



THE BRYAN OF TODAY

The William J. Bryan of today is not the Bryan of yesterday, so far as this world's goods are concerned. The Bryan of yesterday was a man of very limited means and when he went to Chicago at the head of a contesting democratic delegation in 1896, he did not know whether or not he would be admitted into the national democratic convention. He had the munificent sum of \$60 in his pocket, and obtained reasonable accommodations at the old Clifton house, At that time Bryan was the chief editorial writer on the Omaha World-Herald, and also officiated as editor in chief of the weekly edition of the same publication.

The room assigned to the future leader of the demccratic hosts in the Clifton hotel was a modest one and the rate given him quite reasonable. No more attention was bestowed upon him than upon the 200 other degelates who were guests of the establishment. Bryan rolled his small number of bills into a compact wad, as has always been his cautious custom, and gave it to the hotel clerk for safe keeping, and with a few dollars in his pocket went about the city conferring with the party leaders and others who were opposed to the single gold standard.

When Bryan gained admittance into the convention as a delegate from Nebraska and had made his sensational speech divesting himself of the crown of thorns and cross of gold argument which gave him fame together with the democratic leadership and nomination for the Presidency, he went back to his little room at the Clifton hotel in a quiet and modest way. But the fame of his achievement had preceded him and the management of the hotel suggested he ought to have more commodious quarters, but the new democratic leader could not see it that way. He did not believe he could afford a better room than the one he was then occupying. When he became the nominee of his party the hotel people insisted on him occupying a room on the parlor floor, but Bryan only moved upon the assurance that the new quarters would cost no more than the old

When the time came for Bryan to take his departure from Chicago he called for his little roll, found his expenses during his stay at the Clifton amounted to just half of it, and the great nominee of the democratic party returned to his mortgaged home in Nebraska with just \$30 in his pocket. Perhaps he was just as happy as if it had been \$30,000, for he had won fame and fame is usually a fine starting point for the accumulation of riches.

Since that time the mortgage on the Nebraska farm has been paid off and Bryan indulges in the costly luxuries of a farm and a weekly newspaper. The newspaper is said to be a considerable success from a financial standpoint, but its success can be traced directly back to notoriety that came of his original \$30 Chicago investment.

And then came the trip around the world, which has given the distinguished Nebraskan a much broader view of things in general than he had before. That trip was not only a broadening of Bryan's education. but it was profitable from a financial standpoint. The leading papers of the country were anxious to print every line of matter that came from his pen while on that trip, and no doubt the expenses of the trip and a handsome residue resulted from the inspiration that came to Bryan to furnish his impressions on the trip to the public.

The Bryan of yesterday has given place to the

issues ripe for settlement, but the organization is almost as necessary as the platform. Our fight must be made upon a normal plane, for we seek

justice. Our people must appeal to the conscience of the country, and that conscience awakened will sweep everything before it. We cannot fight upon a moral plane with an immoral organization." And Bryan is right in all he says in this appeal to

the rank and file of the Democratic party. Especially is this true of that portion which relates to trusts and trust representatives. The men who, while occupying positions of nonor and trust in the Democratic party have accepted employment at the hands of trusts and combinations organized and maintained in restraint of trade, must be made to feel the weight of party displeasure. They must be taught that Democracy means something more than talking one thing and practicing another. They must be impressed with a proper realization of the fact that they cannot make laws for the people a part of the time in seeking to restrain and control these giant combinations, and employ the balance of the time serving those combinations for a consideration. In plain words, the men who are honored by the Democratic party must

be absolutely above reproach and far above the semblance of suspicion. They must be champions of the people and their cause from the rising to the setting of the sun without any form of intermission.

The Democratic party was given over bodily to the Parker crowd of re-organizers in the last national campaign, and it went down into well merited defeat. Alton B. Parker, the man for whom the Democratic South cast its solid vote, and the man who was loudest in his denunciation of trusts and trust methods, is today the paid attorney of one of the greatest trusts in the country, and Democracy does not desire to do business with any more Alton B. Parkers. Put none but true and tried men on guard, and where members of the great party are showing a disposition to stray off after trust gods, scourge them back into the ranks and let them re-imbibe some of the true principles of real Democracy.

Resolved, That we the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, realizing the great necessity of improving and extending the usefulness of the college of industrial arts as one of the most important factors in molding true womanhood and in fitting our girls for home life, do hereby endorse and pledge ourselves to use our utmost influence with the legislators in behalf of the following items: 1. That the legislature appropriate for the next two

years the funds needed for the maintenance, buildings and improvements of the college of industrial arts, as set forth in the budget hereto appended. 2. That the legislature pass a special act empowering the board of regents of the college of industrial arts to issue to its graduates teachers' certificates entitling the holders to teach in the public schools of

the state. Resolved. That we endorse the action of our home economics committee in their efforts to secure the reenactment of the law of four years ago granting the sum of \$500 to any community that would raise a similar amount to be spent for equipment to be used for domestic science or manual training in our public

schools and for the maintenance thereof. Resolved, That a special committee of three called the "Outlook Committee," shall be appointed by the president to investigate and determine exactly what legislation shall be supported and what opposed by the federation at the coming session of the legislature. The president is to be ex-officio member of this com-

Laying aside the views of what cotton prices will be or should be, a brief review of Texas' part of the cotton drama most assuredly imbues confidence in the hearts of the leaders in almost every Texas enter-

The facts: Middling cotton is quoted at the New Orleans market this morning at 11 3-16 cents per pound. There are, of course, students and prophets and apostles at every turning, ready to predict higher and lower prices, but whatever the final adjustment may be, a decent price for cotton is assured for the balance of the unmarketed crop.

The opinions of the total yield of cotton in the United States are, as has always and will ever be the case. widely varied. But whatever the yield may be, it is quite reasonable to assume that the production of desirable grades of cotton will not be in excess of the world's requirements. It is certainly, therefore, not assuming too much to predict at least fair prices. Nearly all concur in that opinion.

Whatever the yield may be, whatever the prices for the balance of the Texas crop, the surprising revenue from the production of cotton in Texas means a splendid surplus over cost of production.

Now, the next census ginners' report will be issued by the government Saturday, Dec. 8, and the bureau's crop estimate Monday, Dec. 10. In the meantime the latest facts as compiled by the agricultural bureau of the United States are to be found, of course, in the last census.

The census reported 8,531,486 bales as the amount of cotton ginned in the United States up to and including Nov. 13. Texas' share of that total was reported as 2,982,698 bales, or more than 34.96 per cent of the total yield of the staple in this country.
