## TRAIN MAROONED

Walked Four Miles for Food Through Snow Which Was Knee Deep

The lives of eight babies were saved by whisky on a snowed in passenger train between Childress and Dalhart on the Fort Worth and Denver railroad during the snow storm a few

George Burton of Carrolton, Texas, was a passenger on one of the snowed in trains and passed thru Fort Worth en route home Friday night. He told of his experience and said that he never went thru such a time before

during his whole life. He said: two hours to run 110 miles, and then we stuck fast. There was not much coal aboard and provision of which there was but a short supply, soon rar out, and the passengers actually suffered from hunger until they managed to get thru the snow to a farm house four miles distant, where their

"On this train there were eight babies and no milk to feed them on Their mothers could not nurse then and the poor little fellows were crying for food all the time. A mar aboard the train luckily had a quart bottle of whisky and this was the salvation of the infants. The liquor was diluted with water and sweetened and a cloth teat was saturated with the mixture, and by sucking this teat the children were kept alive until food was procured at the farm house fow miles distant from the railroad.

"I have read in story books about the harrowing experience gone a quarter of a mile further. I am glad that I am alive."


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## LETTERS TELL A SAD TALE

Secret of Grace Brown Is Revealed

SOUL LAID BARE

In Love Missives to the Man Who Is Now Charged With Her Murder

Special to The Telegram. HERKIMER, N. Y., Nov. 24.-Link by link the state has forged a chain of evidence against Gillette, from the time he first met Grace ("Billy") Brown until he is alleged to have left her dead body at the bottom of Big

Moose lake. The love letters laid bare the girl's soul and secret and indicated the purpose of the trip that ended with her death. When the couple reached the Cliff house at Tupper Lake, Gillette's brutal conduct began, according to witnesses. He was ugly toward her and

drove her to tears. Gillette told the bus driver to take them to any hotel where they had boats to let. After the tragedy Gillette was seen hurrying toward Eagle Bay with his suit case in his hand. He asked to be directed to a tailor shop to have his trousers pressed as they had been wet.

The tailor swore that the trousers were wrinkled and damp. But the most startling testimony of all was given by Mrs. Marjorie Carey of East Orange, N. J., who, with her family, was camping on the shore of the Big Moose lake. Her testimony was as follows:

"Where were you about 6 o'clock or

### **AWFUL TRAGEDY** IN CHICAGO

Wife Slays Husband Then Shoots Herself

Special to The Telegram. CHICAGO, Nov. 24 .- The bodies of James F. Delaney and his wife, who was formerly Miss Elizabeth Brown of Wills Point, Texas, were found in their rooms here yesterday. The man lay on the bed, shot thru the back of the head, while the woman was near by, with a bullet thru her mouth into

the brain, and in Mrs. Delaney's hand was clasped a pistol. The tragedy occurred in the apartments occupied by the couple at the home of Mrs. Cyrus Woods, 490 La-Salle avenue. They had been in this city but a few weeks, having come from New York. The body of Delaney was found on the bed with a bullet wound in the back of the head. The body of Mrs. Delaney was lying close by, a bullet having been fired into her brain thru the mouth. A revolver was clutched in the hand of Mrs. Delaney when the room was entered. James S. Delaney is well known among business men in New York, where he had lived for the greater part of his life. In his clothing was found a card bearing the inscription, "J. F. Delaney, Vice President of the American Shipping

Company, 20 Broadway, New York.

His name is also in the Chicago directory as vice president of that con-The only evidence to indicate that Mrs. Delaney killed her husband and then herself is by the location of the wounds and the fact that the revolver was found in the hand of the woman Mrs. Delaney was born in this city and graduated several years ago from the Chicago Dramatic School. She was later engaged by Otis Skinner for "Francesca da Rimini" and afterward played in the "Silver Shield."

