



Over 16,500 Sheep Marketed Monday

Fort Worth-The Easter lamb trade Monday at Fort Worth featured the arrival of more than 16,500 sheep and lambs. It was the largest run in almost a year at the market and exceeded the general expectations, because the earlier Easter and the dry conditions which slowed development of milk fat lambs in much of the Southwest had indicated a much smaller crop than usual.

The market wound up 50 cents lower with new crop milk fat lambs topping at \$21, and old crop lambs down. The major markets on Monday reported receipts of hogs around the 75.00 marker again, and this spurred the buyers at Fort Worth into considerable activity. When the dust settled, the butcher hogs were 50 to 75 cents above last week's close and sows were 50 cents higher.

Choice meat type hogs cashed at \$14.50 to \$14.75. Less desirable weights and grades scaled from \$11 to \$14. Sows drew \$9.50 to \$11.50.

Over Half of Lambs Eaten In Three States

New York, California and Massachusetts people eat over 50 per cent of the United States entire lamb crop. Seven states consume 76 per cent of the entire lamb crop. Distribution of the consumption of lamb is the most narrow of all meats, on the basis of USDA figures on the subject.

Here's the way they rate 'em: New York eats 20 per cent of the lamb crop; California, 21 percent, Massachusetts, 8 percent; Pennsylvania, 6.2 percent; New Jersey, 5.9 percent and Michigan, 4.3 percent.

Faster Hams Not So Plentiful As 1955

The big Easter push on hams will be staged as usual this year, but packers tell me they are not under as much pressure as a ) spite the huge crop this season. They say pork products have been moving surprisingly well and the Government's pork buying program has taken lots of hams out of circulation. Most of these hams were purchased as boned, canned hams. Seasonally smaller offerings of fed cattle and fat hogs have some observers hoping prices will continue to improve a little.





## Trees Rob Farmers Of Crops And Income

Worthless trees rob Texas farmers of thousands of dollars each year. Trees, more deeply rooted than other plants, take a larger portion of yearly rainfall than do cash crops such as cotton, corn, grain sorghum. or grass. G. O. Hoffman, extension range specialist, says, a mesquite tree requires about 2000 pounds of water to produce one pound of leaves and bark, but only 899 pounds is required to produce a pound of cotton and about 600 pounds to pro-

duce a pound of grass. Trees along a fence row increase the difficulty of fence maintainance, prevents the farmer from plowing close to the fence, and, if thorny, cause flat tires. A single tree would offer greater wildlife protection if it were cut and piled so wildlife could get under the brush, says Hoffman.

A mesquite tree 10 inches in diameter and 20 feet tall can keep cotton and grain sorghum from growing on 7,650 square feet of land or 1-6 of an acre. It costs the farmer about \$9.10 in reduced yields to maintain this tree for one year.

To stop this loss of vital soil moisture and nutrients, a quart mixture of 2,4,5,-T and 10 gallons of oil should be sprayed around the base of the tree, says Hoffman. This mixture costs about 49 cents a gallon, while cost of labor and chemicals amount to about three cents a tree. If oaks and other hardwoods are to be treated, a stronger solution is equired, such as one quart of 2,4,5,-T to 6 gallons of oil. Such a mixture will cost about 63 cents a gal-

Methods of treating trees include the frill, cut-off stump, and trunk base. In the frill method, the 2,4,5,-T solution is applied to the cuts of the frill. For cut-off stumps the solution is applied next to the bark allowing some to run down the out-

The trunk-base method is used on trees having diameter under six inches. The solution is applied to the lower 12 inches of the tree, running down the bark channels, and coming in contact with the bud zone. Using these methods, one gallon will treat about 25 to 40 trees. Best time for application, says Hoffman, is during the winter months, December through March. Too many sprouts result if the tree sprayed when it begins to leaf

eral election At their Austin meeting the State Executive Committee agreed (1) to nominate by convention; (2) to hold precinct conventions May 5, county conventions May 8 and the state convention May 22 in Houston; and (3) to focus efforts on the reeelection in November of President Eisenhower and Dallas Congressman Bruce Alger, Texas' only Republi-

can congressman. Texas' delegation to the national GOP convention is expected to be solidly pro-Eisenhower, but the touchy question of a vice presidential nominee has been carefully

avoided.

Vaccine Stretching Debated Public health officials are in disagreement over a proposal to delay third polio shots in order to extend the dwendling vaccine supply

to more people. A two-shot plan was endorsed by the Public Health Service in Washington. Such a plan would stretch the still-short supply of vaccine to cover 25 to 30 million persons, of-

ficials said. Dr. Henry A. Holle, Texas health commissioner, turned thumbs down. He said the difference between two shots and three "could be the difference between having paralytiq

polio and not having it.' Texas' supply is almost exhausted However, a rush order of 150,000 cubic centimeters of the vaccine is expected to arrive before the end of the month. One cubic centimeter is sufficient for one innoculation. Meanwhile 11 new cases of police are reported in Texas, bringing
