

Qualified voters of the Cross Plains Independent School District and the Cross Cut district turned out 130 strong Saturday of last week to vote in favor of a proposal to consolidate the latter district with the local district. The vote was 125 to 5 for the school merger, according to unofficial returns.

Election Judge Clyde Sims reported taht a total of 91 ballots were cast here with the tally reading 90 to 1 in favor of the proposal. In the Cross Cut district voters balloted 35 to 4 in favor of the consolidation, according to an official count made by the Brown County Commissioners Court, Monday of this week
