



### Soil Conservation News

"Public interest in water problems in Texas is at an all-time high", H. N. Smith, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, at Temple, said today.

Many articles on water resources and water needs are appearing in newspapers and magazines, and Federal and State agencies, committees, and many cities are making water studies.

"This widespread concern about water supplies", Smith pointed out, 'emphasizes the importance of taking needed steps without delay to prevent rapid filling of reservoirs with sediment with accompanying loss of valuable water storage capacity."

Mr. Smith referred to the four major reservoirs-Benbrook, Garza-Little Elm, Grapevine, and Lavonwhich are being completed by the Corps of Engineers above Dallas and Fort Worth. "These reservoirs." he said, "will give flood protection to Dallas and Fort Worth and to levee districts and farmland along the river below them. The dame will serve the very important purposes of storing water for municipal and industrial use, recreation navigation of the Trinity, and streamflow regulation. Foreseeing even greater needs for water in the future as Texas develops, we need to do verything that can be done to protect and increase the useful life of these reservoirs."

Mr. Smith estimated that at the present rate of erosion, and soil movement in the watershed the sediment pools of the four reservoirs would be filled with sediment in 27

to 36 years. "But this doesn't need to happen", he said. "If the needed soil conservation measures and practices were being used throughout the watersheds of Grapevine reservoir - as an example - the life Sunday. 

### Financial Report Of Callahan County Hospital

In the interest of informing the public of the financial condition of the Callahan County Hospital, we, the members of the Board of Directors do hereby release a statement as to the assets and expenses of that hospital for the past eight years. During that period the money on deposit has grown \$14,255.05. This amount has accrued from a deficit of \$821.59 on January 1, 1945, to a total deposit of \$12,443.46 on January 1, 1954. Of this amount \$8,000.00 is deposited acquiring interest at the First National Bank of Baird and \$4,-443.46 is on deposit as a general operating fund.

However this does not disclose the full accomplishments of the hospital during that period because in addition \$23,620.96 has been expended for equipment, improvements and general expenses. With the interest of providing better service, an X-Ray machine has been purchased at an expense of over \$5,000 in addition to numerous other badly needed items. Paving has been provided for parking facilities, a new roof has been put on the building and the floors com-pletely covered with tile. The halls have been soundproofed, a new furnace installed, new chairs, venetian blinds, fans, and mattresses have been purchased. A water cooler, ice box, ice making machine, dishwasher, stove and other utilities have been installed. These are but a few of the many items which the Board has purchased in the hope of furnishing our citizens a modern, up-to-date hospital at the least operating cost.

The hospital now has a staff of four physicians and a monthly payroll of around \$2,400. Recently several new rooms have been added by changing the wards into rooms in the hope of being able to accomodate more patients during rush seasons.

We, the present Board of Directors, do earnestly urge that any matter or mistake needing our attention, be brought to our attention and we will do our best to fulfill the responsibility conferred upon us:




