The trouble with electing a man to Congress is that he considers it a mandate as they say from the people to get his name on some legislation. There ain't nothing apparently more embarrassing to a Congressman than to visit back home and have to admit to the people he hasn't gotten a law passed that he thought up, and consequently this puts so much pressure on him he has to rack his brain to find a spot for a new law, because if there's one thing the United States has a surplus of, it's laws.

Nearly any situation you think of, some Congressman has already thought of a law to cover it. But the other day a Congress-

man thought up

a new law, and I am concerned over it. What he wants is a law to prohibit the sale of merchandise be-

low cost. Now off-hand this might sound like a good thing, business has got to make a profit to be worth anything, and I guess if a man hasn't got sense enough not to sell for more than he paid, maybe

I know farmers, in fact I'm one of em, who have been selling below cost for years, and you pass a law putting a stop to it and you'll throw a lot of us out of

Year before last, nearly anybody who sold a cow he'd bought the year before that, sold it at below cost, and if this law had been in effect, by now lots of farmers couldn't have gotten to their mail box for stumbling

over dead cows. I'm not in favor of it, but one of the fundamental rights of a farmer has been to sell below cost, and you eliminate that and there'll be years when a man can't plant a new crop for wor-

rying where to put last year's. Maybe a druggist shouldn't be allowed to sell tooth paste below cost, or a merchant a formal evening gown, but you stop a farmer from selling his products that way and what's he gonna do



The explosion also sends miniature shock waves down into the earth. These waves bounce back from underlying strata and are picked up on sensitive recording instruments. Interpretation of these records give clues to where structures which may contain oil are located.

Washington - The Federal Gov-. . takes 63.6 million dollars per year from our citizens in taxes. State and local governments take their additional toll. Federal axes alone are 21 percent of the national income, and amount to 396 for every man, woman and child in our land. It amount to \$1,249 per family. One reaches the point at times of feeling that the best way to curb the astronomical expenditures of Government is to provide less money. This has been tried, but what happens is that the Government goes ahead and spends money it does not have, which means deficit financing.

The only answer is to prohibit Government from spending more than it takes in from taxes, and to force the Congress and every legislative body before it adjourns to provide money for any appropriations it makes.
