Legislative Inquiry No Over Most explosive stage of the house senate inquiry into US Trust and Guaranty may be yet to come.

After a two-day hearing, the house committee voted to "invite" senators who received fees from US Trust to appear before it. Subpoenas were not mentioned. Chairman Wade F. Spilman of McAllen did say, however, that senators who appeared would be put under oatl and cross examined.

This action defied the long-stand ing tradition that each house shall investigate only its own members. It seemed to make pointed reference to the fact that the senate committee neither questioned nor put under oath senators who came before it.

Senate committee hearings also will start again soon, said Chairman William S. Fly. He declined comment on the house move to question senators.

"More than six" legislators will be asked to refund fees they received from US Trust. State Liquidator J. D. Wheeler told the house panel. He noted that two, Sen. Carlos Ashley of Llano, and Sen. William Shireman of Corpus Chi. already have made or offered res titution



Capital Investment Versus Total Receipts

The ratio of capital investment to value of production in egg production in egg production poultry flocks influences the earnings of poultrymen, says Ben Wormeli, extension poultry husbandman.

This subject has been studied by Cornell University for several years. More than a thousand poultry farms were divided according to the number of years it took for total receipts to equal capital investment. A low group required one and a half years, and had a labor income of \$2300. The middle group required two and four-tenths years, and had a labor income of \$1100, while the third group required four years and had

a labor income of only \$200. There seems to be a direct relation between the way a man uses his money and the way he uses his time, says Wormeli.

Warmer climates in southern states offer advantage of lower building investment which is the largest part of total capital invest-

Texas figures are not available but an estimate that would serve as a basis for probable investment on a poultry farm are; land, 5 percent of the total; real-estate (houses) 45 percent; poultry stock, 35 percent; equipment, 10 per cent; and

feed and supplies, 5 percent. If the investment is larger than one and a half times the year's receipts, the poultryman should find out in what area he over invested. On the other hand, if the investment ratio is low, the poultryman may be overlooking some labor saving investments that could increase

labor income. Warmeli adds, as in every business, the poultryman too, must give the dollars involved in his gusiness the skillful managegment needed to bring about satisfactory earnings.







Root plowing of shinnery and oak is not considered advisable by Hickman. However he states this method of brush control apblue brush and other type of woody vegetation not readily controlled by

Hickman has experienced some of the hazards of brush control work on a 320 acre brush pasture. He first started this program in 1947, along with his conservation program on the remaining portion of his approximate 4000-cre farm and

The first step recommended by Hickman in brush control work is to develop a plan for the complete job. Such a plan includes method of dozing brush or supressing brush, applying grass seed where native grasses are not present, flush grazing with goats and timely rotation or deferring grazing to favor grass growth. He finds two or three flush grazings for periods of 10 to 30 days with enough goats to clean leaves from sprouts help eliminate competition to grasses and keep brush under control. In carrying out the control program Hickman has been most successful with spring dozed oak. Spring control is easier because young bads are more palatable and are caten more readily by goats than if permitted to make summer or fall growth. Hickman further points out the importance of spring geating in favoring grass use. He has observed goating brush in the summer and fall sprouts are less palatable gives rise to greater use made of grass in the overall management program.

Grass affords the most practical and effective control of brush, goating, grass management must be uppermost in the management program. Production of large quantities of nutritious livestock feed is essential to profitable grassland agriculture. Late spring and summer deferment has been most profitable for grass recovery on the Hickman

Even though many farmers and ranchers may not want to eradicate all brush, Hickman opinions the merits of grass cover in keeping the invasion of brush under con trol can be made a basis for profitable use of many acres of low producing land now occupied by dens brush and timber. He has found that careful management with goals can be a profitable operation while at the same time suppressing brush. Of course Hickman states the use of mechanical measures on other than oak brush has considerably more merit and is provins profitable in many instances where management is made a part of the brush control program.

Guaranteed purity, higher germination and top crop yields are all on the credit side of certified planting seed. While germination and final yields are dependent upon available moisture, Ben Spears, extension agronomist, says farmers can't afford to gamble with planting seed of questionable quality.

If the planting seed has not been chemically treated for seedborne and seedling diseases, Spears reccomends treatment. He points out that farmers have found this practice profitable and insurance against poor stands and plant losses during early growth.

Local county agents can supply dditional information on seed treating and also on adopted varieties, says Spars.

School Lunch And Milk Program Continues To Expand

Both the School Lunch and School Milk Programs continued to expand during the first half of the current school year, the number of children eating complete lunches under the National School Lunch Program is up 10 percent over last year, and the number of schools approved for the Special School Milk Program is up 48 percent.

Texas now has 2,061 approved for the program. The National School Lunch Program provides children with well-balanced lunches furnished one-third of their dairy nutritional requirements. There were 9,-400,000 children eating lunches with milk under this program in October. This is a gain of 10 per cent over 8,500.000 children in October of last year. Over 2,000,000 more were participating in the milk-only feature of the National School Program last year, making a total participation of nearly 11,000,000. 


