We can even add space between words and letters, if we really come up short. And, as last resort, we can fill out a column by setting a word, perfectly spaced, so that it goes DOWNHILL



This seems to me to be an annual re-occurance of the same old problem and I'm just as anxious about it all this year, as in the past.



GIVE



PREOCCUPIED AS WE ARE with Turkey, Parades and Football we are prone to forget that Thanksgiving Day is our third most important Religious Holiday. No day would be long enough for us to enumerate our multitude of blessings and express our gratitude.

We of the twentieth century will take the day in stride, each person free to offer his Thanksgiving as dictated by his conscience.

In the turmoil of modern living we reach out for anything that promises stability; surely nothing could be more meaningful than a day set aside for our entire Nation to demonstrate our appreciation of Divine Guidance.

One hundred and nine years ago President Abraham Lincoln issued the first of a continuing series of official Thanksgiving Proclamations. President Nixon's 1972 message is one of gratitude for past blessings and hope for the future.

Long before the era of Presidential Proclamations the people gathered in the new world wilderness to give thanks.

There are hundreds of Virginians who claim that the first such meeting was at Berkeley Plantation on the James River in the year 1619, about two years before the Pilgrims held a similar service in Massachusetts.

This was not a "feast," it was given over entirely to prayers of thanksgiving for a safe voyage from England; however the early settlers intended that the "day of our ships arrival at the place assigned for plantation in the land of Virginia shall be yearly and perpetually holy as a day of thanksgiving to almighty God."

Even that early day was really not the first.

In the fall of 1608 the English at Jamestown, Virginia, were recovering from an epidemic of malaria and faced with starvation.

Suddenly Providence came to their rescue. A band of Indians bending low under burdens of corn and venison entered the fort. At the column's head was the teen-aged Pocahontas. Out of the goodness of her heart she fed the perishing colony.

She returned each week and was thereafter called "the dear and blessed Pocahontas."

An account of American traditions would not be complete without some mention of Texas!

When Coronado escaped the endless, drought striken plains in the late summer of 1541 he called his "army" together for a religious service thanking the Almighty for pointing the way into the cool depths of Tule Canyon.

This could very well have been the first real Thanksgiving in the New World.



SX 520 This is a NEW medium maturing yellow corn that was number one in yield tests conducted by Ronnie Gfeller, agronomist, on the Dan Heard Farm, 1 mile south of Dimmitt during 1972. With a yield of 221.5 bushels per acre P-A-G SX 520 stood well (0% lodged stalks) and still out-yielded the late varieties of corn. This P-A-G single cross is another of the fast germinating, vigorous, high yielding "new breed" of P-A-G custom hybrids. SX 520 is an excellent dual purpose corn for high grain vield - high quality, top tonnage silage.

SX 98 Distinctive because of its dark green color and relatively up-right leaf for maximum light utilization. SX 98 yields and yields and yields. (208.2 bushels per acre in 1972 Dimmitt tests.) A fairly short hybrid corn (7 ft. 3 in. in tests) with good ear placement. Has a bred-in "digestive system" that gives it the capacity to make full use of large amounts of fertilizer.

344 A very attractive 3-way cross with dark green color and large, girthy ears. The grain is a medium dent of high quality. A real producer, outstanding performance in tests in Dimmitt area during 1971, and produced 190.8 bushels in the 1972 tests. 344 is a proven high yielder.

492 A tall, rugged, 4-way with the built in capacity to produce "tons" of high quality silage over a wide range of conditions. Grain yields are very high for a double cross hybrid. 492 produces medium length ears with dense grain high in test weight. Several reports of yields in excess of 30 tons of excellent silage made during 1972. Planted beside other silage varieties, farmers and feed lot managers keep planting and recommending P-A-G 492 for top yields of high quality silage.

RESULTS OF MOLDED FEED POISONING

Research indicates that animals which eat feeds contaminated by mycotoxins suffer from a variety of debilitating and lethal conditions such as hemorrhaging, anemia, cancer, poor growth rate, poor feed conversion and others.

Some molds produce a toxin which elicts similar responses in sows as the hormone estrogen. In sows, this response to the toxin may be one of swollen mammary glands and prolapse of reproduction organs.

Apparently, mycotoxins affect the reproductive system in varied ways, from completely stopping milk production, marked decrease in the vitality of new born pigs, numerous stillborn births and lowered ovulation rates to normal pregnancy and lactation. These variable results may be related to the amount of mycotoxin consumed.

Many abortions are reported in swine with no evidence of virus or bacterial infection. It is possible that mycotoxins may play a role in some of these undiagnosed cases.

The best way to keep from playing "Mycotoxicosis Russian Roulette" is to avoid feeding molded feeds.

1. The strain of fungus: not all fungus produces toxin.

2...The temperature at which it grows; the best environment for toxin production seems to be a period of moderately warm weather followed by a period of cool weather and a fairly high moisture content. 3. The length of time it grows.

4. Other bacterial growth associated with it.

5. The species of animal to which it is fed; this may

be even more specific, with toxicity varying with sex and age.

A NEW MILDEW and leaf rust-resistant, semi-winter barley, Tambar 401, has been developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Small Grains Section.

Tambar is a six-rowed, rough-awned barley with leaves that are wider and more upright and twisted than those of Cordova. The new variety produced the highest yield of all varieties

grown in Central and North Texas tests from 1965 to 1971. It was particularly outstanding in the Rolling and High Plains areas. Under irrigation near Bushland, Tambar averaged 103.9

bushels, compared to 88.2 bushels for Will, the best yielding commercial variety. It was equal to Cordova in average test weight for all locations but had a lower average test weight than did Rogers.

Tambar appears to equal Cordova in early fall and winter forage but may produce less forage in the spring.


A late maturing variety, 401 heads about the same time as Rogers and Will, and approximately five days later than Cordova. Straw is large and fairly stiff. It lodges more than Cordova but less than Will and Rogers under normal growing conditions. Winter survival tests at Bushland indicate that 401 is less winter-hardy than Will but equal to Cordova.

HAVE YOU EVER HEARD of "Mycotoxicosis Russian Roulette"? You may not have, but chances are you're playing that deadly game if you feed molded feeds to your pigs.

According to Dr. Gene Cope, Extension Veterinarian, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Amarillo, mycotoxicosis is a two-dollar word which means "poisoning of the host following entrance into the body of one or more toxicants produced by a mold." While the condition has been recognized for many years, serious research was not initiated until the last decade.

The problem is complex, because the production of toxin is influenced by many factors
