





Dairymen Get

vice Extension Dalryman R. E Burleson. Don't wait, he adds, until the first cold snap hits to winterize the facilities needed to make the cow herd comfortable during the winter months ahead. Nature's children are busy putting up the feed they'll need and also looking after their winter housing requirements.

The dairyman who plans ahead will be the one not scratching and scrambling to get things in shape when winter hits and can expect his herd to maintain production at a high level, says Burleson.

Give the cow herd ample shelter to protect them from the elements; be sure adequate feeding and hay rack space is available and give the lots a good cleaning. Fill in holes which may later become mud puddles and remember, points out Burleson, that well drained lots and sheds add to cow comfort and this in turn can mean more production.

The squirrels have laid in their food supplies. Is your roughage supply or hay, silage and fall and winter pastures adequate? Plenty of roughage is essentual even when grains and protein supplements are abundant, says Burleson. Dairy rations built around plenty of roughage properly supplemented with a good grain mixture are the most economical and provide the bulk needed for proper digestion and increased efficiency.

Burleson believes some dairymen are losing production now because they are not including sufficient protein in the grain rations. For top production, he says, the protein level must be in balance with the quality of the roughage and pasture being used. The months ahead offer a special

challenge to dairymen, especially, to their manaferial ability. If the dairy herd gets the attention it deserves, right now is the time to get the dairy in shape for the winter

GET VA TREATMENT

Are you planning to store some grain this year? It would be wise to do some bug killing before putting any grain in the bin, clean the bin thoroughly of insects and trash. Sweep the floor and walls and then spray them with a DDT solution of two pounds of 50 percent wettable DDT pawder in 5 gallons of water, or one half gallon of 25 percent DDT emulsion concentrate in 5 gallons of water. Spray the floor and walls thoroughly, using two gallons of spray to 1,000 feet of surface.

After the grain is in the bin it can be fumigated to prevent wevil damage. Use a mixture of one part carbon tetrachloride plus three parts hylene dichloride or four parts tetrachloride plus one part carbon disulphide. The first mixture is safer to use. The second mixture containing carbon disulphide or "high life" is explosive.

It will take about a gallon of either of the mixtures to fumigate 10,000 pounds of grain sorghum. If your grain is in a steel bin use about onefourth less

The fumigants should be applied uniformly over the surface of the grain. Fumigants are poisonous and should be applied from the outside of the bin with a bucket or trombone type or some other type spray-

er. Do apply as fine spray. Fumigants volatilize into a gas which is heavier than air and rapidly sinks into the grain. Don't breathe the fumes or let the spray get on your skin. After you have treated your grain you should inpect it at least twice a month. If bugs are found to be injuring the grain in storage it should be refumigated.

surface tightly with aluminum foil CHEESE: Store in the refrigerator at 40 to 50 degrees F. After the original wrapper of cheese has been used, wrap the remainder of the cheese tightly in aluminum freezer paper before storing in the

BUTTER: Store in the refrigera-tor. Keep in the original wrapper or in a dish that is covered to prevent the butter from absorbing other odors. Butter may be stored at

Safety Expert Warns to Expect Unexpected of School Age Children

"That should be the watchword for all motorists at all times, but especially during the peak hours of school traffic in the morning and afternoons," Mr. E. C. McFadden of Dallas, Vice-President of Employers' Casualty Company and President of the Texas Safety Association, Inc., told motorists today in speaking of the united community effort being made to reduce traffic casualties to school children by the Safety Association, the Department of Public Safety and the National

"Children often are unpredicita-ble in their reactions," Mr. McFadden said. "This is especially true during the stresses and strains of growing up. "Despite repeated warnings from

parents and from school people not to jaywalk, or beat the light, or run in a street after a ball, children are apt to forget these warnings and walk or run right into danger. "While we are all united in a com mon drive against the senseless kill-ing of our children by motor vehicles each year, we must always be prepared for the unexpected, and keep alert whenever near an area where children may be walking or playing near the street."

"Many of the 4,000 children killed and the more thousands injured in accident over the past year were the traffic consequence of an impulsive action on the part of a child," Mr.

McFadden said. "While we as parents and teachers are doing our best to teach children how to protect themselves from accidents," he said, "statistics show we are not doing enough to insure the safety of our children. We must depend, therefore, on the motorist and enlist his cooperation in remembering his own safety practices


