John D. Monthgomcry, 29-yearold Cross Plains farmer, was found "not guilty" of murder in the death of his wife by the 42nd District Court jury in Abilene, Thursday

The jury of 11 men and one wonan deliberated slightly more than two hours before returning the verdict at 7:40 p.m. The trial opened Monday morning.

The state attempted to prove that Montgomery drowned his wife, Leah Naomi (Shorty) Montgomery in a bathtub at the Montgomery home

The defense maintained Mrs. Montgomery's death came from accidental drowning or suicide.

Cattle Prices Tend Lower; Except High Grade Stockers.

FORT WORTH-One of the largest offerings of cattle of the year appeared at the nation's 12 major vestock markets Monday with over 150,000 cattle were reported. Prices were tending lower at all points.

It was noteworthy that while cattle numbers were large, the offerings of carves around the major markets were around 6,000 under the comparable date a year earlier. This trend toward smaller numbers of calves going to market has been evident all this year and the effect it will have on estimated cattle population, will be confusing.

At Fort Worth most kinds of cattle and calves were weak to 50 cents lower, except high grade stockers and feeders which were fully steady. Again the order buyers reported that most of the stockers and feeders they bought were destined for Lambs \$1 Higher At Texas or other Southwestern states.

Currently prices of replacement cattle and calves here are equal to or above prices at most of the Cornbelt centers, and it is evident that restocking of the drouthy areas is going forward at a fast pace.

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
