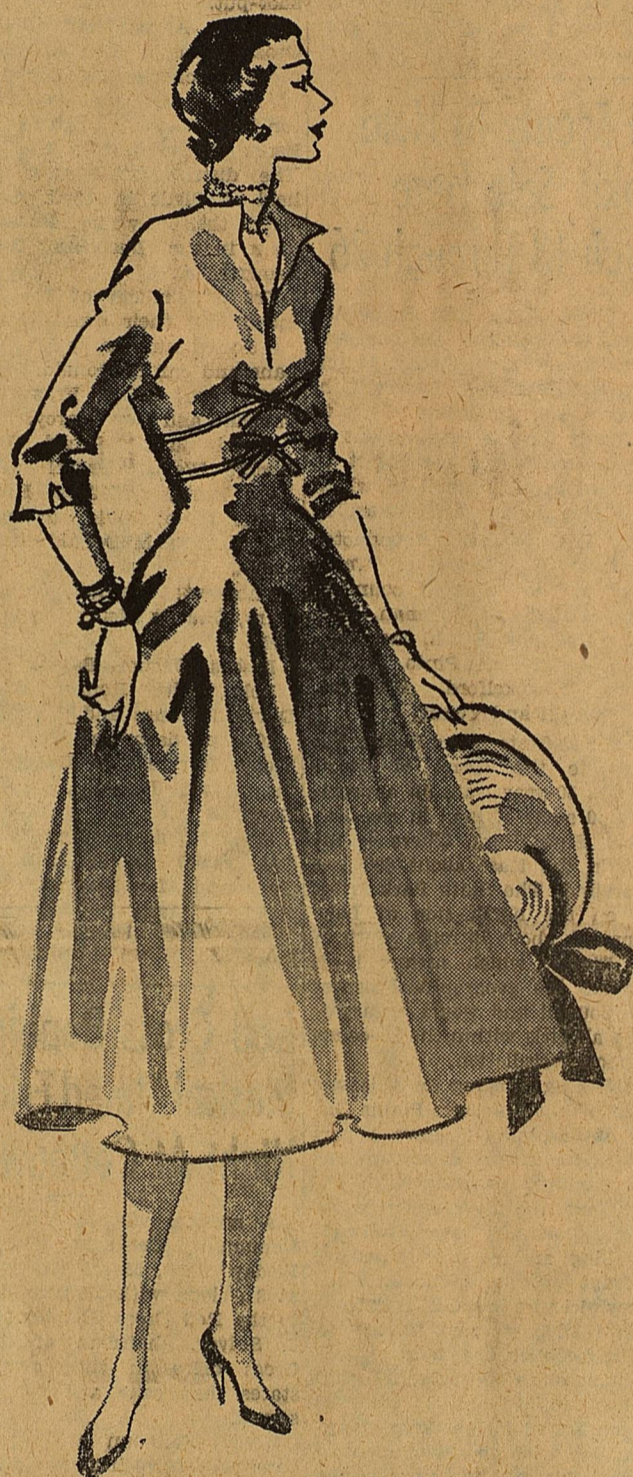

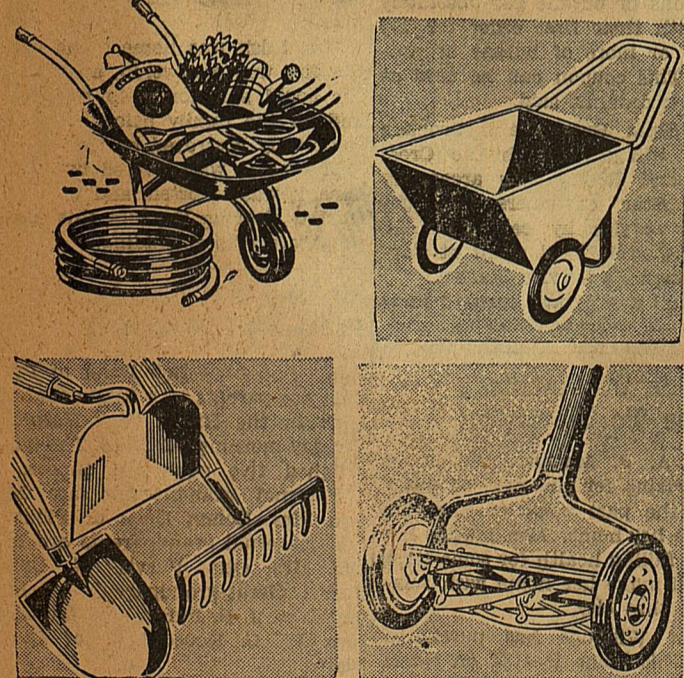

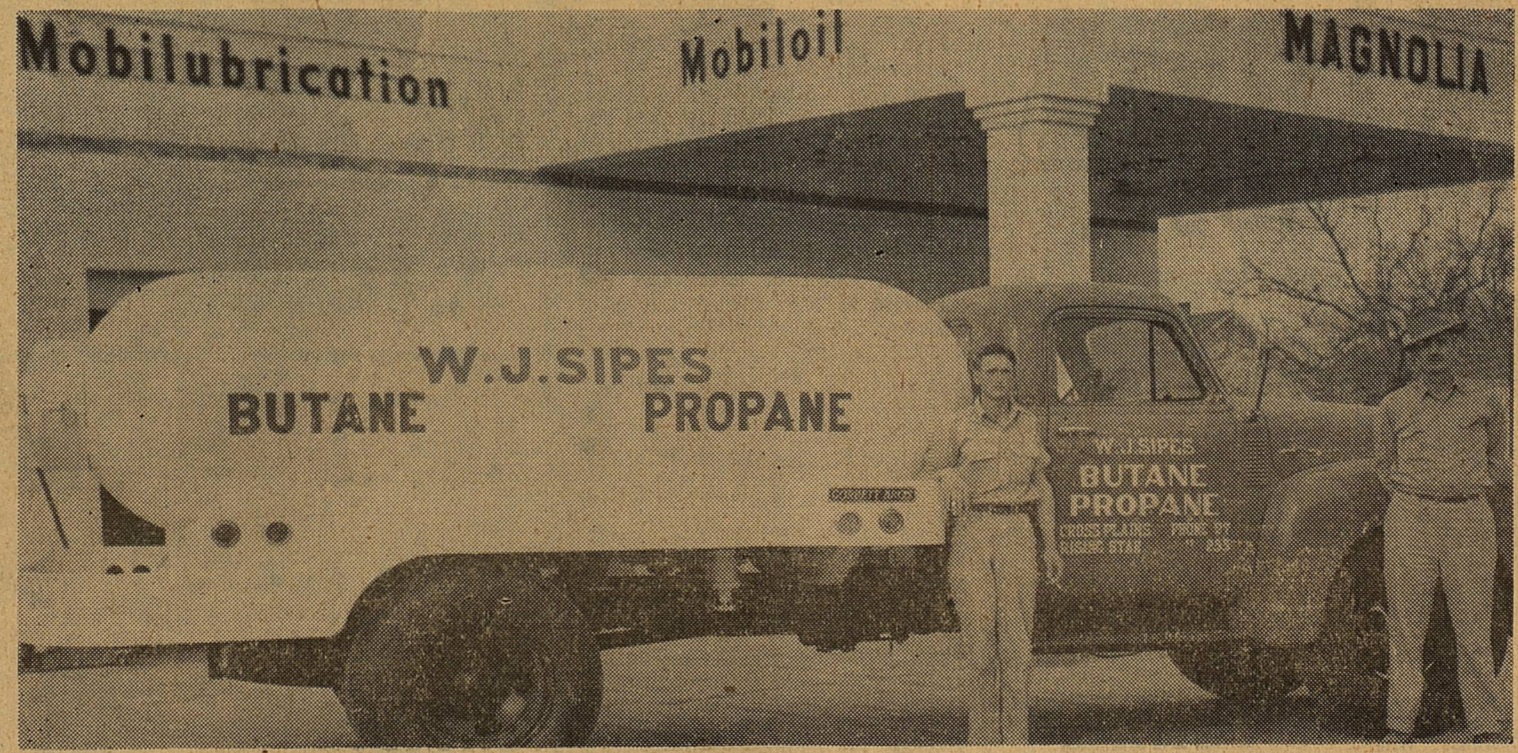

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN.—Top news of the week is the arrest of Bascom Giles.

