Old-Settlers To Hold Meet Here Friday

Friday the 13th means nothing to the old settlers of Callahan County. They will hold their annual reunion on this date in the City Park here and officers of the organization are expecting a record number of old-timers to be on hand for the day's activities. This department joins other firms and individuals here in welcoming the old settlers back to Cross Plains again this year and we trust that you will all thoroughly enjoy your visit here Friday and may it be a lucky day for each of you.

Members of the water committee and the city council members had "ice water" doused on their hopes for a new water supply from Lake Brownwood this week, when Marvin Nichols, consulting engineer for the firm of Freese & Nichols of Fort Worth, met with them and a representative group from Rising Star in the directors room of the Citizens State Bank last Monday afternoon and announced that it was his opinion that the proposed pipeline project would cost at least \$500,000.00. The firm is going ahead with a preliminary survey of the project but if it is found to cost as much as his tentative figure places it, it will be out of the financial reach of either of the two cities and other means will have to be found to secure sufficient water supplies.

With the opening of school only a matter of days away now, we were interested in a story reaching our desk which was released by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, in which it is pointed out that increased education of citizens makes better customers of them. The organization urges all towns to sponsor back-to-school campaigns. Here is the story and we recommend that all boys and girls of high school age read it:

Education is good business; the more schooling citizens have the better customers they are.

In the light of such facts, established by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, the U. S. Labor Department's Wage-Hour Division is urging all boys and girls who have not graduated to return to school this fall.

Furthermore, it hopes that every Texas community will conduct a back-to-school campaign of its own.

Regional Director William J. Rogers said pay checks may look good to minors who have been working during the summer vacation, "but they should look ahead—and so should the community in which they live."

Research by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce in 145 American cities shows clearly that the average educational level is directly related to total retail sales—the more schooling, the more sales.

Dallas, for instance, was ranked among the top 19 U. S. metropolitan areas of 250,000 population or more where the average adult has completed between 11 and 12 years of school. These same areas also had the highest retail sales, averaging \$1,100 per capita.

Education, the official said, increases a person's earning power and improves his standard of living. The (Continued on back page)

Ex-Judge Named County Attorney By Commissioners

Baird—Leonard B. Lewis, 60, former Callahan County judge and county attorney, has been appointed to fill out the unexpired term of the late Felix Mitchell as county attorney.

Mitchell died Aug. 2, of a heart attack after he had served as county attorney for 22 years.

Lewis will probably be placed on the ballot for the post in the general election, according to an announcement made by the Commissioners Court.

Lewis served as county judge for two terms from 1936 to 1940. Previously he served as county attorney from 1928 to 1932.

The late Felix Mitchell once was a law partner with Lewis and B. F. Russell, now of Dallas. Mitchell, at the time made his home in Cross Plains.

Judge Lewis agreed to take the place because he lives here and there was no other available lawyer for the post. Callahan County has only five attorneys.

Wallace E. Jones Laid To Rest Wednesday

Wallace E. Jones, 66, a resident of the Cross Plains area since 1890, passed away at his home here Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Jones had been in ill health for the past two years, but was believed to be somewhat improved when he suffered a heart attack and died suddenly.

Funeral services for Mr. Jones were held Wednesday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock at the Cross Plains Methodist Church of which he was a member. Burial was made in the Cross Plains Cemetery.

He was born at Hutto, Williamson County, Texas, October 13, 1887, and came to Cross Plains with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Jones, at the age of three. He was engaged in farming until his retirement a few years ago.

Survivors include his wife of this city; one daughter, Mrs. Leota Rhodes, Eastland; two brothers, Martin Jones of this city and Clyde C. Jones of Lubbock; a sister, Mrs. Mabel Bond of this city and one grandson.

Engineering Firm To Conduct Survey For New Water Supply

The Engineering firm of Freese & Nichols, of Fort Worth is now on the job here and at Rising Star, running a preliminary survey of the two communities water needs to determine the actual cost of a proposed pipeline to Lake Brownwood.

Hopes for the project were dimmed here this week when Marvin Nichols, consulting engineer of the Fort Worth firm met with local water committee members and city councilmen of Cross Plains and Rising Star and stated that it was his opinion that the project could not be carried out for less than \$500,000.00, which would place it out of the financial reach of the two cities.

He proposed, however, that his firm be allowed to go ahead with a preliminary survey at little or no cost to the city to ascertain the needs of the communities and established a cost based on fact.

Engineers of the firm will be working in the area of the two cities during the next three weeks and a full report of their finding will be given the councils in each city within a period of one month, he said.

