

The murder was the result of a quarrel between Parsons and Hamilton over the sale of the crop on Hamilton's farm. Parsons, with his wife and children in a covered wagon, were leaving the vicinity for the northern part of the state. In a gloomy, heavily-timbered spot along the road the travelers were suddenly confronted by Hamilton Without a word the young man leveled shotgun at Parsons' head and fired. The assassin then beat his victim over the head with the gun, killing him. Hamilton then pulled the woman from the wagon, clubbing her to death. With

knife he slashed the throats of two of the little boys and clubbed the third to death. Went to Church Afterward

With the pitiful cries of his victims yet ringing in his ears Hamilton went o church and sat unconcernedly thru a sermon in which the preacher painted in glowing words the fate of sinners. After the services the young man escorted his sweetheart to her home.

Then he returned to the scene of his crime, loaded the bruised and bloody bodies of his victims into the wagon and drove along the desolate road to the Big Piney river, about a mile distant. Arriving at the stream he dumped the corpses into the river, making no attempt to weight them so they would

Twenty-four hours later two of the bodies were found floating in the river by a fishing party. The stream was dragged and the bloated and mangled remains of the other members of the Parsons family were found. No sooner had the news of the discovery of the bodies reached Houston than young Hamilton came riding into town on one of the mules that had belonged to Parsons. He was immediately arrested and confessed to the crime. A mob was formed to lynch the murderer, and he was spirited away to this city and was later taken to Greenfield and then to Carthage. Threats of lynching reaching the Carthage officials, he was taken to St. Louis, and was confined in

PENDING 5 YEARS Convicted of Murdering Wm. Marsh Rice-Fight for Life Without a Parallel

Finally Commuted

By Associated Press.

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 20.-Governor Higgins today commuted to imprisonment for life the sentence of death under which Albert T. Patrick has remained for nearly five years, since his conviction for the murder of William Marsh Rice, the aged Texas millionaire, in New York city.

A Remarkable Fight

Albert T. Patrick's long fight for life is by all odds the most remarkable and dramatic in the annals of American criminal jurisprudence. In this great legal battle, which has occupied six years, over \$100,000 has been spent by the defense. For nearly five years Patrick has been living in the shadow of the electric chair. Five times Death has pointed its skinny finger at Patrick and said "come." The footfalls of seventeen condemned wretches have echoed in the gloomy corridor which leads from the death cells to the execution chamber since that day the attorney began his long game of life and death. Patrick is now awaiting the result of an appeal to the United States supreme court, and is confident that the previous ver-

### dicts against him will be reversed. Story of the Crime

The crime of which Patrick was convicted was the murder of William Marsh Rice, an aged Texas millionaire, in September, 1900. Charles E. Jones, Rice's valet, made a confession admitting that he had killed the old man with coloroform at the instigation of Patrick, who had been Rice's attorney for many years. The alleged motive of the deed was the desire of Patrick to obtain possession of the Rice state.

For many years prior to his death the Texas millionaire had been in very poor health, and his demise caused no surprise. After a cursory examination of the body, the attendant physician.

forth that the death of Rice was due to heart weakness, indigestion and diarrhea aggravated by the natural debilities of old age. The relatives FOR PATRICK were notified and the body embalmed and prepared for burial. The day following the death of Rice. Attorney Patrick presented several large checks signed by Rice at a New York bank. The bankers suspected Death Sentence of Lawyer Is something wrong, refused to honor the checks and notified the police of the incident. Jones, the valet, first fell under suspicion and he was placed under arrest. He told a number of conflicting stories, in some of which he implicated Patrick in the death of Rice. The attorney was arrested shortly afterward, but from that day to this has stoutly maintained his innocence. After the trial, which resulted in the

conviction of the lawyer, the valet was released under heavy bonds and immediately disappeared. During the first trial Dr. Curry testified that no trace of chloroform or other drug was evident and that his examination resulted in the conclusion that Rice had died from perfectly natural causes. Patrick personally directed the defense and seemed greatly surprised when the jury returned a

verdict of guilty. The whole case of Patrick and his attorneys has turned on the elimination of the confession of the missing valet. The defense holds that the many contradictory statements made by Jones tends to invalidate any evidence he supplied and that the prosecution failed to show conclusively that Rice had been murdered. Thousands of physicians have testified to their belief that the embalming fluid could have caused the congestion of the

lungs alleged by the state to have been produced by chloroform.

**RUSSIAN JEWS OF NEW YORK REJOICE**

**REBUFF OF** CABINET House of Lords Defeats Edu cation Bill **A CRISIS EXPECTED** Radicals Want to Curb Veto

Power of the English House of Lords

LONDON, Dec. 20 .- There will be no dissolution of parliament as the result of the action of the house of lords

defeating the government's educational bill, altho the rejection of this, the main measure of the session, is the most serious rebuff Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman's cabinet has yet suffered.

It is not regarded as being sufficiently grave to necessitate an appeal to the country; whether at the present moment the government could successfully appeal to the nation on the education bill is the question on which even many liberals are in great doubt.

The only imminent effect of the step taken by the upper house will, therefore, be to give an enormous impetus

to the radical agitation in favor of curbing the veto powers of the peers and furnish the non-conformists with new gun and ammunition in the fight for the disestablishment of the churca of England.

There is today a widespread impression that a purely secular educational bill will be introduced during the next session of parliament, while no doubt the cabinet during the recess will consider what means are possible to prevent the lords from nullifying the prolonged labors of the commons and dabar their veto measures passed twice

by the lower house. It is the general view of the politicians that the peers by last night's action entered upon a constitutional struggle embracing much more than he educational bill. The liberals promise there is to be no cessation of the fight until the constitutional issue is settled as to whether the liberal party is to be forever checked by the "standing committee of the tory peers."







### Boat Blown Apart

The accident occurred at Gold Dust Landing, about seventeen miles south of Vicksburg. The Scovell was at the landing taking on freight. Suddenly a terrific explosion was heard and the boat seemed to fly to pieces. Some of her timbers were thrown hundreds of yards and some of the men on board were blown nearly that far. The pilot house and front part of the cabin were blown to splinters and other parts of the boat were so badly damaged that began to sink immediately. When she the Cordill left the scene late yesterday afternoon what was left of the Scovell was listing heavily and her cargo of 1,000 sacks of cotton seed and eighty-five bales of cotton was

Pending the arrival of the Senator Cordill the injured were taken care of at Gold Dust Landing as well as it was possible to do so at that place.

Of the white dead only the body of Lavall Yerger has been recovered. Wade Quackenboss was heard to call for help soon after the explosion, but, according to the reports of those who were on the boat, the escaping steam soon smothered his outcries. Captain Quackenboss was not seen after the accident.

# WHAT THE RAILROADS IN TEXAS ARE DOING

Mineral Wells Extension Special to The Telegram. WEATHERFORD, Texas, Dec. 20 .-

For several months rumors have been going the rounds that the Mineral Wells and Northwestern was to be extonded northwest, or north, or south, and that work would begin "right away." It now seems that, as an ab-solute certainty, before the first day of January, 1907, work will have actually commenced on the extension of the Mineral Wells route, Contractors with their outfits are now on the ground, ready to go to work just as soon as the engineers have gone ahead far enough to keep out of the way of the graders. The engineers are now going rapidly forward, cross-sectioning and staking the roadbed and grades. It is expected by those who are most interested that dirt will be broken on the extension within a week, but it will possibly be a few days later. General Superintendent Bock is very much elated over the prospects of an early commencement of this work, as he naturally should be, for it means a great deal for his road, as well as for Weatherford Mineral Wells and towns along the proposed route. The exact location of the finally accepted route northwest has not been made public, but it is known that it will go almost in a straight northwest course after leaving Mineral Wells. One great disadvantage is found in getting out of Mineral Wells. The line will likely start east from Mineral Wells, gradually veering around to the north, and finally, after reaching a distance of fifteen miles, will turn in its proper direction-northwest. At this point, we are told, the distance from Minoral Wells will on an air line be only four or five miles.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Dec. 20.-Wilton Wolf, a promoter of New York, accompanied by a party of engineers and northern capitalists, left here yesterday in an automobile for Sabinal and Leaky to decide upon a probable route between Sabinal and Leaky for a railroad, which is contemplated to aid in the development of the kaolin beds in that district. The kaolin beds of Uvalde and Edwards counties have been recognized for several years as among the richest in America, but owing to the lack of railway facilities their development has never been at. tempted. Sabinal on the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio railroad, is one of the most desirable locations for a shipping point, owing to its situation on one of the largest roads. It is the announced intention of Mr. Wolf and his associates to connect with the Sunset at Sabinal and from there extend to Leaky, in Edwards county, "I want something to levy on," rewhich is said to be the center of the most extensive and productive kaolin

