Question: If a farmer's average monthly income is determined by including the period back to January 1, 1951, will he not be penalized since he had 20 "covered" earnings until 1955.

Answer: Generally speaking, a person's average monthly earnings are figured by dividing his total covered earnings from 1951 to the date of his retirement or death by all the months in that period. However, under the new law, these four years from 1951 to 1955 can be dropped out in figuring his average monthly earnings on which his benefit will be based. One additional year can be dropped out if the insured worker has five years or more of coverage. The years dropped out need not be consecutive ones. They can be any 4 or 5 years of low or no earnings, so long as they fall within the period used in actermining his average income. In this way the farmer gets the same consideration that was given the self-employed persons who were brought under the program in 1951.

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



Merlin Garrett, Supervisor for the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District, was in town from his stock of this week and reported that the schedule for government aid on the establishing of winter legumes in the Fall of 1955, for winter protec-

tion from erosion will be as follows: Hairy vetch: drilled or broadcast with a nurse crop. Recommended seeding, 10 pounds per acre. Costhared rate, 9c per pound.

When planted in rows with nurse crop, five pounds per acre are recommended and the cost share rate is the same as above.

Austrian winter peas: or Dixie Wonder peas: drilled or broadcast, should be sowed at the rate of 30 pounds per acre and share-cost rate will be 4c per pound. When planted in rows, 15 pounds per acre are recommended and the same

Rye: drilled or broadcast with a winter legume, 30 pounds per acre are recommended. When planted in rows a winter legume 10 pounds per acre are recommended and the baby are spending a few days with cost rate will be 2 1-2c per pound.

Oats: drilled or broadcast with a winter legume, 40 pounds are recommended. When planted in rows with a winter legume, 15 pounds per acre are recommended and the cost-share rate has been set at 2c



First, VA said, GI application forms should be filled out fully and completely. An incomplete application can only cause delay, because VA will have to write to the veteran for the missing information.

Second, veterans should be sure they enclose a photostate or certi-fied copy of their service separation paper, along with their completed application form. Without this paper, VA will be unable to act promptly on the application.

Third, applications should be sent to the veteran's nearest VA Regional office, and not to VA headquarters in Washington, D. C. Any appli cations received in Washington merely will have to be referred to the appropriate regional office-a time-consuming process.


