogether unexpectedly. He had worked as usual in the college and had not specially complained until the attack came on.  
President Kendall had been in charge of the North Texas State Normal since it was created, and was probably the best known school man in Texas.

### GROUND TO PIECES

BELLEVILLE, Texas, Oct. 2.—William Vossiwinkel, a prominent farmer of the Center Hill community, living about two miles north of Belleville, lost his life Saturday night in a horrible manner.  
He returned from industry as far as Beeville with a friend, riding in his buggy, and from here he started for home on foot. He was struck by a train and mangled and literally ground him to pieces. He was identified by papers found near the body. No blame is attached to the engineer in charge of the train, as he had no knowledge of the pending arrival of Sheriff Palm, who arrested him. He gave bond for his appearance. An inquest was held during the night and about 4 a. m. his body was taken to his late home.

The motion will be a formal one, as the agreement had been reached between Attorney General Rogers and attorneys for the Hammond Packing Company that a test shall be made of the clause in the anti-trust law which permits this to be done.

The oldest child, Annie Faro, aged 9, was struck by the horse's hoof, fracturing her skull. She has never regained consciousness. Little hope is entertained for her recovery. The younger child escaped with slight injury. The buggy was demolished.

### CRANE RECEIVES CONGRATULATIONS

#### Dallas Man Who Met Bailey Well Satisfied

DALLAS, Texas, Oct. 2.—Martin M. Crane, who crossed lanes with Senator Bailey in debate at Houston Saturday night, reached home Sunday evening via the Houston and Texas Central. He said he had no comments to make.

### TO ABANDON ROAD

#### Rock Island Will Not Cross Cimarron at Scene of Wreck

*Special to The Telegram.*  
OKLAHOMA CITY, O. T., Oct. 2.—The injunction against the Rock Island running trains over the Wamsley trestle erected across the Cimarron river between Kingfisher and Dover, where the terrible wreck occurred on Sept. 18, which has been made permanent by Judge C. F. Irwin, will probably result in the abandonment of about forty miles of Rock Island track between Ringwood and Watonga. Different branches of the Rock Island cross the Cimarron river three times in close proximity, and to construct bridges necessary to withstand the treacherous Cimarron river would require the outlay of many thousands of dollars. The announcement has been given out that the company will extend the line from Ringwood in Wood county, to a connection with the Santa Fe at Woodward and on to Amarillo, Texas, there to connect with the main line of the Rock Island. This branch of the road will start from Ringwood and run to Orienta, where both the Rock Island and Mexico and Orienta bridges crossing the Cimarron. The Rock Island already has a line running north from Watonga to Orienta, which practically parallels the line from Watonga to Ringwood. The latter line will be abandoned, thus involving the towns of Walthall, Isabella and Hitchcock off the railroad.  
In the injunction just made permanent by Judge Irwin the Rock Island is required to maintain flagmen at the Cimarron where the wreck occurred, and a new steel bridge must be in process of construction by the 5th of November. In most instances the injunction permanent severely criticized the Rock Island and said it was common knowledge that the company is very careless in regard to the safety of the traveling public.
