EMPLOYES WIN
WAGE BATTLE
Fall River Workers Will Get
More Money
Special to The Telegram.
FALL RIVER, Mass., Nov. 24.—Fall River's cotton mill employes won a battle for an increase in wages Friday and Monday next 30,000 operatives will come under a scale giving them 10 per cent more than the present rate.
The granting of the advance by the manufacturers prevented a strike, the workmen having voted at meetings last night to stop work in all mills next Monday if the new schedule is not accepted.
M. C. D. Borden, an independent cotton manufacturer, employing 5,000 operatives, took the lead in meeting the demands of the mill hands by announcing that the scale of wages in his mills would be raised 10 per cent. No demand had been made on the proprietor of the Fall River iron works and his action practically forced the other mill managers to grant the increase.
The new pay scale affects seventy corporations, operating ninety-two mills, besides the iron works plants. The Manufacturers' Association's agreement to pay the increase is for a period of six months, but provision is made for extending it.
Between November, 1903, and July, 1904, the Fall River operatives suffered reductions aggregating 22 1/2 per cent.

PRAIRIE FIRE
SWEEPS LAND
Over a Million Acres Are
Burned
Special to The Telegram.
SANTA FE, N. M., Nov. 24.—Reports have reached here that a prairie fire has swept from western Texas into eastern New Mexico and over a million acres of grazing land and homesteaded land, which has been burned here. No loss of life is reported in New Mexico, but it is believed that several people perished in Texas.
It is estimated that on both sides of the boundaries between 50,000 and 100,000 head of cattle have been left without grazing.
Many ranchers are preparing to ship live stock at once, while the larger ranchers will drive their cattle to other ranges.
The flames swept portions of Pecos, Deaf Smith and Oldham counties, in Texas, and burned for thirty-five or forty miles to the Pecos Valley railroad in New Mexico.

Railroad Rumbles

"The question is one that is not yet settled. I was in conference with Mr. Thorne Thursday and he said that it was his desire to accommodate us and that he was doing some figuring to see if that could not be worked out satisfactorily. Therefore, as there is nothing definitely settled, other than the original agreement, that the Brazos Valley is to use the Texas and Pacific station, that matter still stands, tho it is entirely possible that we may have to make other arrangements."

WAIT SIX DAYS FOR ARRIVAL OF BODY
Body Was Shipped From Denver Last Week
For six days the family and relatives of F. A. De Witt of Paris, Texas, did not know where his dead body was and during that time it was in a grove on the Fort Worth and Denver City railroad, between Childress and Dalhart. The corpse arrived in Fort Worth Saturday morning, when it should have been here six days earlier.
F. A. De Witt of Paris, Texas, went to Denver some time ago for his health. He died there last Friday a week ago and his body was shipped to Paris, his former home, Saturday. A brother of the dead man arrived in Fort Worth only this week to receive the corpse, and to take it on to Paris for burial, where all the funeral arrangements had been made. The snow blockade on the Denver road set in after the train on which the body was shipped, and was caught in a bank of snow in a cut north of Childress, where it remained until Friday before it could get out. The brother of the dead man made every effort to get news of the whereabouts of the corpse, but all telegraphic wires being down north of Amarillo, he could get no information over that line. Messages were sent around by way of St. Louis to Denver, but only news he could get in its present shape was that the body had been shipped and should have reached Fort Worth Monday last. Thursday the brother started up the Denver road on a train that ran to Amarillo, and at that point met the train that was bearing the corpse to Denver. The body was shipped to Paris Saturday morning from Fort Worth, and will be buried Sunday.

NEW COUNTY JUDGE WILL CLEAN HOUSE
Finds Useless Tunnel Under the Street
The new county judge, John L. Terrell, has made a thorough inspection of the county jail and as a result it is quite possible that there will be material improvements made in connection with that establishment in the near future.
Judge Terrell found a fine arched well back of the jail building, bored at the expense of the county that up to this time has practically been unused because the equipment of it was never completed. This well is a dead letter so far as benefit is concerned and it will be of no benefit in its present shape. Before it can be utilized there will have to be a pump and tank put in, but it is not probable that will be done for some time yet.
Judge Terrell also inspected a subterranean tunnel running from the court house to the county jail, which was built for the purpose of placing prisoners thru it to and from the courts to jail, but it is never used for that purpose and is practically useless. It is a dark, damp and showy affair, and only serves to allow a useless expenditure of money. It is a foul, bad smelling affair and it may be ordered walled up.
There was also found at the county jail a large number of broken glass, caused by the blasting of the tunnel for sewer pipe that was excavated from the Ellison building across the court house yard to bluff street. These broken pieces will all be replaced at once and there will be a general cleaning up of the county building.

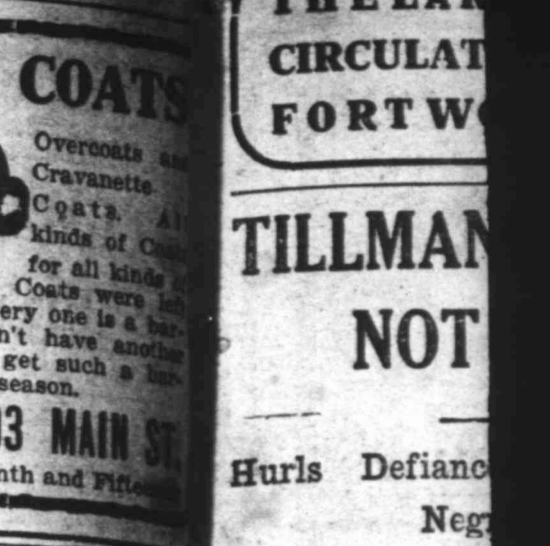
