

While reading in a newspaper I picked up in town yesterday about the results of the vote farmers delivered on cotton marketing quotas this week, as you know these quotas are voted on because farmers have produced too much cotton, I saw over on another page an article that revealed farmers ain't the only people who are over-producing.

Colleges are doing it now. According to a college president the article was quoting, "American colleges may be turning out too many graduates."

This bowled me over. You mean to say colleges ain't no smarter than us farmers and are gonna have to have marketing quotas on graduates?

I kept on readin

You mean to say that college graduates are like bales of cotton. after you get so many there ain't no need for anymore? This seems to put a new interpretation on education, and I'm looking forward to the time when all quota elections are combined and in one column on your ballot you vote for cotton limitations, for corn or maize or wheat limitations in another, for the size of the college crop in another.

This president even went on. He said that some educators feel that in the future large proportions of college graduates will have to be content with manual labor, and he reminded his listeners of the old saving that college ruins some otherwise good plow hands.

I do not follow this line of thinking. The idea that a college education unfits a man for farming, is a new one to me. I know some of us farmers ain't educated, but I never considered that ignorance was a requirement for plowing and once you improved your mind you had to give it up.

The idea that manual labor and education don't go together is a new one on me too. Even a college president with a string of degrees is bound to have to do some manual labor, unless he has somebody hired to work his tooth brush back and forth for him. I ain't never considered calluses on your hands was a bar to some education in your head.

I don't know any farmers who wish they were college professors, but I have an idea there are some college professors who wish they were farmers, if for no other reason just for the increase in income they'd get. I imagine there are more teachers teaching because they can't farm than there are farmers farming because they can't teach.

If we can produce too many college graduates, why can't we produce too many high school graduates? Too many grammar school graduates? Who thought up the idea of teaching people to read, anyway?

Sometimes college presidents leave me wondering, but I guess they could say the same for me.







HEALTH NOTES-

Austin-The drought, which during the last ten years in the Southwest, including Texas, has caused untold damage to the farmers, ranchers, and industry, has also presented problems in public health, declared Dr. Henry A. Holle, state

The drought may be a lesson as it has brought along with it an awakening of the conscience to conserve and protect water quality and quantity for all useful purposes. Many organizations from Chambers of Commerce to other civic clubs, watershed organizations, research foundations and educational institutions have appointed committees and are doing something about it. The problems are complex, yet with unity of purpose, a solution will be

It was through the coordinated efforts of the municipalities, trained water and sewage plant operators and public health workers throughout the state that we have emerged from a most disastrous situation by the breadth of a fine hair. Municipalities in the state, though some of them face future shortages, have at this writing sufficient water for local needs when used conservatively and such cities as were fortunate enough to be located in the proximity of impoundages previously built should show no hesitancy in

continuing their expansion plans. Dr. Holle stated that the state has been able to maintain good protective services which unquestionably will be increased. Such services include approval of plans for water treatment facilities. The periodic inspection of the treatment facilities and checking of their efficiences. The regular analyses of water specimens, amounted to over 85,000 during the past twelve months. Watersheds are surveyed. Reservoirs are required to enforce sanitary regulations. Stream analyses are made. Pollution needs are being met with the 629 treatment plants in the state. Regular inspection is made of the large industrial plants and their wastes are checked for toxic materials and contamin-

Dr. Holle said that we should end our support to the recommendations of the Texas Water Resources Committee which has studied the problems from various angles and is presenting a plan which, if implemented, will insure Texas' preparedness in meeting fu-



Ever See A Nightmare Walking?; They Do

Ever see a nightmare walking? A lot of motorists will tell you they have. And the chances are they're right. For the careless antics of many walkers are a nightmare

to drivers. According to R. B. Roaper of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and Chief Safety Engineer for Humble Oil & Refining Company, the most dangerous habits of walkers (and the most annoying from the motorist's point of view) are:

Crossing between intersections. Dashing out from behind parked cars or other stationary objects. Not looking both ways before

stepping off the curb. Mr. Roaper said that in 1953 more than one out of three pedestrians killed in urban traffic accidents was crossing between intersections at the time of the accident. These figures are from the records of the National Safety Council, which is cooperating with the Texas Safety Association and the Texas Department of Public Safety in sponsoring the November Pedestrian Safety program in Texas.

"It's a driver's duty to use the greatest caution in traffic and to protect pedestrians at all times," Mr. Roaper said. "But we can't expect him to do the impossible. And very often it is impossible for a driver to stop a car in time to avoid a pedestrian who literally springs out at him from the curb."

He urges all walkers to accept the esponsibility for their own safety. "After all," he said, "you'll be in no position to pass the buck to the driver if you get killed in traffic."

y payments under the Social Security Act will find that 1955 starts a more liberal work deduction provision than was formerly possible. However, beneficiaries now receiving payment because their current employment or self-employment is not covered by the Social Security Act are cautioned to read the following paragraph very carefully.

The new law increases the amount of covered earnings a beneficiary is entitled to have and still receive his monthly benefit check. The provision in the old law which restricted such earnings to \$75 a month in covered employment and to \$900 a year from self-employment has been

Dicrimination against the wage earner a compared to the self-employed has been removed and all retired persons will have the earning exemption on an annual basis. beneficiaries under 72 years of age may then have earnings up to \$1,200 in a year without loss of any benefits. This applies to all earnings of any kind, whether overed by Social Security or not. Only one month's benefit will be deducted for each additional \$80 earned. Benefits are payable regardless of annual earnings for any month in which the beneficiary neither has wages of over \$80 nor engaged in substantial self-employment. After reaching age 72, the beneficiary may earn any amount and still receive benefits, beginning
