



Republican candidates, other



Purpose of the Parade of Progress ing of research and engineering; to give people a deeper faith in the American way of life; and to inspire young people to take scientific and engineering careers.

The show carries its own "big top" the Aerodome, described as the only one of its type in existence. The huge tent, with a seating capacity of 1,250, has no poles inside to obstruct vision. It is suspended from arched aluminum girders, and resembles an upside-down umberella.

The Aerodome will be the scene of a 40-minute stage show which will be presented six times daily on week days, and eight times on week

The audience will see startling displays of many basic principles of science, from synthetic rubber made in a pop bottle to a demonstration of a motor that runs on sunshine and a stove that cooks food but never gets hot. A gas turbine engine is demonstrated, and a miniature hydrogen explosion set off.

Around the Aerodome tent will be the nid way or "court" exhibits, contained in 12 specially designed 33-foot long vans called Futurliners.
In one of these exhibits called "Miracles of Heat and Cold" a snowball is created in a flame of 5,000 degrees. The "American Crossroads" shows in 11 minutes the 50-year span in which a village becomes a

For sports car fans, there are two plastic "dream cars" on exhibit. They are the Buick Wildcat and the Oldsmobile 'F-88". By way of contrast, there is also displayed "Old Scout' the first car to set a transcontinental speed record across the

All told there will be 26 major exhibits.

This will be the 121st city in which the Parade of Progress has shown since it went on the road in April, 1953. It has been seen by more than 6,500,000 people in the United States

The show is operated by 60 young men, mostly college graduates. They drive the trucks on the road, put up the Aerodome tent and exhibits and give the lectures and demonstra-







UT Tests Slated

High School seniors with a University of Texas career in mind will find a good vocabulary, logical mind and number sense helpful in taking the scheduled aptitude

Tests may be taken in 42 Texas cities on three dates-Feb. 4, May 12 and Aug. 10.

Dr. H. T. Manuel, director of the University Testing and Guidance Bureau, said that, as a general fule, a student can be confident of his ability to succeed with university work if he is the upper three-fifths of his high school class and makes a score of 75 or more on the aptitude test. Most of those applying for en-trance would be admitted, he said.

The tests are designed to measure two very general abilities in academic work. First the ability to work with words and to understand their meanings. Second is the ability to work with numbers and to solve problems. Scores on the required tests will not be the only basis for admission, Dr. Manuel added. All test scores will be kept confidential.
