Serve Pineapple Meat Balls For A Party Buffet Supper

Pineapple Meat Balls

Meat Balls:

1/2 cup milk
1 slice bread
1 pound hamburger
1 pound ground round
1 egg
2 teaspoons salt
Pepper to taste
Dash garlic salt
2 tablespoons salad oil or shortening

Pineapple Sauce:

1 can beef bouillon
1 #2 can pineapple chunks
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/4 cup wine vinegar
1/2 cup sugar
2 tablespoons Soy sauce
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
2 tablespoons cornstarch

Meat Balls: Pour milk over crumbled bread to soften. Add to combined meats, egg and seasonings. Mix well. With wet fingers form into walnut-sized balls (mixture will be soft). Brown in hot oil, shaking pan frequently so balls will keep their round shape.

Sauce: Combine ingredients except cornstarch and simmer for 15 minutes. Moisten cornstarch in a little water and stir into boiling liquid. Simmer and stir until sauce is clear and thickened. Add browned meat balls and simmer until heated through—about 15 minutes. Serves 8 for dinner or many more for cocktail buffet.

Soil Conservation District News

Application for fish are now being taken through your soil conservation district by technicians at Baird.

Channel cat, bass and bluegill are available for stocking tanks in this area. Farm and ranch ponds are capable of producing fish for food as well as providing livestock water.

Conservation ranching is primarily grass management. A rancher cannot be prosperous without grass. How can a rancher grow grass on bare ground where most of the water runs off in case we do get a good

rain? Range deferment is the answer for many ranchers. A good grass cover means maximum use of rainfall with a small amount of runoff and low evaporation from wind and sunshine. This in turn means a high feed reserve for livestock.

A scant cover of grass means a minimum use of rainfall with high runoff and a high evaporation rate. This in turn means little or no feed reserve.

The water that the rancher saves is the water that grows grass. A good cover of grass stops the destructive force of raindrops, while grass roots keep the soil open so that the water may enter and be used by the grass plant.

From May 1 through October 31 is a very effective time of deferment for the greatest results. Have you considered deferring one or more pastures and growing some grass to sell at a later date?

Navy Enlisting "Texan" Company During April

Chief J. P. Tompkins, USN, Cross Plains Navy Recruiter, announced today that a special company of red-blooded Texans, sailing under the banner of the "Texan" Company, will be enlisted in April by the Navy in an intensified program to obtain the best quality man for service with the Fleet. This company will be enlisted on April 24, 1956, and leave immediately for recruit training at San Diego, Calif.

Young men who enlist in the "Texan" Company will travel with their buddies and close friends, do recruit training with them, and return home on leave with them in early July. "Boot" training will last about nine weeks.

High school graduates are especially desired for the "Texan" Company. Most of these men will be sent to Navy schools where they will learn to operate and maintain highly complicated machinery and weapons. This training is necessary in order to meet the forthcoming needs of the nuclear-powered ships and supersonic jet aircraft of our new Navy. Upon graduation from Navy schools, these men will be assigned to important jobs on ships that will take them to many of the most interesting and adventurous places of the world.

"It isn't necessary to be a high school graduate to qualify for the "Texan" Company Chief Tompkins stated, "but the Navy believes that a man who has what it takes to graduate from high school, is a better bet for further extensive training in the Navy. Any man with a good record who wants to travel, work, learn a trade—and can pass the Armed Forces' Qualification Test—we'll take him".

Aerial Application of Chemical Will Control Mesquite and Oak

Research and practical on the ranch use of chemicals for controlling mesquite, post and blackjack oaks have proved the value of this practice. A. H. Walker, extension range specialist, says the job can be done more cheaply because less chemicals are needed for the aerial spraying job. Too, in many counties ASC will share the cost with the producer.

The specialist lists five points which make for a successful control job. Use the proper chemical at the right time and amount. Secure qualified personnel with experience to do the flying job. Use chemicals with caution. They are non-poisonous but drift can cause damage to susceptible crops. Rest the treated area after spraying and do not expect a miracle. This is a

control program, points out Walker, and retreatment may be required but it will pay dividends if properly done.

He recommends that mesquite be sprayed 50-80 days after the first leaves appear. By this time they should be a dark green color. Apply a third of a pound of low volatile ester of 2,4,5-T or silvex with a half gallon of diesel oil and enough water to make three gallons of spray solution per acre. This can be applied in 60 foot swaths and should cost about \$2.30 an acre, a fourth less than last year. A root kill of from 25 to 35 percent may be expected. Saws Walker and retreatment should be gone in from five to seven years.

For post and blackjack oaks, he says to spray after the leaves have fully developed. Usually from mid May through June. Use one and a half pounds of 2,4,5-T or one and a quarter pounds of silvex per acre in the 3.1 water oil emulsion given for mesquites. Two sprayings in consecutive years or skipping a year is advisable on oak. Under favorable conditions a single application may be 85 percent effective. The cost should run about \$11.50 an acre for the two treatments. The second application should be either one pound of 2,4,5-T or three fourths pound of silvex an acre. Goats can be used profitably in controlling underbrush on sprayed oak areas. They will lengthen the control period and often make a good return.

