



### Dear Editor:

Since I've been on my ranch, working at this job of getting completely well, I have been doing a lot or reading and a lot of thinking about the farm situation. I regret to say that nothing I have learned has made me feel good about the outlook for the average farmer.

Another Rice Crop: In its August price survey, the Department of Agriculture reported a drop of 2 per cent in prices received by farmers for things they raise. This continues the trend that has been under way for three years.
