Antlerless Deer Shoot Is About Set To Start

Austin-Harvest of between three and five thousand antlerless deer in underway, said the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commis-

Slighly more than three thousand head antlerless deer were taken last fall when this method of reducing deer overpopulation was given emergency status in Mason, Llano and Gillispie counties.

This year the special harvest has been approved in those three counties. Commission action has paved the way for the anterless hunts in Medina, Kerr, and Blanco counties subject to final approval of county commissioners' courts.

"These special harvests are dictattated by sound game management policies in the face of overpopulation of deer on drought stricken over grazed ranges," said the Executive Secretary. "Removing surplus deer in these counties this fall will be another step toward balancing the herds and will mean a higher survival rate next winter. We know that this action improves the vigor of individual animals and generally improves deer hunting in the long

Hunters will get special permits from landowners. The limit will be tw antlerless deer or one buck and one anterless deer. Hunting lease cost is expected to range from \$10 to \$25, depending on prices set by landowners for hunting privileges Dates for the special hunts in all counties affected will be from December 2 to 11 inclusive.

"Our reports indicate the deer generally are in good condition up to this time," said the Executive Secretary. "Feed temporarily is adequate and the venison made available under these special harves should be choice.

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

THE STATE OF THE S

Do you have a problem in deciding what to do with the leaves that clutter the lawn at this time of year? Don't let it bother you, and don't burn them either. Just pile the leaves, put on a layer of fertilizer and leaves alternating, and water occasionally and next spring you will have a good compost. The application of compost to the flower or vegetable garden next spring will ncrease the organic content of the soil, help keep soil temperatures down, and hold moisture. Compost is valuable too as a mulch. Now is the ime to plan for next spring.

The annual Dairyman's Short Course will be at Texas A and M College on December 1 and 2. Among the topics to be considered are diseases and sanitation problems, feedng, management, breeding, calf aising, marketing and other subects. All dairymen and others interested in the industry are invited to attend.

With winter and probable hard reezes just around the corner it would be a good idea to check up on auxiliary motors, tractor engines and sprayers. It's worth the extra ime and expense to take care of expensive equipment.

The extension Entomologists have prepared a new leaflet, "Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry". Get your copy at the office. Now is the time to get after several of the parasites.