Our own routine projects of today, as we compete with assorted handicaps imposed by increasing and fishing pressure in the face of shrinking habitat, points up the fact that we are merely in the formative phases of scientifically conducted game and fish management."

Dr. Davis specifically listed the tasks of a wildlife research man: "He may be called upon to work out the life cycle of the animal species involved in natural relationships, even a non-game species, so that its most vulnerable phases may be learned and its control made easier. For example, he may be asked to determine to what extent rodents compete with small game for food, or the importance of minnows as food for game fishes. Consequently, the research man must have a profound knowledge of basic science, which is usually achieved only by graduate work leading to the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. This man is comparable to the research doctor in the medical field who may be trying to discover a means of curing cancer. Both must be highly trained in the basic sciences of chemistry, physics, mathematics and biology."

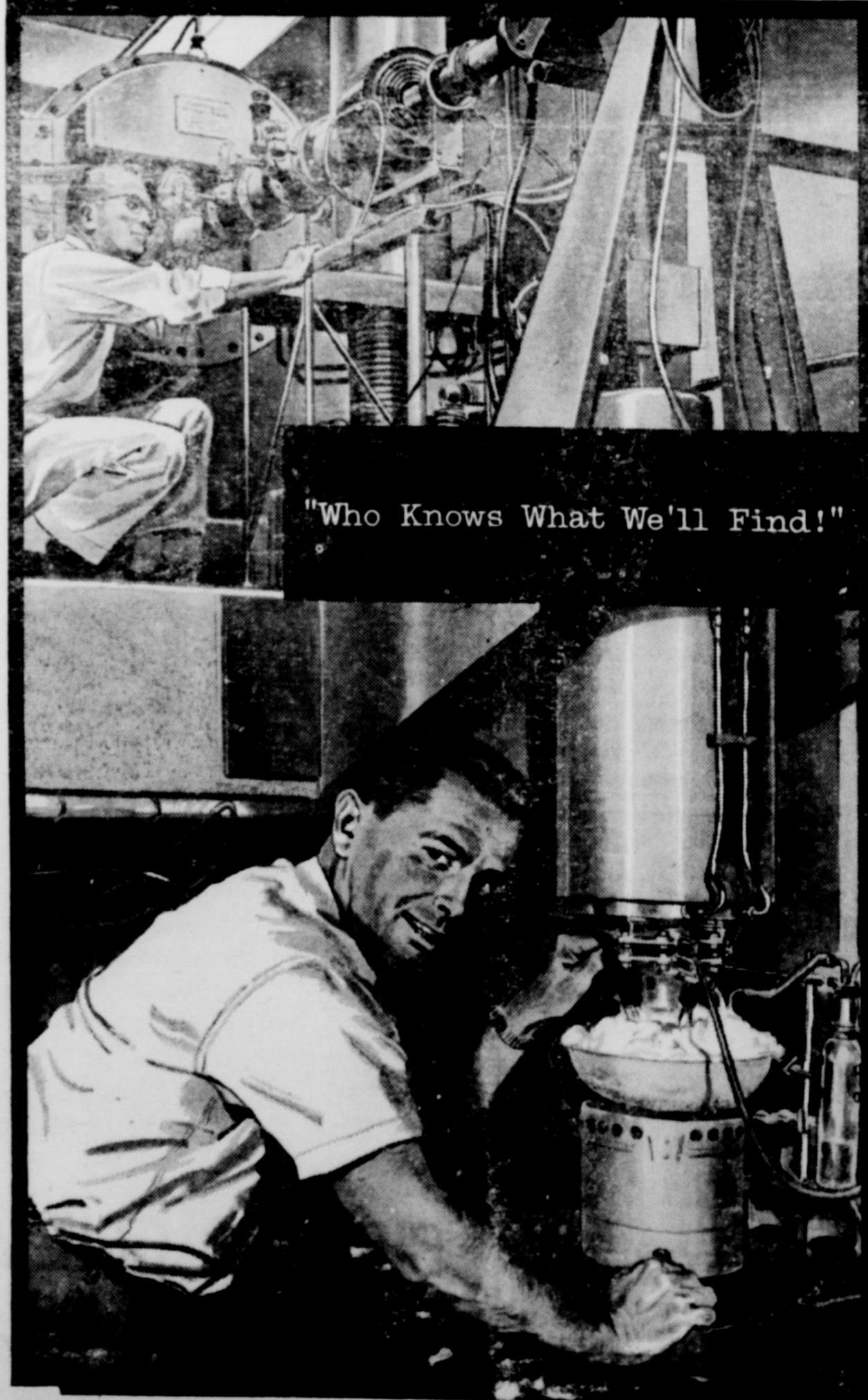

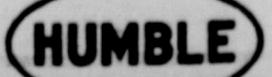