Fred Heyser, Putnam Stock Farmer and President of the Callahan County Old Settlers Association, announced this week that everything is in readiness and the welcome carpet will be rolled for the organization's annual reunion to be held at the city park here Friday, Aug. 13.

This makes the third consecutive year that the reunion has been held here and a crowd of between 3,000

and 4,000 old-timers are expected to be present and take part in the day's festivities.

The Gregory-Fortune Field, six miles northwest of town has gained a new oiler. The well is Forrest W. Gregory & Lamar D. Evans, Midland, No. 2 W. H. Fortune, et al, G. M. Vical Survey 793.

Daily potential was 117.38 barrels of 43 gravity oil, flowing through a 32-64-inch choke with packer set on the casing and 225 pounds tubing pressure. Production is from 60 perforations at 1,763-94 feet with the casing set at 1,797 feet.

Big D Drilling Co. et al of this city staked the No. 4 L. L. Montgomery as a new project in the same field.

Slated for 1,850 feet with rotary, it spots 200 feet from the east and 2,461 feet from the north lines of Victoria CSL Survey 217.

Bayou Philosopher Looks Over Survival Kits Scientists Are Working On In Case Of War

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou takes a dim view of some atomic scientists' plans, his letter this week reveals. He's probably an authority on surviving with the least amount of effort or equipment.

Dear editor:

I read the other day in a newspaper I picked up on the highway after it fell out of a car which sideswiped another on the way to a traffic meeting where a bunch of atomic scientists in New Mexico, out where they make the bombs, have been working, sort of as a pasttime I guess to get their minds off their heavier work, on survival kits.

Since they know more about the effects of an atom bomb than the rest of us, naturally their minds have been turned to thoughts of how they're gonna survive after a few of the things have been dropped, in case they are, and I suppose they will be, as up to now I have never seen a dictator with a new weapon who sooner or later didn't get around to tryin it out.

But aside from all that. I was more interested in what these scientists thought a survival kit ought to contain, to enable 'em to live off the land in case civilization went up in smoke.

The main items on their list were a rifle and ammunition, matches, flashlight, candles, axe, knife, needle and thread, fish hooks and lines, soap, salt, blankets and canned food.

I have read this list over care-

fully and I do not believe it will do the job. For example, I believe man has now reached the point where it would be impossible for him to survive without a lawnmower. Also, nowhere on the list do I find an electric refrigerator, or a can opener, or any directions for repairin a faulty parkin meter. Some races on earth might survive without these necessities, but I don't believe we could swing it in this country.

Also, I notice them scientists have included a rifle and I suppose they figure on livin off game, but most of the game in this country is now confined to zoos and most zoos are in cities, which are generally considered the places where the bombs would fall. Seems to me they'd better leave room in the trunks of their cars, where they're storing their kits, for a walkin plow and a grubbin hoe, although the more I think about it, the less reason I can find for even countin on keeping their cars, unless they can refine gasoline in a tin cup over a camp fire.

In fact, the more you think about this, the more items you pile up and before long you find it'd take a six-wheel trailer-truck to haul a average family's survival kit, and it seems to me it would be a little smarter and a lot easier not to have an atomic war in the first place. There aren't enough trailer-trucks to go around.

Avoid Heat Cramps By Using Extra Salt, State Health Officer Asserts

Austin—There is little doubt that summer is here. If you don't think so, take a quick look at your thermometer or feel your shirt or blouse and chances are that it will be wet and salty with sweat.

Excessive sweating means the loss of body salt, and Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, advises the use of salt in drinking water as a means of avoiding heat cramps.

"Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat," says Dr. Holle. "On days when the thermometer goes to 90 degrees or above, as it has recently, the body may lose as much as fifty grams of salt. Laborers, farmers, and even white-collar workers should be especially watchful of heat cramps."

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the stomach, headaches, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. The danger comes because the loss of salt may occur without the knowledge of the individual until the deficiency causes cramps or heat fog.

Salt tablets may be purchased commercially. If they are not available, a pinch of table salt will serve the same purpose. "Since milk contains more salt than water, drinking milk is an excellent method of replacing body salt lost through perspiration," Dr. Holle says.

"As It Looks From Here"

Washington, D. C.—The Administration "has been searching for a practical plan on which to base a law to keep subversives and disloyal persons out of defense plants. Defense plants, of course, are operated by private industry. Industry has found that they run head-long into labor laws which unintentionally protect subversives."