The former land commissioner was charged with conspiracy to commit theft of \$83,500 in state funds.

Giles' indictment was issued by the Travis County grand jury following investigation of alleged irregularities in the veterans' land program.

He was released after posting a \$60,000 bond—first set at \$100,000 and later reduced.

Strict secrecy has shrouded Travis County's land fraud indictments.

An unknown number of them have been made. Names of others indicted will be announced as arrests are made.

Austin, Tex.—Strict secrecy has shrouded Travis County's land fraud indictments.

An unknown number of them have been made. Names of those indicted will be withheld, pending arrests.

District Attorney Les Proctor said the indictments were sealed "in the interest of law enforcement." He would not estimate how long it might be before the names could be made public.

Proctor also had asked for a special jury to prevent any let-up in the investigation.

District Judge Charles O. Betts signed an order calling a special grand jury into session on March 10. His order does not limit the jury to land investigations, although that is its actual purpose.

Betts' order will keep the jury in session until the last Saturday in July. The previous grand jury's session expired March 5.

Rumors in Capitol corridors have it that the most outstanding breaks in the land investigation are yet to come.

McLarty Returns

T. J. McLarty of Denver, Colo., one of the several real estate promoters indicted in connection with veterans' land transactions, returned to Texas to post a \$26,400 bond and talk to legislative investigators.

He has asked the privilege of having other witnesses and records subpoenaed.

Shepherd Busy

A report from the Attorney Gen-

eral's office reveals that since the beginning of the veterans' land investigation in October of last year, John Ben Shepherd's office has been a beehive of activity.

Shepherd estimates he and his assistants have traveled over 18,000 miles and have put in over 41,000 man-hours of time on the veterans' land investigation.

Shepherd has met with grand juries almost daily.

Thus far, the Bexar and DeWitt County grand juries have returned a total of 188 indictments against eight persons involved in veterans' land sales.

In addition, the State has filed three criminal complaints in Travis County.

Ten civil suits have been filed against 25 separate promoters. The total recovery sought by Shepherd in these 10 suits is \$1,604,000.

Attorney General Shepherd plans to meet with 13 different grand juries during the month of March. He forecasts that this month will see the returning of "hundreds of criminal indictments against most of the persons involved."

Shepherd has added a complete new division to his department to process veterans' land civil and criminal cases. It is headed by Cecil E. Burney of Corpus Christi, an ex-prosecutor and former president of the State Bar of Texas.

Session Passing

Half of the regular session of the 54th Legislature is gone.

Governor Shivers said he wasn't perturbed at the slow start on important tax, water, appropriations and other legislation. He hadn't expected lawmakers to finish much legislation in the first half of the session.

There still is plenty of time, the Governor believes, to complete the program.

Minor Water Bills

Two minor water bills got an okay in the House.

One gives the State Water Board power to review proposals for federal projects. Veto power for the governor, originally in the bill, was stricken out.

The other requires water districts to register with the state board.

Important water conservation measures, involving millions of dollars, have not reached a vote in either house.

Insurance Bills

Two big insurance bills were hung in committee. Rep. Floyd Bradshaw's omnibus bill would regulate fire and casualty companies of all kinds. Sen. Searcy Bracewell's would regulate life companies.

Regulations in Bradshaw's bill would: Raise minimum capital and surplus requirements (combined) to \$200,000 for fire companies; \$300,000 for casualty; and \$500,000 for companies writing more than one line.

One advocate of his bill said, "Insurance companies have to be born big."

Governor Shivers, on the other hand, said that just because an insurance company is small doesn't mean it isn't sound.

Bracewell's bill would raise minimum capital and surplus requirements of life companies to \$200,000 and require that it be kept in cash or bonds, not in real estate.

Rep. Vernon Smith charged that "vicious and false propaganda" by out-of-state insurance companies had impaired confidence in Texas insurance.

The announcement of Culberson's appointment was made by Harlan Powell of Dallas, president of the Texas Society for Crippled Children.

The Easter Seal Campaign will open March 10, and continue through Easter Sunday, April 10. The object of the campaign is to raise funds for the care and treatment of dependent crippled children of Texas, providing treatments and such material aid as wheel chairs, braces, corrective surgery and other services.