Wall of Pumping Station Is Blown Down

Special to The Telegram. BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 24.-At an early hour this morning about seventy-five feet of the remaining wall of the pumping station of the Buffalo water works was blown in by the fierce gale which had prevailed all night. The new pay scale affects seventy corporations, operating ninety-two mills, besides the iron works plants. The Manufacturers' Association's agreement to pay the increase is for a period of six months, but provision

is made for extending it. Between November, 1903, and July, 1904 the Rall River operatives suffered reductions aggregating 221/2 per cent. Last spring a part of the cut was restored, and in view of the continued prosperous business conditions the operatives demanded a complete resumption of the 1903 scale, and it is probable that other cotton mills will follow the lead taken here and that thousands of outside mill hands will ultimately be benefited by the determined stand taken by the Rall River

Vice President Sweeney Returns

Vice President and General Manager Mike Sweeney of the Trinity and Brazos Valley is back from a trip to the southern part of the state and says the condition of freight congestion, more particularly of cotton, is most serious. He was in attendance on the meeting of the Texas General Managers' Association and one of the plans suggested, but not made the formal action of the managers, is that the Galveston Wharf Company waive its rule and receive cotton on flat cars until the rush is relieved. 

#### ATTACKING THE TEXAS LAW

Attorneys representing the Waters-Pierce branch of the Standard Oil Company have made a very unseemly exhibition of themselves at Austin during the past few days in an effort to knock out the proceedings that have been instituted against that corporation for its flagrant violation of the laws of the state. When an outside attorney comes into the state and in the defense of a combination that obtained its present standing in Texas thru fraud and perjury and characterizes the efforts made by the state officials to vindicate the majesty of the outraged law as "scandalous" and "irrelevant," it is time that combination was being brought up with such a jerk as will seat it nicely on its

Judge Priest of St. Louis is the gentleman who seems to have come down to Texas with the idea that it is his peculiar mission and province to revolutionize Texas law. In his argument before the court Judge Priest took up the anti-trust acts of 1899 and 1900. He recited what legal requirements are necessary of a foreign corporation in admitting it to do business in Texas. He said the mere holding of stock in another corporation is not doing business. He asserted that there is not a person in Texas today who can conscientiously say that he has suffered any wrong or injustice at the hands of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company. The anti-trust statute itself makes no definition of a pool, trust agreement or understanding. It is a question of law, predicated upon the facts. He said that should four barbers and four tailors combine to shave people and make their clothes, it would not be any violation of the antitrust acts. He applied this illustration to the Standard Oil Company and the Waters-Pierce company. There sould not be any unlawful combine between these two companies, because It has not been charged in the petition that the Standard Oil Company has ever attempted to do business in Texas since the passage of the 1899 and 1900 anti-trust laws.

"The penalty sued for in this case ls over \$5,000,000," he said. "No man arraigned under the provisions of this statute can know in advance of the charge of the court and the verdict of the jury whether he is guilty or pot guilty. That is an enormity the

terpreting such statutes as this grow, weary and gray-headed?" he asked. Continuing, he reiterated the contention made by Judge Clark that the contract for the transfer of stock of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company to the Standard Oil Company was made outside of the state of Texas and this state has no jurisdiction over the mat-

Perhaps Judge Priest thinks the people of Texas are so ignorant that they feel it necessary to send to St. Louis for a great trust lawyer to come down into the state and expound to them the true principles of justice. His line of argument reads like the effort of a man who cares nothing for right and justice so far as the masses are concerned, but believes that the cormorant corporation must be protected at all hazards. And in the end he is going to find that he has made a fatal blunder.

The Waters-Pierce Oil Company did not enter the state of Texas as a business institution upon the invitation of the people. Detected in its willful and flagrant violation of the law and ousted from the state, its officers perjured themselves in order to continue to do business in Texas, and today while that false affidavit is on file in the state capitol, this law-defying branch of the great Standard Oil trust comes into the state it has outraged for a number of years and declares the proceedings against it are scandalous and irrelevant. Scandalous, because the inside facts of the situation are laid bare, and irrelevant we are left to suppose because the people of Texas should not be permitted to question

any act of this powerful and danger-

ous corporation. It is no wrong for the Waters-Pierce Oil Company to enter into a conspiracy against trade in this state to divide territory, control prices and freeze out honest competition. No man in Texas has been wronged by a corporation which swore it had no connection with Standard Oil when It has been dominated and controlled by the parent company right along. den in Central Park. He was fined \$10 by Magistrate Baker. Caruso's counsel immediately announced they would appeal. The ap-

peal will take the form of certiorari, demanding a review of the case by the court of special sessions. Former Judge Dittenhoefer for his client will seek to expedite the appeal because Caruso is billed to sing at the

Metropolitan opera house Wednesday. Tonight Director Conried declared that the conviction would not interfere with Caruso's appearance. In a quiet manner Magistrate Baker indorsed the affidavit, "Guilty; fine \$10," and handed it to a clerk of the court. He ordered that Frederick W.