grading as fast as possible and lay the rails as soon as the grade is completed. It is safe to predict that the varnished cars will be running into Snyder over our new road by July 4. 1907.





### CATTLE QUARANTINE DECISION

The decision of the Kentucky cattle quarantine case by the supreme court of the United States has occasioned no great amount of surprise and absolutely no consternation among the cattlemen of Texas. The decision is but in line with what has been the general understanding of the situation in this state since the quarantine line was first established.

It has been conceded that the federal government could not interfere with the administration of the quarantine law within the state of Texas in the movement of cattle wholly within the state, and in matters of this kind the federal authorities have in Texas made

themselves wholly subservient to the state law. In the state of Texas the federal quarantine line is run diagonally across the state, and there is no legal authority for such action, for under a strict construction of the law the federal government would only be able to establish such line along the boundary lines of the state and control the interstate movement of live stock. But as a matter of protection to the people

living within what is designated as the safe area in Texas, the federal government agreed that the line might be established across the state provided the state itself would adopt and legalize that procedure. The matter was adjusted thru the medium of providing that the state live stock quarantine regulations must conform with the federal regulations in all things, and the

federal line\_is thus recognized and established across the state by state authority. So far as the effect of this supreme court de-

cision on the situation in Texas is concerned, it is not believed it will amount to anything. The federal authorities are not attempting anything in Texas that is not backed up by the state law. It may have the effect of more clearly establishing just now far the secretary of agriculture can go in dealing with shipments of live stock from one state to another, but it is already a clearly established principle in Texas that there can be no legal interference of that individual with the movement of cattle or live stock within the state, except where the federal contention is backed up





### SENATOR BAILEY IS NOT AFRAID

Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey, who is now engaged in making his third campaign as a candidate for the United States senate to succeed himself, all three of the campaigns having been made this year, is not afraid. That fact stands out as pre-eminently as the dome on the new granite capital building at Austin and is known of all men who have kept an eye leveled in the direction of the senator. As an exemplification of the fact that Senator Bailey is not afraid, it may be cited that Senator Bailey in his first campaign launched forth such thunderbolts as would have done lasting credit to omnipotent Jove, denouncing every individual who differed with him as a scoundrel, a human hyena and a villain of pronounced Senegambian hue. He wanted but a short time to drive the opposition to him into the gulf of Mexico. Shaking his leonine locks and roaring from one end of the state to the other, he made the small fry hard to catch and the big game take to the sky-scraping timber.

Senator Bailey was not afraid, and when he returned to Washington to attend the opening of congress he was confident he had the enemy whipped into line, and secure in his position as the democratic nominee, he could bid defiance to the carping critics who had shown a disposition to follow at his heels and bark at his passing greatness. Then came the Davidson disclosures and the hurried return to Texas. From afar . And that explanation was a complete confession in the main of the charges that had been brought against him.

But still Senator Bailey is not afraid. In the third campaign he has just launched in Texas he is prepared for all eventualities. Concealed in the modest hand satchel always carried in his good right hand is something calculated to make the opposition take still deeper into the brush, and the senator thus speaks lovingly of his artillery: "While I never carry a pistol in my pocket, I always carry one in my hand satchel. A few nights ago while riding on a train, two men purposely sat in a seat next to me and began to make remarks about me. I removed the pistol from the satchel and placed it in my pocket. There were no more remarks about me on that occasion."