Both labor and industry are desirous of firing those who may be dangerous to have working in these plants. The Congressional committee looking into the matter has not come up with a practical answer and feel that a commission should be set up to study the question and recommend needed legislation. Probably nothing will be done until the next session of Congress.

Doing Something About Water Conservation.

Last week on Aug. 3, I introduced HR 10151 entitled, "A Bill to Authorize purchase or a portion of the bonds issued by the Brazos River Authority, an agency of the State of Texas, to finance the early development by it of the water resources of the Brazos River Basin, Texas."

In a statement to the Congress I pointed out that it was not expected that the legislation could be considered in this session. The purpose of presenting it at this time was to allow the various Departments and Agencies of the Government, and others interested, to study the proposition before the Congress convenes again in January.

This Bill is in behalf of the Brazos River Authority, which does not ask the government for a hand-out. What it does is to offer the government 50 million dollars' worth of bonds bearing 2 1/2% interest out of a total of 140 millions dollars for the development of five dams below Possum Kingdom on the Brazos River, and for the improvement of the Possum Kingdom Dam itself.

In my statement I pointed out that this was unique in that an agency of the State of Texas - the Brazos River Authority - proposed to pay interest on money borrowed from the Federal Government and were not asking for one nickel as a gift. The agency even proposes to pay the Army Engineers for their surveys.

This is an instance of local people doing something for themselves and is in line with the policy earlier proposed by President Eisenhower.

Talk alone is not going to conserve our soil and water. According to the experts, we only save about 12% of the water which falls and the remainder goes into the Gulf of Mexico. Along with the water goes topsoil, wasted for future generations. The underground water table continues to drop all over the State of Texas. The future of the great Southwest cannot be assured on present conditions.

There are some who oppose the plan to harness the waters of the Brazos River. Some of the objections have merit, but it is proposed that during the coming months condition be met to satisfy many of the complaints which have been made.

Farm Prices and the Cost of Food.
The Committee on Agriculture has produced an impressive report showing that the severe decline in farm prices has not benefitted the consumer.

As an example, in 1948 the price of wheat reached a peak of \$2.81 a bushel, and the average price of a one-pound loaf of bread was 13.8c. Today the farm price of wheat has dropped to about \$1.91 per bushel, yet the average price of this same loaf of bread has increased to 17c. Thus, while the price of wheat declined 32%, the price of bread has advanced 23%. The farm value of wheat in a one-pound loaf of bread is 2.7 cents.

A cotton shirt costing \$3.95 contains about 30c worth of cotton. Cutting back the price of cotton would mean very little in the price of a shirt.

A 5c peanut candy bar contains about 1/2 cent's worth of peanuts and if the confectioners got their peanuts free this would not change the price of a 5c candy bar.

These are only examples. Out of each dollar spent by the American housewife for food produced in this country, 56c now goes for processing, marketing and transportation charges. The farmer receives 44c. Of this 44c, approximately 30c goes to purchase tractors, trucks, plows, gasoline and other supplies required for modern farming. Thus, the farmer and his family have about 14c out of each consumer dollar for domestically produced food for their cost and investment.

The farmer's share of the consumer dollar has dropped in recent years and months, as farm prices have declined, while retail food prices have remained at 1952 peak levels.

It is not the fault of the retail grocer. He has to meet the high charges of processing, marketing and transportation and until a way is found to reduce this cost, the consumer will have little relief.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



Expanded Supplies of Cattle Sell Better at Fort Worth!

Fort Worth—Monday's offering of cattle and calves was considerably above most of the Monday runs of the past month, but prices were stronger in spite of the bigger numbers.

Giving impetus to the trade was the continued improvement of the stocker and feeder trade. Apparently stocker and feeder buyers are abandoning their earlier position that prices would be lower this season and are taking hold at present levels in much greater volume.

Lending strength to this theory was the improved movement of the plainer kinds of stockers at Fort Worth Monday. Many of the lighter weights of calves also were getting good action, and dealers here commented that many of the calves selling in the \$14 to \$16.50 bracket Monday were comparable to kinds a year ago that sold at \$10 to \$12.

Major packers were making their buying power felt as they were more aggressive buyers than usual for a Monday trade and this resulted in more active trade and fully steady to stronger prices on slaughter varieties of cattle and calves. The increased contention of the major packers forced the shipper and independent butcher trade to move faster in order to get their needs.

