Chiefs Sparkle In Scrimmage

The Friona Chieftains looked impressive in their first 1973 outing, scoring four touchdowns in their scrimmage with Boys Ranch here Thursday night.

And, while the offense was clicking, the defense also sparkled, as the Big Red defenders held the visitors scoreless and allowed only two earned first downs during the controlled scrimmage.

Quarterback Clay Bandy ran for one touchdown, and threw scoring passes for two additional TDs. Halfback Ted King crossed the goal-line twice, once on a pass from Bandy and again on a 60-yard scamper up the middle.

Friona's first unit wasted no time in moving the ball, as Bandy moved the team downfield. He got the score himself on an option run-or-pass play from five yards out.

Late in the scrimmage, Ted King, whose off-tackle runs gave Friona fans something to get excited about, broke to the right and weaved his way 60 yards for the score. The BR defense was caught moving the wrong way, and King's quickness took advantage of the situation.

Friona coaches lauded the team for its sparkling performance.

"The tough defensive play was a great team effort. The boys had the game under control at all times," commented a Chieftain coach.

Singled out for special

recognition were linebackers James Perea, Terry Thompson and Ricky London. Also drawing praise were lineman Dale Cleveland and secondary man Ted King for their defensive work.

Coaches indicated that the team still faced a lot of hard work prior to its 1973 season opener here against Farwell in two weeks, but admitted that they were pleased with the scrimmage results.

The Chieftains go to Canyon next Friday for a scrimmage against the class AAA Eagles, defending district champs. Friona opens its season at home against Farwell on Friday, September 7.

In the meantime, coaches are growing concerned about injuries which are beginning to plague the team in workouts.

Editorial In Slap At Urban Housewives

Editor's note—Many opinions have been generated by the recent meat boycott. One of the strongest we have read or heard is the following commentary written by columnist Bob Brumfield of the "Cincinnati Enquirer." We include it here in its entirety for readers who might want to apply—or debate—the points it raises.

HUNGRY HON? EAT YOUR HEART OUT!

It would serve this country's whining, complaining, penny-wise and pound-foolish housewives right if all the farmers started selling everything they produce to foreign housewives.

The typical modern American urban housewife, for all of her virtues—real or imagined—is a short-sighted, lazy, pampered little ingrate whose primary interests are her underarms, her hair, her hands, her hips, her over-indulged and overeducated children, her overweight and overpaid husband and the next thrilling episode of "General Hospital"—in that order.

A hard day's work in a grocery or a bakery would do her a lot of good. So would taking over the duties of a farm wife for a while. Maybe then she'd realize that these people to make a decent living just as much as her union scale husband.

Whoever gave the urban housewife the idea that she's the only damned person in the world having a hard time making ends meet? When was the last time she had to send her kids off to school with a couple of cold biscuits and a hunk of fatback to hold them until suppertime, or flopped down, bone-weary after working from sunup to sundown, and worried about whether the frost was going to kill the money crop?

While milady of the suburbs is soaking in her tub in her Better Homes & Gardens bathroom, thousands of farm wives are scraping off the dirt of an honest day's toil in a galvanized laundry tub. And while Miss City-britches is spraying \$10 worth of deodorant, skin softener, hair spray, and assorted beauty crap, the average farm wife is counting her blessings because she was able to swing for a bottle of Cornhusker's lotion and some Absorbine Junior.

If the urban housewife would stop organizing food boycotts and shovel a little cow manure, maybe she'd learn where milk comes from and how much work is involved before she strains herself ripping open that little waxed carton.

Boycott a grocery? Not me, sister. I still can remember how many people would have starved in this country if the independent grocers hadn't carried them on credit during the Depression.

Wise up! All that pretty food and those nice cuts of meat didn't just appear in the market in a blinding flash of sparkledust. Millions of people have worked their tails off to put it in there for you—butehers, bakers, clerks, laborers, farmers, truck drivers, accountants, filling station attendants, and hundreds of other occupations. These people have dreams, too. They pay rent and taxes just like you do. And they deserve to make just as good a living as you do. Why single them out for destruction?

Why not your husband, the account executive? Why not your husband, the plumber? Why not your husband, the doctor? Why not your husband, the lawyer? Or why not—God help you—your husband, the newspaper writer?

You sit there in front of your color TV set with a \$3,000 car in the garage, smelling like the Garden of Eden and looking 10 years younger than you are. You take a vacation every year. Your insurance premiums are paid up. Your husband has a good job. Your children are healthy. You don't have any chains around your ankles and the bombers won't come tonight. And you're going bananas because bread went up a penny a loaf! You make me sick.

Of special interest to Texans is "A Season of Weathering". The author, William A. Owens, is a native son. The book is an autobiography of this East Texan with a desire to become a country school teacher and his struggle in the early 1900's to reach his goal. He succeeded and later became president of Columbia University.

If politics concerns and interests you, you would enjoy "The Presidential Character—Predicting Performance in the White House". Author James David Barber writes about why presidents do what they do. Barber was a political science professor at Yale University and is now head of the department at Duke University.

Every president from Washington to Nixon is studied and categorized to fit into one of four divisions. The book was published in 1972, prior to Watergate, and made predictions about Nixon's accomplishments and actions in office. Amusing and interesting incidents about all presidents were discussed. A good book and an informative one.

For the feminine among readers who like reading the poetry of Kahlil Gibran, a new book is in the library. "Beloved Prophet—The Love Letters of Kahlil Gibran and Mary Haskell and her private journal" sheds new light on the Lebanese mystic who became an acclaimed poet and artist in the United States.