Accepting the appointment, Mr. Culberson said he was "greatly honored to be named to head such a worthwhile and humanitarian cause."

"Every contribution, every dollar," he said, "goes to help some crippled child. There are many in our State who need our help. On the success of this campaign depends the future happiness and well-being of many children."

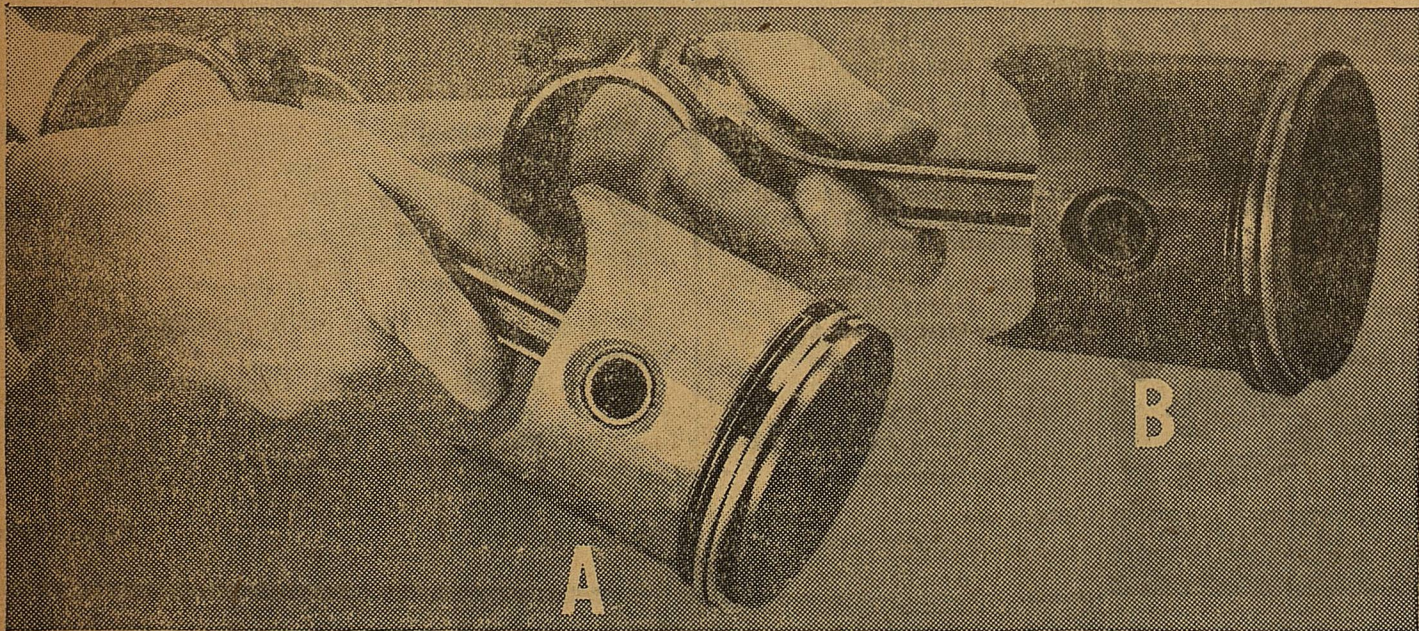

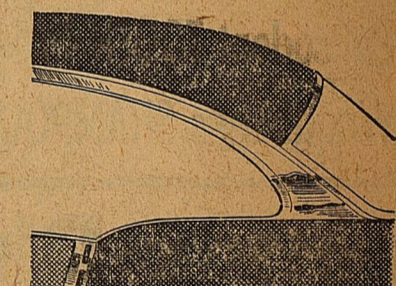

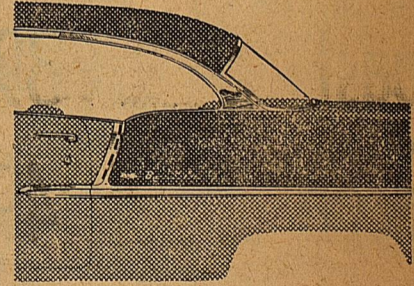

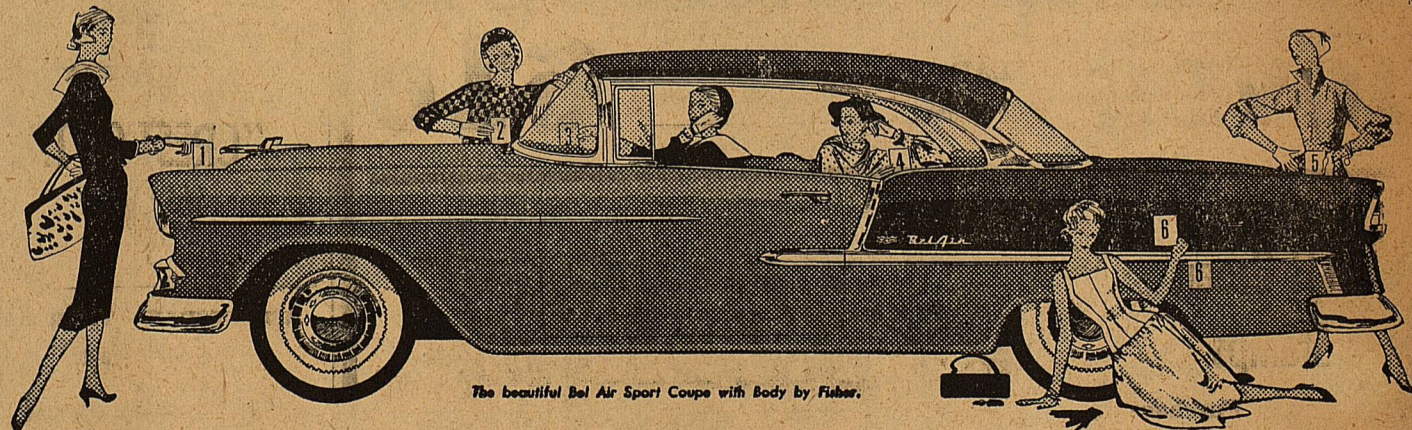

Troy Tomlinson Attends General Motors School

Troy Tomlinson returned home Saturday from Garland, where he attended the General Motors Training Center to learn advanced automotive service techniques which he will use in his work at Bishop Chevrolet Company in Cross Plains.

Mr. Tomlinson, who resides at Burkett, spent two and a half days at the Garland School, one of a nationwide network of training centers being set up by General Motors to keep employees of its car and truck dealerships abreast of new mechanical developments and service techniques.

A mechanic with Bishop Chevrolet Co. for four years, he selected the 1955 product course, taking advanced study in model changes.

