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

sult from such a rating. Q-I am a disabled Korea veteran. What is my deadline for applying for the special GI insurance available to disabled Korea vterans?


A-You must apply and pay your first premium within one year from the date that VA has determined your disability to be service-connected.

Q-Are VA's special "wheel chair housing" grants available only to disabled World War II and Korea veterans?

Third Shot Necessary. Officials of the State Health Department have declared that three Salk polio shots are necessary for maximum protection against crippling effects of polio.

Children who have had two shots should have the third "booster shot" early in the Spring of 1956, the department urged.

In answer to a series of questions, the Health Department explained that it is not known at present exactly how long protection from three Salk shots will last. Experts now estimate protection at about two and one-half years. Perhaps after that time, booster shots again will be advised.

Persons who already have recovered from polio also should have the shots, the department said. There are three types of polio. Having a case of one type will not set up immunity against the other two. The Salk vaccine is aimed at giving mmunity to all three types.

Only nine Texas children have peen striken with paralytic police despite Salk inoculations, Dr. Henry A. Holle, state health commissioner announced. The nine case were among 473,830 vaccinated children.

Beginning next fall, the Univerity of Texas will admit students on the basis of aptitude test scores. Tests are to be given probably three times a year, without cost to the applicant, at centers throughout



HUGH ROSS APPOINTED TO GOVERNOR'S COMMITTEE FOR REFUGEE RELIEF

The appointment of Hugh W. Ross as local representative for the Governor's Committee for Refugee Relief Program has been announced by John H. Winters, committee chairman. Mr. Ross will act on behalf of the state committee in Callahan County.

The committee was appointed by Governor Allan Shivers at the request of President Eisenhower to inform the people of Texas on the refugee relief program. In addition to Winetrs, who heads the State Department of Public Welfare in Austin, members are the Rev. Henry Herbts, pastor of SS. Peter and Paul Church, New Braunfels; the Rev. A. O. Rast, executive secretary of the Texas Lutheran Mission Board; Leonard L. Holloway of the Baptist General Convention of Texas; Sam W. Levy of Houston and C. W. Pfluger Jr. of Coupland.

Under the Refugee Relief Act of 1953, 214,000 displaced persons were declared admissable to this country Recent figures show slightly over 43,000 have obtained sponsors and have migrated to the United States. Of this number it is estimated that less than 500 have been brought

To be successful in helping displaced persons get a new start in life, the refugee program will need assurances from 30,000 to 40,000 sponsors by early in 1946.

A sponsor is required to give assurance that the refugee will be provided with employment and housing and will not become a public

charge. The refugee's qualifications to fill the job provided him are certified by overseas officials. The Governor's committee noted that a large per centage of the refugees are classified as agricultural workers who could be absorbed easily in the farming and ranching regions of Texas. Many skilled craftsmen are also looking for new homes in

"These refugees have escaped, in many instances, from prisons and spending years in refugee camp waiting for resettlement," said Mr Winters. "Texas is lagging in doing its part in this humanitarian program to which our nation has committed itself. Mr. Ross, as representative of the Governor's Committee for Refugee Relief Program in Callahan County, will give the details of the program to any employer or citizen interested in providing a new opportunity to