Speerling of counsel for Caruso be informed of the decision. There was comparatively few persons in the court at the time. Former Judge Dittenhoefer expressed surprise when told the decision was against his client.

'We shall appeal," he said, "at once, We consider the decision unjust and unwarranted by the evidence. "If Caruso was guilty of the conduct Cain charged him with, but which was absolutely refuted, he should have been punished severely. If he, on the other hand, is innocent, he should not have been fined at all." Caruso said tonight: "I am pained

and amazed at the verdict. After all the evidence had been presented I took it for granted that I would be discharged instantly and honorably. I do not doubt that the verdict will be reversed on appeal.

#### CLEVER FEAT

Accomplished in Stopping Escaping River Water

NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 24.-News of the completion of one of the cleverest feats in several years in stopping up escaping water from the Mississippi river by levees was received here today from Collette Gap, eighty-five miles below New Orleans. Thru this gap which is thirty feet wide and ten to fifteen feet deep, five miles of current water poured, the gap being one of the numerous a passes thru which the river disseminates its waters near the mouth, with resulting shallowness in the commercial channel. The bottom of the gap was of soft mud, enabling the current to rapidly wash away the piling. The filling was accomplished by laying across the bottom a huge stringer, which served to deflect the current upward and away from the bottom. The gap was then closed within seven hours and other piles were driven in the massive bunches with cables to support the sheet piling.



watching. There is a fair demand here for a Saturday but factors with supplies reduced by yesterday's large turn over, are asking stiff prices which checks business.

The weather forecasts are unfavorable further rains being pr all states west of Alabama. If they should materialize, interference with the movement would aggravate matters temporarily against the short side as a drop in receipts might stimulate further advance buying from Europe

## MUSEMENT

"The Girl Patsy"

So very little is needed to make "The Girl Patsy" one of the plays that will live; it is a pity to see so much that is indifferent mixed up with so much that is good in this work of a Texas authoress, Jane Mauldin Feigl. A wet night and an apparently pointed indifference on the part of Fort Worth people to Texas products, made the audience at Greenwall's Friday night small. The smallness of the audience dampened the players and as a result "The Girl Patsy" had a rather draggy time. But-Oh, those "buts" of possibilities -what mightn't be done with "The Girl" if she had fallen into the right

Mrs. Feigl's story deals with the common theme of two girls who had been transplanted in babyhood, the one of high birth in a low family, and one of low birth in a home of refinement. There is, of course, one lover, a faithful and devoted family servant, a drunken ne'er-do-well, a villain, and a few extra servants and village charac ters to acd numbers to the cast.

There are sixteen people in the company. Six of them ought to be fired and their wages devoted to getting better actors for the parts of the other ten. Ten people could swing the story better than the sixteen. The action of the play could be made more brisk and there ought to be lines in each act to fasten the story together better. One seeing the second and third acts, gets no idea of what happened in the first. Then as the play is now presented it has the abominable fault of leaving two people alone on the stage and attempt. ing to hold interest by a tete-a-tete This happens a dozen or more times until even the best-natured audience would grow impatient.

But all these faults are minor. It s only because they are easy to see that they appear glaring. The story of Patsy is told well. Not a line in the play could be improved, except by the cutting out of the parts of the useless extra servants, village characters, etc. The unfolding of the climaxes in the play is little short of masterly. More than once Friday night the audience was caught sitting breathless waiting in advance for every spoken word. It takes dramatic skill to knock the breath out of a little audience. Health Officer Says Diphtheria

There are a number of cases of diphtheria and also of scarlet fever in the city, tho the cases are not as numerous as they have been at corresponding months of previous years. According to the city health depart-

ment there are but eight cases of diphtheria in Fort Worth at this time and there have been but twenty-one thus far in the month, against about forty last year in twenty-five days of Nomouth acids and purifying the vember. The disease is well under control and no abnormal spread of the contagion is apprehended. After each patient is convalescent there is a thoro fumigation of the premises, and especially the room that had been used as a sick room, and in that way the possibility of the spread of the disease is minimized. Practically as soon as the fever and soreness of the throat is ended the cases can be discharged, tho it is a recognized fact that the germs of the disease may linger in the throat for six months afterward, but there is but little danger of contagion unless the victim presents an especially favorable subject for the infection.
