MANUFACTURERS EXPORTS MORE THAN \$700,000,000

Special to The Telegram. WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Exports of manufacturers from the United States in the year just ended aggregate more than \$700,000,000. The bureau of statistics of the department of commerce and labor has completed the figures for the eleven months ending with November and adding to these a conservative estimate for December finds that the total exports of the manufacturers for the full year will be in question exceed \$700,000,000. Ten years ago in the fiscal year 1906 they amounted to but \$258,000,000, in 1896 but \$145,000,000 and in 1876 \$105,000,000.

 Another Report  
 The crime was executed deliberately and showed evidence of the same careful and premeditated character as the murder of Generals Ignatieff and Von Der Launitz, and undoubtedly was carried out by the same organization, which, it is reported, has sentenced Emperor Nicholas and several of the ministers to death. The assassin, who wore the uniform of a military clerk attached to his apartments, which were located in the same building. From the nature of the wounds it appeared that seven shots in all were fired, and that at their ends in preparation for the crime in order that they might inflict more serious wounds. Hastily firing another revolver, cartridges were thrown into his revolver and drawing a second weapon, the assassin ran across the garden to the carriage entrance, threatened the porter with his pistol, and dashed down the street, past the imperial opera house, with a crowd of thirty house porters and court attendants close behind. A policeman stationed in front of the house attempted to seize the assassin, but was shot down by the latter, who turned and opened fire on his pursuers, wounding a boy. The assassin then turned his flight through the streets, firing at police officers and house porters who attempted to bar his way. His ammunition became exhausted he was intercepted and captured at Panters Lane.

Suits Filed to Dissolve Merger and Revoke Charters

LOUIS, Jan. 9.—Suits to dissolve the alleged merger of the Wash, the Missouri Pacific and Iron Mountain railroad companies and the Pacific Express Company and to revoke the licenses and charters of the Pacific Express Company, the American Refrigerator Transit Company, the Western Coal & Mining Company, the Rich Hill Coal Mining Company and the Kansas-Missouri Elevator Company, were filed in the supreme court by Attorney General Hadley today. The petition alleges that the stock of the companies named is owned by the same interests, the Goulds, in violation of the provisions of the constitution and laws of Missouri.

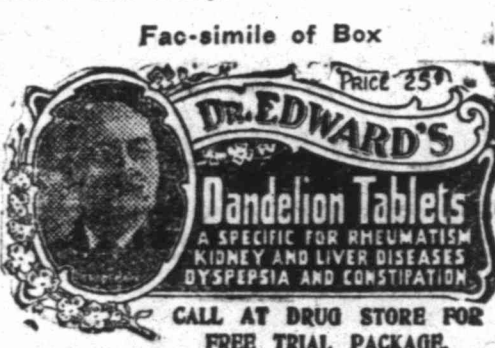

LIVE STOCK SANITARY MATTERS
During the year that has just passed there has been some notable progress made by the bureau of animal industry in its fight for the eradication of the fever tick, notwithstanding the fact that when the movement was first started so many people indulged in the belief that nothing tangible would come of the effort. The department has been seriously handicapped in the work it has undertaken by the lack of available state funds in much of the territory affected, but thru the co-operation of stockmen generally the experiments instituted have been prosecuted to the point where there are no longer any sneers heard at the undertaking.

The congress now in session at Washington at its former session appropriated the sum of \$80,000 for experimental work in fever-tick extermination, but stipulated the work should be done in co-operation with officials of the various states and territories affected. The federal government merely undertook to furnish experts to show how the work of eradicating the ticks should be done, while the state and territorial authorities were required to put the suggestions into practical working effect. The most marked results so far obtained have been in Oklahoma and Texas, where the experimental work has been under the direction of Dr. Leslie J. Allen and Dr. Joseph W. Parker. In Oklahoma the livestock sanitary board employed inspectors to assist in the cleaning up process, while in Texas the work done was the result of voluntary co-operation on the part of stockmen.

"The outlook for the eradication of the ticks is now very encouraging," says Colonel Albert Dean, of Kansas City, who maintains a general espionage over quarantine matters in the Southwest. "We find the best way to go about this work is to talk with the ranchmen and get their voluntary co-operation. Six months ago some of them would not listen to our men. Now some of the biggest ranchmen are putting in dipping vats and getting ready to clean up their pastures. One man who has large interests on both sides of the quarantine line is building twenty vats on his property. The sentiment is very generally changed from six months ago. We believe that we have demonstrated that it is possible to clean up a pasture, and the ranchmen are coming to realize that it can be done, and that it is to their benefit to do so. Reports from government men in Texas indicate that public sentiment in the state is changing on the subject. They used to think we were infringing on their rights when we talked of eradicating the ticks. I understand now that there is a good chance for an appropriation from Texas for the work, and legislation that will give local officials authority to enforce quarantine and cleaning up regulations. Another season's work is of course necessary to show whether our plans of tick eradication can be made permanently successful.

"We can report considerable improvement in the statistics as to Texas fever during the past year. To be sure, Kansas City got blamed in former years for a good deal of fever that we were not responsible for. In the outbreaks resulting from infested feed yards where stuff coming in was held. Part of the trouble in previous years was due to the 23-hour law, under which Southern cattle were unloaded for feeding at yards north of the line, while false fall the extension of the shipping law was largely taken advantage of, and fewer shipments were unloaded at these intermediate points. Then too, the disinfection of these feed yards is better understood now, and clean cattle can follow ticky cattle with less danger than heretofore."

The convention of members of the various live stock sanitary boards, held in Nashville a few weeks ago, urged a federal appropriation of \$250,000 for the purpose of continuing the experimental work now in progress, and if it is granted it is believed Oklahoma can be largely cleaned up and a big showing made in

Texas during the coming season, as well as in other states where the people are already taking hold.

There are some evidences of a recurrent outbreak of the old feeling against the state and federal quarantine line in some counties bordering on the line, together with the revival of the old cry that the line was established in restriction of immigration, but it is not believed that there will be much real trouble over this feature of the situation. Experiments by disinstituted agencies have too clearly established the tick theory at this time for successful contravention, and it is believed the legislature now in session will proceed to act in conformity with the plans of the federal authorities and co-operate with the work now in progress, and at the same time strengthen the live stock sanitary laws in all places where they are now weak and defective. A vigorous effort will at least be made in this direction by leading cattlemen of the state.

TROUBLE FOR THE LEGISLATURE
The legislature of the state of Texas now in session has a grave duty to perform, and the performance of which is going to bring an angry protest no matter as to just how it is performed. That duty lies in the choice of a successor to Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey as United States senator. It makes no difference whether the Bailey matter has been completely threshed over from one end of Texas to the other and the people have heard charges reiterated and explanations offered that do not explain. There is going to be a prolonged and painful howl go up from all parts of the state when a successor to Bailey is chosen, no matter who is honored with the election. It does not require a prophetic vision to decipher that fact. It is written in characters so eligible that all can read.

If Bailey is re-elected it is going to call for a storm of angry protests—a howl to the effect that the legislature has sold out and delivered the people of this state over bodily to the trusts and corporations. That Texas has fallen upon grievous ways and awful days when the self-confessed leader representative of a branch of the leading trust of the country is sent back to the United States senate. There has been a wonderful revision in public sentiment in Texas since the July primaries were held. The vote taken in the second primary in Austin a few days ago indicates that fact beyond the shadow of a doubt.

But in every county in Texas there is a strong Bailey following. In nearly every county in the state this Bailey following is made up of men who are blind worshippers at the shrine of genius, and who believe that Bailey could do no wrong. The acts complained of in the case of Senator Bailey are right perforce they were performed by Senator Bailey. And hundreds of good men and true in the state of Texas honestly believe that Bailey has done no wrong, but that he is the victim of scolding politicians who desire to accomplish his defeat for personal ends. Right here in Fort Worth there are as good men as can be found in the state of Texas who can see nothing in the Bailey matter except persecution of one of the greatest men in public life today, and these men cannot be made to see the situation in any other light.

It stands to reason, then, that if the legislature should decline to re-elect Bailey there is going to be some prolonged howling heard from the Bailey ranks. The friends of Bailey—and he has some of the truest friends mortal man ever possessed—are going to make themselves heard, and they are going to be extremely resentful of the action taken. They are going to cry out that the righteousness and ability of the Democratic party has been crucified in order that other men's desire for greatness might be appeased, and there is nothing but trickery and rascality left in the Democracy of Texas. There will be weeping and wailing and gnashing of political teeth from Red river to the gulf, and from the Sabine to the Rio Grande.

It is clear that the legislature is up against a hard proposition any horn of the dilemma it may choose to take, and for this reason it is confidently believed that with the lights before it, that body cannot presume to act with any degree of haste, but will go about the matter calmly and deliberately. That the legislature cannot afford to re-elect Senator Bailey with these charges against him standing in their present light, is too patent to require any kind of argument, and there seems but one way out of the situation, and that is to thoroughly investigate these matters and let the whole truth out. Conceding for the sake of argument, that Senator Bailey is the Democratic nominee, and it must also be conceded that no Democratic nominee is immune to investigation when circumstances so clearly indicate necessity for such action. Investigation should be insisted upon by both sides of the controversy, and if agreement cannot come out of that investigation, let the whole question be relegated back to the people to be determined in a second state primary.

That seems to be the drift of public sentiment in Texas at this time, and if the state legislature is unwilling to take the action that should be taken in the premises, the people will quickly solve the question so there can be no crimination and recrimination in the future. In the meantime, it is up to the legislature to decide.

PACKERS FAVOR STEPHENS BILL
The packing interests of the country are greatly pleased with the bill introduced in congress by Congressman Stephens, of Texas, for the purpose of extending the meat trade of the United States thru reciprocal commercial agreements. The bill proposes to give the President authority to reduce the tariff on foreign goods not extensively produced or manufactured in this country, provided countries so favored will admit American meats free of duty. A leading representative of the packing industry says of the Stephens bill:

"Such an arrangement would undoubtedly materially enlarge the market for American meats, and it seems to me the proper basis on which to do business. If we expect favors from a person or a nation, it is only fair that we should do favors in return, provided it does not injure us, and as I understand the main ideas of Mr. Stephens' bill, he does not propose to bring our manufactured goods into competition with those of other countries. If other countries have goods we do not make in any considerable quantities, it strikes me it would be a good bargain to admit them under a reduced tariff if these countries will in turn admit our meats, or any other products for that matter, duty free.

"The depressing effects of the recent agitation against American packing house products have, I believe, spent their force, and the past year has shown greater exports of meat and live stock than any year in the history of the country. With some such arrangement as Mr. Stephens proposes, which will do away with all excuses for tariff reprisals by countries discriminated against in any way, the business should grow to still more immense proportions."