The 500 letters and 47 journals were recently discovered in the archives of the University of North Carolina, to which Mary Haskell had donated her papers. The letters and journal follow the relationship of the artist and the American schoolmistress who is 21 years older than he. Good reading for the romantic among us.

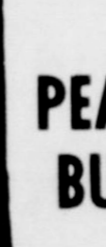

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School Dress Policy Unchanged This Year

On January 11, 1971, during a regular school board meeting, it was unanimously agreed by the board to adopt a standard dress policy for Friona Schools. In the interim, the same policy has been adapted for use and approved in general meetings by school students. The policy that initially was adopted by the school board in 1971 has continued in use and will be the policy again this year.

The school board members said in adopting the policy, "We believe that student dress and grooming is primarily the responsibility of students and their parents. However, a

proper atmosphere for learning in the school is the responsibility of the school.

"We also believe that personal appearance is an important factor in developing and maintaining an attitude and atmosphere which is conducive to learning on the part of the student in school.

"We realize stylishness is a very important thing to all of us, but we think there are some types of dress and grooming which are more appropriate for specific types of activities and/or locations than others. Experience has shown that there are extremes in dress and grooming that lead to

disruption of the learning process in school.

"We believe these guidelines are realistic, reasonable and easily interpreted. It is impossible to list every item or which there might be a question, but attached are the guidelines on items most often mentioned.

The dress policy which was adopted reads as follows—

BOYS

Boy's hair length is not to be worn below the eye brow or collar line of a normal dress shirt in a regular standing position. Boy's hair must be tapered or blocked in the back, also trimmed or combed so that the ears are fully exposed.

Boy's sideburns may extend to the ear lobe provided they are uniformly blocked and neatly trimmed.

Boys will be expected to dress neatly and cleanly at all times—

A. Shirts designed to be worn in must be worn in at all times.

B. Socks must be worn with shoes at all times.

No hats will be worn in the building at anytime. (During regular school day).

GIRLS

Girl's hair should be neat, clean, well groomed, and styled in such a way that the vision will not be obstructed.

Dresses must be of such a length to provide that undergarments can be covered at all times.

Pant-dresses and culottes may be worn so long as the length is skirt length, and the appearance is of a skirt rather than of shorts.

Shirrtails shall be worn in skirts unless shirrtail is square cut and definitely designed to be worn outside the skirt.

Shirrtails may be worn outside slacks so long as they do not exceed the standard length.

BOTH BOYS AND GIRLS

Sunshades are not to be worn in the school building unless prescribed by a doctor or the school nurse.

Superintendent Alton Farr said that one time several students indicated a desire to revise the dress policy, but when a general meeting of the student body was held in the auditorium, with no teachers present, only a small majority voted to change the policy so it was left as originally adopted.

During the past week, a meeting was held in another attempt to change the policy. No results of the meeting have been released, but the indication from letters in the Star office indicate a slight edge toward keeping the present policy.

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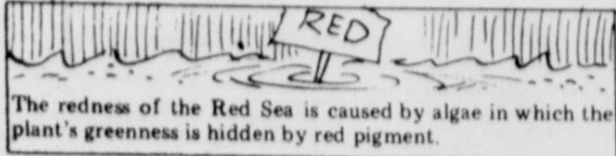

The Truth Will Make You Free
 Jerry Brown, Minister Sixth Street Church of Christ

For the past four months, this article had dealt with the history of the Bible. This is a summary of the essential features of those articles.

1. The most important writing materials in the history of the Bible are leather, papyrus and vellum.
2. The Bible is a collection of books, written in Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek. The Old Testament was written in Hebrew, with the New Testament in Greek.
3. Manuscripts of the New Testament are of two classes—uncials and cursives. Cursives are those written in long-hand style, while uncials are those found in large, capital letters. Three famous uncials are—The Vatican, the Sinaitic, and the Alexandrian Manuscripts.
4. Many ancient versions and scripture quotations made by the early Christians aid on the text of the Bible.
5. Since transcription mistakes have been made in the production of copies, the task of Textual Criticism is to detect these mistakes and mark them off from the pure text. With a wealth of information at his hand, and following exact principles, the textual critic is able to do this with a high degree of precision.
6. The textual variants are of different types and degrees of importance. Most variants are obvious slips made by the scribe and present no problem. Others are of no consequence to our present text because they are not found in the most reliable manuscripts. Some represent substantial variation, but in this number no unique Biblical teaching or command is involved.
7. Our present New Testament text is a reconstructed Greek text. New discoveries have continued to make the text of the Bible more and more secure.
8. The work of early Jewish scribes has resulted in a carefully copied edition of the Old Testament text. The recently discovered Dead Sea Scrolls give unquestioned support to the reliability of our accepted Old Testament text.
9. The term canon applies to those books that are included in the Bible as authoritative Scripture. The separate books of the Bible became a part of the canon gradually.
10. "The Apocrypha" refers to a group of about fifteen books not included in our Old Testament.
11. William Tyndale was the first to translate the New Testament in English based on a Greek text. His ambition to put the Bible in the hands of the people lived on, resulting in the appearance of the illustrious King James Version.
12. Increasing knowledge of the Bible text has made it necessary in recent years to revise the King James translation. The main revisions have been the American Standard and the Revised Standard Versions. The most important advantage of recent translations is that they are based on early manuscripts and thus stand closer to the original inspired message.

This ends our study of the Bible's history. Hopefully, a knowledge of how we got the Bible will inspire you to study the Bible. Next week, we will begin a series of articles on How To Study the Bible and tools in Bible study.