Fat Cattle Topped at \$22, Stock Calves \$19.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings at Fort Worth Monday drew \$18 to \$22. C. F. Mock & Son, Oklahoma, had four loads of 1,046-pound steers at \$22 and Clyde McClung, Johnson County, had two loads of steers at \$22 that averaged 1,022 and two loads of heifers at 774 pounds at \$20.

Fat cows sold from \$9 to \$12, a few heiferish kinds higher, a load of horned cows from Furd Halsell & Son, Tarrant County, averaged 1,216 pounds at \$12.

Canners and cutters sold from \$8 to \$9.50. Bulls drew \$8 to \$12.50, some individuals up to \$13.

Fat calves of good and choice kinds cashed at \$14.50 to \$18.50 and common and medium butcher sorts sold around \$11 to \$14, with culls from \$8 to \$10.

Stocker steer calves cashed at \$15 to \$19 when good and choice and the \$19 price representing some choice feeding calves like those from J. B. McCord of Coleman County, the 26 head averaging 485 pounds at \$19. Stocker steer yearlings sold from \$18.50 down, and numerous loads and smaller lots of the plain to medium stocker kinds sold from \$12 to \$14.50. Stocker cows drew \$7 to \$12.

Lambs Advanced 50c; Dressed Trade Higher. Fat lambs were fully 25 to 50 cents higher at Fort Worth Monday as the market found stronger support from smaller supplies and also from a 2c to 3c per pound advance in dressed lamb prices in New York.

Good and choice fat lambs cashed at \$17 to \$19, the top established by a string of lambs averaging 83 pounds at \$19 that came from Zack Taylor, Tatum, N. M. There were 526 lambs in this shipment. Common and medium slaughter lambs drew \$11 to \$15 and culls sold around \$8 to \$10.

Stocker and feeder lambs cashed at \$10 to \$14.50. Slaughter yearling wethers sold from \$8 to \$12, while aged wethers drew \$6 to \$9. Slaughter ewes drew \$3.50 to \$4.50, and old bucks sold around \$3.

Hogs At Best Prices In About A Month.

Hogs topped at \$23.75 to \$24 at Fort Worth Monday, the best in some weeks, and the market was 25 to 50 cents above the close of last week. Shippers having \$24 hogs included Ed Young, Tarrant County; the Pythian Home, Weatherford; S. G. Goren, Argyle; O. D. Stone, Tarrant County, Perry Clepper, Everman; J. L. Walter, McLennan County; Henry Ballweg, Tarrant County.

Q. To complete my Korean GI Bill training in dentistry, I am required to take an internship in my specialty. May I do this under the GI Bill?

A. Yes, provided the internship satisfies the educational requirements for certification by a Dental Specialty Board. The dental internship may not exceed one year.

Q. My GI insurance has lapsed and I have been told that I must take a physical examination in order to reinstate it. My brother is a doctor. Could he give me the examination?

A. No. Physical examinations for GI insurance purposes may not be made by physicians who are related to the veteran, either by blood or by marriage.

Q. I am the widow of a World War I veteran and I am drawing a monthly VA pension. I have a small part-time job. Recently, I was injured on the job and, as a result, I am receiving workmen's compensation pay. Do I have to include my workmen's compensation, in figuring my annual income for VA pension purposes?

A. Yes. Workmen's compensation payments are considered as income for VA pension purposes. However, you may deduct medical expenses that you have had to pay out because of your injury.

Q. I recently graduated from the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. Would my service there entitle me to Korean GI Bill training benefits?

A. No. Under the law, time spent at any of the service academies may not be counted toward Korean GI Bill entitlement.

Highlights and Sidelights FROM your State CAPITOL

Warning System Coming.
Texas soon will have a modern storm warning system to spot danger miles away by radar, Gov. Shivers announced.

Shivers said that completion of the system called the most up-to-date in the world, will come in the next six weeks.

Already functioning as part of the radar chain are units in 11 cities. The radar net ties into the Department of Public Safety system, giving it Weather Bureau radar reports within two minutes after a warning is issued.

Texas Building Booms.
Construction in Texas spiraled toward a record high in June, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Reported by the bureau was a predominance of commercial, industrial, highway, church, school and government building.

Building permits issued throughout the state during the first half of 1954 exceeded totals for the same period last year by six per cent, the reports showed.

Liquor Revenue Up.
Texas liquor revenue in June showed a \$41,000 increase over the total for the same month last year, the monthly report of the Texas Liquor Control Board reveals.

June revenue this year was \$1,425,179.13 with the largest part of the amount derived from beer and whiskey taxes.

The board also noted an apparent increase of moonshining over the state, with seizure of 11 illicit stills and arrest of six on moonshining charges.

