

MEXICO HUMBLING AND U. S. VESSELS NOW SAFE

Warships Will Not Further Molest Gulf Fishermen DISPUTE IS SETTLED Public Claims Nets on Deck Proof of Intention to Violate Law

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—The state department has been informed that the Mexican government has given instructions to gunboats and revenue cutters which it employed to break up fishing by American smacks in the territorial waters of Mexico, to refrain from any unnecessary interference with vessels outside the three-mile limit and to be as lenient as possible in other respects.

Another matter at issue is the assumption by the Mexican government of the fact that a fishing smack in the neighborhood of the boundary line, her nets and fishing gear on the deck are not subject to these revenue laws. There will be some further exchanges before this point is settled.

Satisfactory Result Seen

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Prospects are said to be favorable for an early and satisfactory adjustment of the fishing dispute.

PRICES GO DOWN Bank of England Discount Affects American Stock Market

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Speculation has almost a standstill in the stock market until the unexpected advance in the Bank of England discount rate of Friday of from 5 to 6 per cent. This took speculative interests on both sides of the Atlantic completely by surprise and precipitated some active liquidation in securities under which prices fell with some violence. The heavy demand of Egypt for gold in cotton was the factor in precipitating the action by the English institution.

HERE TO BUY HIDES Representative of German Firm Now in Texas

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Oct. 20.—Muller Zohndor of Saxony, Germany, is here to buy Texas hides, horns and hoofs for different manufacturing enterprises in Europe. He has heretofore been operating in Mexico, but has now come to the United States.

CATTLE FOR FEEDERS Many to be Shipped From Panhandle to Ohio

AMARILLO, Texas, Oct. 20.—The Western Stock Yards Company will this week ship about 1,500 head of Panhandle calves and yearlings to Toledo, Ohio, to be sold at auction to Ohio farmers. These Panhandle feeders are well graded, hardy and free from disease and find a ready market among the discriminating northern buyers. The cattle feeders of the corn belt states are careful buyers and know what kind of cattle to select for their feed lots. They appreciate the fact that well graded calves and yearlings are the most profitable feeders and are for that reason ready to pay satisfactory prices for good looking cattle such as is produced in the Panhandle.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—A London special dispatch published here today, reported that Selby Abbey church was burning and that it was probably doomed.

Bank Declared Insolvent WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 20.—The Aetna Banking Trust Company of Washington and a branch bank bearing the same name in Butte, Mont., today were closed by direction of the comptroller of the currency. An examination is said to show the bank is insolvent.

500 KILLED IN STORMS FURY

Death List in West Indies Increases Alarmingly ENTIRE FLEET LOST Tobacco Crop in Cuba Badly Damaged—United States Steamers Wrecked

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 20.—Conservative estimates now place the number of deaths in Florida and off the coast as the result of Thursday's storm at nearly 500.

ENTIRE FLEET LOST SAN AUGUSTINE, Fla., Oct. 20.—It is reported this morning practically the entire fishing fleet in charge of several scores of men was lost in the storm. The boats were at sea when the gale was struck. Wreckage from some of the boats was picked up.

Tobacco Crop Damaged HAVANA, Oct. 20.—News from the interior of the island continues to come in slowly. The damage done to the tobacco crop in the province of Pinar del Rio is not yet fully known but it is believed to be great.

EL PASO, Texas, Oct. 20.—Lauro Aguirre, publisher of La Reforma, a social Mexican revolutionary paper, and several others were arrested here between midnight and daylight this morning as Mexican revolutionists. One of the most sensational arrests is that of Captain Castro of the Juarez military command, caught at the revolutionary meeting. He voluntarily returned to Mexico with the officers, Pedro Gonzales and Ramon Came are other prisoners. The documents show their connection with the St. Louis Junta and the Junta's other Texas towns.

Walton is a son of the sheriff of Brewster county, who was formerly the sheriff of Bee county. The shooting occurred in the Mexican mining town of Tomoschale, where Walton worked for Colonel W. C. Greene.

EL PASO JUNTA RAIDED BY POLICE Sixteen Mexican Plotters Are Captured

EL PASO, Texas, Oct. 20.—Acting in conjunction with Mexican Consul Malen, the El Paso police last night made a raid on the local junta of the alleged Mexican revolutionists, Pedro Gonzales was the only man arrested here. Simultaneously with the raid on the American side of the line, the police of Juarez raided several well-known quarters in that city where the revolutionists were thought to meet, and fifteen men were arrested. Documents were secured in El Paso showing connection of the local organizations with those of St. Louis, Douglas, Del Rio, Laredo and Eagle Pass. The raid on the Del Rio organization during the early part of the week led to the raid here.

LEPER DIES PICKENS, W. Va., Oct. 20.—George Paschid, the leper, died this morning. Heart failure was the immediate cause. Two fingers and the top of one foot were almost off. It is likely the body will be cremated.

ROOSEVELT AFTER SCALP OF HEARST

President Dissatisfied With Campaign in New York
Special to The Telegram.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—President Roosevelt told a republican caller a day or two ago that he felt sure the managers of the Hughes campaign in New York greatly underestimated the strength of Mr. Hearst. The President also expressed great dissatisfaction with the manner in which the republicans of that state were conducting the campaign.
It may also be stated on unimpeachable authority that it is only with the greatest difficulty that the President is being restrained from entering the New York campaign himself, either with a letter, urging the election of Mr. Hughes, whom he virtually nominated, or even making one or more addresses in behalf of the republican candidate.
The President resents very deeply the charge that he is responsible for many of the radical utterances of Mr. Hearst, or for "Hearstism."
It is charged even by republicans that the frequency with which the President has urged anti-corporation legislation and his more recent declarations favoring the limitation of the amount of wealth a man may be allowed to accumulate and inherit, are in large measure responsible for the movement which threatens to make Mr. Hearst governor of New York and a formidable candidate for the Presidency.
Such suggestions are said to infuriate the President. He told a caller a day or two ago that he realized that if Mr. Hearst were elected the responsibility therefor would be laid at the door of the White House, which would be eminently unjust.
There is no doubt that the conservatives among New York republicans are aghast that the President should be advocating such drastic legislation at the very time Mr. Hearst is making his campaign on such radical lines. It gives color, they say, to the Hearst claim that everything is "wrong."

HOUSTON MAN KILLED
Cousin of Victim Surrenders to Police Murder Charged

HOUSTON, Texas, Oct. 20.—Marshall Tankersley Jr., a well-known young man of this city, was shot dead tonight about 10 o'clock in St. Emanuel street and from the effects of wounds died within a few minutes after arriving at St. Joseph's infirmary.
E. B. Nichols, a cattleman, formerly of Galveston, and a cousin of the dead man, surrendered to the police and the shooting Nichols was charged with murder pending against him. The man was picked up in the street by an ambulance and conveyed to the hospital, where he died. The two shots fired struck young Tankersley in the stomach and passed thru his body. After the shooting Nichols was on Congress avenue, caught a car and came to town to give himself up.

CONDITT CASE GOES TO VICTORIA CO.
DeWitt Will Hear Second Charge Against Negroes

EDNA, Texas, Oct. 20.—Felix Powell and Monk Gibson, charged with the murder of Mildred Lee Conditt and Mrs. Lora Conditt, and Henry Howard, indicted as an accessory to Felix Powell in the murder of Mildred Lee-Conditt, were arraigned before District Judge Wilson in open court and after all preliminary matters were disposed of in due form the court on its own motion transferred the first case against Felix Powell and Monk Gibson to Victoria county and the second case against them to DeWitt county. The cases against Henry Howard, Augusta Diggs and Bether Reed were also transferred to Victoria county. The prisoners will probably be kept here until the Victoria county district court meets in the latter part of November. Judge Wilson has intimated that these cases will be placed at the head of the docket so as to get them disposed of at the earliest possible date. It is intimated by the prosecution that new evidence has been made available which is of considerable value in corroborating other evidence heretofore secured, which strengthens the state's case in some respects. Captain McDonald, who has been here some two weeks working on the matter along the lines heretofore pursued by him, left for West Texas.

PECANS A FAILURE
Light Yield in the Vicinity of Lampasa

LAMPASAS, Texas, Oct. 20.—The pecan crop in this section of Texas is practically a failure this year. Lampasas has the reputation of being one of the best pecan markets in Texas and the best in this part of the state. Last year the nuts were marketed here and shipped to eastern buyers by the car-load, the grade being good, and most of them were of the paper shell variety. This year, however, there are no pecans on the trees, and it will be a very difficult matter to get pecans of any grade.