Lee Bishop, head of the company, said he sent Mr. Tomlinson to the Garland center to give his customers the benefit of improved service techniques taught there.

The Garland training center, with more than 26,000 square feet of floor space, has eight specialized shop classrooms, for use by the Chevrolet, Pontiac, Oldsmobile, Buick, Cadillac, GMC Truck and Coach, Fisher Body and United Motors Service divisions of GM. Each division supplies a highly trained instructor for its courses at the center, which is managed by L. S.

Kuehn. GM officials expect a total of 5,000 mechanics to attend the center each year. Similar attendance is expected at other training centers when they are completed.

Harlow H. Curtice, president of General Motors, explained that the purpose of the centers is "to insure that the people who buy our cars and trucks will continue to receive efficient and satisfying service." He said that "the centers will make it possible for dealer service personnel to keep up to date on a systematic basis with improved service methods and technological advances such as air-conditioning, power steering, power brakes and other major improvements."

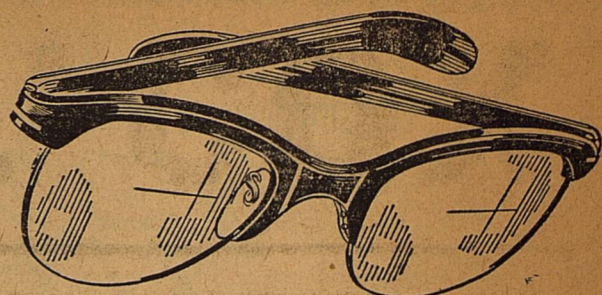