FBI Agent Speaks.

Two forms of crime are on the increase: car thefts and swindling-bad check passing.

So said Vernon H. Bailey, special agent of the FBI in San Antonio, in an Austin speech.

Car thefts inconvenience more people and cause a greater loss of property than any other form of crime, the agent said.

Short Snorts.
Americans no longer believe that things are good only if they come from Europe, says Dr. Lewis U. Hanke, University of Texas professor.

Now you can break the law by driving too slow. The rule of 40 miles per hour minimum applies on a stretch of the Austin Expressway.

Heroes and heroines of Texas education will be selected by a panel, announced A. Garland Adair of Austin, director of the Texas Heritage Foundation. Selections will be announced on School Centennial Day at the State Fair of Texas.

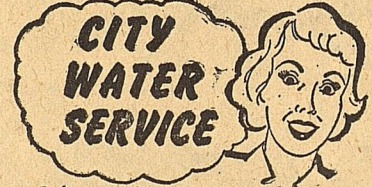

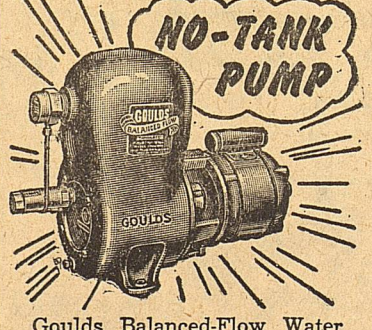

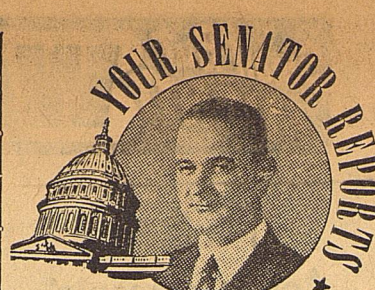

For naval base construction, the committee approved \$114,000,000 in new funds and a total authorization of \$209,000,000.

Important to Texas: So far as Texas is concerned, the supplemental appropriations bill also was important for one item it did not contain.

I expressed to Senator Bridges, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, my vigorous opposition to the FPC request for the additional \$300,000, making three points:

The steps it will take once the issue has reached a conclusion. The gas industry is a Texas asset of tremendous value.

Naturally, I was happy that the Senate committee agreed with me and refused the request of the FPC for the supplemental appropriation.

Public Buildings Program: The Federal Government is about to launch a public buildings program to extend over the next three years.

The General Services Administration and the Post Office Department are now compiling a list of priority Federal construction for submission to the Budget Bureau and to the House and Senate Public Works Committees.

A large number of proposed buildings in Texas are included among the Federal building projects listed as eligible for construction.

For naval base construction, the committee approved \$114,000,000 in new funds and a total authorization of \$209,000,000.

Important to Texas: So far as Texas is concerned, the supplemental appropriations bill also was important for one item it did not contain.

I expressed to Senator Bridges, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, my vigorous opposition to the FPC request for the additional \$300,000, making three points:

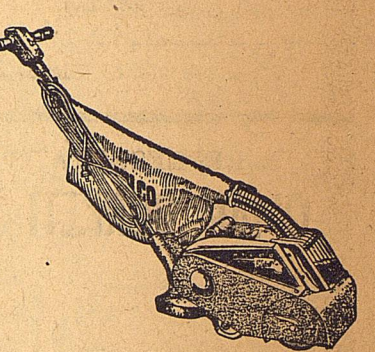

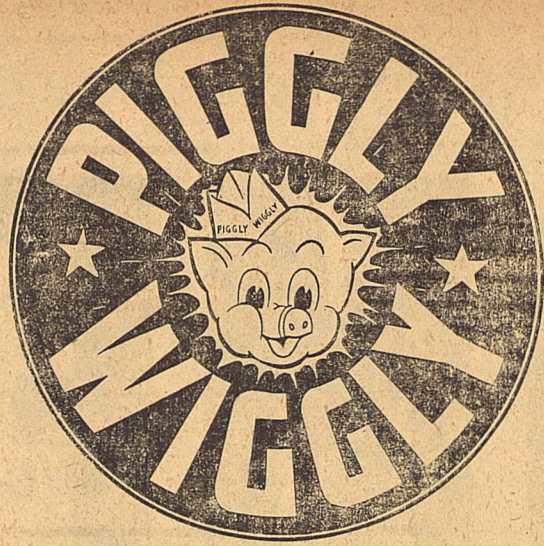
